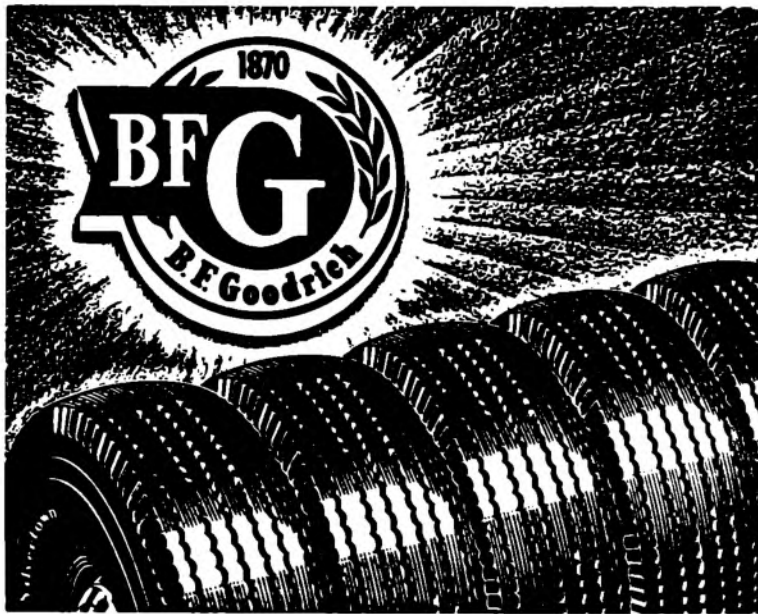

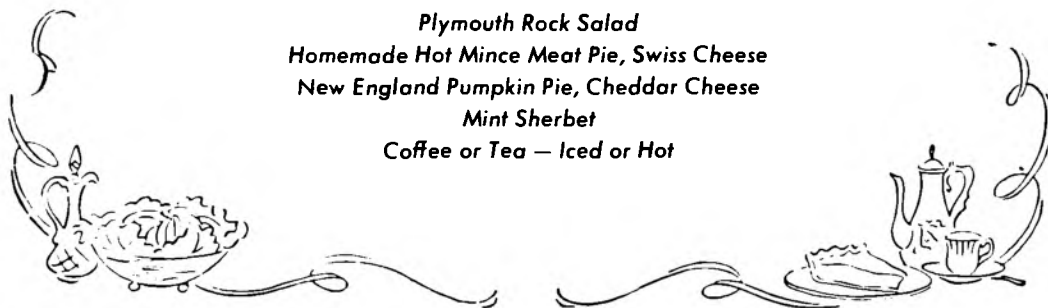

# THE TAFTS VISIT WAIKIKI IN 1900

*It seems appropriate as Bob Taft is making headlines so often to include this interesting article in the FORECAST at this time. Thanks to our good friend and contributor, Col. McClellan, we print this timely bit of history.—(The Editor.)*



Senator Bob Taft, who is for Statehood and who may represent the Republicans in the presidential race next year, visited Waikiki Beach over fifty-one years ago. He saw the site of the Outrigger Canoe Club which came into existence about eight years later.

"The transport *Hancock* (Strube) arrived at noon today," reported the *Hawaiian Star* of April 24, 1900. "She anchored outside the harbor, but will enter as soon as the *Doric* leaves and will take coal at the Pacific Mail Dock." The Army transport *Hancock* had sailed from San Francisco on April 17. *The Friend of May*, 1900, explained that the transport had on board "Judge (William Howard) Taft and his four distinguished colleagues of the Philippine Commission, with their Staff and families, 46 persons in all." This Second Philippine Commission in addition to Bill Taft, included General Luke E. Wright, Judge Henry C. Ide, Professor Dean C. Worcester, and Professor Bernard Moses.

## BOB TAFT ABOUT THE AGE OF DUKE KAHANAMOKU

"I had with me my three children," wrote Mrs. Helen Herron Taft, wife of the Judge. "Robert was ten years old, Helen eight, while Charlie, my baby, was just a little over two." The *Advertiser* noted that among the *Hancock's* passengers were "Mrs. W. H. Taft, three children and maid."

## BEAUTY OF ARRIVAL

"At Honolulu, I got my first glimpse of real tropics and I was enchanted. . . . I shall always think of Hawaii . . . as it appeared to me when our ship steamed past Diamond Head, skirted the huge breakers of Waikiki and made its way up through the bright waters of the Bay into Honolulu Harbor." A four-month quarantine (bubonic plague), which ended April 30th, did not keep the noted visitors from seeing the scenic sights of Oahu. "There were dinners and luncheons and teas and receptions and . . . sightseeing," explained Mrs. Taft, who mentioned Nuuanu Pali (the Pass of the Winds), the Bishop Museum and the Aquarium. The Hon. Harold M. Sewalls were hosts to the Tafts and others at a

reception on the 25th and a dinner the following evening.

