It was moved by Mr. Danford, and seconded by Dr. Beardmore, and unanimously carried, that the following resolution be adopted:

authorized and empowered to execute the acceptance of the offer to purchase the remaining term of the Outrigger Canoe Club's sublease from Matson Navigation Company in the form that such offer was submitted to this Board of Directors on this date."

#### Preparation of information for Mr. Avent

It was moved that the Manager of the Club be authorized to develop and turn over to Mr. Avent through the Club Board of Directors the information required in the proposal presented by Mr. Advent and be authorized to obtain the assistance of our auditors if necessary in accomplishing this.

## KNOW YOUR DIRECTORS



Dr. Stanley James Beardmore

Dr. Stanley James (Jim) Beardmore, elected Director at the 1958 annual meeting, is a true kamaaina. He was born in Honolulu on July 24, 1918, attending Waialua Grammar School, Marfield School in England, Leilehua Junior High School, Punahou, Sacramento Junior College, Pomona College, University of Hawaii, and University of Southern California, where he received his degree in dentistry.

Jim is married and father of two sweet little girls to whom he is most devoted. They are regular visitors at the Club and no doubt will be VB experts as daddy is.

Beardmore became a member of the Club in 1947 and has been active as a member of the Volleyball Committee, 1948-50, chairman, 1950-53, and member of the Disciplinary Committee, 1955-56. In sports, Jim has been most active, engaging in schools in football, track, swimming, boxing and baseball in the Army. At the Club, he has been active in canoe paddling, surfing, softball, and particularly, volleyball. He won the doubles tournament in 1949-51-53 and 55, and runner-up in 1957. In 1952, with Tom Haines, won the Territory of Hawaii Doubles Championships.

From June, 1943, to November, 1946, Jim served in the Army and was honorably discharged as a Captain. He is

presently treasurer of Honolulu Dental Society, and member of the Horizontal Golf Club and Punahou Tennis Club.

Jim is one of our most respected younger members and brings to the Club the viewpoint of the younger and athletic set. The membership is fortunate in electing such a fine, outstanding, young professional man to the Board.

## KNOW YOUR DIRECTORS

James (Jim) Stopford was born in Hackensack, New Jersey, on May 1, 1912 and is married and the father of one daughter. He arrived in Honolulu in February, 1951, and is president and director of the Honolulu Gas Company, Ltd. He became a member of the OCC in 1954.

After attending mainland schools, he graduated from Rice Institute, Houston, Texas, in 1932 with a Bachelor of Science degree in Chemical Engineering.

He participated and is participating in tennis, swimming, skin diving and volleyball, and enumerates as hobbies golf and water sports. As an OCC member he was selected chairman of a committee on long range development of the Elks Club Site on which he has done an outstanding job.

While born in New Jersey, at age two his family moved to Texas where he lived and worked for thirty years. Included

## KNOW YOUR DIRECTORS

James Ward Russell is another true Kamaaina member of the Board. Born March 19, 1917, in Hilo, Hawaii, he was educated in public school at Hilo and graduated from Punahou in 1933.

He is an eligible bachelor, girls, with residence at the Pacific Club. Following graduation he joined the Hawaiian Telephone Company as apprentice in the radio-telephone department. Going up the hard way he worked as switchman, repairman and on through many departments until today he is executive assistant to the president.

In school he participated in track and swimming, and today enjoys surfing, baseball, bowling, golf and his hobby is the Honolulu Community Theatre, primarily stage lighting.

Mr. Russell entered politics as a Republican in 1948 and was defeated for

House Representative from the 4th District. However, he was elected in 1950 and 1952 with a long list of committee activities including utilities, education, county, police and military affair, finance, health and others.

His civic activities are too numerous to list but they include: membership in his precinct club; chairman of board of governors, Nuuanu YMCA; chairman, Adult Education Advisory Committee; director, Volunteer Service Bureau; director, Punahou Alumni Association; membership in Pacific Club, Chamber of Commerce, Engineering Association, Oahu Country Club and others.

He was a member of the OCC Special Mess and Bar Committee of 1958, which made such a complete and comprehensive report.

Mr. Russell brings us a young, vigorous man, full of the desire to serve, of great acquaintanceship with business and politics, and of tremendous following politically.

## KNOW YOUR DIRECTORS

Archibald A. Carswell has been Director for some time, but his biography has not been published here before. He was born on May 9, 1903, in Philadelphia, Pennsylvania. Educated in Pennsylvania he graduated from Northwestern University, Boston, Massachusetts, in 1925, with a Bachelor of Science degree in Civil Engineering.



In 1943 he returned to the mainland with Turner Construction Co. for work at Oak Ridge for the Atomic Energy Commission. In 1946 Mr. Walter Dillingham offered Mr. Carswell the vice-presidency in charge of construction for the Hawaiian Construction Co. He was made general manager of operations on Midway, also manager of the combined opera-

He is director and secretary of Maunalani Hospital and Convalescent Home, trustee of Leahi Home, member of Pacific Club, Waialae Country Club, Hawaiian Village Beach Club, Family Club of San Francisco, former director of both the Honolulu Rotary Club and the Honolulu Chamber of Commerce.

