

Guide for Sponsors

OCC Admissions Procedures

The Outrigger Canoe Club looks to all members to help carry on the spirit and traditions that make the Club a special place for all of us. An important way members do this is by inviting friends who share our values and interests to join the Club.

Our membership includes men, women and children of different ages, ethnic and economic backgrounds. The bonds that bring us together are an appreciation of sports and sportsmanship (regardless if we are athletes or not); the desire to meet and share good times with friends in a setting that is uniquely Hawaiian; and the need to preserve a place where our children will be safe and family members of all ages can be part of the fun.

When the Admissions and Membership Committee reviews applications for membership we aim to determine if the candidates understand and share the values and interests that bring us together at the Outrigger.

We hope the following information is helpful to you. If you have questions, please contact Admissions Secretary in the Executive Office (921-1406) or any member of the Admissions and Membership Committee.

What You Need to Know

Sponsoring members must coordinate with each other throughout the application process.

- Decide who will take responsibility for checking the application for completeness and submitting it. (That person will be posted as the "sponsor"; the other will be posted as the "co-sponsor".)
- Meet with your candidate and discuss the information requested on the application. If your candidate is an applicant for Junior membership (whose parents are not members), please meet with the parents too.
- Discuss the membership classes. Be sure your candidate applies for the appropriate class.
- Check to see that your candidate knows members (other than yourselves) who are willing to be listed as references.
- If your candidate is for any membership class, except Junior, four other voting members should be listed.
- If your candidate does not know four voting members, a non-voting member (except a Junior) the spouse of a voting member, or another local resident, may be listed.
- If your candidate is for Junior Membership, two other voting members should be listed.
- If your candidate does not know two voting members, a non-voting member (except a Junior), or the spouse of a voting member, may be listed.

Ask your candidate to fill out all the information on the application completely and legibly, attach a current photo, and return it to you as soon as possible.

- The committee understands some questions do not apply to all candidates. It is up to the candidate, however, to identify which ones are not applicable.
- Tell your candidate not to leave blank lines unexplained. (For example, if your candidate is not employed, he or she should write "retired," "homemaker," or whatever is accurate, where current employment information is requested.)
- Explain that information on the application will be verified. Incomplete, inaccurate or misleading applications will be denied further consideration.

When your candidate returns the application to you, read it carefully. If it is incomplete, or there is anything you do not understand, follow-up with your candidate until you are satisfied the application is clear and complete.

- Tell your candidate the membership selection process is thorough and can take a considerable amount of time.
- Ask your candidate to let you know immediately if any information changes anytime during the process.
- Read and sign the Sponsor Affirmations.
Place the application in a sealed envelope and deliver it personally to the Admissions Secretary in the Executive Office.
- If neither of you can deliver the application personally, label the envelope "Personal & Confidential" and mail it to the Admissions Secretary.
- All applications for membership must be submitted by sponsors. A candidate for membership should never submit an application or contact the Secretary or any member of the Admissions and Membership Committee directly.

Upon receipt of the application, the Admissions Secretary will:

- Check it for completeness and verify accuracy.
- Mail confidential reference forms. Nothing further will be done with the application until the reference forms are returned.

When the completed application has been verified and references returned, your candidate's name will be placed on the waiting list.

- Names are placed on the waiting list in the order the application file is completed. If either of you is slow to return reference forms, it will prolong the time it takes to get your candidate's name on the waiting list.
- Once the candidate's name is on the waiting list, the length of time he/she will be on it depends on the membership class and the openings in that class. If anything changes with regard to your candidate's application, please notify the Admissions Secretary

- immediately to update the application.
- Do not allow your candidate's name to be posted or the application to go before the Admissions and Membership Committee with incorrect information. Let the Secretary know if your candidate gets married or divorced, changes jobs, residence, or other pertinent facts.
- If your candidate decides to withdraw the application, or if either of you decide to withdraw sponsorship, report the circumstances to the Admissions Secretary or the Chairman of the Admissions and Membership Committee without delay.

When there is an opening in the membership class and your candidate's name is at the top of the waiting list, his or her name will be posted.

- If the Admissions Secretary has not heard anything to the contrary from you, we will assume all the information is current. We will post your candidate's name, occupation, sponsor names, and membership category as they appear on your candidate's completed application. The posting will remain for at least 30 days on the bulletin board in the main lobby. It will also be published on a list that is mailed with members' monthly statements.
- During the posting period, members are invited to submit confidential comments concerning the candidates. All comments received are considered by the Admissions and Membership Committee. Names of members responding and details of their comments are held in strictest confidence.

