

WALTER JAMES MACFARLANE A Tribute by Wilford D. Godbold

Each year on July 4, the Outrigger Canoe Club holds the Walter Macfarlane Memorial Canoe races in memory of a past president of the club and one of its most beloved members. Walter "Mac," as he was familiarly called, was elected president of the Outrigger Canoe Club in 1939. It was a position of great responsibility as the club was confronted with a number of problems. The Treasury was practically non-existent, the lease on the grounds owned by the Queen Emma Estate was about to expire; the buildings were obsolete and unfit to continue in, and must be rebuilt. With this discouraging future, Walter "Mac" took over. His was an indomitable and courageous outlook with a determination and an optimism that a plan to finance new building and build a new club on modern lines could be carried out.

A committee was formed with the directors and other members, and a formula for the successful continuation of the Club was blueprinted. Many members with the memory of the lean years of financial strain and of losing membership dropped out. However, Walter "Mac," with a small group who stayed by him, and by devoting every ounce of his energy and most of his time, finally succeeded in selling bonds and raising the capital to erect the present club at Waikiki beach which our members now enjoy.

Though the club was erected, there were still many problems of furnishings, the stocking of food and liquor, eventually paying off the bonds, increasing the membership and other problems, but these did not deter Walter "Mac." The new club opened with a gala party in 1941 and was well on its way to success. In May, 1943, Walter "Mac" was called to the mainland on business and was struck suddenly ill in Oakland, California. On June 4, 1943, news was received that our beloved president had died. The directors and the members of the club were shocked and in memorium, on Sunday, June 6, 9:00 a.m., impressive services were held at the club with the Rev. Henry P. Judd, one of our kamaaina members. officiating.

Walter "Mac" was born in Honolulu on September 5, 1907, the son of a kamaaina family. He attended Punahou school where he was prominent in athletics; later prep school at Palo Alto, graduating at the University of Hawaii where he was again active in athletics. He was vice-president of the advertising firm Bowman, Holst, Macfarlane and Richardson, and a member of the Territorial Legislature during 1935, '37, and '39. He took particular interest in those problems concerning Hawaiians and served on committees of the Legislature whose object was to improve their condition.

PARADISE REGAINED By PAUL McGINNIS

Paul McGinnis, author of a recent best seller, "Lost Eden," is visiting Honolulu with his wife. It is very likely that they will become residents of the islands.

The Chicago Tribune says: "Lost Eden is . . . so perfect of its kind that it sends a glow of delight through the reader . . . as colorful a tale of the sea as one could wish. Paul McGinnis has done a sterling job with his historical material."

Your new, jovial Manager Magill asked me to describe how it feels to renew a membership in the club after twenty years, and that is a most difficult thing to do without firecrackers.

The club's new look really is delightful, and in addition, all the other charms are there as they were when the club was a little rough car-

pentry job painted plantation green.

My first outrigger canoe ride was in 1928, and the steersman was a likely looking young fellow named Duke Kahanamoku. I noticed that he did nothing but steer, while he encouraged the malahinis in their paddling. His encouragement was so good that he had nothing to do but sit there and watch the bleached-out mainlanders dig into the brine.

Recently, after 20 years, I had a ride with Turkey Love, who seems to have a similar tech-

nique and does some nice steering.

That fellow Duke seemed to have a good head on him, and if anyone knows what has become of him, I wish they would tell me.

There is another boy I would like to look up. I have his name on a little faded square of paper which is my membership ticket of 1928. As near as I can make out the name, it is Lorrin P. Thurston, Jr., Secy. I wonder what happened to him?

Everyone has a reason for coming to Honolulu. If they have no reason, they find one. I came here to rest from too strenuous newspaper work, and build a good foundation of health, which I did, thanks to the club and Waikiki. I practiced the crawl, along with Buster Crabbe and some other good swimmers, and after I had worked at it about nine months, "Dad" Center said, "It begins to look like a crawl."

But soon I found that I was bulging out of my clothes with strength which I never thought I could acquire. Thanks, fellows. I know that

is just why you built the club.

And it is a fine job you have done in preserving and encouraging those two grand sports, surfboarding and outrigger canoeing. I understand that there was a time when these were all but lost arts. I am sure they will never be lost again.

There is another Hawaiian sport which intrigues almost everyone who learns of it, and that is holua or coasting on a sled down a runway covered with grass, and I have been wondering if in some way the club or its members could not revive this art. I should think it would be a "must" for tourists, second only to an outrigger ride.

There is an old bolua slide, I understand, behind Kamehameha School, and I think I can see part of it and its course from the window of our very pleasant Alewa Drive home, which the George Armitages have permitted us to keep for them until their return in July. (We are encouraging them to stay away longer.) A road seems to cross this runway now, and probably this slide can not be restored, but perhaps one could be built elsewhere.

I learned of this while studying all the Hawaiian histories I could find here, because I found Hawaiian lore most fascinating. And, after many years, these studies produced a novel called "Lost Eden." It tells about my voyage (imagined) with Captain Cook when he discovered these islands.

Believe me, after I sailed all those months with 112 men on a 90-foot boat, and about the same number of animals, all making noises, I was mighty glad to fetch the Sandwich Islands, a place more like Paradise than sailors had ever imagined.

I tried to write a book for those who want the best and most entertaining part of about 150 books in one, and I put about five years of work into it to make it as authentic as possible. Counting all the words I wrote and rewrote, I think I tapped my typewriter about 3,000,000 times, not counting punctuation. I am that fellow you see on the beach with his fingers worn away to nubbins.

But it was fun. I am doing another now, and when my fingers get too bad, I will use my nose, as Percy Granger does sometimes when he plays the organ.

The swimming is just the same, just as lavishly soft, just as invigorating. It is good to be back.