Mr. Carswell brings to the Club a vast experience of management, engineering and financing, and adds much to the high caliber of our directors.

# ANNUAL MEETING • Feb. 28, 1958

## Questions and Discussion—Re: Avent Lease Offer

*As stated in the March FORECAST we are printing below a transcript from a wire recording the discussion regarding the offer made by the Avent interests for the remainder of the lease.*

*As the recording was undecipherable at times, due to the speaker not speaking directly in the microphone, very small and unimportant sections were omitted.*

**Arthur Emerson:** I wish we could have posted on a board perhaps something so we could help keep in mind the terms that have been outlined, and I suppose the arrangement would be such that there would be no hiatus between our being active and occupying this clubsite and our being able to go directly to another clubsite. We wouldn't sell and then have a long period when we had no clubhouse, but that would be something I would like to know.

**Mr. Steere:** Let me attempt to answer that. As I understand it, if the membership here today authorized the board to go ahead and use their judgment in this matter and it was decided by the Board to accept this offer, in explanation it would then take several months to prepare plans that would be suitable to you people and to our Building Committee. Once we get to the stage where the plans are acceptable there is a period of many months to construct the club, and it is my understanding that we would not move out there until the club was ready to occupy. It naturally will be a complex activity but in our investigation we have tried to protect the membership here at all times and make sure that we would not be put out and have no place to hang our hats. Does that answer your question? As far as the posting of the figures I checked with Punahou School regarding putting up a blackboard, and then I tried to figure where you could put a blackboard in this room that all you people could see, and I didn't find any answer so we are trying to do the explanation verbally.

### QUESTIONS FINANCIAL ABILITY

**Philip P. Kennedy:** I would like to know whether this man has \$200,000, and where is he going to get the resulting credit.

**Mr. Steere:** We have spent considerable time on this matter and the man has been investigated and as Judge Godbold explained, the money would be put in escrow. It is the opinion of the Board that the man is good for it. His own financing is just one of the problems that the Board has been working on and will have to work out. We will not enter into any arrangement with this offerer until such time as we are positive we are going to get all the money at the time we want it, and we will be entirely assured of getting all the loan money at the time we will need it. That is why we

have not sat down and taken a vote of the Board because we have not arrived at that stage yet. We will have to arrive at that stage before next Thursday, as I understand it, else this deadline will elapse, but I assure you we are not interested in wasting your time ours if we didn't think the man had the money we would have stopped the negotiations some time ago.

### WILL MATSON CO-OPERATE?

**Wm. O'Rourke:** Has Matson been explored as far as allowing the sub-lease to be assigned?

**Mr. Steere:** Will you stop there please, at the risk of getting into Judge Godbold's field, I try that question. We worked with Matson many weeks and we are assured that is no obstacle.

**Wm. O'Rourke:** Would they require us to be responsible for the remainder of the period of the actions of our successor if it is consummated?

**Mr. Steere:** I'll again try to invade Judge Godbold's area and say that once we get here we are off—is that correct, Judge?

**Judge Godbold:** There have been discussions with Matson and Matson has not committed itself, they have indicated that they, and this from the top, have indicated that they would do what they could to cooperate with the Club and to back up any decision the Club made. The offer as made by Mr. Avent specifies the fact that if there is any consideration to be paid to Matson or to Queen's Hospital, that consideration would be paid by Mr. Avent and not by ourselves. The type of consent to the assignment of lease that we would go along with, in other words we wouldn't assign it until we were still liable on the lease, but we would

assign it if Matson let us off the hook. If the Board votes that way.

*Howard Cook:* I would like to know if this man Avent is a front for Murchison and Trousdale. I think we are entitled to know whether we're getting one man's opinion or one man's offer, or whether we are getting the (excuse we'll say?) for Murchison and Trousdale from some bona fide group of investors and can we get a certified statement of ability?

(Jack Eagle asked to answer.) *Mr. Eagle:* I can answer that, Mr. Avent has not met Mr. Trousdale. Mr. Cox and myself chased Mr. Trousdale all around the country and we don't need to go through all the details that were involved. A very fine gentleman and he is interested in the Club. Mr. Avent himself has a Hawaiian style house, has a Hilo girl working for him, and is very interested in this Club and its welfare, and actually he has offered 100% more than we advised him to. I have been for years contacting various people with money and assure you the offer is a valid one and that the Club is doing the right thing.

#### WILL WE HAVE A BEACH?

*Adele Summerfeld:* When we voted to abandon the clubhouse when the lease is over there was a description about the condition of the beach. That the City and County or Planning Commission was going to extend the beach out there. Will the beach be ready in that time? Will we have the sort of beach that we have now within that period of time?