After your candidate's name is posted, the Admissions Secretary will contact both sponsors to meet individually with the Admissions and Membership Committee. The purpose of the meeting is for you to present your reasons for proposing your candidate for membership.

The next step is for one or both of you to bring your candidate to meet with the committee.

- The purpose of this meeting is for you to introduce your candidate and for your candidate and the committee to get acquainted.
- Depending on the agenda, you may be asked to bring your candidate the same night as you meet with the committee; or you may be asked to bring your candidate to a subsequent meeting. In either case, please follow the instructions you receive from the Admissions Secretary.
- Sponsors are responsible for making arrangements with the candidate to come to the meeting. Please be sure your candidate is prepared and try your best to put him or her at ease.
- If your candidate is married, his or her spouse must come to the meeting. If your candidate is engaged, his or her

fiance/fiancee is encouraged to attend. (This is not necessary if your candidate's spouse or fiance/fiancee is currently a Club member.)

- If your candidate is for Junior membership, parents who are not Outrigger members must attend. Parents who are Outrigger members are encouraged, but not required to attend.
- Please meet your candidate in the lobby prior to the scheduled meeting time and wait there until the Receptionist calls you.

The Admissions and Membership Committee makes its recommendation on all candidates to the Board of Directors.

If your candidate is selected for membership, he or she will receive a welcoming letter and an invoice for the initiation fee and first month's dues. As soon as the invoice is paid, your candidate will officially become a member and entitled to enjoy all the privileges of membership.

If your candidate is not selected, you will be notified. It is the responsibility of one of the sponsors to personally inform the candidate as soon as possible.



The top three finishers in the Surfski Race were Marshall Rosa, Steve Kelly and Mark Sandvold.





Describing it as a "peak experience", Gerry DeBenedetti is back from Midway Atoll. Actually 3 coral islands: Sand, Spit and Eastern, the atoll is 1,300 miles from Honolulu. No commercial flights go there (except in an emergency), so Fish & Wildlife Service (FWS) and Coast Guard arranged flights are the only way to fly. Gerry went as a volunteer for the FWS to participate in the biennial albatross count. Ask her how one counts 460,000 nesting albatross. That number actually represents pairs, so nearly 1 million albatross make Midway their home. She spent three weeks there over Christmas and New Years on a team of 20.

They lived in the old WW II officer's family homes, rode bicycles to work and play, ate great food prepared by a group of Thai cooks, and saw lots of turtles and monk seals. They traveled between the three islands in a small boat, got to snorkel and walk several beaches from one end to the other and then some! Many of the volunteers are working professionals and gave evening talks on oil spill bird rescues, endangered species, and bird behaviors. On the evenings without meetings or talks they gathered in the local Tavern for research on beer and wine.

The team also participated in the annual Christmas Bird count, when they counted everything flying other than the albatross. Their Christmas tree was an iron-wood tree (considered an invasive species) decorated with fish lures, beach debris, those floating plastic cigarette lighters (which are very harmful to the birds), and feathers. If you are interested in volunteering for such an experience, and willing to spend a working holiday this way, talk to Gerry and she will put you in touch with the FWS field workers.

He entered the Castle Swim in November, so he's home, at the Club, and starting business in Honolulu.

"Some unique experiences included a symphonic presentation by the Orchestra of Children with Special Needs of Ecuador (followed by some salsa dancing with the students), luncheon in a convent, and having home-hosted meals and visits with a family in both Peru and Ecuador," she writes.

Art and Libbie, George and most of the young people made it to the top of the highest peak in Machu Picchu the second day there, while the rest of the group were flat in bed from something they ate or drank the day before!"



Look For the Junior Waterman Program This Summer

The Beach & Water Safety Committee will sponsor the OCC Junior Waterman Course. In some ways it will be similar to the City and County Junior Lifeguard Program, but with an Outrigger Canoe Club slant.

The program will teach lifesaving skills and techniques, including certifications in CPR and First Aid. But, we are also going to include skill and safety lessons in such activities as surfing, canoe surfing, paddle boarding and sailing.

Primarily, the course will be run by selected OCC Beach Services staff. A special qualified guest (or guests) will be helping with each segment.

To participate in the program, you must be an OCC member between the ages of 12-18. You will also have to pass an ocean skills test before being allowed in.

The tentative dates of June 6-12 have been set. More specific information will be in next month's magazine.

