At the 2005 Annual meeting of the Outrigger Canoe Club, Keanuenue Rochlen was awarded the Winged "O". She received this prestigious award for her 50 years of distinguished contributions to the Club's athletic programs.

She has been a member of the Outrigger Canoe Club for 50 years. Keanuenue has participated in Outrigger competitions in canoeing, volleyball, baseball, and tennis.

Probably Keanuenue's most outstanding achievements have been in the area of canoe paddling. At the Paddler's Awards Banquet in July 2001, Keanuenue won the Outrigger's Most Valuable Paddler Award for steering the winning Master's 55 crew.

She has probably won more gold medals for paddling than any other female paddler in the State. During the 2000 paddling season Keanuenue was recognized for being the oldest registered woman paddler in OHCRA.

From 1983 through 1989, the Outrigger Master's Women steered by Keanuenue Rochlen won seven consecutive State Championships. During these same years Rochlen also steered her crew in 17 consecutive first places.

Keanuenue Rochlen played both indoor and outdoor

volleyball for the Outrigger teams. In the 1970's, Keanuenue and Chris Crabb won several doubles tournaments on the sand courts at the Club. As a member of the Outrigger's six-person indoor hard-court team Keanuenue, coached by Ron Sorrell, played at Palama Settlement, University of Hawaii Gym, Fort Ruger, and at the opening of the Hickam Air Force Base Gymnasium.

Keanuenue played baseball for one season on the Outrigger's team, coached by Dave Pierson. The games were played at McCully Field.

Coached by Gertrude Berger, Keanuenue was a member of the Outrigger's tennis team for several years.

Keanuenue started paddling in the early 1940's with Blue Makua at the Waikiki Surf Club, catching waves and playing in the surf. She paddled in her first races with Waikiki Surf Club. After two years Rochlen began to steer the Surf Club's Novice Women. In the 1960's Keanuenue began steering for the Outrigger Canoe Club teams.

Keanuenue Rochlen is honored to receive her Winged "O". She recognizes that her substantial achievements couldn't have happened without her outstanding crews, partners, coaches and teammates.

# Biggest Turnout Ever for OCC Invitational Swim By Ray Robinson Photos by Marilyn Kali



More than 100 swimmers participated in the OCC Invitational.

Chris Moore, Ben Komer and David Stackhouse were top OCC finishers in the

OCC's Ted Sheppard, Vic Hemmy Jr., Roger Cundall and Laurie Sloan all entered the 1-mile swim.

Swimming Committee members Jim Weincke, Ginger Thornburg, Gerry DeBenedetti and Ray Robinson register swimmers for the swim.

> About 7:30 Sunday morning, May 22, the Hau Terrace became sort of a pleasant madhouse as 105 swimmers from many different swim clubs shouted greetings at each other, milled about, had numbers painted on their arms and legs, collected their swim event-shirts, and donned the personal ankle bracelets which would automatically record each swimmer's finish time.

It was the largest number of participants ever to show up for OCC's annual Invitational 1-mile and 2-mile swim, in the 22 years the meet has been held.

Dennis Blake, Swim Committee chair and meet coordinator, checked the weather and ocean conditions and declared the day perfect. It had dawned bright and clear, with very light trades, a little bump running low tide which makes for clearer water, and just a slight current running from town towards Diamond Head.

Blake briefed all swimmers gathered on the OCC beach, led the group to the San Souci beach and fired all of them off together at 9 a.m. sharp.

Twenty-four minutes and 24 seconds later, Roger Cundall came through the finish gates to take first place overall in the 1-mile in 24 minutes and 24 seconds. Ted Sheppard came in second in :26:52 and third place went to Gary Bignami in :27:21.

Among the women, Linda Kaiser splashed home in :27:35, first place for women in the 1-mile, and fourth overall. Diane Stowell was second in :31:11, and third place went to Laurie Sloan whose time was :32:57.

Laurie's husband Bruce came in first in the Men's 55-

59 age group in the 2-mile in :57:21.

In the men's 2-mile event, Kalen Darling, 17, took first overall in :47:46. Number two spot went to Chris Moore for a time of :51:12. Quinton Darling came in

Perennial participant June Harrigan swam in the onemile, but husband Arnold Lum missed the event as he was in Jeffries Bay, South Africa surfing. Tough life, but I guess somebody's got to do it.

Only one Hemmy made it this year (sometimes there are three) and Vic Jr., running late, almost missed the starting gun, but came in second in his age group in a very respectable :35:17.

Age of the participants ranged from 13 to 77.

The sumptuous OCC Brunch was enjoyed by more than 100 swimmers and escorts, and prizes were awarded to the many winners.

The last two swimmers came in long after most were at breakfast, and received a rousing hand of applause for hanging in there and finishing.

