The disappointing loss meant no Gold bracket this year for this group, and new goals for the remainder of the tournament.

They knew that as hard as it was, they needed to pick themselves up, support each other, finish strong, and win out, which is just what they did. They won the next five matches, beating Coastal, Pali, Ohana, Pipeline, and D1 Chicago, finishing with 9-2 record overall, and champions of the Bronze bracket.
