# OCC 2C OUTRIGGER CANOE CLUB - THE 2nd CENTURY

The Master Plan Adhoc Committee has made considerable progress since our report in the December magazine. Architect Ted Garduque completed the schematic drawings. A

Construction Project Manager was selected.

The committee decided on the "design-assist" approach to developing the plans we will need for actual construction and considered proposals from three well-established and qualified contractors.

The Board of Directors authorized the Master Plan Adhoc Committee to select a contractor, and the committee has chosen Pankow Special Projects, L.P. to provide precon-

struction services.

As this article goes to press, OCC 2C is still a design concept. As soon as the Master Plan Adhoc Committee reviews and approves the schematic drawings, the next step will

be to develop the plans we will need for actual construction.

This process will take approximately one year and will involve conducting various soil and engineering studies, completing all the design details, determining the constructability of all aspects of the project, as well as the phasing and scheduling, and finally obtaining necessary permits.

Only after all this is completed will we have an accurate estimate of the cost to complete the project and a firm schedule. At that time the Master Plan Adhoc Committee

will go back to the Board with its final recommendation.

The Construction Project Manager is David Kerr, President of Construction Management Group, Ltd. David has been in the construction business in Hawaii since 1967 and has extensive experience in renovation projects similar to ours. David helped the committee establish the criteria for selecting the contractor and advised the committee during the selection process.

His job will be to provide construction project management services in coordinating all aspects of the project. He will work with the architect, the contractor, Club management, and the Master Plan Adhoc Committee to assist in project budgeting; coordinating,

scheduling and furnishings installation.

"Design assist" is a process whereby a contractor is engaged while the building plans are being developed and works very closely with the architect and the Construction Project Manager to ensure the design specifications can be carried out in the most efficient and cost effective manner.

The Master Plan Adhoc Committee believes "design assist" will encourage greater commitment on the part of the contractor, help decrease the possibility of unexpected problems and changes during construction and, therefore, achieve the best possible cost

control.

Pankow Special Projects, L.P. is a division of The Pankow Companies, Builders. While they have the background and resources of a large construction company, they specialize specifically in small-scale projects such as ours, and have considerable experience renovating occupied properties.

The team that will be working with us has experience working with Ossipoff designs and has demonstrated sensitivity to the architectural and landscaping features that are so

important to the Outrigger Canoe Club.

During October and November representatives of the Master Plan Adhoc Committee made informal presentations to all the standing committees. Committee member Bob Dewitz got an official endorsement from members of the Long Range Planning Committee. The response from members of the other committees was generally favorable and enthusiastic.

Committee members came up with some excellent suggestions that are being studied by Architect Garduque and the Master Plan Adhoc Committee. Everyone is looking forward to seeing the more detailed visual presentation. We expect to have that ready to present to the committees and the general membership early in 2003 and hope to get full endorsement at that time.

The Master Plan Adhoc Committee will continue to update members as the project progresses. Please watch for notices of communications meetings and be sure to attend.

It is a pleasure to acknowledge two OCC members who have given unselfishly of their time and talents during the 2002 athletic season. These two individuals were selected for recognition by the Club Captain, because they represent the values that perpetuate the tradition of excellence in athletic competition at the Outrigger Canoe Club.

- Dave Shoji was an outstanding coach for the 2002 Jr. National Volleyball Champions in the Boys 14 & Under division.
- Peter Ehrman was an extraordinary chair of the Volleyball Committee for the 2002 season.
   Peter personified the athletic program objectives of respect, responsibility and results.

**One-Man Training** 

The OC-1/Kayak Committee and Walter Guild conducted a clinic for members on November 30, 2002. Group training sessions have been scheduled at the Club on M-W-F at 6:30 a.m. for members

interested in preparing for the one-man season that begins January 12th.

**Basic Coaching Workshop** 

The Club sponsored a Basic Coaching Workshop for approximately 25 youth coaches in all athletic programs on November 19. The workshop was conducted by Robert Baarts, a trainer from the Positive Coaching Alliance. The PCA was developed at Stanford University to "transform youth sports, so sports can transform youth."

**Annual Athletic Committee Meeting** 

The Club Captain's Annual Meeting of all athletic program chairs will be held on Tuesday, January 21 at 6 p.m. in the Duke Room. The recently completed Policies & Procedures Manual for the Athletic Committee will be presented to all committee chairs.

**Beach & Water Safety Committee** 

This committee has been activated to address concerns related to water safety and liability. The committee will provide safety oversight for all Club-sponsored water sports events and supervise certification for use of surfing canoes and Whalers.

#### OC-1/Surfski Lockers

When will more OC-1/Surfski boat lockers become available?

The current number of boat lockers is the maximum possible in the parking garage. Some of the early boat lockers were designed before the OC-1 crafts became popular so the larger volume canoes will not fit in them and there is no place to store the ama. Administration is looking into the feasibility of constructing a rack for ama but must accomplish this without sacrificing any additional parking stalls. The new overhead boat lockers have been marginally successful. Increasing the number of boat lockers may be accomplished when



the parking garage undergoes a major renovation in the next few years. At that time all watercraft will need to be removed from the facility and new policies for boat locker use will apply to all existing tenants.

