MEMO from our President

As the city grows and its population increases, our Club becomes dearer to its members as an oasis in a desert of high rises; a place where the aura of old Hawaii still persists.

For this reason, we should all jealously guard and preserve this haven by lending our full support to the Club and its policies.

Members should always enter the Club by the front door, sign the register, and list any guests they may bring with them. Discourage use of facilities by those who are not members or bona-fide guests. Try as they might, Management cannot possibly control this practice entirely, but if each member would adopt an attitude of "not welcome" in this respect it would be a very effective tool in helping to correct this situation. Report any intrusions to Management.

Support the Club by keeping your account up to date. The Club operates on a very slim profit margin; this benefits members by keeping prices at the minimum. Obviously, to run in this manner, the Club requires your continued prompt payments. Patronize the Club at every opportunity and thereby help to preserve it.

Effective July 1, 1971, the new Tax Reform Act requires that private club administrations keep an accurate accounting for tax purposes of what is termed "related" and "unrelated" income. In order to determine this it will be necessary for Management to ask for certain information concerning parties of more than eight persons: the purpose of a party, etc. Your cooperation in this respect will be appreciated.

OCC CREWS WIN THREE MACFARLANE DAY RACES, PLACE THIRD IN POINT SCORES

When the fifteen events of the Club-sponsored July 4th Outrigger Canoe Regatta had been run off, the scoreboard read: Waikiki Surf Club, 45; Healani Club, 35; Outrigger Canoe Club, 34, with Hui Nalu, Lani Kai and Kai Oni in the "also ran" group.

In amassing their creditable 34 points, our Club crews captured three first places: Boys 12 and under—B; Women Novice—B, and Senior Women—1 mile. Outrigger Club crews also picked up five third places in the scheduled events, and

an OCC four-man crew won a special race for the John D. Kaupiko trophy, Waikiki Surf, Healani and Lanikai trailing in that order.

This year's Meet also saw three Macfarlane Day records fall, the OCC's Senior Women and Novice Women—B accounting for two of the new marks. (Did anyone mention Women's Lib?)

Names of the Club's winning and placing crew members, together with photographs if available, will appear in the Outrigger's August issue.

OUTRIGGER HISTORY BOOK DESIGNER SELECTED

Tom Lee, well-known Honolulu graphic designer, has been selected to design and layout the History of the Outrigger Canoe Club, now in production and expected to be available to members in late September or early October.

Lee is proprietor of his own design firm, Tom Lee Design, and has created numerous handsome printed pieces and books for Hawaii corporations and civic institutions—The Honolulu Symphony Society, among them.

As currently planned the book will be square in shape, hard-backed in textured cloth with a bold red Outrigger emblem on the cover. It will be about 192 pages containing 40 to 50 historic photos dating from 1908, a 4-color section with about 12 color photos of the present club facilities and accompanying text prepared by Harold Yost.

Price of the volume has not been firmly established since firm printing bids and other costs are now known only on an estimated basis. A marketing subcommittee of the public relations committee in charge of the project and co-chaired by Don Woodrum and Max Pilliard expects per-copy prices to be as follows:

- \$18.00 retail, in bookstores and to the community-at-large.
- \$12.50 to voting members on an assessment single-payment basis.
- \$10.00 to members after the first copy for 5 books or more.
- \$15.00 to members on a deferred payment basis at \$1.25 per month over a period of 1 year for 1 or more books.
- 12.50 to new members joining the club, in a single payment.

Members are urged to regard the above price schedule as tentative, but well-educated estimates. A firm price schedule will be announced when the books become available.

The Outrigger History will be offered to voting members on an assessment basis; the book will be available to members in other categories, of course, and the same final price schedule will apply.

MANAGER'S COLUMN

Parents of children under 10 please read, note—and kokua!

"Children: All children under the age of ten (10) years shall be accompanied by their parents or adult hosts who should at all times be responsible for their supervision."

The foregoing is a Club rule of long standing. It applies in the water, on the beach, in the locker rooms, *anywhere on Club premises*. Even the most mature, well-behaved youngster under 10 should not be left unsupervised. Help to assure another safe fun-filled summer at the Outrigger Canoe Club. Don't forget to abide by the rules: keep a watchful eye on your children who are under ten at all times! It's for *their* safety—and for the peace of mind of your fellow-members.

Never, under any circumstances, leave a child under ten alone at the Club. Either you as a parent, or another adult member of the Club, must be with young children at all times while they are on Club premises.

Another Club rule to remember is that children over ten who are not junior members may only enter as the registered guests of Club members twice a month.

Children 10 through 13 whose parents are members may join the Club without initiation fee. Dues for the first child are \$2.40, and only \$1.20 for additional children—and remain the same until the youth finishes college. He can then go on to become a regular member without ever having to pay an initiation fee; a real bargain, actually less than the cost of servicing the account.

New members during the first 90 days of membership may bring any of their children, ages 10-20, in as members without initiation fee and with the same dues as above. After 90 days, the regular membership rules apply.

OCC CO-SPONSORS SECOND ANNUAL ROUGH WATER SWIM FOR LABOR DAY

To help revive public interest in competitive swimming as a club and general inter-organization sport, the Outrigger Canoe Club is co-sponsoring the Second Annual Waikiki Rough Water Swim scheduled for Labor Day, September 6, 1971.

The meet will be held under the auspices of the Hawaiian Rough Water Swim Committee in cooperation with Honolulu's Department of Parks and Recreation. Other sponsors include Hawaii Visitors Bureau and Hilton Hawaiian Village Hotel.

The Rough Water Swim, over a two-mile course starting at Sans Souci Beach near Diamond Head and finishing at the Hawaiian Village, is open to men and women of any age, with special classifications for Old Timers (over 35) and Masters (professionals and paid swimming coaches).

Official entry blanks for the Rough Water Swim, containing full information about the meet, may be picked up at the Club Office.