Petroglyphs, Pictures, and Harry Jefferson Next Stew-Rice Night, March 29th

Retired engineer Harry Jefferson indulges his passion for both photography and hiking by capturing the spirit of Hawaii's petroglyphs on film...well, not only these fascinating symbolic and stylized figures incised in stone, but a variety of Hawaii subjects.

Petroglyphs, however, is the subject of our particular interest. He will show an impressive collection of his *ki'i pohaku* images in a Stew-Rice Night presentation on Monday, March 29th.

You won't want to miss this showing and the opportunity to get acquainted with Harry, without a doubt a multi-aptitude man. The imposing six-feet-three kamaaina continues, in retirement, to develop backgrounds in science and the arts that he honed initially during student days. Following graduation from Punahoa, he went off to UCLA, where he earned a bachelor of science degree in engineering and also a bachelor of arts degree in fine arts. A military stint in the submarine service, where he served in the Atlantic Fleet (based in New London, Connecticut, on the *USS Sablefish*), was followed by a career in project planning and management of resort, industrial, and residential properties on the Mainland and at home in Hawaii.

Living for a while on the Big Island provided him an up-close and ever-present exposure to the full spectrum of Hawaii's brilliant contrasts, her geological dynamism, her lush exotic flora, and the rich archeological evidence of her stone age culture so recently still in tact.

All this was bound to ignite in any art sensitive and creative person an urge to respond in a concrete way-and Harry didn't even try to resist. The scientist in him went to work analyzing photographic technique and technology; the outdoorsman in him took to the trails (together with his wife, Gay, a watercolorist of note); and the artist in him allowed the islands' many-faceted tapestry to give full vent to his creativity, emerging in elegant images of Hawaii.

From the exquisite structure of an emerging fern frond, to fiery fingers of Pele, to the stylized mystery of a multitude of human, animal, and inanimate incisions in stone, he has built a 100,000-image body of work representing a wide range of subject matter including people and the built environment as well as nature and archeology.

A photo essay of some 80 of his images of plants and petroglyphs won a warm reception at Volcano Art Center. And upcoming-perhaps about the time of his OCC slice-show lecture-are Reyn's Spooner shirts of fabric featuring Harry Jefferson images.

Meanwhile, focus is on petroglyphs at the March 29th Koa Lanai event, the OCC Historical Committee's first Stew-Rice Night of 2004. Don't forget you must reserve space-and that's limited to 150 guests. Be ready-call now!

OCC House Rules



The Club Bylaws empower the Board of Directors to regulate the affairs of the Club, set policies and establish rules of conduct on Club premises. Bylaws also assign responsibility for enforcement of established rules to the Club management. The rules and regulations are posted on the Club bulletin boards and other conspicuous places.

Identification Cards

Each member's eligible child age 10 and older, dependent or family member (other than spouse), or guest using the Club more than twice in any one calendar month must have his or her own appropriate membership card and be billed accordingly.

Club employees by direction of the Board of Directors are instructed to ask to see the membership card of anyone using the Club facilities if the person is not known, and to report violations to the General Manager.

Please do not feel offended if a receptionist, beach attendant, server, parking or locker room attendant or any other authorized Club employee challenges you, or a guest, as the intent is to protect the Club from illegal use.

To protect our privileges and private Club status, members are obligated to report to the management any persons believed to be using the Club illegally.

Guests

Any member in good standing may bring guests to the club provided they are not persona non grata. No guest shall use the Club more than two days in any one month. This limitation does not apply to spouses of members or ladies and gentlemen accompanying single men or women members, respectively.

Members are responsible for determining their guests' eligibility.

Guests are required to remain in the company of the host member as long as the guest remains on Club premises.

Entry and Registry

All members are required to sign in once a day when first entering the Club. This is necessary to preserve our private club status. The number of invited guests is to be recorded on the sign-in register located inside the lobby entrance or lower floor beach passageway.

Limitations

Quotas may be established by the Board of Directors on the number of Reciprocal and/or Guest Members and their guests authorized at any one time. Attendance at certain Club functions by Reciprocal and Guest Members and all guests - other than escorts of authorized single members - may be limited. The annual Christmas Party traditionally is closed to Reciprocal Members and Guest Members and all guests other than spouses.

Children

Children under 10 years of age must be in the company of a responsible supervising adult member. Effective control of children by parents or other accompanying adult member is mandatory. Playpens or carriages may not be placed in dining areas.