*Mr. Steere:* That question has concerned a lot of the members, we have gone into that at some length with various governmental authorities, Charlie Humme of Hawaiian Dredging Co. has followed that for us out there and to the knowledge of the Board we are told that that is something in the dim dark future. We may get a beach out there at Territorial expense in say 6-8-10 years—there is nothing you can put your teeth into now, and as Leslie Hicks said a while ago, if and when we get out there we probably should spend some money and make the swimming facilities useable by our membership. But to answer your question as we sit today we know of no commitment by any governmental authority to spend any money out in that area.

#### ABILITY TO BORROW

*Billy Heilbron* (in brief as this did not come out on transcript): Wondered if Avent were out of the picture if the Club would be able to obtain a loan.

*Mr. Steere:* It's a good question, Bill, we investigated quite carefully in the last few months, can't remember exactly when, but Leslie Hicks, Marty Anderson and some of the others, our two bankers, investigated the loan-

ing field and we've been told by the various loaning agencies that none of them are too enthused about loaning to a Club. Apparently we are all unreliable characters and nobody wants to lend us more than \$50,000 for 3 years to buy furniture with, you hit it right on the head, that in my opinion is one of the big items, as Mr. Hicks explained a little while ago, the cash puts you in a position where you don't have to start spending your Building Fund right

away, and if nobody is going to loan you more than \$50,000 for furniture and ask for it to come back in 3 years you could run out of money when you get out there and want to spend \$650,000—you could run out of money fast. My personal opinion is that if we turn down this offer we are going to scratch for \$400,000 we'll have to get it one way or another. We'll have to increase dues, we'll have to increase all our charges around these premises, turn this Club into an enterprise for profit for sure, and at the end of 1963 have \$400,000 in our jeans, and that's not going to be any simple item.

#### IF WE BUILD A BEACH

*Heilbron:* Freddie, it looks like this is something the members should consider, this loan. Another thing I'd like to ask you, if we build the beach out there and in the master plan we come along and extend it, will they reimburse us?

*Mr. Steere:* Bill, membership might as well hear about one plan that has been afoot for quite awhile. Mr. Bush, when he was Chairman of Chamber of Commerce Beach Committee, this committee that has been working on the expansion of land outside of Kaiser's down there, had a proposition whereby they would put a peninsula outside of that point out there starting from Poni Moi Road and running down in front of the Queen's Surf. According to some people that has been somewhat of a dead issue, we have Mr. J. B. Wilson, head of Law and Wilson is one of our Club members, he ran for the Board this time, and I understand he now runs that committee. But if that type of a development was put in

the Outrigger would then be in a stillwater lagoon with a peninsula seaward of them. I wanted to be sure that everybody understood that the Outrigger Board has gone on record with Mr. Bush and Mr. Wilson as being against that—not that that is going to carry much weight, we're not the most influential organization on the Island, but to try to answer your other question, Bill, that is a problem that has concerned me. If we spent \$50,000 out there putting in a beach and all the beach swimming area, and everything else and then 10 years from now the Territory came out there and spent a lot of money putting in a beach I think we would be out of pocket—am I right, Godbold?

*Godbold:* No question about it, you wouldn't get the money back from the Territory.

*Steele:* We'd be out of pocket—that is one of the risks we will have to take, in spending money out there outside of our seawall, and after you have time to look at this drawing of Mr. Avent you will see that the attempt to make provision for I think one swimming pool inside our property and one wading pool for the younger kids.

#### THURSTON OBJECTS

*Lorrin Thurston:* I appeared with Leslie for many years on the Board, I think my total was 18. I feel that if this Resolution is adopted we are starting the last chapter of the Outrigger Canoe Club. If we were going to a place which was adapted for the purposes for which this Club was founded I would be thrilled to death. I cannot get over the fact that Mr. Trousdale sat at my desk and told me as sincerely as any man could, that it was his desire to maintain the Outrigger Canoe Club right here. It was his desire to work with whatever architects our Club Directors might specify to see if his needs and our needs as a Club could not be brought in line. I think that that statement by Mr. Trousdale was honest. I remember so well the discussion of the Board, and apparently whether it was a clash of personalities or not they did not apparently get the same basic reaction that I did, which is most regrettable. I feel that to charge the dues which are indicated as being necessary, because I am quite sure there are many members who would resign from this Club if we were to move out there, where I don't think we have any greater possibility of success than the Elk's have had, I think that it is not too late yet if our Board is so minded to sit down with Mr. Trousdale, who has expressed his desire to cooperate with us, and see whether that alternative has been fully explored.

