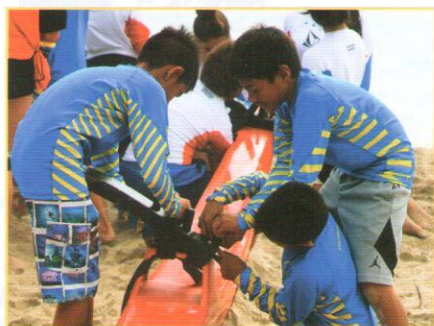

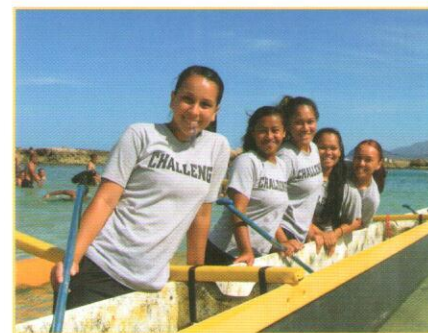

DONORS & STUDENT ATHLETES HELP PERPETUATE THE "DUKE SPORTS"

On June 16th the Annual Mahalo Luncheon was held at the Outrigger Canoe Club bringing together some of ODKF's major donors with many of the scholarship and grant recipients. The luncheon is an opportunity for donors to meet those whose lives they directly impact, and for the student-athletes who benefit from their generosity to thank them personally. Realizing the importance of perpetuating the spirit and legacy of Duke Kahanamoku, and the cultural and historical significance of the "Duke sports" to Hawaii's communities, resonated throughout all in attendance. The audience was treated to a grounding and moving speech by guest speaker, former Olympian and Founder of Spike & Serve Volleyball Club, Kevin Wong. He challenged our recipients to set the highest of goals, while acknowledging how fortunate our community is to have an organization like ODKF whose dedication and donor support continues to affect the lives and opportunities of so many.

As a result of our generous and loyal donors, ODKF was able to present \$165,000 in scholarships and grants to eighty-eight outstanding Hawaii scholar-athletes and non-profit organizations involved in water sports and volleyball. Sixty-six exemplary scholar-athletes received \$120,200 in college scholarships for the upcoming school year. A total of \$44,500 in athletic grants went to twenty-two awardees, comprised of Hawaii athletes competing in water sports and volleyball events, along with non-profit organizations providing competitive events and youth development programs in the "Duke sports".

