

THE PRESIDENT COMMENTS

There apparently exists among the members of the club wide spread misunderstanding as to tipping. Section 44 of the club by-laws provides: "No tips shall be offered to any employee or accepted by the same." Throughout the period of the war this provision in the by-laws was almost universally violated. At that time the prevailing patronage of the club dining room and bar was by service members and their guests. The enforcement of the rule was almost impossible, and I believe very little attempt was made to curtail tipping. However, at the annual meeting of the club last past a majority of the members present spoke vehemently in favor of the enforcement of the "no tipping" provision.

The Board of Directors has now directed the manager to enforce this rule strictly. In order to do this it was necessary to provide some other type of incentive to the waiters. This has been done in allowing the waiters 6% on the gross sales of each waiter in the dining room and bar. It is contemplated that this percentage may be increased in the near future provided that the revenues of the club justify increase.

The attention of the membership is called to the fact that by offering a tip to a waiter they are jeopardizing such waiter's employment. Further, members violating the by-laws will, of course, be subject to disciplinary action.



KAMAAINA KOMMENTS by George Bustard

I was pleasantly interested in reading the enlarged edition of "The Outrigger Canoe Club's May Forecast," and the Editor, "Ernie" Stenberg, is to be congratulated by his efforts since 1941 in disseminating information to the members regarding the club's activities.

In looking over the list of members of the club when it was organized in May 1908, I notice that there are 15 still taking an active interest in life in our midst, which is a good record for a club established 40 years ago.

I was invited to become a member one month after the club's organization in June 1908, and it has been an honor and a pleasure to have been associated with such a group during the past four decades.

In those days \$10.00 were the annual dues (some difference to what they are now) and I don't recall paying any initiation fee (now \$300.00 plus 20%). There was very little formality about joining in 1908. Alex Hume Ford would approach a likely prospect and ask: "Want to join the Outrigger Club?" and getting the affirmative he would scribble the name

on the back of an old envelope and that was that.

In 1908 the girls wore full-dress to go in swimming and I recall the comments on the beach when a young lady dared to go in the water at Waikiki without her stockings. She was talked about for weeks.

You see therefore, how the world is improving with the passing years. Two or three years later, Judge "Billy" Rawlins discovered Duke Kahanamoku at the beach, and easily recognized championship talent when he saw his swimming. He was not wrong in his surmise, as later events transpired.

As "Dad" Center mentioned in his splendid article in the May issue, notables from all over the world have visited the club. One of these visitors was Jack London, the famous writer. In his carefree natural manner, he would make daily pilgrimages to the club grounds and make himself comfortable under one of the hau trees thoroughly enjoying the

ANOTHER REMINDER