Possibly new faces, possibly less enthusiasm to move to the Elk's Club put into that argument would give a different result. I cannot

personally help but feel that whatever is done with this property by whoever gets the lease, eventually, is going to incorporate beach facilities. If we could tie in with that need and be a happy part of it I'm sure that we would be able to continue those facilities for which our Club was originally founded. There would be no more reason for calling our new Club out there by the white elephant on the point as Outrigger Canoe Club, than there would be to call it a swimming club with a stinking little swimming pool as is indicated on the plan—or even if it were a big one I wouldn't like it because I don't think the majority of our members come down here to swim in a swimming pool. It would be my hope, and I would like to ask one question if I might, and then I would like to proceed a little bit longer. I would like to ask this—Is it impossible for us under the lease we have with the Elk's Club to sublet that property or must we use it for ourselves?

*Judge Godbold:* One condition of the Elk's Club lease is that we use it primarily for Club purposes. In order to sublease it for a purpose other than club purposes would require the approval of the Elk's Club—would require separate negotiation for that approval.



Lorrin P. Thurston said "This is the end of OC if it passes."

*Thurston:* In other words it would not be closed to us then if some other alternative were possible, is that correct to sublease that?

*Godbold:* No, negotiations would be open. Lorrin—I imagine it would involve a cash consideration to them if it involved a commercial venture that they thought would damage them in any way more than a private club would.

*Thurston:* I realize that, Mr. Godbold, perfectly. But I would hope that even though Mr. Avent put a Thursday time limit on this thing that on behalf of those old members who want to stay here, and I'm one of them, that another look be taken at this thing by an entire, new group of individuals to approach it with the idea of trying to find out how it can be worked out that we can stay here instead of the former attitude as to prove to the membership why we could not stay here.

*Marty Anderson:* I'm not on the script for this afternoon but Mr. Thurston's comment I think warrants my making a statement about the questions he raised. If Mr. Thurston will remember and I'm sure most of you will, I was the dissenting director in the decision to move to the Elk's Club, and I think after the decision was made that Bill Ewing swung over to my point of view and felt so strongly about that he resigned. So I have a strong feeling, Mr. Thurston, for your point of view, in fact when we were back a couple of years I'd be very happy to pursue it, but remember this, you members after a very thorough and almost agonistic argument with your Board of Directors to fight against me and the dissenting opinion to stay here to keep the lease that Trousdale offered us at the time which I thought was very valuable.

You reached a decision then which this Board in good faith has gone along with, and while I support Mr. Thurston in his point of view a couple years back I said my battle is over. When the Board and the membership voted against me two years ago to move I said now I must direct my attention to what alternatives we now have. The decision has been made to move, I didn't like it, don't like it any more well now, but the decision is made and the membership decided what it wanted to do. I think it is a little late now unless this membership wants to open up the whole question again. If you do, remember 2 years have gone by and I don't know that anyone could say that Mr. Trousdale's situation is the same now as it was then. You're going, Mr. Thurston, to try to fight something we already lost unless there is a very very strong sentiment from the membership to go back and change their point of view, I think it is incumbent upon us to assume that the membership is still of the same mind, and to go ahead and do now what the Board thinks is best. While I agree in principle, Mr. Thurston, I think that two years have gone by, and unless this membership in sufficient majority want to change their mind I think it's a little late to go into that now. I wish that we were born two years ago, sir.

*Mr. Thurston (rebut):* I don't think that it's too late in the life of any Club to change one's mind. The Directors have never to my knowledge, in their estimates, certainly Mr. Hicks for whom I have the highest regard, did not point out what possible loss in membership might accrue if this situation happened. Suppose Mr. Avent or Mr. Trousdale decides they want to put up a beach club here and offer membership in it to people just such as us, in addition to whomever he might have, what chance would we have of holding our entire membership out there. I don't go for this thing at all; that, because time has gone by it's too late to change your mind, and I think that if this was ap-

proached with a will to work it out here it could be done.

*Mr. Steere:* One comment, I assume that you think there is no surfing out in that area, Mr. Thurston. Well you're talking about changing the character of the club, I assumed that's what you meant. For your information we have taken canoes out there and there is a lot of surfing going out there and we will take at least 3 canoes out there when surf conditions permit in front of the Club, rest of the time we surf in the bay in front of Dad Centers. There's plenty of place for the kids to surf.

*Mr. Eagle:* I'd like to say, Lorrin, I think we did just mention that Mr. Avent is interested in the Club, the amount of money here is going to be well over \$100,000 for the lease, I don't think the Directors would want to get the Club in big business, secondarily, Mr. Avent has an option which he intends to exercise whether the Club goes along or not, and negotiate for business in front of the present Club. Other than that if there is a facility here, and there will be, the area will be open on this side and the Outrigger members will have a privilege, I don't know to what extent it will be, but they will have special privileges.



Martin Anderson said, "I was of the minority opposed, but I will now go along with the wishes of the majority."

