According to the best hookupu traditions, each of the crews brought the king presents including bananas, pineapples, coconuts, papayas and two live pigs.

Incidentally, winners of these porkers were Hui Nalu sextet in the senior men's open canoe race and the Waikiki Surfing club girls' open senior canoe team.

Clad in red mahioles (helmets) and yellow capes, Kamehameha and his court of four were Johnny Kaaihue, Sammy Mokuahi, Jimmy Clerk and Jimmy Mitchell.

They occupied a beautifully decorated stand adorned with green ti leaves and coconut fronds. Four giant marigold, one red lehua and yellow lehua kahilis added color and regal pomp to the occasion.

Presented Before King

All winning crews were presented before the king and he personally congratulated the victors. To express his appreciation, the king observed the hookupu, the ancient Hawaiian art of gift-giving. The victors were richly rewarded.

The aquatic meet itself was a decided success with the Hui Nalu sextet under Capt. R. Kekai copping the blue ribbon event, men's open canoe

race, in 9 minutes, 57 seconds. Waikiki Surf and Outrigger Canoe clubs were second and third, respectively.
