

**Wins Castle Swim Again**

For the second year in a row, Kristi Torkildson won the OCC's traditional Castle Swim. The 14-year-old Punahou student finished the race in a fast 35 minutes and 34 seconds. Very close behind was Wil Yamamoto in:35:50.

The OCC's traditional Castle Swim, which started some 80 years ago, was for several years open to the public. The original course was from Harold Castle's home on the site where the Elks Club now stands to the old OCC Clubhouse in Waikiki where the Outrigger Waikiki Hotel now stands. Mr. Castle is said to have personally passed out trophies.

Thirty-two years ago, Castle was resurrected, made a private OCC members-only event, and the course was reversed, to start in Waikiki and end at our present beach.

Last year the wind kicked up, and slower swimmers encountered troublesome counter-current in the latter stages of the swim.

This day dawned cloudy and cool, but soon became warm and windy.

Much of the chatter amongst the contestants at the check-in table on the Hau Terrace early Sunday morning after Thanksgiving was about what ocean conditions they'd find; the wind, current, the amount of sun, but mostly about the current.

At 8 a.m., meet director Dennis Blake declared the swim a "go" and 31 swimmers were bused down to Waikiki, hitting the water shortly after 8:30 a.m. from the Outrigger Waikiki hotel beach.

This year, most swimmers agreed it was windy and choppy on the course, and those without escorts had trouble seeing the final yellow turn bouy. Most swimmers had escorts on surfboards, one-mans or paddleboards to help them find the best route and to keep them from missing any bouvs.

Swimmers ranged in age from 14 to 73.

Dennis Blake reported there was a smooth start but around the middle bouy it became very choppy and there was a strong current out of the channel from the final turn bouy into the Club beach.

It was a beautiful day with much camaraderie. After the swim, contestants and escorts enjoyed the OCC's sumptuous Sunday morning brunch, and prizes were given out to winners in each age group.

**Kudos to Swim Committee members** Dennis Blake, Gerry DeBenedetti, Arnold Lum, Blake Johnson, Diane Stowell, Ray Robinson, and Ginger Thornburg for making it happen; to all the escorts, and to Beach Captain Don Isaacs and his crew for setting the course.


Karen Kottow







Among the guests were the Divas of the Hawaii Opera Theater Chorus.



On November 5, 2004, he was in the winning 400 free relay at the Lake Forest Invitational, Chicago, Two days before, at Boldt Natatorium (Lawrence University), he and his team defeated six other teams in individual dual meets. On November 16, his team lost to the University of Wisconsin, but defeated Marquette University.


- Monday, January 10: General Meeting to assign volunteers to various work groups, entertain questions about the paddling program and review priorities for the season.

# Reciprocal Club Review

Review #35 features The Columbia Club in Indianapolis.

First, please note that our previous club there, the Indianapolis Athletic Club has closed. Therefore, in its place we are accepting reciprocity with the Columbia Club.

This 115-year-old Club was founded in February 1889. The 11-story clubhouse is designated as an historic landmark and has been placed on the National Register of Historic Places.

It is conveniently located in downtown Indianapolis on Monument Circle, approximately eight miles from the airport, and a short distance to more than eight museums, Circle Center Mall (300 shops), the RCA Dome, Conseco Fieldhouse, Victory Field, the Indianapolis Zoo, and White River State Park.


Indiana is also home to many universities and colleges including some right in the Indianapolis area such as Butler University and the University of Indianapolis, with others like Purdue University not being far away.

The Club has 89 guest rooms and suites pricing from \$125-\$195 with room service offered Monday-Saturday. The Club has four restaurants and lounges, ranging from casual alfresco to fine gourmet dining, plus full catering services and private rooms for groups up to 350.

Breakfast, lunch and dinner are served six days a week but the restaurants are closed on Sundays. The dress code varies with the different restaurants and meals, from casual to coat and tie. There is also a full fitness center complete with indoor pool at no charge for overnight guests. Valet parking is available 24 hours a day.

As usual all charges must be settled prior to departure with credit cards or cash. A valid OCC membership card plus a current letter of introduction showing good standing must be presented upon arrival to receive reciprocal privileges.