#### WOMEN ON BOARD SUGGESTED

*Peggy West:* I wondered first of all if the gentlemen of the Board of Directors have an aversion to women. We have no women on the Board of Directors and I think perhaps even one might be a balance wheel. Beside the point, what I would like to know, Is there a statement available to the membership of the Outrigger Club that will show the comparable expenses or expenditures as far as the new club 7 years from now and the present location here. Now I wonder whether the building costs 7 years from now will eat it up—in other words the rental fee if we remain here where we all love it rather than be moved. None of us like to be moved no matter where it is from our homes. I wondered if we can get a report of the building cost, the rental here comparable to the rental or the purchasing of the land or rental at the Elks Club.

(Over)

*Mr. Steere:* Your question is a little involved. What we are trying to settle today is should we make a decision and take this offer. In the event of our accepting the offer we would then have to go through the process of planning and building a club and sometime in that period, starting after the acceptance, if any, and the approach to our move out there would obviously be the duty of the Board of Directors and the Manager to start computing costs. You've got a cheap rent here today—we pay Matson a very small amount of money, that's why we're sitting here today on \$5.00 a month dues. In view of land values today, here we are getting this money next to a gift, thanks to Matson Navigation Co. and thanks to the ability of our Board of Directors for the last 20 years. But to answer your question definitely is pretty impossible. I can only say that once we decide to go out there the Board and the Manager would have to get together and compute costs of operation. I might throw in at this point one more complexity. R. Q. said "not to muddy the water," but we might as well muddy it a little more. He hoped we could capitalize on air rights and build rental space above the Club.

#### SUPER DELUXE CLUB PROBABLE

*Fred Wolfe:* First of all I want to endorse everything that Lorrin said. I want to say further that first of all I don't like this Thursday deadline stuff, to me that doesn't mean a darned thing, if they wanted Thursday they wanted Friday and Saturday and I don't like to be rushed into things. Secondly, I don't thoroughly agree to the thought that it's too late by a long shot. When we agreed to take the Elk's club lease, as I understood it (occasionally I'm pretty dumb), we were told, well we could sign the thing as sort of a threat that we can give Trousdale, we can always sublease the thing, it will be a very profitable thing for us to do. At the meeting a few months ago, and again I may be dumb, but as I understood it we were to pay an architect, and one of the thoughts in paying this architect was again we could go to Trousdale and say, "Look here we can move, we've gone ahead, we can force you people to do things." Now when Lorrin said that there will be a loss of membership this is probably going to be a very unpopular thing for me to say, but I will be one of those whom the Outrigger will lose. I also want to say this, that in my opinion it is absolutely utopian to hope that this property will not be used to the extent to which it can be used. And as far as I can see it there is only one way that this property can be used—I wrote the Board of Directors that sometime ago—that in this spot should be and I almost swear there will be,

something like the Olympic Club or the New York Athletic Club, or something else.

There will be a beautiful beach facility, there will be locker rooms, there will be living quarters, and they won't have the name probably the Outrigger Canoe Club, it will be the Surfboard Club or the Waikiki Athletic Club or something else, and after all there is an old army saying—give the enemy credit for as much sense as you have. Certainly Kaiser has gone ahead and tried to do that same thing and I am certain in my mind that if we move out that there will be a substitute Outrigger canoe club here which will be doing a terrific job.

Now I think there is only one realistic way for the Outrigger to approach this thing and that is to try and have a glorified Outrigger Canoe Club here financed by Trousdale, financed by Avent, financed by somebody, but that we stay here and enjoy what we have now. Another thing I might add is that one of our quick sources of income is the use of guest cards and the use of the Club by guests. I don't believe that that would be done in the new place, and I also want to apologize for taking up so much of your time.

#### A NEW OUTLOOK

*Fred Roblfing:* I'd like to comment on the last several discussions. I think that there is a misinterpretation of things, in my mind anyway. The statement is being made that we are going away from what this Club used to be. Now I would like to say that it is my belief that this Club when it moves out to the Elk's Club will become the thing that it was many years ago, and which it was always intended to be. That is a Club primarily designed for athletics, and for athletic pursuit, and the connection with social activities to be the secondary phase of it. I feel that in this location we are hemmed in by commercial interests, we are in the tourist's area in the top sense of that word. We move out to the Elk's Club we can build a Club which will do that which we want. In this line we can choose the things we want to build, we're not taking orders from Mr. Trousdale, we're not told to take the 3rd deck of a building, and take second place to a tourist attraction, or anything else—we don't have to take a lot of guests that came in from some place on the Mainland—we can do what we please, and I think that the question today is whether we will take this offer which has been made by Mr. Avent, and to go forward with the \$200,000 which we will get, plus the loan, and continue to have a better Club at the other location. Before I sit down may I move the previous question.