## SURFBOARDS AND OUTRIGGERS AT WAIKIKI

"The Philippine Commissioners' party this morning went out to the Bishop Museum. . . . From the Museum the party went up Nuuanu Valley and were the guests of Mr. and Mrs. George R. Carter at luncheon," reported the *Hawaiian Star* of April 27, 1900. "In the afternoon, as guests of Mr. Carter, they went to Mrs. E. K. Wilder's Waikiki Beach residence. Here they spent the afternoon surf canoe riding, the canoes belonging to A. M. Brown and E. C. Macfarlane, being placed at their service."

"George R. Carter entertained the distinguished Americans, April 27th," described the *Advertiser*. "The visitors were initiated into the joys of life at the Beach. Several canoes were kept going most of the afternoon. Judge Taft took a paddle and, under the guidance of President (Sanford Ballard) Dole, tried to get the stroke as the boat flew through the water." Mrs. Taft wrote that "surf-riding at Waikiki is a great game . . . the surf there doesn't look as if any human being would dare venture into it; but when you see a beautiful slim brown native, naked save for short swimming-trunks, come gliding down a high white breaker, poised like a Mercury, erect on a single narrow plank—it looks delightfully exhilarating." Judge and Mrs. Taft and the other Commissioners enjoyed the canoe rides. "Taft was taken surf-riding in native canoes and reported that he

had never enjoyed a 'more exhilarating sport,' " wrote Pringle.

After surfing, "a tea was served at the Wilder's residence after which the visitors came to town in *wagonettes*," reported the *Advertiser*.

#### THE TAFT LUAU AND HULA

"On our last evening in Honolulu, after a morning of sight-seeing, a luncheon, an hour in the buffeting surf (at Waikiki), and a large tea-party, we were given a particularly elaborate *Poi* Dinner where we all sat on the floor. . . . Girls came in flaming-bright *Mother-Hubbard* dresses (*holokus*), crowned and covered with *leis*, to dance for us curious folklore dances (*hulas*) of the old time."

"The members of the Commission and their Ladies were most charmingly entertained at a *Poi* Supper and musical at *Yoha Cottage*," wrote the *Advertiser* reporter in describing this *luau*. "Mrs. B. F. Watkyns and George P. Thielen were the hosts. The feast a *la Hawaiian* was spread on the floor. . . . Pretty music by Solomon's *Quintette* and a wealth of beautiful flowers and Japanese lanterns added to the attractiveness of the scene. After the feast, dancing was indulged in for a short time and the guests were escorted to the Wharf where *alohas* were said and sung as the departing visitors sped out to the *Hancock* in the steamer's launch." Commissioner Ide voiced the sentiments of all when he said that they "had fallen in love with Honolulu."

"The transport *Hancock* left at five this morning," reported the *Hawaiian Star* of April 28, 1900. "She went out of the Harbor at high tide, drawing 29 feet of water." *The Friend* of May, 1900, recorded that the Taft party "after an enjoyable stay in this city, departed for the scene of their labors."

Two days later, President William McKinley approved the Organic Act for the Territory of Hawaii but Hawaii and the Tafts did not get the news for weeks later.

Senator Robert A. Taft is cordially invited to visit Hawaii and Waikiki during the presidential campaign. Vital issues lurk in the Pacific area out as far as Korea, Japan, China, and time spent in a visit to Hawaii, and points farther west, will bring rich returns in the election of November, 1952.

## OUR AFFILIATED CLUBS

*At McCarthy Center in Houston, Texas, is the Shamrock Hotel, housing The Cork Club, which though only two years old is already becoming famous for its facilities and hospitality. Members of the Outrigger Canoe Club are indeed fortunate to number it amongst the Clubs with which we have reciprocal relations. Elsewhere in this issue are enumerated Clubs which you may enjoy while away from home. Application must be made to our manager Fred Mosher for the issuance of courtesy cards to any Club listed. Below is the story of The Cork Club.—(Editor.)*

### THE CORK CLUB

The Shamrock opened its doors on March 17, 1949, and at the same time The Cork Club, a private club, opened its doors. The Cork Club was designed for the comfort and pleasure of its members, which at that time numbered 500, both resident and non-resident. The many facilities offered were 1,000 rooms, all air-conditioned, a 1,000-car garage, all located in the magnificent Shamrock Hotel.

The Cork Club (members, guests, and reciprocal club members) leases from The Shamrock the Lounge, with a seating capacity of 200, also a bar and beverage control room. Under Texas liquor laws each member must keep his beverage in our control room and each bottle must bear the member's name and his locker number, which number is also his membership number. A few months back we issued to each member a metal tag showing the Club Crest on one side and membership number on the other side. This tag may be attached to a key chain, or in case of lady (member's wife), attached to a bracelet. This tag was in lieu of a membership card.

