Outrigger Canoe Club members gathered in the Koa Lanai on February 23 for the Annual Meeting of the Club. President Glenn Perry presided.

More than 100 members were present, and 449 submitted proxies.

Highlights of this year's meeting were the announcement of newly elected Board members: Jon Bryan, Geoff Graf, and Brad Wagenaar, and the re-election of Gregg Robertson, Barbara Stehouwer and Vik Watumull. All will serve two-year terms.

The chairs of each of the Club's standing committees presented their accomplishments for the past year. Copies of those reports may be found on the following pages.

President Perry announced that Jennifer Watland had been selected as Employee of the Year. He presented her with a plaque and check for her outstanding work as the receptionist at the OCC Front Desk.

The membership voted approval for Life Memberships for former OCC presidents Ben Cassidy, Rab Guild and Roy Kesner.

Ron Sorrell and Walter Guild presented the prestigious Winged "O" award for outstanding accomplishment and service as an OCC athlete to Traci Phillips, who has surfed, paddled and played volleyball on many Club championship teams.

The results of the OCC 2C Referendum vote were announced by George Norcross, Chair of the Judges of Election Committee. There were 625 votes in favor of the OCC 2C Master Plan, and 382 against it. Of those voting in favor, 450 voted for the Fitness Center to be relocated to the

basement, and 175 voted for it to be relocated to the roof of the Bar. Six ballots were invalidated due to double voting. (See story on page 17.)

During the new business portion of the meeting, member Shay Auerbach recommended that members be charged a usage fee for the new Fitness Center when it is built, similar to the locker charges. The motion was defeated by the membership.


Member Nancy Bannick presented a letter to the Board with 66 signatures regarding the OCC 2C design and Elks Club lease. President Perry promised that the Board would consider her letter at its March meeting.

Peggy Morgan asked the Board to reconfirm its position that design and construction of the improvements would not take place until after the Elks Club lease negotiations. President Perry and OCC 2C Chair Jaren Hancock reaffirmed the Board's policy as described in a letter sent to all members in January.

Norman Ho questioned a rumor about placing the OCC Fitness Center on the roof of the Colony Surf parking garage, in exchange for the OCC building additional parking for the Colony Surf. President Perry said that no proposal had been received from the Colony Surf.

Former President Bob Anderson thanked President Perry and the Board for their "steady hand and cool nerves" on the OCC 2C issue. "You've done an excellent job in providing information and handling a difficult issue," he said.

The meeting was adjourned at 6:45 p.m. Light refreshments were served following the meeting.



President's Report

This was a very exciting and satisfying year for me. It was exciting because of the challenges caused by management turnover (the General

Manager, the Food & Beverage Manager and the Maintenance Manager), monitoring daily operations without some key managers, and the issue of the Master Plan or OCC 2C.

It was satisfying because I worked with an outstanding Board of Directors, outstanding committees and outstanding management/employees. The year was also rewarding because the Club is in great financial shape, the landscaping and facilities are generally in excellent condition and the credit for this goes to our B&G Committee along with the management and employees of the Club and especially all you members who use the Club regularly.

The year was satisfying because the OCC 2C final conceptual drawings were completed and the referendum was sent to all voting members...the results of which will be reported following my report.

Most of you did not even feel that we were operating without key management staff. At this time, I would particularly like to single out Gordon Smith, our Controller, our Acting General Manager, our Acting Food & Beverage Manager and our Acting Maintenance Supervisor for the tremendous job he did while the Search Committee did a careful search for a new General Manager.

I am happy to report that we did find an excellent candidate for our General Manager in Bill Comstock. His background and March 8 start date are posted on the bulletin board in the Lobby. The General Manager will interview and hire a new Food & Beverage Manager and Maintenance Manager/Supervisor very soon.

