"OUTRIGGER CLUB" SUGGESTED

The Seaside Hotel, Moana Hotel, and Waikiki Inn managers, the Hawaii Promotion Committee, and the many Waikiki residents showed an active interest in promoting the Beach and its surf sports; the Myrtle Boat Club, Healani Yacht and Boat Club, Kunalu Boat Club, Diamond Head Athletic Club and the Kamehameha Aquatic Club all were active in aquatics; but there was no Outrigger Canoe at Waikiki on New Year Day of 1908. However, no longer was human-leg power, bicycle, outrigger-canoe, steamer, or horse and mule necessary for the people to visit Waikiki Beach. The electric trolley and automobile made the Beach available to everybody. So, *kamaainas* started to think about a Beach-Club.

BONINE'S MOTION-PICTURES

R. K. Bonine, an eminent motion-picture maker, arrived in Honolulu. Movies made by him were exhibited at the Opera House on February 15, 1908 for the benefit of the *Hawaii* yacht Fund. Announcements for this Motion-Picture Show were headed "Surf-Riders on the Screen," and they explained that "the view of the Float at Waikiki is really very good." In a plug on February 12, 1908, the *Advertiser* told Honoluluans that "to see themselves as others see them will be the chance given by Mr. Bonine to the Surf-Riders and Bathers at Waikiki."

The Annual Floral Parade on February 22, 1908 was a brilliant success. Palenapa impersonated Kamehameha - the Great in the Hawaiian Tableaux. There were *pa-u* riders, automobile floats and other features. R. K. Bonine was there with his movie-camera and made some fine reel.

BURTON HOLMES AND A. H. FORD ARRIVE

Burton Holmes, the well-known traveler and lecturer and successor to Charles Warren Stoddard, arrived at Honolulu aboard the *Siberia*, on March 2, 1908, reported the *Hawaiian Star*. "I took the first moving-pictures ever taken in these Islands when I was here ten years ago," in 1898, said Mr. Holmes to the *Advertiser* reporter.

"Yes, I am back in Hawaii," declared Alexander Hume Ford to the *Advertiser* Man on March 3, 1908 as he stepped ashore from the *Moana*. "I left Honolulu last June" (1907), explained Mr. Ford who then asked—"How did I happen to return to Hawaii at this time?" Answer—"She hummed *Aloha Oe*, and that settled it!"

ELLA WHEELER WILCOX IN HONOLULU

Mrs. Ella Wheeler Wilcox, accompanied by her husband (R. M. Wilcox), came to Honolulu on the *Mongolia* on February 5, 1908. They occupied a cottage on the spacious grounds of the Royal Hawaiian Hotel. Mr. and Mrs. Wilcox enjoyed the Beach at Waikiki. Ella Wheeler Wilcox, on her first visit to Hawaii "made a conquest of Honolulu," reported the *Advertiser*, the largest affair in her honor being the big reception on March 5, 1908 "in the rooms of the Kilo-hana Art League." Mrs. Wilcox wrote a lovely poem on Princess Kaiulani which Governor Walter F. Frear read on March 6, 1908 in the ceremony commemorating the death of the Princess.

After Burton Holmes and R. K. Bonine had made motion-pictures of them at the dock, the Wilcox's left the Islands aboard the *Manchuria* on March 7, 1908.

BONINE AND HOLMES MAKE SURFING PICTURES

"Bonine is to take another picture of the bathers of the Seaside (Hotel) within a day or so," reported the *Hawaiian Star*, March 9, 1908. "The Promotion Committee realizes the benefit that will follow the exhibition of views of Hawaii and are aiding Mr. Bonine to secure the best obtainable."

"The big tripod at the Seaside is being rigged up on the Reef to allow R. K. Bonine to mount his moving-picture machine and obtain some close-at-hand shots at Surf-Riders and Surf-Canoers," explained the *Advertiser* of March 9, 1908.

"It would be difficult to conceive a greater pleasure than to have Messrs. Bonine and Burton Holmes on the stage at the same time," wrote the *Hawaiian Star*, March 10, 1908. "Mr. Burton

KNOW YOUR DIRECTORS

Reverend Henry Pratt Judd, elected Director at the annual meeting, is almost but not quite a kamaaina. Born at Rensselaer, New York on March 15, 1880, he arrived with his parents in Hawaii in July of the same year. However, Henry's family have a history reaching to the early missionary days.

He attended Punahou Academy, then Yale and later the Auburn Seminary. For many years he was a minister of the Congregational Church and though retired still acts at times as pastor for several churches. Incidentally he is one of the few parsons who sermonize in the Hawaiian language.

