OUR AFFILIATED CLUBS

In our August issue we started a series on our affiliated clubs. Fittingly we started with the oldest and largest on the east coast—the New York Athletic Club. We continue with the oldest and largest on the west coast, the Jonathan Club of Los Angeles. It has been my privilege to visit this wonderful club several times and it is a club hard to equal anywhere.—(Editor)

The Story of the Jonathan Club

The history of the Jonathan Club, since its founding in 1895, has been one of continual progress, and its growth and expansion have paralleled that of the City of Los Angeles. In every era of the City's history, Club members have been prominent leaders in the community, and the place which Los Angeles occupies today in the 100th year since its incorporation as one of the largest and greatest cities in the country is due in no small measure to the efforts and foresight of Jonathan Club members.

Though the Club has passed through many vicissitudes and has experienced, as has the City itself, many periods of difficulty, its leaders have steadfastly preserved the ideals and traditions of its illustrious founders.

The Jonathan Club first came into being on May 1, 1894, when a small group of men with common political interests banded together to favor the nomination of William McKinley for President of the United States. First president of the political predecessor of the present-day Jonathan Club was Colonel W. H. Chamberlain. Members of the group became so closely associated during the McKinley campaign that they decided to remain together as a social group and thus became the charter members of the Jonathan Club.

The Jonathan Club was reorganized as a social club on October 21, 1895, and the officers elected were as follows:

Directors were Hancock Banning, E. B. Tufts, George P. Taylor, B. F. Day, Bradner W. Lee and George C. Gaskill.

Most of the older members of the Club are well acquainted with the story of how the Jonathan Club received its name, but for the benefit of those newer to Jonathan membership, it might be well to recount briefly the circumstances surrounding this event.

The name "Jonathan Club" was first tendered by member Ed D. Tufts, who was known as the father of golf in California. This was the name, among all those proposed, finally selected for the Club.

Jonathan was, of course, a reference to "Brother Jonathan" Trumbull, the Governor of Connecticut on whom, so the story goes, George Washington depended for advice on all matters of importance during his terms as president. In fact, so close was the political relationship between Washington and Jonathan Trumbull that it gave rise to an expression, "Leave it to Brother Jonathan." Brother Jonathan became a legendary figure, and in the days of early American

ROYAL HAWAIIAN HOTEL STARTED

Frank G. Atherton (Vice-President of Castle-Cooke) "announced the building of a two-million dollar hotel at Waikiki by the Matson Company, which will pool interests with the Territorial Hotels Company, Ltd.," reported the *Advertiser*, April 29, 1925. The new hotel will occupy the site of the Seaside Hotel—15.21 acres owned by the Bernice Pauahi Bishop Estate. On July 6, 1925, Theodore Hopkins, Chief Engineer of the Territorial Hotels Company, broke the first dirt for the Royal Hawaiian Hotel on the Beach of Kings. However, the Royal Hawaiian Hotel did not open until early 1927.

OUTRIGGER CLUB ENTERTAINS "THE FLEET"

Thousands of officers and men of Our Navy and Marine Corps were entertained at the Outrigger Canoe Club and hotels of Waikiki at the conclusion of the mammoth Joint Army-Navy-Marine-Corps Maneuvers in the Spring of 1925. The "Outrigger Canoe Club Party" to representatives of the Press took place on May 2, 1925 at which time the Women's Auxiliary also served tea. For weeks the Club held "Open House" to our Nation's armed-forces.

The old *Matsonia* docked at Pier-Fifteen about half-past seven o'clock on the morning of July 14, 1925 and on board were Major Edwin North McClellan, USMC, Mrs. McClellan and their three children—Dick, Anne and Don. The "Colonel" was in Hawaii for his fourth visit, this time for over two years on duty at the Pearl Harbor Marine Barracks.

OUTRIGGER - CHAMPION TRACK AND FIELD

The *Advertiser*, on March 28th, reported that "the Outrigger Canoe Club will enter a Track Team in the Rainbow Carnival and the AAU Track and Field Meet, April 11, 1925, following the decision of the Punahou Track Team to

participate for the Beach Club. The Outrigger Team was formed of Burton Hooper, John Watt, Dick Gartley, Milton Carter, Harold Harvey, Wayson Williams, Ralph Ault; also the following-named Punahou athletes—Bill Jones, Bernard Farden, Al Giles, Ray Melim, Charlie Cooke, Herbert Deverill, Al Lemes, Napihaa, Mel Peterson, 'Kanny Ross, Gannon, Norman Ault, Walter Fernandez, Lloyd Smith, Danford and N. Davis. It was announced that Jack Slade would be coach of the Outrigger Canoe Club team.

"The Outrigger Canoe Club Track and Field Team, on paper, looks like the strongest entry in the First Annual Rainbow Relay Carnival," explained the *Star-Bulletin*, April 6, 1925. Harold Harvey is captain, Ralph Ault is manager and Jack Slade is coach.

