

Outrigger Canoe Club Wins Races

The Outrigger Canoe Club of Oahu packed the top trophy, a 44-inch koa canoe, back to Oahu to wrap up the State Championship Canoe Regatta last weekend.

The crews trained by coach Rabbit Kekai scored three firsts, one second, three thirds and two fourths in the 11 events.

Outrigger paddlers had to dig deep in every race, for they were virtually tied as late as the ninth race by the Waikiki Surf Club, second in the total point standings.

Third place was won by Healani, fourth by Kauai and fifth by the Hawaiian Civic Club of Kailua, Oahu.

Every age team contributed equally by winning its event as first place was worth the same in all races—five points.

Second place was worth four points; third, three; fourth, two and fifth, one.

The Kamehameha Canoe Club of Hilo picked up two Regatta points with a fourth place in the first race, the quarter miler for boys 13 and under.

Junior Women (1/2 mile)—Waikiki Surf, Kauai, Hui Nalu, Outrigger;

17 & Under (1 mile)—Outrigger, Waikiki Surf, Healani, Kauai;

Senior women (1/2 mile)—Waikiki Surf, Hui Nalu, Outrigger, Maile;

Freshmen (1 mile)—Kailua, Lanikai, Hui Nalu, Outrigger;

Junior Men (1 1/2 miles)—Kailua, Waikiki Surf, Outrigger, Lanikai;

Senior Men (2 miles)—Waikiki Surf, Outrigger, Healani, Kailua.

Men from the destroyer USS Renshaw made up two crews which raced against a team of Peace Corps girls and came in first and second respectively.

Eleven canoe clubs sent 970 paddlers and alternates to the State Championship Canoe Regatta, according to the number accommodated Thursday and Friday nights at five auditoriums and halls in Hilo.

An estimated 10,000 persons packed the bay front to see the old Hawaiian sport renewed in a big way.
