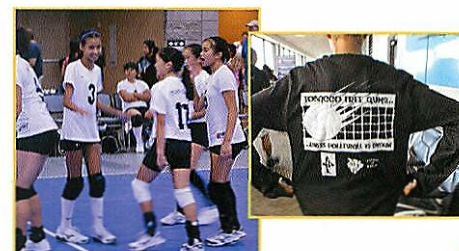

GRANT RECIPIENTS FOR 2008-2009

Thirteen events, seven teams and fifteen individuals received grants. There were sixty student-athletes receiving college aid in the amounts from \$500 to \$2,000 with two Duke Kahanamoku Ambassador of Aloha Scholarship winners receiving \$10,000 each. Of these 41 were women and 19 were men. The winners came from Maui, Kauai, the Big Island and Oahu.

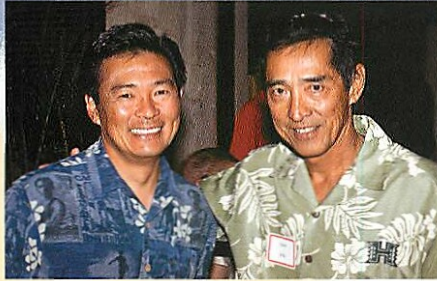

Nanea is gracious, focused, friendly and thoughtful, qualities recognized by her teachers, coaches and peers.

The Ambassador of Aloha Scholarship is awarded to one college-bound high school senior each year who embodies the spirit and character that made Duke such a beloved figure in Hawaii and around the world. We feel Nanea represents what this scholarship is about.

KGMB's Guy Hagi, a waterman in his own right, again served as a masterful master of ceremonies. Our special guest speaker was Duane DeSoto, the founder of Na Kama Kai, a youth program utilizing ocean awareness and safety to increase the capacity of youth in the community through cultural and environmental education.

Among our special guests were family members representing Board Designated Fund honorees, including Carol, Marian and Wink Arnott (Thomas Arnott Fund), Kisi, Marc and Marilyn Haine (Tom "Daddy" Haine Fund) and Audrey Higuchi (Kirk Smith Fund). 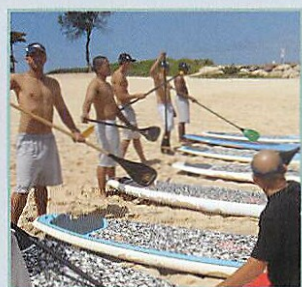

The Boys and Girls Club Hawaii's (BGCH) 8th Annual Duke's Ocean Sports & Fitness Day

This event engaged some 160+ youths between the ages of 10-14. Participants received transportation, an event lycra (rashguard), refreshments, and lunch from Duke's Restaurant Waikiki all free of charge. Over a hundred dedicated volunteers helped make the day possible as they hosted a series of different clinics, providing instruction in canoe paddling & ocean safety, surfing, body boarding and stand up paddling (at Kalama Beach); and beach volleyball. Clinic hosts and volunteers included friends from Outrigger Canoe Club, Aloha Surf Lifesaving, Bank of Hawaii, Boys & Girls Club of Hawaii Alliance members, Hawaiian Island Creations and some of its ambassadors and the Hawaii Pacific University Women's Volleyball team with Coach Kapis. Participants were provided a unique opportunity to learn about ocean awareness, ocean safety, health and fitness and apply those lessons directly throughout the day. The experience for all involved was one of fun, laughter, and great memories as volunteers and members shared time learning and laughing together in the varying clinics. As one volunteer put it "I was reminded of why I do this when one young BGCH participant came up to me and said 'thank you', sharing how appreciative and excited they were to be here today." The event culminated with the 250+ volunteers and participants coming together for recognition of everyone's efforts and lunch provided by Duke's Restaurant Waikiki. The ono grinds and camaraderie of all was a great end to an awesome event. The 9th Annual Duke's Ocean Sports & Fitness Day is tentatively scheduled for mid-April 2010 at Kailua Beach.

ODKF also supported a new mini surf event that was held on July 25, 2009 at White Plains Beach for BGCH's Leeward coast members. The event, entitled the Barbers Point Surf Challenge, allowed some 50 BGCH youths ages 9 -18 from Waianae, Nanakuli, and Kahikolu Homeless Shelter to participate in a surfing clinic. Professional and amateur surfers attended and taught BGCH youth water safety and general wave knowledge, as well as specific techniques for boogie boarding and surfing. These professional watermen also talked to members about the dangers of drugs and alcohol. We look forward to next year's event in the summer of 2010.

A Day at the Beach for the Hawaii National Guard Youth Challenge Academy

For more than four years ODKF has partnered with the Hawaii National Guard Youth Challenge Academy (YCA) to help provide 16-to-19 year-old "at risk" youth a second chance to obtain their high school diploma and become productive citizens within the community. ODKF sponsors two Duke's Ocean Water Sports Days a year and provides four \$500 grants for each graduating class to help awardees with college or to develop a trade. The Duke's Ocean Sports Days are held in one of Ko'Olina's Lagoons and allow YCA members to participate in water sports activities and reinforce their learning in the program. Administered by the Hawaii National Guard since its inception in August 1994, YCA has graduated 30 classes totaling approximately 3,000 students. Currently, 85% of the Cadets completing the program have earned their high school diploma.