I don't want to repeat what was already reported to you but I would like to highlight some of the areas covered in the committee reports. Financially we finished the year with \$7,797,049 in Gross Revenues, \$218,890 better than Budget in revenue, loss was \$1,375 better than Budget in Profit/Loss and we have approximately \$16,310,138 in our Building Fund and Capital Improvement Fund combined.

Wendell Brooks did an excellent job chairing the Budget Committee and in spite of rising operating costs, kept our increase in dues to nearly the cost of living index.

The Long Range Planning Committee, chaired by Bob Dewitz, researched other ways of increasing revenues with a recommendation to raise initiation fees. This was approved for the first time in eight years.

Our land lease with the Elks lease runs until 2056 but the rent must be re-negotiated by November 2006. We have a highly qualified Elks Adhoc Committee chaired by Peter Nottage that is already working on appraisals and strategies for the negotiations. The Elks have also started to organize their committee.

One significant development we have to report is that the Elks have stated, in writing, that they are NOT interested in selling us the land under our Club. Although we will always seize upon the opportunity to purchase the land, we

are moving forward with the understanding that it will not be available in the foreseeable future.

I would like to thank Barbara Stehouwer, Club Secretary for the Board minutes and the excellent entire Executive Committee for the hundreds of hours spent to guide, oversee and plan the future of our great Club. We are so lucky to have people with the quality and dedication of those we have serving on our Board of Directors, the 12 standing committees, and the Elks committee and OCC 2C Adhoc committees. These volunteers and you our members make the Outrigger Canoe Club the finest club in Hawaii. Thank you!



Judges of Election Report

The Judges of Election Committee met on Sunday, February 22, 2004 in accordance with Section 9 of the Club's Bylaws and determined that the following nominees were duly elected to the Board of Directors for the two year term 2004-2005:

Ballots were mailed to 1,840 members eligible to vote. These include Regular, Intermediate, Senior and Life members. Eleven hundred were received. Of these 15 were invalid because the envelope was unsigned or the

voter was delinquent. There were four blank ballots and two were voided for voting for more than six nominees. This left 1,079 valid ballots compared with 879 in last year's election.

The OCC 2C referendums were mailed to the 1,840 members eligible to vote. These include Regular, Intermediate, Senior and Life members. Eleven hundred were returned. There were 625 yes votes and 382 no votes. Of the yes votes, 175 were for the Fitness Center to be built above the Bar with 450 votes for the Fitness Center to be built in the basement.

Treasurer's Report

The annual audit of the Club's records is presently being conducted by PriceWaterhouseCoopers. A copy of the audited financial statements of

the Club will be available in the Manager's Office in mid-March for review by any member. Based upon preliminary figures, the following are the financial results for 2003.

The Club's operating finances were pretty close to budget. While there was an operating loss of \$123,122, the budget projected an operating loss of \$124,000. The sum of \$452,300 was collected in initiation fees and added to the Capital Improvement Fund.

At December 31, 2003, members' equity was reflected in three separate funds, the Operating Fund consisted of \$3,322,723; the Capital Improvement (or OCC 2C) Fund consisted of \$2,534,890 and the Building (or Elks) Fund consisted of \$13,775,248, for a combined total of \$19,632,861.

During the year, the Club has placed on its books the total amount of the employee's pension plan liability. This required the sum of \$536,964 to be posted in 2003 on the Club's financial statements, resulting in a total pension fund liability of \$1,215,395.

While in the future there may be minor adjustments because this liability is affected by changes in interest rates and market values of stocks and bonds, a significant portion of this liability will have to be funded over the next five years. The Board of Directors has asked the Finance Committee to make recommendations as to the best way to fund the liability.

The Club's food and beverage operations came close to meeting the goal of breaking even with the unspent mini-charge being added to food and beverage income. Strong sales in December enabled the Logo Shop to meet its budget.

The Club spent \$417,152 on capital improvements and another \$512,961 on repair and maintenance. The Club has made progress in repairing the concrete spalling around the Club and has an ongoing project to address the remaining spalling problems caused by the age of the Club. In 2004 the Club will be repairing and re-waterproofing the Volleyball Courts to prevent water seeping into the Snack Shop and Locker Rooms.