Upsetting predictions, the University of Hawaii's Rainbows, defeated the Outrigger Canoe Club in the Rainbow Relay Carnival on April 11, 1925, by the score of 87 to 65. The O.C.C. was second in the half-mile-relay (the Surf-Quartet was R. Melim, H. Deverill, B. Farden and W. Jones); and second in mile-relay the Outrigger runners being V. Danford, A. Giles, Jim Landers and H. Deverill. The Club won the four-mile-relay race with T. Thomas, J. Swezey, Jim Sanders and Burt Hooper. O.C.C. was third in the two-mile-relay but won the quarter-mile-relay with sprinters Freitas, Giles, Jones and B. Farden. Dick Gartley won the pole-vault with Harold Harvey taking second-place.

The Outrigger Canoe Club won the AAU Track and Field Meet on April 18, 1925 by three points from the Deans (or Rainbows) of the University of Hawaii, the score being, Outrigger 65 points, Deans 62 points and Palama 46 points. The final result was in doubt until Al

Lemes of the Outriggers won the broad jump with a leap of 22 feet, 1 inch, beating Ching of the University. The broad-jump was the last event and it made the Waikiki Surfers, Champion of Hawaii.

Bernie Farden won the 100-yard dash with W. P. Jones, second; Burt Hooper won the mile with F. Thomas in third place; John Watt was second in the high-hurdles; H. Deverill won the quarter-mile; N. Sanders won the two-mile, Burt Hooper taking second place; B. Farden finished second in the 220-yard dash and W. P. Jones, third; Ray Melim was second in low hurdles; R. Ault was fourth in the half-mile; O.C.C. was second to the University in the mile-relay; second also to the Deans in the half-mile relay; R. Gartley won the pole-vault at a height of 11 feet, 8 inches, N. Sanders, second; Milton Carter won the high-jump at 6 feet, 1¾ inches; and Lemes won the broad-jump with R. Ault second.

This was not the first time the O.C.C. had won the T&F Championships for they did in 1920. A picture of the 1920 team in the Cocktail Lounge of the Club shows these names: G. Canario, M. Lydgate, R. Mott-Smith, A. Cleghorn, Joe Stickney, S. Deverill, Sam Poepoe, T. C. Melim, W. A. Inman (Coach), Allen McGuire, D. Crozier, G. Lindley, W. Bryant, W. Leal, H. Harvey and C. J. Willis.

On June 11, 1925, Burton Hooper, of the Outrigger Canoe Club, won the A.C.A. Club's six-mile modified Marathon. This race started at Queen-and-Richards Streets and finished in front of the Advertiser Building.

Bernard Farden and Burton Hooper were entered in the AAU Nationals at Kezar Stadium, San Francisco, early in July, 1925. They sailed from Honolulu aboard the *Ventura* for San Francisco on June 6, 1925. Soon, word came back that Farden had been injured and was unable to compete.

We see where Champion Swimmer Cleveland has been selected to play the part of Tarzan in the movies. Hawaii has certainly supplied its share of movie Tarzans.

"Haunani" (*Beautiful Hau*) Christened

The Haunani Hui gathered for the launching and christening of Bob Reisses' Hawaiian Surfing Canoe on July 29th. The canoe, 20 feet long, was overhauled by Johnny Hollinger, Duke Hong and Jim Alama. It is Hawaiian polished, varnished hardwood hull with white manues and gunnels.

The Hui requested smiling, good-natured Eva De Coto who greets all members and guests in the Club office to christen the canoe. Eva broke a coconut on its bow and as the luscious milk spread over the hull wished it Good Luck and God-speed. The nut was then shelled and all Hui members and guests were given a piece for good luck.

Johnny Hollinger, "Old Sea Biscuit" and Miss Margie Hoffmeister, a visiting co-ed from California, gave the canoe its christening ride out to Blow Hole and upon its return it was predicted "a fine surfing canoe."

Present were Hui members Ernest Lishman, Panama Dave, Ernie Cook, Jim Alama, Johnny Makua, John D. Kaupiko, Dad Center, Laughing John, Curley Cornwall, Charlie Lambert, Fred Mosher and many guests.

Needless to say the party started after the launching and many toasts were drunk in the Hawaiian manner, as the accompanying picture attests.

Editor's Note: On Sunday, August 19, a Canoe Racing Regatta was held under the auspices of the Hawaiian Canoe Racing Association. The Outrigger Canoe Club won but one event. However, this is hopeful for the future as the event was the Freshman Six. In the last several regattas our young paddlers have made the best showing. Below is the story as reported in the Honolulu Star-Bulletin of August 20.

Paddling to five first places and three seconds, Waikiki Surf Club won the team championship of the Hawaiian Canoe Racing Regatta Sunday in Honolulu harbor.

The Surfers piled up 31 points against Hui Nalu with 13, Hui Kalia with 10, Koolaupoko, eight, and Outrigger Canoe Club, five.

Waikiki Surf Club captured the men's senior six, men's junior four, women's senior six, women's junior four and the boys under 18 events.

Hui Nalu won the men's junior six, while Outrigger came through in the freshman six and Hui Kalia in the men's senior four.

The blue ribbon senior six race over three miles went to the Surfers in 32 minutes and 8 seconds. The day's final event, the men's senior four, was won by Hui Kalia in a photo finish over Waikiki Surf Club.

The time was 9 minutes, 20.3 seconds over the one mile course.