#### Third Annual Duke Ho'olaule'a





THE PURPOSE of the Outrigger Duke Kahanamoku Foundation is to financially support the development of individuals and organizations that perpetuate the spirit and legacy of Duke Kahanamoku. • ODKF accomplishes this by encouraging athletes and scholars whose endeavors will contribute to the growth and development of athletics in Hawaii; supporting athletic events and participation by teams and individuals in local, national and international competition; supporting individuals in furthering their education; and assisting in preserving, perpetuating and developing sports which have a special cultural or historical significance to Hawaii.

#### **BOARD DESIGNATED FUNDS**

There are seven ODKF Board Designated Funds.

Muriel Macfarlane Flanders Fund: established by Muriel Flanders to support water sports in Hawai`i, to perpetuate the Macfarlane Fourth of July Regatta, and to honor the accomplishments of Duke Paoa Kahanamoku. Earlier this year ODKF mourned the loss of this most gracious lady. Through this Fund her legacy will surely endure.

Terrence McCarthy Fund: established by Terrence McCarthy in memory of her husband Edmond McCarthy, who firmly believed in the combination of athletics and education. Mrs. McCarthy honors her husband by supporting Hawaii's top scholar athletes.

Tom "Daddy" Haine Fund: established in 1994, funds support the sport of volleyball in Hawai'i. Haine was the captain of the 1968

U.S. Olympic men's volleyball team. He was an 18-time USVBA All-American and in 1991 was inducted into the US Volleyball Hall of Fame. He was a member of the original Outrigger Foundation that later merged with the Duke Kahanamoku Foundation to form ODKE.

Kala Kukea Fund: established in 1996 and named for one of Hawaii's top overall water sports man. Kukea touched the lives of many young athletes in his short 52 years on earth. He was an outstanding competitor, coach and role model. In 1996 he posthumously received the Hawaiian Canoe Racing Association John DeRego Perpetual trophy for service to the Association and to the Molokai-Oahu canoe race.

Cline Mann Fund: named for John Cline Mann, a superb water sports-

man who died in 1996. He was captain of his Dartmouth College swimming team, an avid small boat sailor, and a strong promoter of paddleboard racing. Grants from this fund help to support the annual Cline Mann Paddleboard Race. Cline Mann was also a member of the original Board of Directors of the Duke Kahanamoku Foundation (DKF) that was founded in 1963. He played an instrumental role in the merger of DKF and the Outrigger Foundation to create the present Outrigger Duke Kahanamoku Foundation (ODKF).

Thomas Arnott Fund: established by Marian Arnott in loving memory of her husband who was a great supporter of both OCC and ODKF. Tommy Arnott, a masterful surfer, was also recognized for competing in canoe races with Duke Kahanamoku. As teammates they beat all their competition in the

early 1940's. Consequently this fund supports interscholastic canoe paddling in Hawai'i.

Henry Ayau Fund: established in memory of this renowned athlete and his legacy. A "Moloka`i Boy," Henry excelled in life as a businessman, sportsman and community servant. An exceptional athlete, Henry was a noted baseball player, surfer, canoe paddler, and world-class free diver. Many viewed him as a modern day "Ambassador of Aloha." Henry's untimely death last year left us with heavy hearts. Our lives were so enriched by his smile, good nature and enduring Hawaiian spirit.

ODKF awards grants to athletes, teams, scholar-athletes and sporting events in the name of the above listed funds. We thank the families who have made these grants possible.



#### **GOLD MEDALISTS**

The Gold Medalist program began in 1990 as a way to acknowledge those who have contributed \$1,000 or more to ODKF in a given year. We are pleased to announce there were 20 Gold Medalists for the 2003-2004 year. (See list of donors on page 7.)



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Leadership Training for Positive

# Coaches

On November 1, more than a dozen Outrigger athletes, coaches, board members and administrative staff attended a leadership workshop conducted by Positive Coaching Alliance trainers Kathy Toon and Mike Town. Kathy, employed by the Positive Coaching Alliance in Stanford, CA, is a fulltime trainer in Portland, OR. Mike, a fulltime criminal court judge, was certified by the PCA as a volunteer trainer.

