President's Message

Aloha!

This was indeed another banner year for the Outrigger Duke Kahanamoku Foundation.

ODKF's principal mission – financially supporting Hawai'i's outstanding college scholar-athletes, as well as individuals and teams competing nationally and internationally in "Duke Sports" – remained at the forefront of our considerable range of projects.

To that end, ODKF awarded more than \$154,000 in scholarships and grants to 92 Hawai'i individuals and teams whose scholastics and competitive endeavors were representative of Duke's enduring legacy.

In addition, ODKF awarded its third annual Duke Kahanamoku Ambassador of Aloha Scholarship to Tyler Amina of Kamehameha, who is now studying pre-med and playing water polo at Princeton University. Like his predecessors, Tyler was selected from a stellar field of candidates and earned the \$10,000 scholarship because we felt he best exemplified Duke's character and spirit.

Duke's OceanFest solidified itself as the "Must See, Must Do" summertime event in Waikiki, enjoying record numbers of competitors and attendees for this ocean sports celebration the week of Duke's birthday anniversary in August. As is our tradition, the week of festivities was capped by an emotional lei draping ceremony at Duke's statue, at which the Kahanamoku family paid special recognition to ODKF for its ongoing efforts to perpetuate Duke's memory.

Now in its ninth year, Duke's OceanFest would not be possible but for the energetic and tireless efforts of its founder, Jim Fulton, and a dedicated team of enthusiastic supporters led by Chris Colgate and Marty Thomas, and dozens of hardworking volunteers. We are also profoundly thankful to our major corporate sponsors, Hawaiian Airlines, Outrigger Hotels & Resorts, the Madden Corporation, Oceanic Time Warner Cable, Corona, and Duke's Waikiki for their support of this superb event.

The success of Duke's OceanFest was also the primary driver behind ODKF being named the Non-Profit Marketer of the Year by the Hawai'i Chapter of the American

Marketing Association. What a terrific and well-deserved honor!

Also in August, under the spirited leadership of Dr. Malia Kamisugi, ODKF launched the first-ever Hawai'i Waterman Hall of Fame, an enduring testament to the finest aquatic athletes in the sports most closely associated with Duke.

Canoe champions Wally Froiseth and Nappy Napoleon, surfing legends Fred Hemmings, Eddie Aikau, Buffalo Keaulana, Rabbit Kekai and Rell Sunn, swimming icon Keo Nakama, and, of course, the legendary Duke himself, comprised the inaugural Waterman Hall of Fame class for 2010. Many thanks to Primo Beer for their very generous support of this tribute.

The remainder of 2010 featured other ODKF signature events, notably our annual Mahalo Luncheon at the Outrigger Canoe Club, Duke's Water Sports and Fitness Days for the Boys and Girls Club and Hawaii Youth Challenge Academy, and a wonderful donor appreciation party at Mike and Judy Pietsch's lovely Wailupe home.

That so much could be accomplished with such quality can only be attributed to one of the greatest boards I have ever had the privilege of serving with.

Notable among the board members are past president Malia Kamisugi, Billy Philpotts and Wink Arnott in making the Hawai'i Waterman Hall of Fame a reality; Stefan Reinke for organizing the Mahalo Luncheon; Judy Pietsch and Bill Pratt for their superb efforts in the development area; AnnMarie Mizuno as our judicious financial chair; Patrick Shea's year-long support as our incoming president; and Roberta Cullen who, as our executive administrator, kept everything on track with flawless precision.

Lastly, to our volunteers and donors, I send you a thousand mahalos for your support, hard work and considerable generosity.

GRANT RECIPIENTS FOR 2009-2010

Receiving grants were 14 events, 11 teams, and 14 individuals. There were 53 student-athletes receiving college aid in the amounts from \$500 to \$2,000 with three Duke Kahanamoku Ambassador of Aloha Scholarship winners receiving \$10,000 each. Of these 31 were women and 22 were men. The winners came from Maui, Molokai, Kaua'i, the Big Island and O'ahu.