Thanks to Beach Captain Don Isaacs and his crew of Sam Clemens and Ron Baker for setting the course buoys and bringing them in afterwards, patrolling the course in the whaler, and setting up the tents on the beach.

Kudos also to the Swim Committee members Dennis Blake, Ginger Thornburg, Blake Johnson, Diane Stowell, and Club general manager Bill Comstock for making the event happen.





Ever since Bruce Brown showed The Endless Summer at Roosevelt Auditorium in the summer of '63, I've wanted to surf the East Cape of South Africa, where the Cape St. Francis scene was filmed.

Who can forget those pictures of young Mike Hynson

and Robert August, crouched and riding, parallel-stance, across those seemingly endless rights? Almost 42 years later, Henry Richmond and his Durban colleagues Spider Murphy and Rod Stainton of Safari Surf Company presented us with the opportunity to surf South Africa.

George Plechaty and I, joined by three other friends, decided to make what is essentially a surfari to the opposite side of the world. (Technically, Botswana is antipodial - opposite from Hawai'i - but there's no surf there.)

To make a long story short, our trip to J-Bay was spot-on.

The beach where Bruce Brown filmed along the East Cape is now called "Bruce's Beauties," but the wave is fickle, so Jeffreys Bay, a short distance from Bruce's, churns out hollow right point waves on a consistent basis due to low pressure systems constantly moving across the Roaring Forties, and is now where the surf action is centered.

We scored waist to head-high surf on four of the five days we were there. The famed Supertubes break turned out to be too radical for us old long boarders, but The Point, which is the next break down from Supers, has a mellow wave, ideally suited for riding tankers. Twenty-second rides are not uncommon, and I managed to score a 10-second nose ride from the middle through the final inside section.

A typical day for us consisted of a full English breakfast, followed by a mid-morning session with maybe a half-dozen surfers at The Point (when it got to 6 ft. plus, it did become more crowded). Afternoons were spent relaxing on the balcony of our condo overlooking Supers, watching the kids get barreled.

For those of you who short board, the weapon of choice at Supers is a 5'11" narrow thruster, less than 2' thick, weighing about 4.5 lbs. (2 kilos). The boards are glassed light because the wave breaks so close to the rocks during typical southeast swells, and you don't want to be dragged too far after the wave finally closes.


The East Cape not only produces fantastic waves, but also primo food and beverages. We ate kudu, ostrich, and other game meat cooked on the grill at our condo (a "braai" in Afrikans), and drank endless bottles of local pinotage, lager, and milk stout, all of which I highly recommend.

Restaurant evenings were spent over bowls of calamari and soba at the restaurant next door, and the Mexican restaurant in town served up huge plates of salsa-laden food that challenged even the most hard-core chili picante freaks.

To top things off, Henry and his wife Jerry accompanied us on a game park safari after our surfari to J-Bay wrapped up. This time, our headquarters was Hilltops Lodge in Hluhluwe Umfolozi Park, located not too far from Mozambique.


At Hluhluwe (pronounced "shlushluway"), cape buffalo, warthogs, and other big game stroll by the bar, and zebra, baboons, and impala greet you at your doorstep in the morning. Needless to say, more pinotage, lager, and milk stout was consumed, along with copious amounts of food, between park ranger-led trips to view giraffes, rhinos, elephants, hippos, crocs, and the big cats.

Actually, Henry was the only one of us to score a big cat - a leopard obligingly crossed in front of his car. So is it worth the effort to travel half way around the world to surf? We all agreed that it is one of the things that has to be done before you exit the planet.

# **Backward Glances**

#### 51 Years Ago 1954 Samuel M. Fuller, President

A special meeting was held to apprise members of the BOD's plans and possibilities for the Club's future. President Fuller explained he was not able to make any definite statement as to the future but that the Board had undertaken four projects:

To negotiate a continue of the present lease: Mr. Godbold had contacted the Queen's Hospital Trustees and Mr. Trousdale who had an option on 65 acres that included the OCC property. Mr. Trousdale had stated a willingness to extend the lease with reservations and restrictions. Thus far all matters presented were talk and no concrete propositions had been submitted.

To negotiate the purchase of 50% of the Elks Club property: Mr. Bush stated the Board felt that this was a good location to move to in the event no favorable lease was accomplished. Also, the Elks property was a good investment for our Building Fund and that the return from this property would be greater than our investments.

To negotiate for the lease of the Steiner Estate property: Mr. Taylor advised the Steiner property was leased to Rudy Tongg who was held up from any improvements as the property was in the Master Plan, and it would be necessary to have it released which was felt possible for a Club such as OCC. This plan was only in the talking stage as no steps had been taken to option it or work with the Territorial Planning Commission for a release.

