Annual Macfarlane Regatta JULY 4

It was one of the wildest days at Waikiki in recent years. The surf started coming up on Thursday the 3d and by race time the morning of the 4th First Break waves were common; big outside Castles were running line after line and at times the entire Waikiki Beach almost closed out. 




The 16's go out.

The most satisfying race of the day for Outrigger was the Junior Girls. **Mike Lemes** steered a beautiful race, holding for the surf and then charging ahead with his allgirl crew at the right moment through the surf around the flag and home on a beautiful wave that provided a fitting finish to a superbly calculated race.

The Junior Men provided the most upside down race of the day. Steve Scott and his crew of Pat Spencer, Henry Ayau, Billy Mitchell, Bob Arnott and Terry Deacon provided all kinds of action. They were swamped on their second mile of two and seemed almost out of the race. After bailing, they got underway determined to finish with at least a point. On the way in on the second mile, they caught the wave of the day and for a second it looked as though they had it all the way in but Steve got jammed by a surfboard and that ended it, the wipe out of the day, great for the spectators, very hard on the crew and Leilani. With all of this, the Juniors now proficient in bailing, bailed and came in for fourth place and a vital point.

The main event of the day, the Senior race, showed that the best are also at the mercy of the surf. The first mile of the scheduled two and a half mile race went quite well for the Seniors but going out for the second mile brought a very untimely swamp and of course the frustrating time cost in bailing. The Seniors got under-

way again and made their next mile but got in trouble with the surf again in the last half but nonetheless managed to make a third place. The Seniors were Marty Wilson, Tom Conner, Jon Haneberg, Mark Buck, Mike Holmes and Mike Lemes. After all the swamps and waves and wild action of the day the final point standing gave Outrigger the team point first place it has been after since the start of the season. We totaled 30 points to Waikiki Surf Club's 28.

Each 4th, the Outrigger Canoe Club holds an open 4-man race for one mile. Our crew this year consisted of Tom Conner, Jon Haneberg, Mark Buck and was steered by Tommy Holmes. The open 4 provided the most spectacular wave of the day for pure thrill as Tommy went over into the main surf area to pick up a giant wave that brought the Kakina down like a rocket enveloped in her own bow spray to the point that no one could tell if she was going to make it or not until she shot out the bottom and came home a winner. So went the day for Outrigger, a great day of challenge for everyone who participated.
