# **ODKF Awards Fall Athletic Grants**

The Outrigger Duke Kahanamoku Foundation announces \$9,000 in athletic grant awards for its third quarter. A total of \$50,000 will be awarded by the end of September.

OCC members receiving funds are:

Mahealani Lum, kayaker, of the U.S. Canoe and Kayak Team, now residing at the Olympic Training Center in Chula Vista, CA. Her grant enabled her to travel to Seattle for the Junior World Team trials. Mahealani is considered an Olympic contender in Australia in 2000. This is her fourth grant from ODKF, and all have come from the Board Designated Kala Kukea Fund. Donations continue to be made to support kayaking and paddling athletes and events in memory of water sportsman Kala Kukea, father of member Nalu Kukea.

Victor Sherman, a physical therapist from Hawaii Kai who completed a solo crossing of the Kauai Channel in a single person outrigger canoe on July 16. Sherman has many team and solo paddling events to his credit, and is the first person to complete a solo crossing of the 80 mile channel from Haleiwa to Nawiliwili. It took him 15 hours. Funds for this grant come from the ODKF Board Designated Cline Mann Fund, named for long time OCC water sports participant, John Cline Mann, for whom the Cline Mann Paddleboard Race is named.

The OCC Boys 16 Volleyball Team, for their trip to the U.S. Volleyball Association Junior National Tournament in Dallas, TX in July. They placed in the top third of 57 teams. Funds for this award comes from The Tom

"Daddy" Haine Fund. Haine was an Olympic Volleyball player in 1968 who died in 1994. He was an OCC Past President.

ASICS National Championships
in Chicago and the Junior
National Championships in Dallas.
Machesky flies to Oahu from the
Big Island to play with the ASICS
Rainbow 18's, coached by OCC
member Dennis Berg. The team
placed third in Dallas and is now
ranked 19 out of 64 top junior
teams in the nation. Her grant
also comes from the Haine Fund.

Kama'aina Kids, a child care organization, to conduct summer water sports activities.

Na Wahine Ho'olehua, a women's canoe club, to participate in distance canoe races. Funds for this grant come from the Board Designated Muriel Macfarlane Flanders Fund, established by ODKF for the support of paddling and to honor Duke Kahanamoku.

The UnbeataBulls, a boys soccer team, to attend the Albuquerque, New Mexico U.S. Youth Soccer Regional Championships.

The annual OCC paddleboard race, a long-distance marathon, was won by Aaron Napoleon. A 6.2 mile race, it is considered the roughwater swim of the paddleboard and surfing arena; 28 men and one woman participated.

#### 10 Years Ago—1988 Mark Buck, President

The annual Cline Mann 5K Paddleboard Race had 55 paddlers in this 4th annual event. In 3 to 4 foot surf, the race was won by Charlie Walker with a time of 31 minutes, 37 seconds.

Five OCC members participated in the Maui Channel Swim. The swim drew 52 teams, each with an escort boat, from Australia, the mainland and Hawaii. The 11-mile race ran from Lanai Island to Maui (Lahaina).