To negotiate for the lease of a sizeable area for parking: Mr. Bush spoke of the possibilities of a multi deck parking building and the project was in the planning stage.

The Walter Macfarlane Races were held despite the high surf breaking beyond the normal surf line. The rough surf produced a lot of strange happenings.

An outrigger canoe finished its race stern first. A Club canoe finished and crossed the line submerged in the water with its crews' heads barely visible. The canoe had swamped 100 yards form the finish line and steersman Wally Froiseth wanted to beach the canoe and bail out the water, but the crowd insisted that they finish, so our Senior Girls paddled with only the outrigger noticeable above the water. John Kaupiko, coach of the Hui Nalu, made a friendly protest that this was a canoe race and not a submarine race.

Waikiki Surf won the Regatta with 33 points; Hui Nalu, 29; Outrigger, 14; Hui Kalia, 7, and Koolaupoko, 6.

Sponsored by the Lanikai Association, the Oahu Championship Regatta was held at Kailua Bay. OCC's Junior Women's 6 won the only first place for the Club. The regatta was won by Waikiki Surf with 31 points; Hui Nalu, 25; Healani, 12; Koolaupoko, 8; Hui Kalia, 7; and OCC, 5. Other canoe clubs entered were Lanikai and Kai Oni.

#### 38 Years Ago 1967

The Walter Macfarlane Races were a great success for the Outrigger. It brought the Club its first regatta victory in many years.

OCC scored seven first places for a total of 41 team points and Waikiki Surf was second with 33 points.

Our winning streak started with the Boys 13, then the Boys 14; the Novice Girls; and the record breaking Novice Men. The Junior Women brought home a record for their half mile event. Also in first place were the Boys 18 and the Freshmen crews. The heart breaker saw the Senior Men finish first across the line only to be disqualified for touching the inside buoy.

The Oahu Championships Regatta was held at Keehi Lagoon with the tide and wind constantly moving the buoys causing delays in the race. Once again Mark Buck and his crews brought home the team trophy and 39 points to Waikiki Surf's 31 points.

#### 31 Years Ago 1974



The Walter Macfarlane Races were held in front of the Moana Hotel. As is traditional with the regattas, the optional steersman rule was in effect. This rule allows the coach the option of an experienced surf steersman to paddle in place of a crew's regular steersman. Performing the steering chores were Fred Hemmings Jr., Brant Ackerman, Mike Lemes and Kainoa Downing.

Total point standing fluctuated throughout the day. As the regatta moved toward the closing events, our Junior Men and Senior Women won their races. The pressure was on the Senior Men who in a close battle nosed out Lanikai for first. OCC was the winner with 58 points; Healani, 53; and Lanikai, 51.

The Oahu Championship Regatta held at Keehi Lagoon was run as more of a tropical storm than a canoe regatta. Southeasterly winds and blowing squalls turned the lagoon into a rough water course until early afternoon when everything went into a dead calm. OCC took first place with Senior Men, Boys 13, and the Sophomore Women; and two second places with Women Novice B and Novice A.

The final regatta point standings were Healani, 75; Outrigger, 38; Lanikai, 37; Hui Nalu, 21: Leeward Kai, 20; Waikiki Surf, 5; and Ewa Beach, 3.



He intends to spend his EOM money on his 17-year-old son who attends and plays football for Radford. Big Grin.



# **Board Briefs**

Board Briefs is taken from the minutes of the May 26, 2005 meeting of the Board of Directors.

Membership Count: The Membership Count was 4,807 as of April 30, 2005.

Capital Needs Study: The Buildings & Grounds Committee requests the Board approve the concept of a complete update of the Long Range Capital Expenditures Forecast through the use of professional consultants.

House: The Board approved the House Committee's recommendation to accept Lahaina Yacht Club (Maui) and the City University Club (London) as reciprocal clubs of OCC.

Treasurer: The Club has put its federal income tax return on extension and is in compliance with all regulatory filings. An audit may be required of the Club's 401(k) plan for 2005 because the IRS threshold (eligible employees) may be exceeded.

Financial Report: Mr. Comstock reported that April was a good month financially for the Club. Net income showed an improvement of \$34K to budget. Food sales were up versus budget. Food and labor costs caused a \$7K shortage in net profitability against budget. Anticipated June price increases should remedy much of this. Beverage sales were up \$4K to budget and cost of sales percentage was better than budget. Undistributed Expenses were \$14K better than Budget.

Mr. Comstock reported that the permanent supports in the Snack Shop area are in place and the cosmetic finishes will be completed once ARC approval is granted.

Hooray, hooray. Our former general manager John Rader underwent successful live donor liver transplant surgery in a 12hour operation on June 2 at USC University Hospital.