Financially speaking, our Club is presently in a sound, financial condition and our financial records are maintained in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles.

The development of the annual budget of the Club is a major task, involving all Club committees and many, many individuals. Wendell Brooks was the Chair of last year's budget committee and did an outstanding job. Thanks Wendell for a job well done. Gordon Smith, our controller, has played a major role and he, too, deserves recognition for a job well done.

The Budget Committee worked hard on the 2004 budget with the goal of keeping price increases and dues increases as low as possible while maintaining the traditional Club services and activities and keeping the Club in first-class shape. Each committee request for funds is given serious consideration and study by the Budget Committee.

In closing, here are some of the capital items set forth in the Budget for 2004 that will be occurring during 2004:

- Resealing of the volleyball courts
- Construction and installation of a Wave Deflector
- Purchase of normal equipment replacements in the amount of \$45,000
- Purchase of four new computers for the staff
- Purchase of approximately \$23,000 of new fitness equipment
- Purchase of a new 18-foot Boston Whaler and a canoe
- Completion of certain Koa canoe repairs, and
- The purchase of a new regatta tent



Finance Committee Report

During the year the Finance Committee continued to implement and monitor the Club's investment policies. The Building Fund is intended to provide financial support to purchase the fee interest in the Club's land or fund future ground lease payments.

The Fund has a specific goal to grow in value to \$16 million by the year 2006. At year end, the Fund's market value was \$13.8 million and within reach of the Fund's stated goal.

The Capitol Improvement Fund, established to assure that money will be available for defined, future capital improvement projects and comprised entirely of fixed income investments, ended the year at \$2.5 million.

In response to increased, unfunded pension contribution requirements, a Pension Liability Subcommittee has been formed. The subcommittee will develop and recommend a funding plan over the Club's five-year funding requirement period.

The committee also met to recommend changes to our insurance program resulting in comprehensive protection of the Club's assets in spite of a difficult insurance marketplace.

Finally, a review with the Club's auditors of the Club's financial records, found no major weaknesses in internal control and that we continue to compare favorably to other Hawaii clubs' financial position.



Admissions and Membership Committee Report

Our family as of 2004 is now 4,674 members. The committee was lucky to have Alan Lau as our Coordinating Director, under his guidance we were able to get through a sometimes difficult decision making process with a minimum of change.

Thanks to my Co-Chair Marc Haine for his input of great comments and energy. Also a much deserved mahalo goes out to Dr. Randy Shibuya, Ann Martin, Heather Damon, Chris Smith, Kilipaki Vaughan, Peter Balding Jr., and Kaili Chun for all their time and patience in working with a tough process.



Athletic Committee Report

The members of the 2003 Athletic Committee provided excellent leadership for our various teams, crews and individual competitors through a remarkable season.

The Outrigger Canoe Club won many trophies; however, the organization, communication, sportsmanship and unity that permeated our athletic programs were most noteworthy.

Assistant Club Captain Kisi Haine provided valuable support and Coordinating Director Tom McTigue provided appropriate guidance during the season. The fiscal responsibility of our subcommittee chairs, especially Courtney Seto, the chair of Canoe Racing and Peter Ehrman, the chair of Volleyball, made it possible to operate within our annual budget. We had productive meetings with the Budget and Long Range Planning Committees. The majority of subcommittee chairs attended our annual Athletic Committee meeting on January 27, 2004.

Some highlights of our athletic programs during the season were:

- *Beach & Water Safety* – Chair Rick Hobson and Don Isaacs initiated or improved many services within their purview. Most appreciated by members were the Sunday canoe rides, Aka Hemming' Summer Steering Clinics and Canoe Exploring, and water safety support for our many water sports events.
- *Canoe Racing* – Our upper division women, under the direction of Coach John Puakea, had the best crew in the nation. The men's program, under the leadership of Coach Kala Judd, was also very strong and will be even better this year. The youth program, led by perennial Coach Keoni Kino, continued its growth and helped the Club win our third consecutive Oahu Championship. Anthony and Siana

Hunt took care of everything that needed to be done during the regatta season including a sensational awards banquet.