Dress Code

Club employees are instructed to refuse service in the Cocktail Lounge including Bar, Dining Room and Lanais to any person in improper attire.

Cellular Phones

The Club prohibits the use of cellular phones in the Koa Lanai, Hau Terrace, Ka Moi Lounge and Bar.

Alcoholic Beverages

Alcoholic beverages shall be consumed only in designated Club areas. Strict compliance with established rules is essential for the protection of the Club's liquor license. No alcoholic beverages purchased from the Club are allowed on the public beach at any time.

Persons under the legal drinking age are prohibited from purchasing, being served or consuming alcoholic beverages on Club premises.

Club rules provide that no alcoholic beverages may be brought onto Club premises, including the volleyball courts and parking areas, or taken from the club premises. No glass containers are allowed in sand areas including volleyball courts.

The laws of the State of Hawaii are to be

strictly enforced and Club employees are instructed to require legal identification where doubt exists as to age or bona fide affiliation with the Club, and to refuse service to anyone who appears to have over indulged.

Board Room

The Board of Directors has priority use of the Board Room. Club committees are authorized use of the Board Room for an approved activity at times specified and registered with the Executive Secretary on a first request first reservation basis. The Club duty manager is authorized to unlock the room and thereafter secure it - only for an approved activity. Furnishings will not be removed or re-arranged without permission of the General Manager. Minimum dress code, no tank tops or swimwear.



Table Restrictions

To accommodate the most members and guests during surge periods, 11:30 a.m. to 2:00 p.m. daily, all Hau Terrace, Ka Moi Lounge and Snack Shop tables are reserved for food and beverage service. Game tables and reading facilities are available in other areas of the Club.

Television

Viewing in Ka Moi Lounge is limited to selected athletic and special events preprogrammed by the management. Equipment is to be handled and adjusted only by authorized Club employees.

Snack Shop

Food and beverages from the Snack Shop are not to be taken to other club-house areas. Dispose of all utensils and waste in appropriate containers and keep area clean. Condiments must remain on service shelf.

Smoking Restrictions

Smoking is not permitted anywhere on the Club's premises except for the top level of the parking garage, and the Snack Shop

area after the Snack Shop has closed.

Lobby

Persons in swimwear are not to loiter in lobby. No food or beverages allowed. Reading material provided is not to be removed. Surfboards and other large articles are not to be transported through the Lobby.

Telephones

Club telephones are provided as a convenience to members and guests. Local calls only, please, limited to three minutes or less.

Water Safety

Members are responsible for their own good behavior and safety on the beach and water area fronting the Club. Parents, or other adult member hosts, shall at all times accompany all guests, and all children under the age of 10, and shall be responsible for their behavior and safety on the beach and in the water. Rules are posted.

Locker Rooms

The locker room designated "Senior Men" is restricted to use of males 18 years and older, and "Junior Boys" area for males under 18. The "Senior Women" locker room is for use of females age 18 and over; the "Junior Girls" locker room is for those under 18.

Children under the age of nine may use the senior locker rooms when accompanied by and under the supervision of an adult. Children between the ages of five and nine years must be accompanied by an adult of the same sex using the locker room facility designated for that sex. Children nine years and older must use the junior locker rooms.

No food or beverages allowed; no smoking. Conserve water when using showers. Towels are not to be taken from locker rooms. Other rules are posted.

Rest Rooms

Swimwear is prohibited in the "Wahine" and "Kane" restrooms adjacent to the dining room - lanai area.

Parking

Cars of members (except Reciprocal and Guest Members) must bear a current OUTRIGGER CANOE CLUB parking decal in the prescribed manner. Motorcycles are also required to have a parking decal and may use a stall. Mopeds and bicycles are not

required to have a decal. They must be parked in the bicycle area at the street level of the parking garage. Decals and instructions are available to authorized members from the receptionist at the Front Desk.

Reciprocal and Guest Members must show their current Club identification card to attendants and sign a chit for the posted rate (6:00 a.m. - 5:00 p.m.; after 5:00 p.m. no charge).

For other cars without a current parking decal, including cars of authorized guests, limited parking is available at the posted rate (by chit) from 6:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. except holidays. There is no charge for member and their guest who eat lunch in the Dining Room or Hau Terrace. Give the top copy of the parking chit to your server and you will not be charged for parking. There is no charge for parking after 5 p.m. Avoid dinging cars parked beside yours.



