## It's summer fun as Hui Nalu spanks OCC for Oahu crown

The way Kala Kukea sees it, paddling an outrigger canoe shouldn't be like getting an audition with the Pittsburgh Steelers,

"It's a fun summer thing. It's not like trying out for the NFL," said the 36-year-old head coach of Hui Nalu.

"Our philosophy is to get everybody to paddle," Kukea said. With a 210-member club, that means a lot of crew-shuffling from week to week. "Maybe it's not the best crews, but we want to get everybody involved."

With that philosophy, Hui Nalu split the season's first six regattas with Outrigger Canoe Club.

But yesterday was different.

With the Oshu Hawaiian Canoe Racing Association title on the line, Kukea filled each of his crews with its best six paddlers and blasted arch-rival Outrigger out of the waters of Keehi Lagoon.

Thui Nalu crolled up. 75 points to OCC's 54 for an easier-than-expected

team viotory and a fourth consecutive Oahu title. Kailus was third with 43 points, Healani fourth with 38 and Lanikai fifth with 33.

Highlighting Hui Nalu's victory was a record-breaking — and, for Outrigger, back-breaking — effort in the junior men's race.

The crew of Steve Wood, Barry McKeown, John West, Rob Burns; Ray Lum and James Kodama covered the 1½-mile course in 12 minutes, 27.6 seconds — 11.5 seconds faster than the old mark set by Hui Lanakila in 1979.

"They've always had it. It just took time to get their act together," Kukea said of that crew, which hada't won a race all season.

They gave Hui Nalu a 55-40 lead with just five races to go. And if that wasn't the knockout punch, it at least sent Outrigger reeling against the ropes.

OCC had been making a comeback, too. Halfway through the meet it trailed Hui Nalu 35-24, but Outrigger chipped away until it trailed 38-35 with eight races left. Then Hui Nalu stiffened, edging OCC for second place in the men's open fours, storming to victory in the junior women and winning junior men. In just half an hour OCC's deficit went from three points to 15.

It wasn't a good day for Outrigger. Its boys' 13-under crew, which had won its race, was disqualified for a false start. "That hurt," said head coach Walt Guild. But halfway through the meet he remained confident. "I hate these down-to-the-wire races," he said.

As it turned out, Hui Nalu took all the suspense out of the day when it won both senior men's and senior women's races. And it looked like Kukea's time-sharing philosophy has paid dividends.

"In one crew I have 18 people, so you see how much I have to move crews around," he said. "If they come out and train all year and never get in a race they'll never come back. We might have a guy who's not so good — next year he'll come back and be our best paddler."