• *Fitness Center* – Phil Whitney and his subcommittee continued to do an excellent job of maintaining our busy exercise facility.

• *Surfing* – Terri Needels and Kisi Haine have worked hard for years to develop our surfing program and their efforts paid dividends last year. Two of our amateur female surfers were ranked in the top ten nationally and two of our men are competing internationally on the professional tour. The Summer Surf Clinics are over-subscribed by adults and junior members. The Rell Sunn documentary in October was a wonderful end to a terrific season.

• *OC1-Surfski* - Three of our members, Chair Sue Brown, Sean Monahan and Karel Tresnak Jr. won their respective surfski and one-man divisions in the Kanaka I Kai Ka series. Walter Guild provided weekly one-man training sessions from the Club during the season. The subcommittee hosted the annual Tri-Ocean Race.

• *Swimming* – The subcommittee, chaired by Dennis Blake and Arnold Lum, hosted the annual Invitational Swim and the Castle Swim. Young swimming prodigy, Kristi Torkildson, was the first woman to win the Castle Swim.

• *Volleyball* – Five junior teams went to the nationals in Phoenix, AZ and they returned with four trophies. The popular Daddy Haine Tournament had more teams than they could accommodate and provided a finish that was the most exciting in recent memory.

On behalf of our many athletes, coaches and subcommittee chairs, Kisi and I thank the membership and the Board of Directors for their generous support of our athletic programs. We will continue to do our best to perpetuate the sports of old Hawaii.



Building and Grounds Committee Report

The following projects, assignments, and reviews were undertaken by the Building and Grounds

Committee and the Architectural review Committee for the year 2003 to 2004

Landscaping

- Three coconut trees and the necessary irrigation were installed near the beachfront.
- Currently, Ray Cain designed and is receiving quotes for landscape renovation of the two areas between the Lobby and Bar.

Quarterly Inspection Report

- Amended the original worksheet format by adding several more categories and streamlining the existing categories.

Architectural Review Committee

- Letter to Board rejecting SK6 and SK7.

Approved Budget Submittals

These three projects are to be completed this fiscal year:

- Volleyball Court spalling repair and waterproofing, cost estimates received, Adon Construction to perform work.
- Volleyball Court fence repair and renovation, cost estimates received, Island Fence to perform the work.
- Sea wall wave deflector, Sea Engineering to perform the work.

Budget Items Submitted not Approved

These four projects will be submitted for approval in the new fiscal year:

- Volleyball court lights.
- Security system upgrade.
- Roof over service area in Hau Terrace.
- Ceiling painting in the parking structure.

Miscellaneous Items

- Removing the paint on the wood handrails at the Entry and walkways off Lobby and exposing the natural wood.
- Added stainless steel handrail at the base of spiral stairs leading to the Volleyball Court.
- Removed the brightly colored sign at the entry and also the "Welcome to OCC" sign over the entry to the parking structure.
- Procuring samples of the paving tiles to match existing concrete pavers.
- The walkway leading from the Lobby to the Bar and dining areas was cleaned and painted.
- Studying the future repairs to the Bar
- Ceiling tiles in the Lobby have been replaced.
- Studied the Club's signage throughout and recommended uniformity.
- Studied repainting the red beams in the walkway between the Logo Shop and Men's Locker Room
- Studied fabrication of a shoe rack in the Men's Locker Room.

Long Range Planning Committee Report

In 2003, the LRP Committee set out to update the Club's Long Range Plan, which had been developed a number of years ago, put on the shelf, and not updated since. In the course of this effort, a number of deficiencies in the planning process itself became evident and we recognized that before we could update the plan, we needed to fix the process through which the plan was developed.