Five things set Hawaii's Youth Challenge Academy apart from other programs serving "at-risk" youth.

- The five month Residential military based approach not only instills discipline and a sense of self worth, but also establishes an effective learning environment by supervising the students' time 24-hours a day.
- Each cadet is given the opportunity to study and take the GED to earn their high school diploma. They are also required to participate in community service activities.
- Family support is nurtured in numerous educational parenting sessions.
- The 12 month Post-Residential, mentoring period provides personalized guidance, to help each student face the difficult choices that establish and maintain a foundation for a productive future.
- YCA takes an active interest in the success of its students well beyond the mentorship phase.

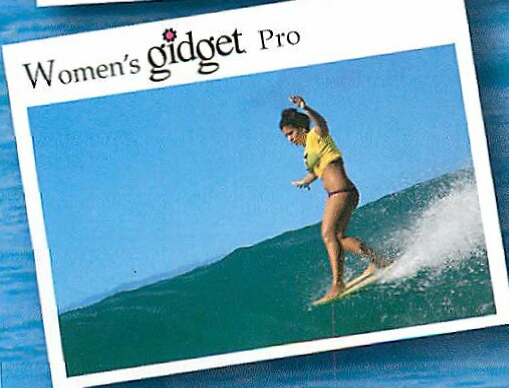
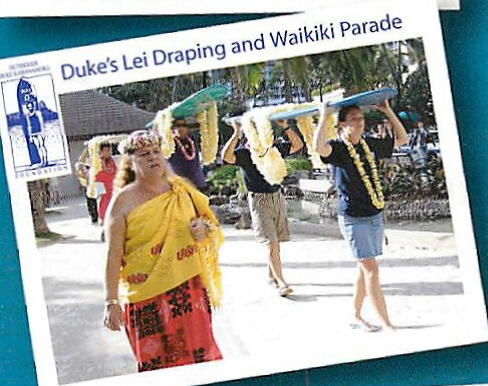

Having taken time to reflect, I felt this year's Duke's OceanFest was the best one yet, especially considering the economic challenges our sponsors, participants, and volunteers have had to confront in 2009.

Nevertheless, perseverance and hard work won out and I am thankful for how everyone continued to maintain their faith in what has developed into the premier ocean sports festival in Waikiki. The entire week was one thrill after another, but there are a few highlights worth singling out.

First, we were delighted to welcome two new event sponsors who added the luster of professional longboard surfing to our week of events. The "Toes on the Nose Rabbit Kekai Pro Longboard Classic" moved its event this year from Costa Rica to Waikiki, carrying on the legacy of one of Hawaii's beloved watermen and legendary beach boys. Additionally, the "Gidget Women's Pro Open" brought many of the world's best women longboarders to Waikiki.

Kudos to the Hawaii Paddleboard Championship for not just staging another exciting "Duke's Race" from Hawaii Kai to Waikiki, but for encouraging physically challenged paddleboarders to compete. Duke would be so proud. What an inspiration!

The Duke's Waikiki Ocean Mile Swim surpassed expectations by drawing 319 competitors for a morning sprint off Waikiki Beach. Swimming catapulted Duke Kahanamoku onto the world stage, so it was gratifying to see such a strong turnout for an event that goes to the core of Hawaii's water sports legacy. A big mahalo goes to Chris Colgate, a dedicated waterman who gives way more than he's ever given credit for, both to this event and to Duke's OceanFest as a whole.

Finally, Duke's OceanFest garnered some great exposure on the Internet courtesy of the live streaming video that Oceanic Time Warner Cable aired at www.dukefoundation.org. The streaming video received more than 260,000 hits during the three days of the surfing competition, with many online visitors coming from the mainland and internationally. We are excited about the potential this offers for taking the events of Duke's OceanFest, the beauty of Waikiki, and the legacy of Duke Kahanamoku to the rest of the world.

As is always the case, all of our efforts support the Outrigger Duke Kahanamoku Foundation (ODKF) and its good work for Hawaii's scholar-athletes in water sports and volleyball. The sponsorships, the t-shirts and luau tickets sold, and the work of volunteers – everything in some way or another benefits ODKF and the outstanding young men and women of Hawaii it is committed to serve.

THE PURPOSE

of the Outrigger Duke Kahanamoku Foundation is to financially support the development of individuals and organizations that perpetuate the spirit and legacy of Duke Kahanamoku. • ODKF accomplishes this by encouraging athletes and scholars whose endeavors will contribute to the growth and development of athletics in Hawai'i; supporting athletic events and participation by teams and individuals in local, national and international competition; supporting individuals in furthering their education; and assisting in preserving, perpetuating and developing sports which have a special cultural or historical significance to Hawai'i.

