



NOMINATING COMMITTEE APPOINTED

As the Annual Meeting will be held on February 28 and election of Directors voting closes February 27, the President has appointed the following Committee to nominate directors. They are:

The following resolution was adopted at the special meeting on November 22, 1957, and the By-Laws will be revised accordingly. This means the addition of new directors as of the Club year 1958.

Be It Resolved:

That the first paragraph of Section 6 of the By-Laws of the Outrigger Canoe Club, as amended, relative to the number and term of the Directors is hereby further amended to read a follows:

"SECTION 6

The Board of Directors shall consist of 13 regular members from and after the annual membership meeting of the Club in 1958 and 15 regular members from and after the annual membership meeting of the Club in 1959 and thereafter. The regular members of the Board shall be elected to serve for two years. At the annual meeting held during even numbered calendar years (after 1957) eight directors shall be elected and during odd-numbered calendar years (after 1957) seven directors shall be elected. Duke P. kahanamoku shall be an honorary director of the Club."

That Section 57 of said By-Laws is hereby amended to read as follows:

"SECTION 57

A majority of the regular members of the Board of Directors shall constitute a quorum at any meeting thereof."

Dated at Honolulu, Hawaii this 22nd day of November, 1957.

Notice of date and place of the Annual Meeting will be mailed to all regular members together with ballots and short tography of nominees, according to the Club rules.

ALE ALE KAI V

On Saturday, December 28, the big pink Ale Ale Kai V was launched off Hawaiian Village Hotel. Reputed to be the largest catamaran in the world, it is 100 feet long with 30 foot beam and 50 inch draft. She is equipped with twin 225 horsepower motors and her main sail is 2400 square feet.

Though launched she will not be ready to sail as rigging and much fitting must be done before her trial spin is made. She is rated at 30 knot sailing speed and will carry an 8 man crew and a total of 6800 square feet of working

ALICE ROOSEVELT AT WAIKIKI

Impetuous, tempestuous but charming Alice Lee Roosevelt, daughter of President Theodore Roosevelt and distant cousin of FDR and wife, made two visits to Waikiki. First, of one day in 1905; second, of five weeks in 1907 as Mrs. Nicholas Longworth. She liked Waikiki and saw the OCC sites of 1908 and 1963. I wonder what Alice Lee Roosevelt Longworth's thoughts in 1957 are of the Coral Curve of Waikiki.

The Manchuria steamed out of San Francisco Bay on July 8, 1905. "The Manchuria . . . a Congressional Ark with [William Howard] Taft as its Noah," recorded Henry F. Pringle, carried as passengers a large group of Republicans and Democrats, among them Alice Lee Roosevelt, daughter of President Theodore Roosevelt. The party was under the leadership of Secretary of War William Howard Taft. Also

aboard the Manchuria were Representative Nicholas Longworth, about whom there was much speculation as to whether he was to wed Alice Roosevelt. Also, Senator and Mrs. Newlands, Representative Charles Curtis (part Indian, later Senator and Vice-President), Representative W. Bourke Cochran, Mabel Boardman, official photographer Burr Mac-Intosh, and many others. The Friend of August, 1905, reported there were 104 in the Taft Party, which would enjoy one day in Paradise.

"ENTHUSIASTIC . . . MISS ALICE"

The Manchuria was off Diamond Head early on the morning of July 14, 1905. "The visit of the Taft Party, brief as it was, had the time of their lives," reported Hawaiian Annual, 1906, "and not the least enthusiastic of whom was Miss Alice Roosevelt."

AWAKENED BY MUSIC OFF LEAHI

"The morning we reached Honolulu I was awakened by the plaintive singing voices and musical instruments of the natives who had come out to meet the steamer," wrote Alice Roosevelt in Crowded Hours. "I had never heard anything like it before and felt as if the Lotus Eaters themselves had come out to greet 115."

LOVELY OAHU, WONDERFUL WAIKIKI

"My eyes were open and my head was out of the porthole simultaneously, to see the lovely mass of the Island of Oahu lying offside in the early dawn light, mountains and valleys in cloudy green . . . the white beach."

In Alice Roosevelt's vision was Diamond Head; at its foot the three-story residence of James B. Castle directly upon the sea, the water dashing against the stone foundation walls [this is the general site of OCC 1963 home]; she also saw the Moana Hotel, the Old Moana Pier, and the Royal Hawaiian Annex [late Seaside Hotel]; between them the Apuakehau Stream and Lagoon where the OCC later appeared May 1, 1908.

GARLANDED US WITH LEIS"-"DAY OF HOSPITALITIES"

"We rushed through breakfast and landed for a day of hospitalities," wrote Alice. "The entire population seemed to be on the wharf to meet us and garlanded us with leis of heavy-perfumed flowers." The Royal Hawaiian Band played Aloha Oe and the thousands of assembled spectators expressed their fond aloha. There was an official welcome. A detachment of the Tenth Infantry rendered military honors.