Specific deficiencies that we sought to fix are as follows:

- The Club's near-term planning cycle, essentially from March when new committees are appointed, through October when budgets need to be submitted, was too compressed to be effective. We have structured a planning process whereby the current year committees will develop action plans and budgets for the following year.
- The LRP did not tie into the budgeting process. We sought to remedy this by creating a strong and more formalized integration between the two.
- Most importantly, there was not a structured, repeatable process for updating the plan or measuring performance against the plan. To remedy this, we developed a Planning Binder that has been distributed to all Board Members, each of the Standing Committees, and to the General Manager. This binder details the planning steps and reduces it to a few simple forms that are submitted during the course of the year.

Using these structured inputs from the committees and management, a meaningful, well supported plan, including goals and budget requirements, can be developed each year and actual performance measured against well-defined objectives.

It is our intention to work with the standing committees to implement this planning process during 2004. We believe that it will result in a more comprehensive, more integrated, and more efficient attainment of the Club's objectives.

At the direction of the Board, the LRP also studied the Club's initiation fee structure and recommended various changes that were adopted by the Board.

The committee is currently studying three issues that we feel are of long term consequence:

- Means of increasing revenues and reducing cost to pay for anticipated ground rent increases associated with the Elks lease renegotiation in 2006.
- Direction and development of a more functional information management system.
- Potential impacts of the Club's projected demographic profile.

I would like to thank our Coordinating Director, Larry Johnson for his guidance during the year, and our committee members who worked so effectively: Chuck McCrary, Susan Merrill, Tom Macdonald, Jakob Vaughan, Keith Steiner, and Tim Guard.

House Committee Report

Mission Statement: The House Committee is a standing committee provided for under the Club's Bylaws. Its function is to assist the General

Manager and the Board of Directors in the Operation of the Club.

All employees have completed a course on harassment.

The House Committee joined the Buildings and Grounds Committee on three separate Club inspection walks. They found the cleanliness and maintenance repairs were being taken care of in a timely manner. My thanks goes to Gay Sevier, Vicki Reisner and Dean Eyre for being a part of this team.

Again this year the House Committee recommended there be a survey of the membership budgeted for the year 2004, however the Budget Committee turned the request down. We strongly recommend that the new House Committee address this issue immediately. They should make a list of survey items, costs, what the survey accomplishes for Management and the House Committee. All these facts must be in place before they are presented to the Budget Committee in September.

The Board of Directors asked the House Committee to study and make a recommendation on what can be offered to increase the usage of the Koa Lanai. Gay Sevier, Peggy Hogan, Valerie Davis and Lisa Livingston volunteered to study the issue. They all felt it was not a menu issue. After several meetings, they suggested a small cocktail lounge for Koa Lanai patrons, located in the unused area in front of the Koa Wall. The Board at their January meeting deferred our recommendation until a new General Manager is in place.

During our year the House Committee recommended five clubs to the Board for approval as reciprocal clubs. The San Diego Yacht Club, Western Australian Club in Perth, Hilo Yacht Club, Del Mar Country Club, and University Club of Washington, D.C. were accepted. Valerie Davis over the past few months has taken the time to write about these new clubs and the articles have appeared in our magazine.

The Board approved our recommendation to publish a new Food and Beverage brochure as well as a General Information brochure, since the ones in use were very outdated.

It came to the attention of the House Committee that the Annual Holiday Party, (free for Members only event), was being attended by non-members in large numbers. They were entering from the beach side of the Club as well as the underground walkway. Also noted were members bringing guests. The House Committee recommended an article be placed in the November issue of the *Outrigger* Magazine, and signage be placed around the Club, stressing the fact that the event is for Members Only.

The House Committee was asked by the Board of Directors to study the extra large SUV parking in the garage. Due to their size it is hard to see around them, and backing out is difficult with the possibility of hitting some one. The House Committee recommendation to the Board of Directors is to have some guidelines established for extra large vehicles and ban parking them on the street level.

