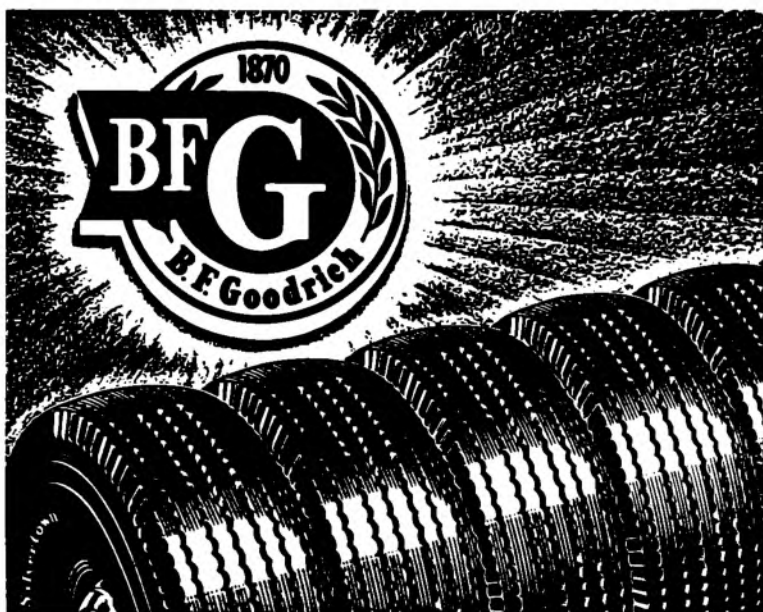

WALTER JAMES MACFARLANE MEMORIAL RACES

*Big Event
for July*

*"Out of Dreams and
Dust Rise Men's
Great Monuments"*

The great canoe racing event of each year is the Walter J. Macfarlane Memorial Races held annually on July Fourth and sponsored and conducted by the Outrigger Canoe Club. These races were named in honor of Walter "Mac" in commemoration of the great services he rendered to the Club.

Walter was born in 1907 and passed away on June 4, 1943, at which time he was president of the Club. A true son of Hawaii with partial Hawaiian blood, his was a history of participation in many sports and those of surf and sand particularly, for he loved Waikiki, the Club and its surfboard riding, canoeing and swimming. It is most fitting that we honor him with these races.

Walter's great contribution to the Club was his indomitable purpose in erecting from the old, run-down Club a new, modern, pleasant Club at Waikiki of which all members might be proud. The task seemed insurmountable. Funds were non-existent, the lease was due to lapse, doubters scoffed at the possibility—but Walter Mac and a small group went to work—resulting in the present Club.

Fortunately, Walter lived to see the dream come true—a monument to good health, good fellowship and recreation—all made possible by a few dreamers who knew that dreams come true by work and sweat and purpose.

"TOOTS" MINVIELLE SURPRISES THE EXPERTS

A. E. Minvielle, Jr., of the Outrigger Canoe Club, surprised the experts and upset the predictors, on May 30, 1925.

"Swimming along with a steady stroke that brought him into the lead early in the race, A. E. ("Toots") Minvielle, Jr., Outrigger Canoe Club, won the First Annual *Star-Bulletin* Athletic Association's Mile Swim in the Waikiki Waterway," by "a good ten yards over George Harris, Jr., Hui Nalu, who finished second," reported the *Star-Bulletin* of May 30, 1925. "A crowd estimated at two thousand witnessed the event." K. Makinney, Outrigger Canoe Club, finished third in the field of eight starters. Gay Harris, Jr., Outrigger Canoe Club, was fourth. John Woodd of Waialua swimming for the Central-Y was fifth. John Kahauku of Central-Y was sixth. John Gilmer Kealoha of the Navy and John Kaiwi, unattached, started but dropped out before the end. Samson Hyun (Hui Makani), Jack Silva (unattached) and E. L. K. Hartman (Outrigger) were scratched. Time was 25 minutes, 28 seconds.

"One of the interesting features of the event is the fact that Minvielle was not anxious to enter and only signed an entry-blank because of repeated urging by his Club-mates." In March, 1951, "Toots" told me—"I only entered the race because Dad Center told me to." Minvielle received a gold medal, George Harris a silver medal, and K. Makinney a bronze medal. The officials for this race included L. Fullard-Leo (referee), Arthur K. Powlison (starter), "Dad" Center, Mrs. E. Fullard-Leo, P. G. H. Deverill and Victor Ligda.

AQUAPLANING—HAWAIIAN STYLE

"Aquaplaning in Hawaii is different and more thrilling than aquaplaning at

Mainland beaches," wrote Mike Jay in the *Star-Bulletin*, March 7, 1925. "The Hawaiian system is a rope not attached to the surfboard. It goes directly from the boat to the hands of the standing rider, who transfers the motive-power by bracing his feet against the board. . . . The Hawaiian system is to be introduced to the Mainland next summer when Herbert Dowsett [and Harold Dillingham] goes to the Gold Cup Yacht Races on Long Island Sound [about August, 1925]. Carried to the *nth* degree was the Hawaiian system of aquaplaning with surfboards when the power was supplied by seaplanes going from sixty to eighty miles an hour at Pearl Harbor some years ago."