## FOR THE MOTION

*Hans Zimmerman:* I think they are just talking about something that should have been done a long time ago. You are losing track of the real issue, in talking about the past what we should have done—we should have owned the Club. We are in the situation now where we have to face the issue because we have to move out of here sooner or later, and the way the Club activities have been going on here—well you hardly see anybody anymore that you know. So I believe we should get busy and start a Club at the Elk's Club where we have the facilities to put a nice club and especially the parking facilities. Talking about staying here at this place where do you park?—you can't into any parking place after 4 o'clock, consequently there is no activity here. We just lack our facilities to enjoy this club to the extent to which we are entitled, and that I believe is the complaint of practically everybody here. I move that we go ahead with the questions and give the Board of Directors a vote of confidence and let them go ahead and do the best that can be salvaged for the mistakes that have been made in the past.

*Mr. Steere:* The question before the house is as I understand it this resolution—"That the Board of Directors of the Outrigger Canoe Club be and it is hereby authorized and empowered to assign that certain sub-lease from Matson Navigation Co. at such time and under such terms and conditions as the said Board of Directors may deem advisable." My understanding that does not commit us to accepting the offer, includes just the authority to act. That correct, Judge?

*Godbold:* That is correct. Our counsel says "that is correct." We are asking for authority to act, we are not accepting the offer. If in our judgment the offer should not be accepted naturally we will reject it. Question?

All in favor please rise—standing vote taken. All opposed counted first—31 no's. 161 yes.

*Mr. Steere:* Remaining agenda is the routine reports, it is now 6:25, we have the President's Report, The Building Fund Committee Report, The Steward's Committee Report, The Treasurer's Report. If you want we can put them all in the FORECAST and adjourn the meeting, what is your pleasure? Motion of adjournment heard and seconded, all in favor rise—meeting adjourned.



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# ANCESTRAL OUTRIGGER CANOE CLUB

Polynesian roots of the Outrigger Canoe Club have been nourished for over eight centuries by every grain of Waikiki sand and every drop of Pacific water that caressed the Coral Curve. Those roots have sent up many structures to comfort aquatic humans but it was not until May 1, 1908, that the greatest of all appeared—our own sturdy Outrigger Canoe Club, the Golden Anniversary of which we commemorate May 1, 1958. Twenty-five years later will come our Quinseptuagesimal.

A symbolic Rainbow of Ancient Promise always has arched over the King of Beaches from the Ala Moana to Diamond Head. It pledges that as long as the Soul of OCC lives, Surf-Sports will never disappear from Waikiki. The Lovely Spirit of Waikiki forever has whispered into *kamaaina* ears—"keep alive your Polynesian heritage." Aloha to all those who, down the centuries, have retained for us the sports that made Waikiki famous round the world.

## VISITORS PRAISE WAIKIKI

One has not enjoyed Hawaii until Waikiki has been visited! Nathaniel Portlock and George Dixon who, in 1786, sent a party from the *King George* and *Queen Charlotte* to "discover" Waikiki Beach, saw King Kahekili's surfers off the Beach. Master William Barkley anchored the first *haole* ship—the *Imperial Eagle*—off the famous Crescent Curve. Joseph Ingraham was in command of the first American ship to visit Waikiki—the *Hope*.

One after another they came to worship nature at the Spurting Waters—George Vancouver in 1793; Jonathan Thorn of the *Tonquin* in 1811; John Marshall Gamble in the U.S.S. *Sir Andrew Hammond* in 1814; Lord George Anson Byron in 1825; Herman Melville; Edwin Booth; Chester Smith Lyman who, in 1846, enjoyed the Young Chiefs OCC at Waikiki with calabashes of water as a showerbath; Mark Twain; Crown Prince Oscar of Sweden in 1884; Charles Warren Stoddart; Robert Louis Stevenson; Joaquin Miller; Matthew Arnold; William Howard Taft and Bob Taft in 1900; Jack London and Burton Holmes. Those are just a few!

## JAMES DODD'S LONG BRANCH BATHS

The Easy Eighties will never return to Waikiki. In those carefree years a surfer reached the haven of Waikiki by hiking, horse-riding, carriage or bus, bicycling or outrigger. Right on the spot, where the OCC clubhouse now adorns the beach,

was James Dodd's Long Branch Baths to which Dodd's Bus would convey one.

## HOLMES, FIRST MOVIES, SURFING

Burton Holmes arrived at Honolulu aboard the *Moana* in June of 1898. He made the first movies of surfing at Waikiki. Prominent people, including Princess Kaiulani, and a large fleet of outriggers, were shown in the pictures. The Princess had her own Outrigger Canoe Club.

## MARSHAL BROWN'S OUTRIGGER CANOE CLUB

But it was Marshal Arthur M. Brown who had the nearest thing to an OCC, ten years before the OCC's natal day. Burton Holmes was entertained at Waikiki by Marshal Brown with a *luau* featuring a *poi*-fattened dog. They all went outriggering in the "Marshal's Fleet of Five Canoes" out to the Royal Surf Kalehuawehe.

"Mr. Brown's *Lanai* . . . really was the Home of the Outrigger Canoe Club," wrote Mr. Holmes ten years later.