In closing, I would like to say Mahalo to my entire committee. A special thank you to Don Figueira, who was our Food and Beverage Manager until December, Debbie Stanley, our committee secretary, Gregg Robertson, our Coordinating Director, and finally to Gordon Smith for taking the time from his busy schedule to sit in on our meetings, representing management as well as Food and Beverage.



Historical Committee Report


The Historical Committee has completed another productive year preserving, categorizing, and collecting memorabilia and other items concerning the Club and its activities.

The committee has 12 subcommittees:

- **Current News Service and Digital Archiving:** preserves various current events of the Club which are detailed in daily newspapers, plus other contributions concerning Club activities. The scanning and digitizing of these pieces is on-going. We appreciate the cost of the clipping service which is underwritten by former director Joyce Timpson.
 - **Oral Histories:** Two oral histories were completed this year, bringing the total to date to 63.
 - **Photos:** Catalogues, researches and accounts for the more than 3,000 widely varied photographs owned by the Club. One photo was framed in 2003 for exhibit in the Dining Area. The collection also documents Waikiki history.
 - **Special Events/Slide Show:** Three Monday night Stew and Rice presentations were made in 2003.
 - **Writing/Research:** The researching of Club records produces the Backward Glances column in the monthly *Outrigger* magazine.
 - **Trophies:** The Club's trophies now number 280. A data base catalogs all trophies. The Board Room display cases are maintained, and each year, the committee polishes all the silver trophies.
 - **Library:** A number of books are owned by the Club. This subcommittee collates, binds, maintains control and manages the collection.
 - **Lobby Display/Reception:** The committee mounts a lobby display window each year in March/April to explain its functions. An additional display was done in 2003. Also, the committee displays mounted exhibits at each Stew/Rice function.
 - **Life Membership Review:** Three members were recommended this year to the Board for Life membership.
 - **Koa Canoes:** Committee members mounted and maintained the *Ka Moi* surfing canoe in the Ka Moi Bar and Lounge. The group is collecting research, including pictures, on canoes. The material will become a significant body of canoe history and an integral section in the centennial publication.
 - **Centennial Publication:** This 10-year project continues on schedule with its time-line updated. Ms. Barbara Del Piano has been selected as the author of the publication, and is hard at work on this massive effort which will produce the publication for members in the centennial year 2008.
 - **Archive News:** This subcommittee researches Library of Hawaii newspaper articles relating to the Club's historical activities. The articles are copied from microfilm without photos, then transcribed and scanned. Copies are on file at the Club.
- Paul Dolan has devoted long hours creating databases which catalog, describe, and keep track of assorted information about the Club.

OCC Ko Kainalu Program to Begin June 7 By Dolan Eversole

The Beach and Water Safety Committee's Ko Kainalu Jr. Waterman program is intended for youth members 12 to 18 years old who want to develop and enhance their ocean-related skills. Successful graduates will follow the tradition of a long line of Outrigger Canoe Club members who symbolize the essence of the waterman including Duke Kahanamoku.

The course format is similar to a Jr. Lifeguard program offering a challenging curriculum of classroom lessons and active physical skills development.

OCC Beach Services staff will be assisted by guest instructors providing specific lessons on ocean safety, OCC and ocean sports history, character development, hazard and risk assessment, nautical and surf skills, and weather and the environment to name a few.

Participants will be introduced to a wide variety of information and practical skills related to ocean sports, recreation and water safety. Participants must be competent ocean swimmers and will participate in vigorous physical activities daily.

General Requirements, Conditions and Information

- Open to OCC members ages 12 to 18 years, both boys and girls
- Limited enrollment based on qualifications and potential (15 kids maximum)
- Program runs June 7-12, from 8 a.m.-1 p.m., Monday-Saturday
- Applications will be available at the Front Desk and online in May
- Participants must be competent swimmers with some basic ocean skills (surfing, paddling or other). Swim test administered as part of testing process.
- Selection criteria will be based on meeting above minimums and a brief letter of intent outlining qualifications and experience. Personal introductory letter required for consideration including background, achievements and personal goals. This will be primary basis for selection.
- Jr. Waterman special committee and/or Beach & Water Service Committee members will review applications and select participants.