Dr. Judd is married and the father of two strapping big sons. He joined the OCC in 1913 and can be seen daily there at about noon when he takes a long swim. His participation in sports while at school was in football and in swimming.

Long a student and researcher, a historian, writer and teacher, he taught Hawaiian language at the U of H from 1934 to 1945 and was retired as Professor Emeritus from the University. He still teaches classes in language, lore and Hawaiiiana. He is a man of many interests and has written four books and countless articles on Hawaiiiana and is recognized as an authority.

Many of our Outrigger members have had the honor of being married by Henry and his services are always in demand.

He is a member of Central Union Church, was Chaplain of the Hawaii National Guard from 1919 to 1940, retiring as Major Chaplain. He was Chaplain for the Legislature in the Sessions of 1943 and 1945 and for the Senate Sessions of 1947 and 1949. Of course when the Constitutional Convention was called in 1950—Dr. Judd was the Chaplain, opening and closing the Sessions in Hawaiian and English.

As a member of the OCC he has acted as Director for one previous term. He still loves his swim and was a collector of land shells having donated a fine collection to the Bishop Museum and finds time to study Hawaiian history.

Presently, Henry is civic minded with active membership in the Honolulu Chamber of Commerce, Waikiki Rotary Club, Social Science Assoc., Yale Alumni Assoc., Director in Honolulu Automobile Club and membership in many other organizations.

DUKE, HONORARY LIFETIME DIRECTOR

Members attending the Annual Meeting will recall that an Amendment to the By-Laws was passed creating the position of Honorary Lifetime Director. Following the Amendment another motion was made nominating Duke P. Kahanamoku and electing him to that office.

In order to determine whether the action conformed with the Club's By-Laws the President stated that the By-Laws would be consulted.

Under Sec. 53, By-Laws Feb. 1945, they state, "Written notice of the time and place of each meeting of the Club shall be mailed or delivered to the last known address of, or served personally on, each member entitled to vote at least ten days prior to the date of said meeting; provided that the object of any special meeting shall be set forth in the notice thereof and no other business shall be transacted."

Under Sec. 63 AMENDMENTS AND EXCEPTIONS, "With the exceptions of the provisions with respect to the composition and powers of the Finance Committee, these By-Laws may be amended by a majority of the members present at any annual meeting or special meeting called for that purpose in the absence of a statute of the Territory of Hawaii to the contrary."

It having been determined by the Board of Directors at a special meeting on Sunday, March 23rd that the proceedings were in accord with the By-Laws

as stated above, Duke P. Kahanamoku accepted the honor of the position of Honorary Lifetime Director.

The acceptance of this office created a vacancy of Director on the Board and President Godbold then appointed Mr. Ernest Cameron as a Director.* Mr. Cameron received the next highest number of votes in the Annual election. The Board immediately confirmed the above actions by unanimous vote. The above action increased the number of Directors from eleven to twelve.

GUEST CARD POLICY DEFINED

At the last regular meeting of the Board of Directors a new House and Grounds rule was passed regarding the issuance of Guest Member cards.

This rule was the result of the apparent desire of the membership to restrict this privilege as shown at the Annual meeting. The new rule is as follows:

"No member may have issued more than ten (10) active outstanding guest cards at any one time." "This rule applies to ALL MEMBERS WITHOUT EXCEPTION."

The above motion and rule was passed unanimously by the Board. A strict check will be made on all member guest cards and the rule will be enforced.

GUEST CARDS DENIED

A commercial tour service recently applied for the issuance of guest cards for a large tour party. The service was informed that the Club cannot issue such block cards as its accommodations and House rules do not permit it.


THOSE UNIVERSITY GIRLS

At the Annual meeting it was stated that a group of University girls visiting Hawaii on a tour to attend Summer Session at the University of Hawaii were given block guest privileges. Your editor made an investigation of this matter and found that the speaker was misinformed.

There were not 200 or 300 girls in the group. There were 140. The number of guest cards issued to the visiting girls did not include the entire group but a number were issued by request of Club members. The tour service conducting the party rented a cottage at the Moana cottages and most of the girls used these accommodations to dress and shower when visiting the beach.

However, a goodly number of the girls did use the Club privileges, the dressing room, the dining room, volleyball courts and other facilities. Incidentally they were all thrilled with Honolulu, the Club and Waikiki.

