This year our crews turned in six first places, three second places and one third. They captured the Open Men's Four Race, a special one mile event for four men rather than the regular six.



Our Novice Men paddled a fine race and came through with a second place, but were disqualified. The Boys' 16 set things right with a win in their 1/2mile event. The 16's were followed by the Freshmen Women with another first place in their 1/2-mile race. Not to be outdone, the Junior Women came up with yet another first in their 1/2-mile event. Our fortunes turned to third place with the Junior Men who paddled a fine race but couldn't quite get that needed speed to get in first. The Blue Ribbon Event, as it is called when any club other than Outrigger wins it, was beautifully won by our vastly improved and spirited Senior Men's crew. Their win was an easy one, not to say they didn't work; indeed they did, like a polished machine. With this most important win came the Macfarlane Trophy and much champagne. Following the triumphant Senior win came the Boys' 18 who not to be outdone performed a beautiful race and won a first place. The final event was the Freshmen Men which had to be the closest race of the day, and but for four-tenths of a second, the outcome of the regatta. The Freshmen took the closest second place that has possibly ever been recorded and thus went the regatta.

A special four-man race is held at the Macfarlane regatta. Its stakes are high—a case of beer. Well, that Outrigger beer stayed right with the Outrigger Canoe Club this year. Our four-man crew consisted of Mark Buck, Fred Hemmings, Gary Blaich and Glenn Perry. Their win was so clear they had the Kakina out of the water before the others reached shore.

This year's regatta was held in rather mild surf; as a result there were few if any swampings. Our only crew to suffer at the hands of the surf was the Junior Men as they were going out on the start. They took on a lot of water but kept going.

Mark Buck and all of his crews thank the membership for their splendid turn-out for this, the Outrigger Canoe