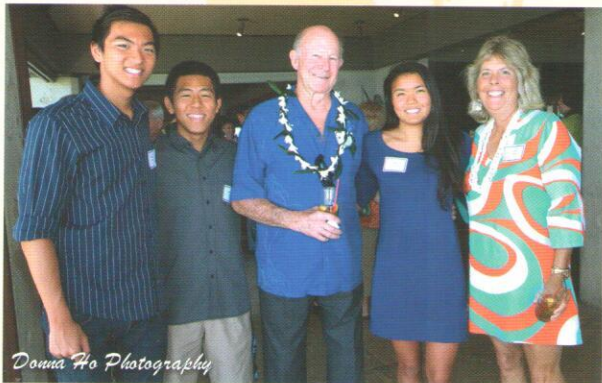

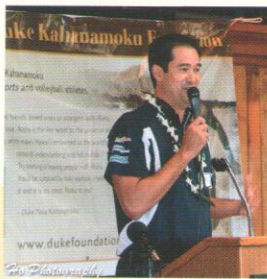

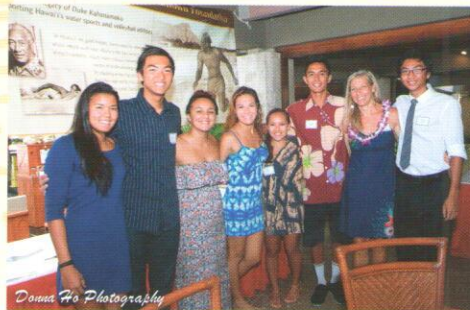

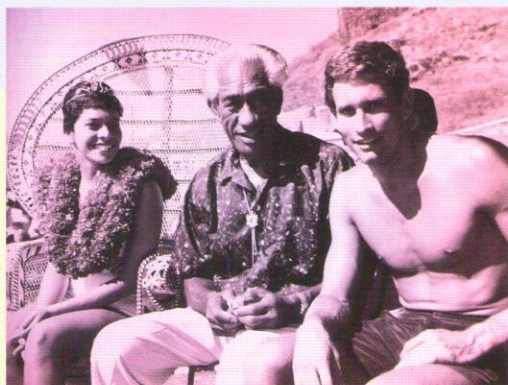

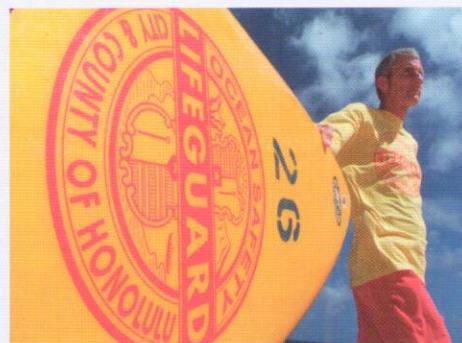

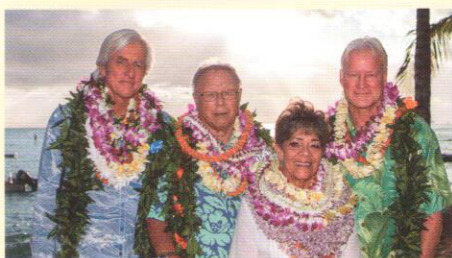

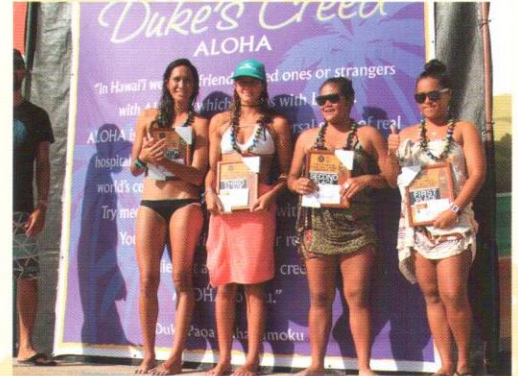
WAIKIKI'S PREMIER OCEAN SPORTS FESTIVAL



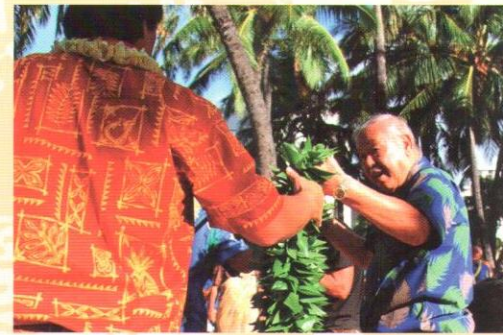

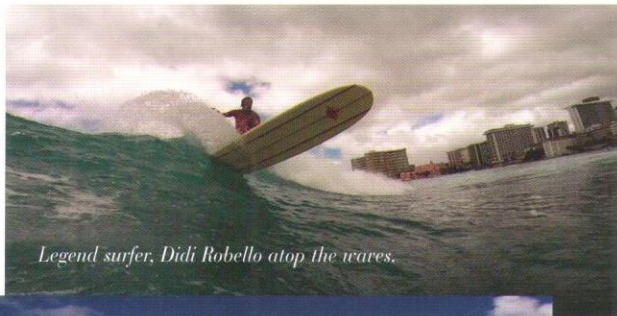

ODKF ATHLETIC GRANTS AND SCHOLARSHIPS

There are three types of grants made by the Foundation: athletic grants for teams and individuals, event grants and scholarships. Athletic and event grants are directed towards specific purposes such as upcoming tournaments or competitions. These grants may be awarded to an individual, team or event. **Individual and Team athletic grant applications are awarded one time per year with a deadline of February 15th. Event athletic grants have a deadline of September 15th for events occurring in the following fiscal year.** The purpose of these grants is to sponsor, promote and encourage amateur participants in state, national and international competition in the sports of canoeing, surfing, kayaking, swimming, water polo and volleyball. Scholarship grants are given to athletes who participate in the same sports as athletic grantees and additionally are in need of assistance in pursuing post high school education. **Scholarship applications are accepted from January 1 to March 1 of each year.**

All grants and scholarship applicants must be residents of Hawaii and participate in the "Duke Sports." For complete requirements or to apply, go to www.dukefoundation.org.