This session was the third in a series of workshops sponsored by the Athletic Committee to improve the quality of the youth sports programs supported by the Outrigger Canoe Club.

During his introduction, Mike Town reminded the group that, "The PCA mission, 'Transforming youth sports so sports can transform youth' emphasizes the need for coaches, parents and athletes to focus on three essential components of positive coaching:

- Redefining "Winner" "A positive coach helps players redefine what is means to be a 'winner' by emphasizing mastery of the sport through individual effort and personal improvement by learning from mistakes."
- Filling Emotional Tanks "A positive coach fills player's 'emotional tanks' with encouragement and praise, recognizing that players need full tanks to play their best. A positive coach strives to achieve the 5:1 Magic Ratio which is five positive comments for every one correction."
- Honoring the Game "A positive coach teaches players to 'honor the game' by always demonstrating respect for the rules, worthy opponents, officials, teammates and themselves."

The PCA Philosophy promotes the development of character traits over the accumulation of medals and trophies. Winning is still important, but plays a secondary role to the development of healthy life skills in young athletes.

Kathy Toon focused attention on the importance of a "positive culture" within the entire organization. Kathy stated, The leaders of the organization must be aligned before the coaches become empowered.

The prerequisites for creating "alignment" within the governing body of the organization were:

- Vision Statement The motto or slogan for the athletic program must clearly define the "a compelling mission statement that inspires people and galvanizes their energy to make it come true." These 'noble goals' must be declared in a concise and memorable way to remind coaches, parents and athletes why they are playing the
- Leadership Team A dedicated group of leaders must establish the "cultural norms" for the organization and its athletic programs. In addition to formal rules, a set of "informal rules" must be created to remind everyone "how we do it here."
- Implementation Team A much larger group consisting of coaches and parents must work to consistently "implement the noble goals" through the season. Often times the team will designate "culture keepers" to remind people "how we do it here."
- Maven Recruitment Mavens are highly respected individuals within the organization who reinforce the "noble goals" by their example and influence. To paraphrase an advertisement, "When they speak, people listen."

Finally, Kathy described the "Action Plan," the actual process for creating the organization's "Roadmap to Excellence." The components of this process include methods for preventing negative behaviors, mechanisms for enforcing the noble goals of the program, and a model for building long-lasting structural pillars to support a positive coaching environment.

An enthusiastic Leadership Team consisting of Kisi Haine, Keoni Kino, Rick Hobson, Rob Durkin and George Wessberg will be assisted by Mike Town in the creation of the "OCC Roadmap to Excellence" for all youth sports programs. This group held its first meeting on November 16 and intends to complete the project by February 2005.

# Fitness Center Committee Presentation on Heart Rate Monitor Traning By Arnold Lum

To kick off your training program for this year, the Fitness Center Committee will present a clinic on training with a heart rate monitor. The event is planned for Monday, January 24 at 6 p.m. in the Board Room.

The speaker is Tai Blechta of the Running Room, a top-level (elite division) triathlete who competes in Ironman Kona and the Xterra World Championships. Tai has worked as a professional running and cycling coach and is a trained CCSCS personal trainer.

The clinic will introduce us to the values of training with a heart rate monitor, including both competition and health benefits. Heart rate-based training is a powerful tool that can be applied to swimming, biking, paddling, as well as gym workouts.

Tai will explain the features that a person should look for when purchasing a heart rate monitor, based on intended use. He will bring Polar and Timex demonstration models, as well as models for purchase.

Whether you are an elite, age-group, or fitness athlete, your New Year's resolution should include a promise to train more efficiently and to maintain a proper level of conditioning throughout 2005.





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
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#### **Backward Glances**

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## **Board Briefs**

Board Briefs is taken from the minutes of the Board of Directors meeting on November 18, 2004.

Secretary's Report: Four members were suspended for 15 days due to their accounts being delinquent for the third time in a 12-month period. One member was terminated

for being four times delinquent.