DESIGNATED FUNDS

There are eight ODKF Board Designated Funds.

Muriel Macfarlane Flanders

Endowed Fund: Established by Muriel Flanders to support water sports in Hawai'i, perpetuate the Macfarlane Fourth of July Regatta and honor the accomplishments of Duke Paoa Kahanamoku. Through this Fund this gracious lady's legacy will surely endure.

Terrence McCarthy Fund:

Established by Terrence McCarthy in memory of her husband Edmond McCarthy, who firmly believed in the combination of athletics and education. Mrs. McCarthy honored her husband by supporting Hawai'i's top scholar athletes.

Tom "Daddy" Haine Fund:

Established in 1994, funds support the sport of volleyball in Hawai'i. Haine was the captain of the 1968 U.S. Olympic men's volleyball team. He was an 18-time USVBA All-American and in 1991 was

inducted into the U.S. Volleyball Hall of Fame. He was a member of the original Outrigger Foundation that later merged with the Duke Kahanamoku Foundation to form ODKF.

Kala Kukea Fund:

Established in 1996 and named for one of Hawai'i's top overall water sportsmen. Kukea touched the lives of many young athletes in his short 52 years on earth. He was an outstanding competitor, coach and role model. In 1996 he posthumously received the Hawaiian Canoe Racing Association John DeRego Perpetual trophy for service to the Association and to the Molokai-Oahu canoe race.

Cline Mann Fund:

Named for John Cline Mann, a superb water sportsman who died in 1996. He was captain of his Dartmouth College swimming team, an avid small boat sailor, and a strong promoter of paddleboard racing. Grants from this fund help to

support the annual Cline Mann Paddleboard Race. Cline Mann was also a member of the original Board of Directors of the Duke Kahanamoku Foundation (DKF) that was founded in 1963. He played an instrumental role in the merger of DKF and the Outrigger Foundation to create the present Outrigger Duke Kahanamoku Foundation (ODKF).

Thomas Arnott Fund:

Established by Marian Arnott in loving memory of her husband who was a great supporter of both OCC and ODKF. Tommy Arnott, a masterful surfer, was also recognized for competing in canoe races with Duke Kahanamoku. As teammates they beat all their competition in the early 1940s. Consequently this fund supports interscholastic canoe paddling in Hawai'i.

Henry Ayau Fund:

Established in memory of this renowned athlete and his legacy. A "Moloka'i Boy," Henry excelled in life as a businessman, sportsman and community ser-

The financial statements for the ODKF as of and for the year ended September 30, 2008 were reviewed by CW Associates. These financial statements are available to our members by request.

A report has been developed for the foundation's un-reviewed financial results for the fiscal year ending September 30, 2009. These financial statements are now being reviewed. When that review is completed in January 2010, they will be available to members by request. Scholarship grants for fiscal year 2008-2009 totaled

\$99,500 and athletic grants for the year totaled \$90,862.

Foundation income came from donors who specify an amount be charged to their OCC account, as well as those who make cash contributions. Additional funds were raised through activities connected to the Duke's OceanFest and royalty payments from TS Enterprises (Duke's Restaurant) and Malama Pono.

GENERAL INFORMATION

There are three types of grants made by the Foundation: athletic, event and scholarship. **Athletic and Event grants** are directed towards specific purposes such as upcoming tournaments or competitions. These grants may be awarded to an individual, team or even/organization. Individual and Team athletic grant applications are awarded one time per year with a deadline of February 15th. Event grants have a deadline of August 15th each year for events occurring in the following fiscal year. The purpose of these grants is to sponsor, promote and encourage amateur participants in state, national and international competition in the sports of canoeing, surfing, kayaking, swimming, water polo and volleyball. **Scholarship grants** are given to athletes who participate in the same sports as athletic grantees and additionally are in need of assistance in pursuing post high school education. These applications are accepted from January 1 to April 1 of each year.

GRANT REQUIREMENTS:

All Applicants must:

Be a resident of Hawai'i and an American citizen.
Submit a grant application.
Submit a personal letter of intention.
Include last federal tax return (or parents' if claimed as a dependent).
Submit a recent photo, preferably an athletic action shot.

Individual and Team Applicants must also:

Participate as an amateur in competitive "Duke" sports and provide a record of accomplishments.
Describe their training program and history.
Include a letter from an athletic coach or trainer.
Demonstrate financial need.
Be applying for a specific upcoming event.

In addition to the requirements listed above, Scholarship Grant Applicants must:
Plan to attend an accredited college as a full time student.

Submit a transcript of grades.
Submit two letters of reference.

Event/Organization Applicants must:

Be a resident of Hawai'i and an American citizen.
Prove that the proposed event will promote Duke's legacy.
Show how ODKF will be represented at this event.
Show the history of the event.
Be applying for a specific upcoming event.
Provide organizational and financial documentation.