## WAIKIKI CANOES IN REGATTA DAY RACES

For a long time *kamaainas* of Waikiki had owned canoes. In 1900, on Regatta Day, Arthur M. Brown's *Alabama* won the Six Paddle Outrigger Race in the Harbor of Honolulu. From then on many Waikiki canoes were victorious on Regatta Days. They and their owners and crews later helped create the OCC. *Alabama*, *Waikiki*, *Puakalani*, *Malolo*, *Aa* or *A*, *Halekulani*, *Keomoku*, *Hanakeoki* and others. Arthur M. Brown, Walter

F. Dillingham, Dr. Alfred C. Wall and Prince Kuhio were a few of the owners.

#### THE OLD MOANA PIER

The Old Moana Pier, constructed about 1890, was present as Nature's *Kahuna* to bless the OCC on May 1, 1908. In early days it jutted out from the American Legation *Moana* of American Minister Harold M. Sewall. July 4, 1898 was a notable occasion when Minister Sewall held a reception attended by a member of OCC's Hall of Fame—President-Governor-Judge Sanford Ballard Dole.

#### MOANA HOTEL OPENS—1901

The Moana Hotel opened its doors on March 11, 1901, to form with the Royal Hawaiian Annex (Seaside), across the stream Apuakehau, an attractive site for the OCC. Already there were suggestive whispers heard for an OCC.

#### DOWN THE PRE-OCC YEARS

Down the pre-OCC years, surfing at Waikiki was glorious and never in danger of extinction. Surfing was practiced by both Hawaiians and Whites. On March 20, 1905, a great throng gathered in front of the hotels as the Royal Hawaiian Band played on the Moana Pier. Young surfers rode standing upright on their boards that day.

"The surfing is glorious!" exclaimed Alice Roosevelt in July of 1905.

Harold Hustace was the Waikiki Surfboard Champion of 1906. In this year, George F. Macfarlane acquired the Royal Hawaiian Annex and renamed it the Seaside Hotel. Seaside Manager Fred Church sponsored surfing.

#### NEW YEAR'S REGATTA—1907

Alatau Leonard Charles Atkinson laid many a coral block in the foundation of the Outrigger Canoe Club. On December 16, 1906, he proposed to the Promotion Committee that a "New Year's Regatta, Waikiki Beach," be held, limited to "Hawaiian Aquatic Sports" on surfboards and in outrigger canoes and swimming. J. F. Morgan and F. L. Waldron were appointed a committee to arrange the Regatta.

There we have a definite beginning of the OCC. Weather interfered and the Waikiki Aquatic Regatta was not held until March 16, 1907, when a program of fourteen events was run off. Familiar

canoe names appeared in this Regatta—*Hanakeoke, Halekulani* and *Keawamalie*—while a few person-names were: Archie Robertson, A. M. Brown, Kenneth Brown, Vince Genoves, J. F. Morgan, F. L. Waldron, Lane Webster, Dr. Alford C. Wall, Harold Hustace (surfboard winner), Harry Steiner, and James McCandless. Practically the entire charter membership of the future OCC were contestants, officials or spectators. "As far as the memory of man runneth, there never has been such a large gathering," reported the *Advertiser*.

#### MORE VISITORS—1907 AND 1908

Jack and Charmian London in the summer of 1907 lived in their "Brown Tent Cottage" on the present site of the OCC. Alice Roosevelt returned to Waikiki as Mrs. Nicholas Longworth in July of 1907. A. H. Ford visited Hawaii for a short while in 1907 but made no recommendations for an OCC. R. K. Bonine, an eminent motion-picture photographer, visited Waikiki in 1908 and gave the King of beaches additional prestige.

#### BURTON HOLMES AND A. H. FORD—1908

Burton Holmes arrived back on the *Siberia* March 3, 1908. Alexander Hume Ford landed from the *Moana* the next day. Ella Wheeler Wilcox was here at the time.

#### BURTON HOLMES' SURFBOARD CARNIVAL

"Mr. Holmes has become the hero of the youngsters at Waikiki," explained the *Advertiser* of March 12, 1908. "They are arranging A Surfboard Carnival for him on March thirteenth, while their elders close the sport with an outrigger canoe race."

"Both Mr. Holmes and Mr. Bonine were at the Moana Hotel, on March 13, 1908, trying to get a lifelike pictures of the surfriders and canoes," reported the *Evening Bulletin* of March 14th. "There were many on the lawn who watched with interest the many canoes and surf-riders."

#### WAIKIKI CLUBHOUSE FOR SURFERS

"Honolulu is to have a Clubhouse at Waikiki Beach for Surfboarders and those interested in Canoe-Surfing," announced the *Evening Bulletin*, March 14, 1908. "Mr. Archibald Stout (Manager)

and William Lishman (Proprietor) of the Seaside Hotel, at the request of A. H. Ford, granted the site and A. L. C. Atkinson has promised to promote and organize the Club. Burton Holmes and L. K. Bonine are registered as the first and most enthusiastic non-resident members."