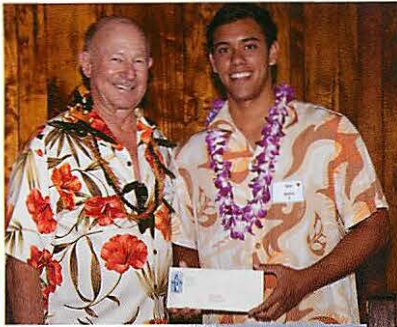

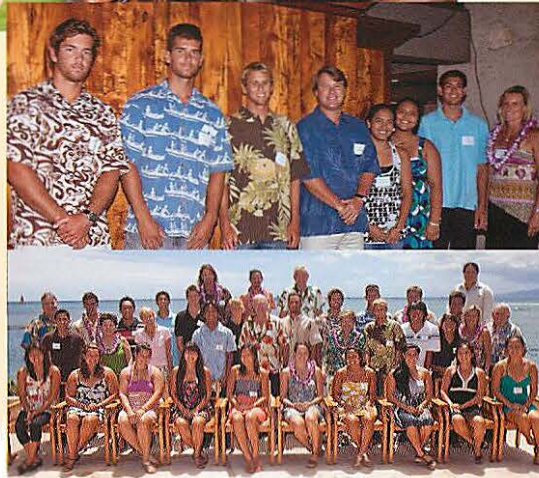

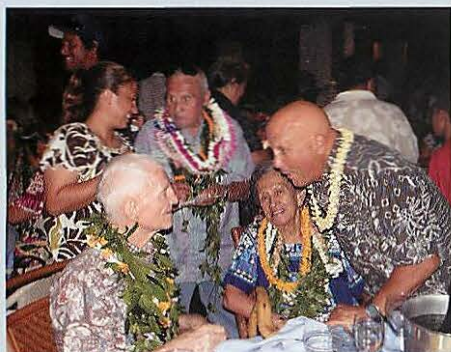

"The Hawai'i Waterman Hall of Fame celebrates individuals whose contributions to water sports unite, inspire and remind us of the unique opportunities our oceans provide our communities." So reads the mission statement of the ODKF Waterman Hall of Fame, which was launched on Duke's Birthday, August 24th, at the Outrigger Canoe Club. Our inaugural class represented a slate of famed watermen and waterwomen who have been true leaders, competitors and mentors both in and out of the water including: Wally Froiseth (canoe paddling, surfing), Buffalo Keaulana (surfing), Rabbit Kekai (surfing, canoe paddling), Nappy Napoleon (canoe paddling), Keo Nakama (swimming), Fred Hemmings (surfing, canoe paddling), Rell Sunn (surfing, canoe paddling, first female lifeguard), Eddie Aikau (surfing) and Duke Kahanamoku (surfing, swimming, canoe paddling).

The event quickly sold out and the feelings of ohana and camaraderie were heavy in the air. Maunaloa started the evening's entertainment, which ended in a jam session joined by Nappy Napoleon and Fred Lunt. Todd Bradley emceed the "short and sweet" induction ceremony which was led by a video tribute edited by Hawaiian Extreme TV honoring our posthumous inductees. Governor Lingle attended and told the crowd about her first surfing lesson with Senator Hemmings out at Old Man's.

THE PURPOSE

of the Outrigger Duke Kahanamoku Foundation is to financially support the development of individuals and organizations that perpetuate the spirit and legacy of Duke Kahanamoku. • ODKF accomplishes this by encouraging athletes and scholars whose endeavors will contribute to the growth and development of athletics in Hawai'i; supporting athletic events and participation by teams and individuals in local, national and international competition; supporting individuals in furthering their education; and assisting in preserving, perpetuating and developing sports which have a special cultural or historical significance to Hawai'i.

DESIGNATED FUNDS

There are Eleven ODKF Board Designated Funds. ODKF awards grants to athletes, teams, scholar-athletes and sporting events in the name of the funds listed below. We thank the families and friends who have made these grants possible.

Muriel Macfarlane Flanders Fund: Established by Muriel Flanders to support water sports in Hawai'i, to perpetuate the Macfarlane Fourth of July Regatta and to honor the accomplishments of Duke Paoa Kahanamoku. Through this Fund this gracious lady's legacy will surely endure.

Terrence McCarthy Fund: Established by Terrence McCarthy in memory of her husband Edmond McCarthy, who firmly believed in the combination of athletics and education. Mrs. McCarthy honored her husband by supporting Hawai'i's top scholar athletes.

Tom "Daddy" Haine Fund: Established in 1994, funds support the sport of volleyball in Hawai'i. Haine was the captain of the 1968 U.S. Olympic men's volleyball team. He was an 18-time USVBA All-American and in 1991 was inducted into the U. S. Volleyball Hall of Fame. He was a member of the original Outrigger Foundation that later merged with the Duke Kahanamoku Foundation to form ODKF.

Kala Kukea Fund: Established in 1996 and

named for one of Hawai'i's top overall water sportsmen. Kukea touched the lives of many young athletes in his short 52 years on earth. He was an outstanding competitor, coach and role model. In 1996 he posthumously received the Hawaiian Canoe Racing Association John DeRego Perpetual trophy for service to the Association and to the Molokai-Oahu canoe race.

Cline Mann Fund: Named for John Cline Mann, a superb water sportsman who died in 1996. He was captain of his Dartmouth College swimming team, an avid small boat sailor, and a strong promoter of paddleboard racing. Grants from this fund help to support the annual Cline Mann Paddleboard Race. Cline Mann was also a member of the original Board of Directors of the Duke Kahanamoku Foundation (DKF) that was founded in 1963. He played an instrumental role in the merger of DKF and the Outrigger Foundation to create the present Outrigger Duke Kahanamoku Foundation (ODKF).

Thomas M. Arnott Fund: Established by Marian Arnott in loving memory of her husband who was a great supporter of both OCC and ODKF. Tommy Arnott, a masterful surfer, was also recognized for competing in canoe races with Duke Kahanamoku. As teammates they beat all their competition in the early 1940's. Consequently this fund supports inter-

scholastic canoe paddling in Hawai'i.