Some of the other direct facilities of the Club are: The Eden Room, which is the Club dining room where a buffet luncheon is served daily from 12 noon until 2:30 P.M., excepting on Sunday, when the service is a la carte from 12 noon until midnight. On the second floor of the Club is the Western Room, which has an all-leather floor; also, true Western setting. This room is available for private luncheons, dinners, and special parties, such as bridge, canasta, teas, anniversary and birthday parties, children's parties and many other special occasions.

The Health Club is located on this

floor, which is open to our members from 11 A.M. until 11 P.M. For the members and their guests, adjacent to this room, is the Card Room, which is also known as the Trophy Room. There are many interesting things to be seen in this room, all sent to Mr. Glenn McCarthy from all over the world.

The Cork Club being a separate corporation also leases from the Shamrock Hotel the swimming pool. The pool is built to Olympic specifications and is the largest hotel pool in this part of the country. Two 1600-foot wells supply its 800,000 gallons of purified circulating water. The pool is 165 feet long, 60 feet wide at the deep end (14' 3"), and 120 feet wide at the shallow end (3' 4"). Under-water lighting is provided by 35 1,000 watt lamps. Experienced guards are on duty from 8 A.M. until 11 P.M. daily. Swimming instructions by qualified teachers may be arranged. Pool locker rooms for Club members and their guests are located conveniently on the lower level; attendants are on duty at all times during the pool hours. Club members and their guests, also guests of the hotel register at our checker's desk on this level; here also valuables are checked and towels issued. Members may drive

# ALOHA WEEK CANOE, SURFBOARD REGATTA

Members from all the beach clubs participated as contestants or officials. The success of the events was to a great degree due to the efforts of our own Sam Fuller, Bob Fischer and other members.

The beach was crowded with an estimated 10,000 interested spectators. The weather was perfect, sunny, a bit windy and just right for surfing. Following are excerpts from the *Honolulu Advertiser* of the events:

In the feature race of the day, the canoe surfing Malihini Special of mixed crews, the Edgewater Hotel paddlers won in 7 min. 41.4 sec. Edgewater won by a half length.

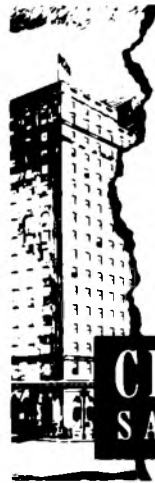
Mrs. Cook has been a member of the Club for more than two years. She arrived here in December, 1948, to spend a "three week vacation" — and hasn't left since!

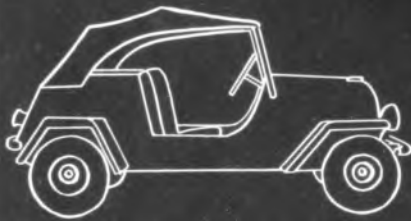

## DUKE AMONG '12 OLYMPIC STARS HONORED

Duke Kahanamoku was among the athletic stars of the 1912 Olympics in Stockholm who were honored in Los Angeles.

The sheriff of Honolulu accepted an invitation to attend a special banquet given by the Swedish Club of Los Angeles in cooperation with the Helms Athletic Foundation and left Thursday for the tribute Friday night, October 29, 1951, at the Biltmore Hotel.

Other 1912 Olympic heroes present were Fred W. Kelly, who ran the 110 meter high hurdles; Alma Richards, high jump star; and James Donahue, who placed fourth in the decathlon and second in the pentathlon. Others at the festivities were Dean Cromwell, noted track coach, and Marjorie Gestring, the three-meter springboard diver of the 1936 Olympiad.

The 1912 Olympics was the first of four games in which Duke participated. He won the 100 meter freestyle at Stockholm and repeated in 1920 at Antwerp, Belgium. He was second to Johnny Weissmuller in 1924 in Paris and played on the U. S. water polo team in 1932 in Los Angeles.—(Honolulu Advertiser, October 26, 1951.)

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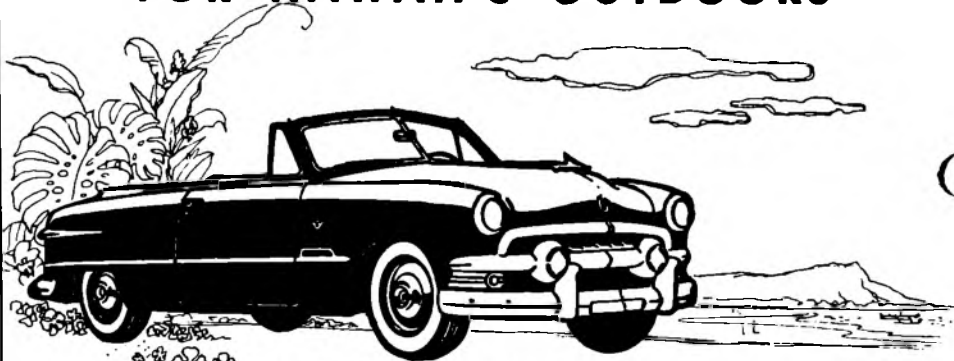
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