- Ko Kainalu is a one week program this year and may have increased frequency as needed or add advanced levels as well next year.
- Primary staffing for the program is from OCC beach attendants with at least one guest instructor each day and may have additional staffing for in-water instruction.
- For more information visit the OCC website or call Don Isaacs of the OCC Beach Services.

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
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Reciprocal Club Review

Review #36 features *The University Club of Washington D.C.*

The newest addition to our list is located in the "Golden Triangle" area of Washington D.C. which means it's within walking distance of the White House and the Capitol, and is also very close to the Metro or subway system.

It is a prestigious club housed in a stately red brick clubhouse, which has been a landmark in downtown Washington since 1904, and whose 2,450 members are comprised of Congressmen, both current and former, and many influential business people. Its very first president was William Howard Taft, who later became President of the United States.

The club's most unusual feature is the day spa called Sage. It's the only club in the east to have its own private spa. You can have everything from various types of massages to facials to body treatments and manicures and pedicures. In addition to the spa they have a state of the art fitness center, news and expanded ladies locker room, and two new international squash courts.

This came about as a part of their Second Century Plan. They also have an indoor swimming pool, a barber, a 6,000 volume library and billiards. The front desk is open 24 hours a day, seven days a week. There is also valet parking.

Of special interest to OCC members will be the 57 newly ren-

ovated guest rooms on the upper four floors of the clubhouse. These rooms provide not only the convenience to downtown Washington but also luxury and comfort. Rooms on floors four and five come with coffee makers, voice mail, internet cable TV, hair dryer, iron and board and daily newspaper.

Executive level rooms are on floors six and seven and have all of the above plus bathrobes and slippers, safe, complimentary local phone calls, complimentary full breakfast during the week, continental on weekends, complimentary fax and copying services, and complimentary use of the athletic facilities.

All others pay \$15 for these athletic facilities. The 2004 room rates range from \$149 on floors four and five, and from \$219 on the executive levels. Suites are also available.

There are two dining venues - the elegant Taft Dining Room where gracious and personal service awaits - and the more casual Pershing Grille with a grand oak bar. There's also a Humidor Lounge for cocktails and cigars. Tipping is not required but a 15% service charge is added. Jackets are required in the Taft Dining Room, with the Pershing Grille accepting a more casual dress code.

Reciprocal privileges can be arranged for two weeks at a time - with a maximum of 12 weeks in one year. Upon departure your bill can be cleared with cash, Visa, MasterCard or American Express.

A letter of introduction is required and they prefer to know in advance of your arrival even if you aren't using the guest rooms, so please stop by our Executive Office before your trip and set up these arrangements.

Members Approve OCC2C Plan, 624-380

On behalf of the Board of Directors and the OCC2C Adhoc Committee, we would like to thank members of the Outrigger Canoe Club for their unprecedented participation in the Club's long range planning process.

The results of the OCC2C Referendum were announced at the Annual Meeting on February 23. A total of 1,009 Referendum ballots were cast. Of that, 1,004 were counted (five were invalid). A total of 624 members (62% of those who voted) voted YES in favor of the improvements embodied in the OCC2C Plan; 380 members (38% of those who voted) voted NO.

Of the 624 members who favor OCC2C, 450 (72%) selected the alternate plan (SK-7) with the Fitness Center in the basement. The remainder, 174 (28%), chose the original plan (SK-6) with the Fitness Center over the Bar.

The OCC2C Committee is pleased with the results of the referendum and gratified by the support and enthusiasm so many have shown. The committee appreciates the interest and involvement of all members

including those who opposed the plan or some aspect of it. The cordial attitude that prevailed among supporters and opponents when the results were announced is testimony to the spirit of the Outrigger ohana.