Henry Ayau Fund: Established in memory of this renowned athlete and his legacy. A "Moloka'i Boy," Henry excelled in life as a businessman, sportsman and community servant. An exceptional athlete, Henry was a noted baseball player, surfer, canoe paddler, and world-class free diver. Many viewed him as a modern day "Ambassador of Aloha."

Kirk Smith Fund: Established in 2007 in memory of Kirk Smith who came to Hawai'i to catch waves and caught an enduring love of the Islands. He created the Hawaiian Airlines Duke's Legends Surf Classic as part of Duke's OceanFest. Without his energy and passion it would not be the great event that it is today. His family and friends knew how important it was for Kirk to support water sports and the young scholar athletes of Hawai'i and, thus, created this special fund in his name.

Rand Booth Carlson Fund: Randy Carlson loved Hawai'i, the ocean, and traveling to exotic places but most of all, teaching young people. An artist by nature, poet in spirit, and voyager to the core, "Mr. C" inspired his students to explore and embrace the wonders of the world surrounding them. He was also an accomplished canoe paddler whose grandfather competed with Duke Kahanamoku in the 1932 Olympics. Randy's family established

this fund to perpetuate his legacy of motivating young people to achieve, love life, and forever learn.

David & Keanuenue Rochlen Fund: Established in 2010 in their loving memory to perpetuate Hawaiian water sports and encourage young athletes as they did in life. Dave, an accomplished waterman, lifeguard, stuntman and philosopher, forever influenced beach culture with creative, colorful beach and resort wear, delivering the message to embrace Color, Freedom, Difference and Love. Keanuenue was also a water woman and athlete in her own right, recognized by the Outrigger Canoe Club with a Winged "O" for her outstanding achievements in surfing, paddling, beach volleyball, tennis, golf and softball. All the while, they raised their family to enjoy the ocean and respect their island roots. Dave and Keanuenue enthusiastically embraced island life, gave freely, and both loved to share with their friends and ohana.

Title Guaranty Fund: Title Guaranty established this fund to support the Ambassador of Aloha scholarship. As Hawai'i's oldest and largest escrow and title Company, Title Guaranty is committed to promoting and protecting the same values embodied by Duke's creed. This fund to support ODKF's signature scholarship reflects Title Guaranty's belief in Hawai'i's future leaders.

The financial statements for the ODKF as of and for the year ended September 30, 2009 were reviewed by CW Associates. These financial statements are available to our members by request.

A report has been developed for the foundation's un-reviewed financial results for the fiscal year ending September 30, 2010. These financial statements are now being reviewed. When that review is completed in January 2011, they will be available to members by request. Scholarship grants for fiscal year 2009-2010 totaled \$109,000 and athletic grants

for the year totaled \$45,500.

Foundation income came from donors who specify an amount be charged to their OCC account, as well as those who make cash contributions. Additional funds were raised through activities connected to the Duke's OceanFest, the Hawai'i Waterman Hall of Fame Awards and royalty payments from TS Enterprises (Duke's Restaurant) and Malama Pono.

Applications for Athletic and Scholarship Grants

GENERAL INFORMATION

There are three types of grants made by the Foundation: athletic, event and scholarship. **Athletic and Event grants** are directed towards specific purposes such as upcoming tournaments or competitions. These grants may be awarded to an individual, team or event/organization. Individual and team athletic grant applications are awarded one time per year with a deadline of February 15th. Event grants have a deadline of August 15th each year for events occurring in the following fiscal year: October 1st through September 30th. The purpose of these grants is to sponsor, promote and encourage amateur participants in state, national and international competition in the sports of canoeing, surfing, kayaking, swimming, water polo and volleyball. **Scholarship grants** are given to athletes who participate in the same sports as athletic grantees and additionally are in need of assistance in pursuing post high school education. These applications are accepted from January 1 to April 1 of each year.

GRANT REQUIREMENTS:

All Applicants must:

Be a resident of Hawai'i and an American citizen.
Submit a grant application.
Submit a personal letter of intention.
Include last federal tax return (or parents' if claimed as a dependent).
Submit a recent photo, preferably an athletic action shot.

Individual and Team Applicants must also:

Participate as an amateur in competitive "Duke" sports and provide a record of accomplishments.
Describe their training program and history.
Include a letter from an athletic coach or trainer.
Demonstrate financial need.
Be applying for a specific upcoming event.

In addition to the requirements listed above, Scholarship Grant Applicants must:

Plan to attend an accredited college as a full time student.
Submit a transcript of grades.
Submit two letters of reference.

Event/Organization Applicants must:

Be a resident of Hawai'i and an American citizen.
Prove that the proposed event will promote Duke's legacy.
Show how ODKF will be represented at this event.
Show the history of the event.
Be applying for a specific upcoming event.
Provide organizational and financial documentation.