Reservations for guest parking are required in advance by the host member contacting the receptionist or the parking attendant and accepting responsibility for the charge. Overnight parking - including bikes - is not permitted without prior explicit permission of the General Manager; violators will be fined \$5.00 per day. Safety regulations are posted in the garage. Violators will be denied Club parking privileges.

Parking attendants are required to report the license numbers of cars ignoring stop signs and other safety regulations. Pedestrians have the right of way. Speed limit is 5 mph!

Pets

Animals are not allowed on the Club grounds or in the clubhouse. Do not feed birds, please!

Restricted Areas

Members or guests are not permitted in the Kitchen, Storeroom or Business Office except on official Club business or when accompanied by a member of the management staff.

Valuables

The Club assumes no responsibility for personal valuables or other belongings.

Personal Effects

Personal effects are not to be left on Club premises except under specific arrangements with the Club management. A lost and found service is available at the Front Desk. Equipment such as surfboards, kayaks, surfkis, canoes, etc. left on Club premises without the consent of the management will be fined \$5.00 per day.

Bulletin Boards

Signs, posters, notices or advertisements for other than authorized Club related functions and activities are not permitted anywhere within the Club. Items posted on Club bulletin boards are to be coordinated with and approved by the Club Manager. Official committee postings are to be coordinated in advance with the Executive Secretary.

Tickets

Admission tickets to Club special events will be charged to accounts at the time the tickets are picked up at the Front Desk. Refunds will not be made unless reservations are cancelled at least 48 hours prior to the scheduled time of the event.

Christmas Fund

An employee's Christmas Fund has been established by the Board, with stipulated amounts for each membership classification. A member may contribute more or less than the suggested amount. If a member does not wish to contribute, the Business Office must be notified in writing by November 15. Otherwise, the contribution will be billed.

Charge System

The Club operates on a charge system: no cash and no tipping. The server receives a 15% gratuity on food and beverages, which is added to monthly bills. Please take the top copy of your signed chit as it will help you to reconcile your monthly statement.

OCC House Rules



Billing and Statements

The applicable State general excise tax is added to all bills, in addition to the servers' gratuities. Reciprocal and Guest Members are charged 20% of the gross amount of their bills as dues.

The sponsoring reciprocal club is responsible for unpaid Guest membership accounts, up to \$500.00, whereas a sponsor member is liable for all unpaid Guest charges.

Statements for charges, including dues, assessments and other debts, shall be due and payable upon the first day of each month at the business office of the Club, and shall become delinquent if unpaid on the 16th of the following month.

Payments received by the Business Office on the 15th either during or after working hours shall be posted as received on the 15th. If unpaid by the 16th, delinquent amount and name of the member owing same shall be posted on the Club bulletin board, a delinquent penalty imposed, and all Club privileges and further credit suspended.

Commercialism

No member or guest shall be approached on Club premises for business purposes except by invitation. No petitions shall be circulated, nor subscriptions, funds or donations solicited unless expressly authorized by the Bylaws. The use of the Club's name, stationery, address or telephone number for business purposes is prohibited.

The facilities of the Club are not to be used for any commercial purposes or for conducting any TV, radio, press interviews, conferences or professional photography without prior explicit approval of the Board of Directors.

There shall be no display of badges or name tags on Club premises, unless authorized for special functions.

Conduct

All members are responsible for their personal conduct and the conduct of their families and guests while on the Club premises or engaged in Club activities. Members and their guest whose conduct is unacceptable will be subject to appropriate sanctions, up to and including expulsion from membership. Privacy of members and guests shall not be violated for any reason, such as autographs, pictures, and solicitations.

Complaints

Employees are directed by the Board of Directors to report observed violations of house rules to the General Manager for appropriate disciplinary action.

All complaints regarding Club services, breaches of normal social conduct or other Club matters are to be made directly to the Club management.

Enforcement

Club rules will be enforced. Failure to enforce a rule promptly or authorization of a necessitated exception shall not constitute a waiver of the governing rules nor be considered a waiver of the rules or policies established by the Board of Directors. The Board of Directors reserves the right to refuse entry or service to anyone. The General Manager is delegated this authority.

Waiver of Claims

An essential requirement to become a member, guest, employee or agent of the Club, or of securing entry to its premises is the waiver insofar as legally possible of all claims of every nature arising from, injury or damage of any kind while on the Club premises or arising in any manner from the occupation of such relationship to the Club and the acceptance of any such relationship or the presence on Club premises shall be deemed such a waiver (Section 65, Bylaws).

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
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Backward Glances