The Board of Directors will take no further action in connection with the preparation of final construction drawings or construction of OCC2C until the lease rent renegotiations with the Elks have been completed and the amount of the Club's annual lease rent for the remaining term of the lease has been determined.

The OCC2C Adhoc Committee will continue to meet quarterly to prepare the request for eventual Board approval and implementation of the plan. Walter Guild will take over as Committee Chair. Some committee members, including Jaren Hancock, Sue Tetmeyer, Bill Swope and Alan Lau, will step down to make way for newer members who will carry the project through to completion.

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



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New OCC Life Members

Board Briefs

Board Briefs is taken from the minutes of the Board of Directors meeting on February 19, 2004. The Executive Committee meeting was canceled.

Vice President Activities Report: William T. Comstock accepted the General Manager position and is scheduled to start work on March 8, 2004. Ms. Tetmeyer thanked the Search Committee Members for all their hard work. She said the Search Committee had always hoped to fill the General Manager position and then have the new General Manager select his/her own Food & Beverage Manager. However, as time passed and the committee was unable to find the right person for the General Manager position, it began interviewing candidates for the Food and Beverage position; because they believed it would be better to fill that position if they could, rather than leaving the two positions open indefinitely. By the time Mr. Comstock was selected, the Search Committee had interviewed several Food & Beverage candidates and identified one they consider to be viable based on the results of the initial videoconference interview. Ms. Tetmeyer said that the candidate currently resides in California. The candidate's name has been referred to Mr. Comstock. It will be up to Mr. Comstock to decide whether or not to consider the candidate.

Secretary's Report: Four members were suspended for being delinquent for the third time in a 12-month period. Two members were terminated for being delinquent four times in a 12-month period. . . The Outrigger Duke Kahanamoku Foundation Ho'olaule'a will be held in August.

General Manager's Report: With the change in initiation fees, the policy on payment plans for Intermediate members was updated. The new policy reads as follows:

2.2.3.1 Intermediate applicants may make an initial down payment of \$500 and pay off the

\$1,000 balance of the initiation fee over a thirty-month period at the rate of \$36.50 per month including interest.

There was a net income of \$55,936 for January, which is \$39,736 better than budget. \$51,900 in initiation fees has been collected and added to the Capital Improvement Fund. The combined food and beverage income with the mini charge was \$13,860.

A structural engineer has been retained to determine the appropriate support needed for the Volleyball Courts before the waterproofing can begin. The project is scheduled to start March 1, 2004 and take 80 working days to complete. Some of the members have asked to delay the work until September 2004, however, the Board feels that the work needs to be completed as soon as possible because of the leakage in the Snack Shop and Locker Rooms.

A new shoreline survey must be completed in order to obtain the permits necessary to install the wave deflector. The wave deflector should be in place prior to the start of the summer. Since the removal of the groin, the waves have been coming onto the Hau Terrace much more frequently than before and are now also coming over the Koa Lanai wall on a regular basis.

Admissions & Membership Report: The membership count was 4,680 as of January 31, 2004.

House Report: The House Committee was asked by the Board to study whether other Honolulu clubs would be available for OCC members to use on Mondays, the day the Koa Lanai is closed. The Waialae, Oahu and Pacific Club are also closed on Mondays. The House Committee felt that since the Hau Terrace was open on Mondays, OCC members should enjoy the Hau Terrace and there was no need to pursue establishing agreements with other clubs.

Our Employee of the Month is Erlinda Abad, Ladies Locker Room attendant and laundry worker. Users of the Women's Locker Room will know her as the polite, soft spoken, hard worker that she is. Known for her reliability and dependability, Erlinda often covers shifts for employees who are ill or on vacation, so she is around a lot.

What isn't as well known is that OCC was Erlinda's first job. She has been here 10 years. When you ask her what she likes about the Club, her face lights up and she says "oh, it is so good!"