#### BURTON HOLMES AND OCC

"Burton Holmes was bubbling over on March thirteenth . . . while looking over the ground upon which he hopes the Lanai Clubhouse will grow during his absence from Hawaii," reported the *Bulletin*.

"The only marvel to me," Holmes said to the *Bulletin* reporter on this pioneer date of March thirteenth, "is that it never has been done before. When I first came to Hawaii ten years ago it was Mr. Brown's *Lanai* that was really the home of the Outrigger Canoe Club as it is today. . . . I believe that the building of a *Lanai*, for those who wish to own canoes but have no place to keep them, is a splendid idea."

#### ANNUAL OUTRIGGER AND BOARD RACES

Burton Holmes looked at the OCC site as he spoke. "There should be a large non-resident membership. . . . One man to look after surfboards and canoes will be the only force needed so that the surplus from dues not needed in adding more *hau* trees can be devoted to cups and prizes and the expense of conducting Annual Outrigger Canoe Races and Carnivals, while an Annual Surfboard Series of Races would not only tend to keep alive this King-of-Sports as Jack London named it, but should attract visitors from all parts of America."

#### SARAH PARK CANOE RACE JULY 13

The first annual Sarah Park Memorial Invitational Canoe Race will be held July 13 in Waikiki by the Waikiki Surf Club, Allen Bostick, president, announced recently.

The race is being held in recognition of Miss Park's long-time effort to stimulate interest in Hawaiian water sports.

Miss Park, who was an active member of the Waikiki Surf Club, died in a plane crash over Windward Oahu while covering the seismic (tidal) wave last March or the *Star-Bulletin*.

## PRE-PADDLING PATTERN

Well, here we go again! It seems this paddling routine is a never-ending task. To spectators watching a canoe race, and even to the participants in the canoe, it's not realized just how much planning is necessary before a regatta can be staged. Apparently, it's getting tougher all the time, for this year there has been no break in monthly meetings of the Hawaiian Canoe Racing Association. Heretofore, the season has been closed with a meeting following the Territorial Championships, giving the coaches and H.C.R.A. delegates a four or five month break from gathering around the table once a month to make momentous decisions. Currently, yours truly and Coach Downing have been maintaining the Outrigger's representation during the off-season so that the Club's program can be geared to any new format or requirement imposed upon it by the association.

For those interested and to indicate the need for planning on the part of the Club authorities the following are listed as the sponsored races for the coming '58 season—Maritime Day, May 24; Kamehameha Day, June 15; Oahu Championships, July 20, and the Territorial Championships, August 2, at Kauai. To the naked eye a short season; however, we are pleased to announce that at long last the association has come around to taking a step long advocated by the Outrigger delegation. Outrigger, the sponsor of the July 4th's Macfarlane Day regatta, has never been able to get this event out from under the sponsorship of the association, which has meant that although Outrigger puts up the awards, does the work, sets the course and provides the assistance to the officials, the Club has been forced to have some decisions and some of the methods used in running the regatta imposed upon it by the association and other clubs which are getting a free ride. Therefore, it is pleasant to announce that the regattas have been listed as sponsored and unsponsored. Sponsored races are under the complete jurisdiction of the H.C.R.A. Unsponsored race means that the club staging the regatta can select the type course it desires, choose the number and length of races it desires, and gen-

erally speaking, run things in a fashion convenient to its purse or facilities.

To round out the schedule the following are the proposed unsponsored races: Walter James Macfarlane, July 4; Sarah Park Memorial by Waikiki Surf, July 13, and a very questionable Labor Day at Kailua, Oahu.

By inserting these in the calendar, one can see a crowded July schedule. July 4, 13, and 20. The July 4th and 13th regattas are of questionable value in preparing for the Oahu Championships on July 20 since they are held at Waikiki and it is anybody's race, depending on surf conditions. There should be no doubt in anyone's mind that the aim of the Outrigger is to capture the Territorial Championship and to do so an entry must be gained in every event at the Oahu Championships. Therefore, its apparent serious thought must be given to getting the paddlers into their peak form at the right time. Too early or too late can mean a loss at the final championships.

With this thought in mind, Coach Downing is calling a paddlers' meeting Saturday, April 19, at 2:00 p.m. Place: Iwalewa sun-deck. The season's overall strategy will be gone over, with the paddlers themselves asked to come up with some of the answers. Remember, school requirements, school sports, and exam week cannot be ignored, and certainly, Mom and Dad are in the picture. Don't forget, April 19, at 2:00 p.m., a Saturday afternoon, with special emphasis on new material. Coach Downing extends a special invitation to all girl smokers. See you on the 19th!

## VOLLEYBALL SPOTLIGHT