On April 26, 1925, Elmer E. Peck of San Diego and Coronado (where he gained fame as a surfboard rider) did his stuff in Honolulu Harbor. Peck demonstrated his stunts near Piers One and Ten, riding a surfboard behind a launch speeding at about fifty miles an hour.

It was in the thirties that "Toots" Minvielle thrilled hundreds of spectators on the Beach at Waikiki, as he did sensational aquaplaning-riding standing on his surfboard behind a speeding launch.

ON THE BEACH AT WAIKIKI

"Sam Kahanamoku rode two 'first-break' waves in succession standing—a distance of nearly a mile," explained Bob Ripley under an illustration in *Believe-It-or-Not* in the *Star-Bulletin* of April 18, 1925.

"Suitable outer garments reaching at least to the knee are going to be in demand from now on," reported the *Star-Bulletin*, April 4, 1925, as Sheriff David K. Trask, and his aides, arrested eight

WAIKIKI'S WILD WAVES

The sudden appearance of huge surf was the biggest event at Waikiki in years, June 15, 16, 17. Mainlanders, often complaining our surf is too small in comparison with theirs, are now silenced. Record ride was made by Gene "Tarzan" Smith from Castle's through Public Baths and Cunha's to shore alongside new drainage outlet. Same ride made in 1930 by Tom Blake, twice, and by Duke. Duke won by riding his board up the old Makee stream under Kalakaua Ave.!

Many would-be surfers turned into long-distance swimmers after having their boards torn from their grasp by the huge breakers, which were breaking in a continuous unbroken line from the Elks Club to Honolulu Harbor, and as far out as you could see. This was the largest surf seen here since the Japanese earthquake of 1923, when the waves were even larger, according to old timers "Dad" Center, Knute Cottrell, John Dee Kaupiko, Sr., Sally Hale and others. Hearing the news over radio KIKI and reading the news stories brought huge crowds from all over the island to Waikiki to watch King Neptune put on a show with his great white steeds.

The cause of the surf has not been determined and people are still guessing. One solution is that there was a tremendous submarine volcanic eruption to the southeast of Hawaii (that was the direction from which the surf came). However, there could not have been any earthquakes connected with the eruption as none were recorded on seismographs. Another suggestion is that there was a terrific storm of hurricane intensity which was located beyond the usual plane and shipping lanes and thus was not reported.

There was no major damage, but the large steel life raft belonging to the Ulu Niu swimming club was washed ashore in front of the Royal. Danny de Rego, lifeguard, with the help of Steamboat, Curly and other volunteers finally got it afloat and anchored beyond the Royal. On Monday a crew shoved it back to its old position and moored it more securely where it affords pleasure and recreation for hundreds of bathers daily.

persons the day before on Waikiki Beach for violations of the Desha Bathing Suit Law. However, our beach in 1951 is unmenaced, for the Desha Law was repealed two years ago.

"For the first time in her life, Mme. Amelita Galli-Curci (the world's greatest coloratura soprano) consented to be photographed in a bathing suit," reads a caption under a well-clad opera-star, in the *Advertiser* of July 23, 1925. On July 21, 1925, "she graciously gave the *Advertiser* permission to take the accompanying picture while she was enjoying the delights of Waikiki."

GAY HARRIS AND WATER-POLO

"Water-polo, which has had several revivals here in the past seven or eight years, is shortly to undergo another, according to the plans now being laid by Gay Harris of the Outrigger Canoe Club," published the *Star-Bulletin*, March 21, 1925. "Harris is calling a meeting shortly to which will be invited representatives from the Hui Makani, Hui Nalu, and other swimming-clubs." The *Advertiser* of March 24, 1925, reported that the AAU of Hawaii, on March 23, 1925, voted to approve the "holding of a water-polo tournament provided the Outrigger Canoe Club . . . would supervise and conduct it." Gay Harris, Chairman of the Committee on Water-Polo, had recommended that the tournament be held. Up to March 24th, the Outrigger Canoe Club had taken no official action but it was thought very likely that they soon would.

"On Sunday morning, May 31, 1925, in the water polo preliminaries, the Outrigger Canoe Club had little trouble in defeating the Palamas, 5-0, while Hui Makani won from Hui Nalu, 4-1," reported the *Star-Bulletin* of June 1, 1925. "The Muirhead Brothers stood out for the Surfers while Matsuguma was the best man on the Palama team."

The final game was played on June 1, 1925, between the Outriggers and Hui Makani. "The game was close for the first half, Kealoha scoring one for the Hui Makani and A. E. Minvielle, Jr., one for the Outrigger." (To be Continued)
