Outrigger's streak pays off

Late charge is good for OHCRA title

Riding the strength of six consecutive victorious crews, starting with the junior men's race, the Outrigger Canoe Club burst from a tight, three-way battle and won the 10th Oahu Hawaiian Canoe Racing Association championship yesterday at Keehi Lagoon.

Outrigger finished with 82 points, eight points ahead of second-place Kailua. Hui Nalu finished third with 59, Healani fourth at 50 and Lanikila fifth with 12.

Leeward Kai won the A division with 15 points. Anuenue and Hui Lanikila tied for second with 12 points.

Outrigger clinched the victory on the 29th race of the 30-race slate, the women's junior masters. Outrigger finished the 1-mile event in a time of 8:46.60, almost nine seconds ahead of the second-

going into yesterday's championship. Outrigger's overall team depth was a major factor in the women's junior masters' victory, with head coach Mike Fox making some personnel changes to qualify that squad for the state championship,

place Kailua crew, which was undefeated

to be held Aug. 6 at Keehi.

Had they not won the race, Outrigger's women's junior masters would not have qualified for the states. Unlike the Hui Wa'a association, which sends its top four Oahu championship finishers to the state race, the OHCRA sends its champion and three best other crews, based on yearlong performance

Fox changed five of the six women in the women's junior masters crew, with only Kathy Clifford being retained.

The way I look at everything, it's an educated guess, sort of a calculated gamble," said Fox of the personnel changes he made throughout the day. "You figure you have a 50-50 chance or a 75-25 chance and you make your decision from there.

Throughout the morning, Healani, Hui Nalu, Kailua and Outrigger exchanged leads in the battle of team points. By early afternoon, Healani had started to

drop off the pace.
After 17 races, Kailua held a sevenpoint lead over Hui Nalu and an eight-point lead over Outrigger.

But Hui Nalu won the men's sophomore and women's junior races, and, after 20 events, they had tied Kailua. Outrigger still trailed by eight points.

Starting with the 21st event, the men's juniors, Outrigger took control by winning six straight races. After 23 events it was Kailua 56, Outrigger 55 and Hui Nalu 54.

Just three races later - the men's and women's senior masters and the women's open fours - Outrigger held a nine-point lead over Kailua and a 13-point lead on Hui Nalu.

OCC finished second, third, first and first in the last four races to win going

"We gave it our very best shot, I'm proud of my club because everybody hung in there throughout the regatta.

said Kailua co-head coach Pat Erwin.

"We like to win this regatta more than any regatta because in the state race you don't know what you're up against," he added. "This is the most important regatta of the season for me. I don't think we've every been higher for a regatta than this

In the end, Kailua couldn't match Outrigger's depth, which limited its options. "We went very straight (didn't change many people)," said Erwin. Despite the bitter loss, Erwin dished

out praise to his competition.

"Hats off to Mike Fox, the guy is a terrific head coach," said Erwin. "The guy has a lot of class. They're all our friends (in Outrigger) and there's no grudge between us. We're paddling because we love the sport, not because we want to beat Outrigger.

He also praised Hui Nalu, saying "I think another thing you guys have to remember is that it isn't just Kailua and Outrigger out here. Hui Nalu put on an unreal display of their depth today.

Hui Nalu head coach Darryl Hara was pleased with his team's effort, but conceded, "It still ended up the way we figured it would come out. I thought that Kailua might have a good shot to win today, but Outrigger was too strong and too deep.