General Manager's Report: There was a net loss of \$30,815 for October. Year to date there was net operating fund income of \$39,120. . . Food and Beverage costs were high partially due to wine promotion. Utilities were over budget; the cost of oil continues to be high resulting in higher electric and gas bills. . . The Department of Land and Natural Resources, along with Control Point, will visit the Club to assess the Club's shoreline for certification in order to obtain a permit to construct the Wave Deflector. . . The City of Honolulu requires a shoreline certification as part of the permit process for the installation of the support columns for the reinforcing beams in the Snack Shop and Men's Locker Rooms. The support columns are necessary for the structural integrity of the volleyball court.

Admissions & Membership Report: The membership count

was 4,749 as of October 31, 2004

Building & Grounds Report: Architect Jim Reinhardt is completing a structural architectural review of the roof. Bob Dewitz recommended that that any specification/contract for re-roofing include a bonded warranty from a reputable bonding company. . . The committee has been studying pedestrian safety in the front entry walkway circle. The committee is considering the possibility of an entry from the front sidewalk through the garage into the Club. . . The Board discussed the ongoing issue of kayaks being placed in the front entry circle and destroying the landscaping. The committee is considering other landscaping designs which would prevent kayak placement in the planted area. . . There are several areas infected with termites. Independent inspectors will be contacted for bids to analyze the termite damage and determine if the Club will require tenting.

House Report: The La Jolla Beach and Tennis Club has ended their reciprocity agreement and the Indianapolis Athletic Club has closed. The House Committee recommended and the Board approved reciprocity with the Columbia Club in Indianapolis, Indiana. . . The General Manager, together with a member of the House Committee and the Public Relations Committee, will write a series of articles in the OCC Magazine, emphasizing Club rules regarding proper

conduct.

Athletic Report: Canoe Racing Chair, Courtney Seto, expressed concern about increasing costs related to long distance competition. Each year there are increased costs in airfares, escort boats and other related expenses. Coordinating Director Geoff Graf feels the 2005 budget addresses the increase in expenses; however the escalation of travel expenses will continue to be a concern. The Athletic

Committee is coordinating with the Club Captain to create a logical organizational succession plan structure for sub-committees that outlines job descriptions, leadership development, a transition plan for key positions, and written policies and procedures for essential duties. . . The Board of Directors recommended that the PCA Workshop be conducted after the sign up for the 2005 paddling season when enthusiasm is the strongest, but before the season starts. All coaches should be required to attend.

Historical Report: The Historical Committee expressed concern that in the event of a flood like the one that hit UH, the archival materials, photos, and trophies would be severely damaged. Gregg Robertson recommended that a formal proposal be drafted for consideration by the Board. . . Ja-ne de Abreu was approved as a member of the Historical

2005 Budget: The recommended 2005 Annual Budget developed by the Budget Committee was adopted. The approved budget included dues increases effective January 1, 2005 as follows: Senior, \$59.00; Regular, \$118.00; Intermediate, \$81.70; Associate, \$12.50; Associate (parent non member), \$18.25; Junior (parent member), \$12.50; Junior (parent non member), \$18.25; Service, \$81.70; Student Inactive, \$6.50. Annual Nonresident Dues will be: Regular, \$354.00; Intermediate, \$245.10; and Junior, \$54.75.

Operating Costs: A motion was made by Bob Dewitz, seconded by Jaren Hancock and approved by the Board, that Management develop a plan to lower operating costs by \$75,000, and report these findings to the Board within six

Cost Overrun: The Board of Directors discussed and agreed to accept the Budget Committee's recommendation to transfer from the Capital Improvement Fund to the working capital account the amount of the cost overrun for the Volleyball/Locker Room construction.

Nominating Committee: The Board approved the following members to serve on the Nominating Committee: Joyce Timpson, Chairperson; Jeffrey Dinsmore, Kawika Grant, Gloria

Keller Henderson, and Ann Martin.

Judges of Election: The Board approved the following members to serve on the Judges of Election Committee: Gerri Pedesky, Chairperson; Peter Balding, Jack Mattice, Diane Stowell, Geraldine DeBenedetti, Stewart Kawakami, Lisa Livingston, and Alice Lunt.


