Molokai — The Ultimate Canoe Challenge

The night preceding the Molokai ce normally finds hundreds of paders, families, fans and coaches tryoto get a good night's sleep, but nking, planning, and praying that winds, the waves, the competition d the careful plans made would be arried through to victory.

Hale-O-Lono Harbor on the West and of Molokai is the site of the start the greatest outrigger canoe race the world. Approximately 38 miles water, which can range from gentle alm to ferocious currents and 30-ot swells, are challenged by an arada of canoes representing not only awaii but the Mainland, and this ear, Tahiti as well, making this the st international Molokai Race.

The kickoff to Aloha Week 1975 ffers a \$600 prize to the koa division inners and a \$500 prize to fibre glass ctors, but everyone who paddles olokai is a winner whether he finhes first, last, or not at all. For Modai presents such a tremendous allenge to strength, endurance and mwork that it must be one of the

more protean feats in all sports.

The advance strategy of Coaches Tom Conner (Koa Crew) and Archie Kaaua (Glass Crew) was to try to have their teams steer as straight a course as possible, as there is no "inside" or "outside" in the open ocean. Depending upon the ocean, the competition, and their own condition, Outrigger planned to play a "waiting game," trailing early but coming on strong as they approach Oahu and the finish at the Moana Hotel.

The crew members who went through the rigors of training deserve equal credit.

The 1975 Molokai/Oahu Canoe Race was given such complete coverage by the Honolulu dailies and on at least one of the city's major TV channels that this account is a matter of record for most of our Club readers rather than a news story. Comments on the race are largely quotes from Member Mark Osmun's excellent account in the Advertiser of Monday, October 20.

The tone of the Advertiser story was more or less set by the headlines: Tahiti pushes Outrigger to a record". In his story, Osmun led off by saying that "the trophy for the Molokai-to-Oahu canoe race was nearly on its way to Tahiti, but the Outrigger Canoe Club managed to fend off a surprisingly strong effort by the Tahitian 'Tautira' paddlers to win and set a record for the annual 38-mile Aloha Week race."

Actually, the Tahitian crew, paddling a fiberglass canoe loaned them by Outrigger, won the non-koa division in the record time of five hours, 47 minute and 33 seconds, but had to take second place overall to Outrigger, which completed the distance in five hours, 39 minutes and seven seconds, some eight minutes better than the Tahitian crew's time. (As pointed out by Cline Mann in his article on the Molokai classic in the October "Outrigger", there are several different records for the race because of changes that have been made in some of the rules as well as in both starting and finishing points. Outrigger's new record is for the Hale O Lono to Moana Beach a distance of some 38 miles. The old record was set by an OCC crew in 1968.

Mahalo To Kimo Austin

At the end of another canoe racing season, the OCC extends a special MAHALO to Kimo Austin, who has been designing and making racing and steering paddles for Outrigger crews for more than five years. Most of the Junior Men's crew and the Senior Men, who recorded an outstanding race season, paddled to victory this summer using his semi-teardrop design, a paddle with a 19½-inch blade.


According to Austin, paddlers often go through several paddles a season, and he keeps busy replacing broken ones, making special adjustments in weight and size for each crewman, and keeping paddlers equipped for both rough and smooth water racing. The handsome spruce and cedar handles are monogrammed with each paddler's name.

Along with Paul Maclaughlin and Marshall Rosa, Austin is constantly experimenting with new designs for greater speed under different racing conditions.

In addition to keeping OCC crews well-equipped, Kimo Austin has constructed the paddles that will guide the Polynesian Voyaging Society's HOKULE'A on her Bicentennial Year journey to Tahiti and back. Working with Herb Kane, he designed and made the two giant sweeps, each between 24 and 26 feet long, that con-

trol the double-hulled outrigger in rough water, the 9-foot long steering paddles, and the 7-foot paddles that will be used to propel the canoe if the wind dies down during the voyage.