PARKING LOT

A report of the parking lot's revenue and expenses for the past six months was reviewed and after a general discussion, the following action was taken:

1. Monthly parking privileges will be limited to 350, with regular, term and life members being eligible to apply for these privileges. It was understood that at present, there are 388 members availing themselves of the monthly parking privilege and no action will be taken to remove the additional 38 from the parking lot but as these members discontinue their monthly parking privilege, the list will be reduced to the 350 limit.
2. It was also recommended and approved that the existing schedule of parking fees for transient parking be continued on all days except Saturdays, Sundays and holidays when the parking lot will be made available to monthly parking members only.
3. The question of certain members working in the Waikiki area who park their cars all day in the parking lot was also discussed. It was felt that this practice was undesirable especially when considering that this practice is being followed by members who are included on the \$2.00 monthly parking list and we are therefore competing, on an unfair basis, with operators of public parking areas. It was, therefore, suggested and approved that this matter be referred to the Manager for review and recommendation.

It was recommended and approved that adequate coverage of the parking lot area seven days a week be set up by the Manager.

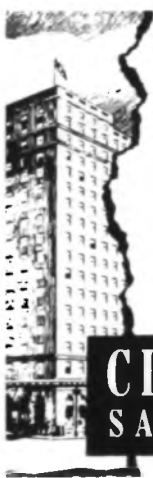

HEALANI CANOE RACING

On Sunday, March 23rd, the Reverend Henry P. Judd, Director of OCC, gave a blessing to a new canoe the "Papaloo" in ceremony held at Ala Wai boathouse. The canoe, built especially for racing is the property of Healani Yacht and Boat Club who intend to become competitors in canoe racing. They are a most welcome addition.

"Papaloo" meaning "long board" is forty two feet long and was built at Kealakekua, South Kona, Hawaii and was a gift of Amy Greenwell.

Healani Club is a member of the Hawaiian Canoe and Paddling Association which was organized some years ago to perpetuate the sport of canoe racing and surfing. UHU....

Uhu, not to be confused with huhu—is a fish of a sort. In this case a human fish. But, let us start at the beginning. Many years ago while visiting Albert Edward “Toots” “Uhu” Minvielle at his home I was amazed at the quantity of medals and cups scattered about. Questioning him about them I found he had several more trunkfuls and was rather reticent to talk of his athletic exploits. “Toots” was a bachelor then—but he’s married now and the women do talk, so we eked out a bit about him.

Born June 1, 1903 at Olaa, Hawaii, he is truly a kamaaina. He attended school in Hawaii, graduated from McKinley High School in Honolulu and majored in engineering and graduated from the University of Hawaii in 1925.

Swimming always was his major sport of which more later, but he had time to learn to play the violin and played with the Honolulu Symphony Orchestra. His wife an accomplished pianist and vocal teacher finds a kindred soul in this field.

“Toots” or “Uhu” joined the O.C.C. in 1916 and has been a member of the Canoe Committee off and on for many years. He has entered into canoeing, surfing and swimming meets for the Club, bringing in many points. He has coached in all these sports and has been most active in surveying canoe courses and laying buoys in preparation for regattas. Unobtrusively and quietly he has contributed much to the Club and has much more to give. “Toots” is probably one of the best canoe designers in the islands for he combines not only a mastery of steersmanship, knowledge of surf and currents but also the technical engineering knowledge of weights, balances, stresses and strains.

He was married to Miss Mildred G. Tummonds of Tacoma, Washington, in 1948. They have recently moved into a new home built for them. He is a member of the Masonic Lodge, the Shrine and the Aloha Patrol.

While swimming, surfing, canoeing are his major sports he participates in volleyball, goat and pig hunting, spear fishing and fishing. In fact the nickname

“Uhu” comes from his uncanny skill in spear fishing. He is accused of having a secret fishing hole somewhere near Honolulu Harbor where he could always go and bring back a canoeload of uhu. We know this is true—we’ve seen the fish.

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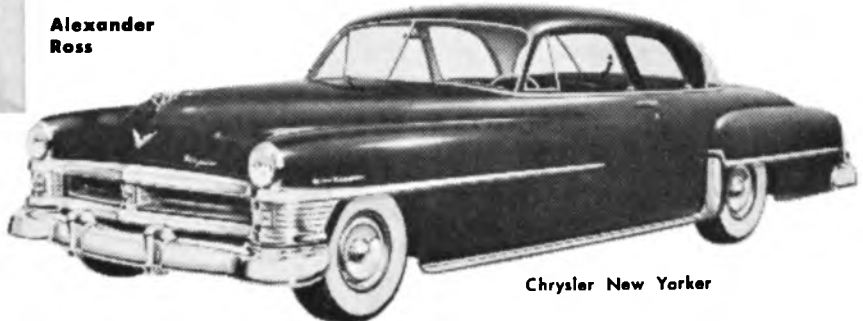


