
## OCC's Designing Woman-Margaret Puder

Puder 's wide-ranging talents soon expanded beyond the display case and she now decorates the entire Club for special holidays such as Christmas and Easter. For the past few years she has turned the Club into a tropical South Seas wonderland for the annual lu'au.

Each year Puder comes up with a different theme for the Club's Christmas decor. Ideas are garnered from a myriad of sources including magazines, fabric motifs, craft fairs, and greeting cards. When traveling, she always keeps an eye out for new ideas. The year that the Christmas designs featured red silk hibiscus, the idea blossomed when Puder was cutting some of the flowers in her own back yard.

Other themes have featured doll-house miniatures, paper mache fish, Hawaiian Santas, glittery stars, outrigger canoes, Christmas stockings and photos of Club families encased in felt ornaments.

Puder says that planning for the following Christmas begins when the current display comes down. Once the theme has been chosen, she works out the details and by June the overall design is ready for implementation and the next phase of the process begins.

Gathering materials and supplies now becomes the major focus. One year her ingenuity led her out to Campbell Industrial Park where she located a company that could provide just the right type of foam for a special project. Puder recycles items from previous years, raids dumpsters, explores craft shops, scrounges from friends, and utilizes her own personal collection of "stuff". By September, everything is ready to go.

Some years the decorations are more time consuming than others. The year the decor featured "Outrigger Dolls", hours were spent hand stencilling the OCC logo onto fabric and assembling the dozens of dolls which adorned not only the tree, but garlands and wreaths as well.

Puder credits other talented Club members who help her throughout the year. Sue Moore often collaborates with Puder in both the creative process and the fabricating as well. Gay Austin and Jeanette Dolman are both dedicated and indispensable workers on whose support Puder depends.

Events such as the Club Lu'au require a large contingent of helpers and in addition to her own "crew", members of the Entertainment Committee eagerly turn out en masse early in the morning to work under her careful supervision. The enormous arrangements of lush tropical flowers, greenery, coconuts, shells, raffia hula skirts, fish nets, table decorations and other tropicana that immediately catch the eye of the guests as they enter the Club are the result of months of planning and preparation.
