
SENIOR SIX CHAMPS

OUTRIGGER CLUB OAHU CHAMPS

The Outrigger Canoe Club upset Waikiki Surf Club to take the team title and also two senior races in the Oahu canoe racing championships at Kechi Lagoon on July 21.

The O.C.C. men's senior six won by three lengths over the W.S.C. crew in the feature 2-mile race in 17 minutes flat.

In the women's senior the Outrigger crew finished two lengths ahead of Waikiki Surf Club with a time of 5:26 for the half-mile event.

O.C.C. won 38 points for the team championship. W.S.C. followed with 31, Healani 29, Kai Oni 18, Holomua 8, Hui Nalu 5 and Lanikai 3.

The '57 racing season ends August 3 with the staging of the Territorial championships at Kailua, Kona.