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Surf 'n Sand

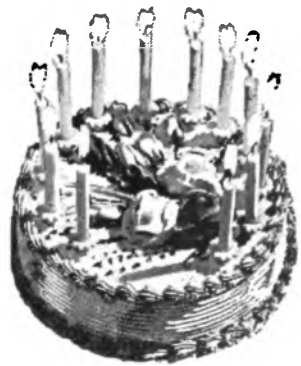

Holmes is to be at the Opera House" on March 12, 1908, to tell the people in the audience what the pictures are and to say something of his impressions of Hawaii."

"When Burton Holmes and R. K. Bonine get together with a motion-picture machine there is bound to be something doing," reported the *Advertiser*. "Holmes has travelled all over the world; so has Bonine . . . both make pictures and Holmes tells about the countries he has gone through."

EXHIBITION MOVIES OF WAIKIKI SURFERS

Motion - pictures of Waikiki - surfers, Floral Parade, Panama Canal, and the departure of Ella Wheeler Wilcox were shown at the Opera House by Holmes and Bonine on March 12, 13, 1908. A trial-run was held on March 11 and the *Evening Bulletin* reported that the "picture is a beauty." Advance reports in the newspapers lavishly praised the pictures. "Burton Holmes had been taken out to learn the art of surf-boating by the Princess (Kaiulani), the first day he arrived in these Islands ten years ago," reported the *Advertiser*. "The pictures of surf-riding," Mr. Holmes said, "were the finest taken of that subject up to date, but that it was his hope and Mr. Bonine's to take some better ones before they left."

HOLMES—"HERO" OF WAIKIKI LADS

"In Honolulu, Mr. Holmes has become the hero of the youngsters at Waikiki Beach," wrote the reporter in the *Advertiser*, March 12, 1908. "They are arranging a Surfboard Carnival for him on Friday afternoon [March 13], while their elders close the sport with an Outrigger Canoe Race."

"Both Mr. Bonine and Mr. Holmes were at the Moana Hotel" on March 13, 1908, "trying to get life-like pictures of the Surf-Riders and Canoes," stated the *Evening Bulletin* of March 14, 1908. "There were many on the Lawn who watched with interest the many canoes and surf-riders."

WAIKIKI CLUBHOUSE FOR SURFERS

"Honolulu is to have a Clubhouse at Waikiki Beach for Surfboarders and those interested in Canoe-Surfing," an-

nounced the *Evening Bulletin*, March 14, 1908. "Mr. Stout, Manager of the Seaside Hotel and Proprietor Lishman have, at the request of Alexander Hume Ford, granted the site and 'Jack' [A.L.C.] Atkinson has promised to promote and organize the Club. Burton Holmes and E. K. Bonine are registered as the first and most enthusiastic non-resident members."

BURTON HOLMES AND OUTRIGGER-CLUB

"Splendid Scheme for Making Use of Honolulu's Magnificent Beach for the Greatest Sport on Earth," was the headline in the *Evening Bulletin* of March 14, 1908." Burton Holmes was bubbling over yesterday [March 13, 1908] afternoon when interviewed by the *Bulletin* Man, while looking over the ground upon which he hopes the *Lanai* Clubhouse will grow during his absence from Hawaii."

"The only marvel to me," he said to the *Bulletin* Man on this pioneer date of March 13, 1908, "is that it has never been done before. When I first came to Hawaii, ten years ago [1898], it was Mr. Brown's *Lanai* that was really the home of the Outrigger Canoe Club, as it is today. Here, the Princess Kaiulani ordered her crew to launch her canoe and, seated in the prow, she gave directions as we came sailing in upon the billows, and I was initiated into the grandest bit of sport the world over."

"I believe that the building of a *Lanai* for those who wish to own canoes but have no place to keep them, is a splendid idea," said Burton Holmes on March 13, 1908, as he stood looking at the site of the Outrigger Canoe Club. "And there should be a large non-resident membership." As "no drinks will be sold in the Clubhouse, one man to look after the surfboards and canoes will be the only force needed, so that the surplus from dues, not needed in adding more *hau* trees, can be devoted to cups and prizes and the expenses of conducting Annual Outrigger Races and Carnivals, while an Annual Surfboard Series of Races would not only tend to keep alive this King-of-Sports, as Jack London named it, but should attract visitors from all parts of America."



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