"JACK" ATKINSON, ALOHA CHAIRMAN

"The entire party was taken charge of by a committee of which Acting Governor ["Jack" Alatau Leonard Charles] Atkinson was chairman," explained Alice. "Jack" Atkinson was Secretary of the Territory and in the absence of Governor Walter Francis Frear was the Acting Governor. He was a surfing enthusiast and was one of the Founders of the OCC.

"We first drove in a long procession of carriages to the Pali," continued Alice. "Next we raced back down the road to Honolulu to take a special train to see a sugar plantation and refinery."

HULA, "LESS JEUNE FILLE"

"A rather expurgated *hula* was provided for our entertainment" at the sugar plantation, lamented a disappointed Alice

"Is it not possible to see a less *jeune* file version?" she asked. "Yes," was the

pleasing reply.

"So, with a few others, I left the general crowd and saw a dance that undoubtedly was much more like the *real*

thing," explained Alice.

"I could and did!" declared Alice.

LUNCHEON AT ROYAL HAWAIIAN

"We were given a luncheon at the Royal Hawaiian Hotel [downtown], rooms and lanai decorated with . . . tropical fruit and flowers," wrote Alice. The Band, according to what was almost a habit of bands in those days, played Alice, Where Art Thou?" But the Band did not render Alice Blue Gown. After luncheon the Taft Party went out to the Moana Hotel at Waikiki Beach.

SURFING AT WAIKIKI

Alice Roosevelt, with many others, spent the afternoon at Waikiki, swimming and outriggering. Surfboarding was a challenge to Alice and, on a dare, she mied her luck on a surfboard.

THE DUKE" WAS THERE

Alice Roosevelt did not notice a tallish well-proportioned Hawaiian youngster of almost fifteen years named Duke Paoa Kahanamoku. With some of the Surfing Gang he was there to look at the distinguished malihimis. Duke and the other many members of that Surfing Gang—including Dad and Mike Center, Ken Atkinson, Knute Cottrell, Zen Genoves, Dude Miller, Harry Steiner, Ken Brown, Lawrence Cunha and the Hustace brothers—were making it impossible for surfboarding and outriggering to become extinct on the Beach at Waikiki.



IF YOU CAN KEEP YOUR EYES OFF THE HIPS AND ON THE HANDS THEN YOU'RE A KAMAAINA

When you start watching the hands, you're a real kamaaina. It does not matter who said it—it does point up the real meaning of the hula, which actually is a pantomime with the hands telling the story of a song or chant. The hips only

keep the rhythm of the dance.


Origin of the hula dates back into misty Hawaiian legend. One version is that two gods, male and female, both named Laka, came to Hawaii to dance for the people. After a while the male disappeared and the woman remained to be worshipped and to teach the hula. Hiiaka, beautiful sister of the fire goddess Pele, was expert at the dance which she learned from Laka.

In ancient times, the hula was a religious function. Historically, only men danced the hula but as civilization became more complex men went to war and were involved in government, women took over. From religious beginnings, the hula gradually expanded into the opera of Hawaii. Meles (songs for the hula) touched almost every aspect of daily or historical life.

Still another innovation on the Island dance scene is the increasing Tahitian type of hula. A shimmy kind of hula, it is popular with visitors who seem to like the faster pace of the Tahitian dance along with the more stately, slower type

of Hawaiian hula.

Performers were divided into two classes-the olapa (agile ones) and the ho'o-paa (steadfast ones). The younger men and women were assigned to the olapa while the ho'o-paa handled chants and heavier instruments. Costume for both sexes was the short skirt called the pa'u. However, the missionaries, shocked by the state of undress, hustled the dancers into cotton dresses and eventually middy blouses and full skirts. Then began the intense campaign to suppress the hula. So successful was this move that music-loving King Kalakaua in the 1800's had to send couriers to remote mountain villages to find Hawaiians who still knew the precious old chants and dances in his revival of the old hulas and meles. 







"We stayed on the Beach at Waikiki until it was time to go back to the seamer," explained Alice. "I did not unt to leave."

"The Manchuria sails at five o'clock," announced someone. "We'd better burry." The advice was heeded but not soon enough.

"I missed the ship at the wharf, as it had to sail at a definite time because of the tides," wrote Alice. A launch was recurred.



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"SURFING IS GLORIOUS"

At the Pier, Alice told an Advertiser man—"The surfing is glorious. I never imagined that one could enjoy anything as much as I have enjoyed this day in Honolulu" (Advertiser, July 15, 1905).

"ALOHA NUI LOA"

As she departed the Royal Hawaiian Band played Goodbye, Little Girl, Goodbye, reported the Paradise of the Pacific. Alice shouted back—"Aloha Nui Loa!" She knew her Hawaiian.

"In a launch, with Nick [Longworth], Senator and Mrs. Newlands, and a few others, *leis* about our necks, regret in our hearts at leaving, I pursued the *Manchuria* out into the Pacific," wrote Alice Lee Roosevelt. Of her 1907 visit to Waikiki—later I hope.
