

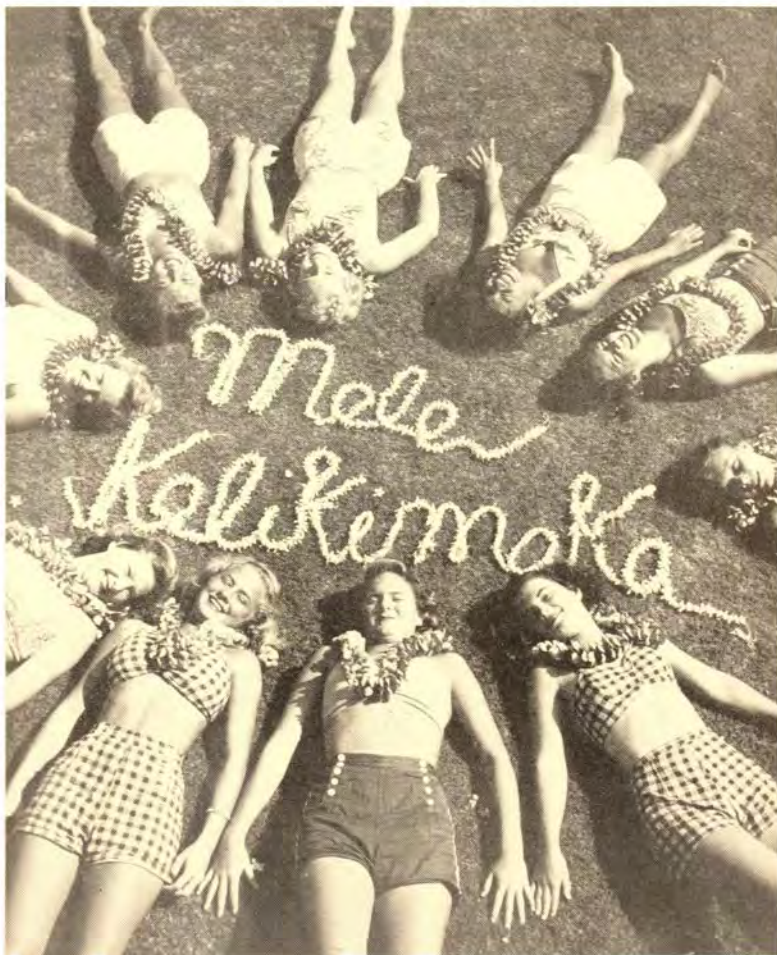

THAT NO TIPPING RULE

★

Recently the Club sent out statements to members covering a Christmas gratuity for the personnel of the Club. While the response to this Annual gift has been gratifying, there are a few members who have returned these statements with the remark that the tips they give should be sufficient. To make this clear we are reprinting "The President Comments" which was printed in the June issue of the Forecast, which fully covers the rule regarding tipping. Please read it carefully. You will note that the manager has been directed to STRICTLY ENFORCE the non tipping rule and that there are heavy penalties against members and dismissal for employees who violate this section of the Club's By Laws.

THE PRESIDENT COMMENTS

There apparently exists among the members of the club wide spread mis-

understanding as to tipping. Section of the club by-laws provides: "No tip shall be offered to any employee or accepted by the same." Throughout the period of the war this provision in by-laws was almost universally violated. At that time the prevailing patron of the club dining room and bar was service members and their guests. Enforcement of the rule was almost impossible, and I believe very little attention was made to curtail tipping. However, at the annual meeting of the club past a majority of the members present spoke vehemently in favor of the enforcement of the "no tipping" provision.

The Board of Directors has now directed the manager to enforce this rule strictly. In order to do this it was necessary to provide some other type of incentive to the waiters. This has been done in allowing the waiters 6% on the gross sales of each waiter in the dining room and bar. It is contemplated that this percentage may be increased in the future provided that the revenues of the club justify increase.

The preceding Financial Statement showing a loss for the month of October reflects many things. The cause of the loss can be attributed in great part to the strike in the shipping industry for the last three months. It has affected business in Hawaii heavily, causing many persons to economize, it has caused raise in prices of food and other costs and has definitely cut our tourist business to a minimum. Had the management not foreseen what might happen and stocked up butter, meats and many other items, either the losses would have been greater, or prices in the dining room would necessarily have been raised.