Management has attempted to monitor activity of existing boat lockers with the intention of asking inactive tenants to release their spaces or allow the Club to transfer the watercraft to an off-site storage facility. Policies relating to watercraft storage were not clearly defined when the boat lockers were initially constructed and leased to members. Another consideration was to police the subleasing of boat lockers by inactive tenants to a member who is on the waiting list or stores more than one watercraft at the Club. Unfortunately, members who refuse to cooperate with the original intent of the boat locker program have made this policing exercise difficult.

Another suggestion was to give priority to active members of the paddling programs because Upper Division Canoe Racing emphasizes one-man training. This would be prejudicial to members that paddle for pleasure and violates the mission of the Club to preserve the sports of old Hawaii for all members.

Therefore, these options, though well intentioned, appear to be impractical solutions to the current problem of insufficient boat lockers. In the meantime, we must rely on the goodwill of members that are inactive tenants to release their boat lockers to active paddlers rather than use their space merely for storage of an old watercraft or improperly loaning/subleasing the space to a friend.



#### Duke Paoa Kahanamoku Ho`olaulea







THE PURPOSE the Outrigger Duke Kahanamoku Foundation is to financially support the development of individuals and organizations that perpetuate the spirit and legacy of Duke Kahanamoku.

ODKF accomplishes this by encouraging athletes and scholars whose endeavors will contribute to the growth and development of athletics in Hawai'i; supporting athletic events and participation by teams and individuals in local, national and international competition; supporting individuals in furthering their education; and assisting in preserving, perpetuating and developing sports which have a special cultural or historical significance to Hawai'i.

## **BOARD DESIGNATED FUNDS**

There are seven ODKF Board Designated Funds.

Muriel Macfarlane Flanders Fund: established by Muriel Flanders to support water sports in Hawai'i, to perpetuate the Macfarlane Fourth of July Regatta, and to honor the accomplishments of Duke Paoa Kahanamoku.

Terrence McCarthy Fund: established by Terrence McCarthy in memory of her husband Edmond McCarthy, who firmly believed in the combination of athletic participation and education. Mrs. McCarthy honors her husband by supporting Hawaii's top scholar athletes.

Tom "Daddy" Haine Fund: established by the Board of Directors in 1994, funds support and develop the sport of volleyball in Hawai'i. Haine was the captain of the 1968 U.S.

Olympic men's volleyball team. He was an 18-time USVBA All-American and in 1991 was inducted into the U.S. Volleyball Hall of Fame. He was a member of the original Outrigger Foundation that later merged with the Duke Kahanamoku Foundation to form ODKF.

Kala Kukea Fund: established by the Board of Directors in 1996 and named for Kala Kukea who was one of Hawaii's top overall water sportsman. Kukea touched the lives of many young athletes in his short 52 years of life. He was an outstanding competitor, coach and role model. In 1996 he posthumously received the Hawaiian Canoe Racing Asso-ciation John DeRego Perpetual trophy for service to the Association and to the Molokai/Oahu canoe race.

Cline Mann Fund: named for John Cline Mann, a superb water sportsman who died in 1996. He was captain of his Dartmouth College swimming team, an avid small boat sailor, and a strong promoter of paddleboard racing. Grants from this fund help to support the annual Cline Mann Paddleboard Race. Cline Mann was also a member of the original Board of Directors of the Duke Kahanamoku Foundation (DKF) that was founded in 1963. He then played an instrumental role in the merger of DKF and the Outrigger Foundation to create the present Outrigger Duke Kahanamoku Foundation (ODKF).

Thomas Arnott Fund: established by Marian Arnott in loving memory of her husband who was a great supporter of both OCC and ODKF. Tommy Arnott, a masterful surfer, was also recognized for competing in canoe races with Duke Kahanamoku. As teammates they beat all their competition in the early 1940's. Consequently this fund will support interscholastic

canoe paddling in Hawai'i.

Henry Ayau Fund: established this year by the Ayau Family to honor this renowned athlete and his legacy. A "Molokai Boy," Henry excelled in life as a businessman, sportsman and community minded citizen. An exceptional athlete, Henry was a noted baseball player, canoe paddler, and world-class free diver. Many thought of him as the modern day "Ambassador of Aloha." Henry's untimely death this year left us with a heavy heart but with our lives enriched by his smile, good nature and enduring Hawaiian spirit.

ODKF awards grants to athletes, teams, scholar-athletes and sporting events in the name of the above listed funds. We thank the individuals and families who have made these grants possible.

## FINANCIAL REPORT

The financial statements for the ODKF as of and for the year ended September 30, 2001, were reviewed by Pricewaterhouse-Coopers. These financial statements are available to our members by request.

At the foundation's annual meeting on October 23, 2002, a report was made on the foundation's un-audited financial results for the fiscal year ending September 30, 2002. These financial statements are now being reviewed by Pricewaterhouse-Coopers. When that review is completed in January 2003, they will be available to members by request.

Foundation income came

from donors who specify an amount be charged to their OCC account, as well as those who make cash contributions.

Additional funds were raised through the sale of tee shirts at the annual Walter J. Macfarlane Canoe Regatta, activities connected to the Duke Kahanamoku Ho`olaulea and royalty payments from Malama Pono.

Scholarship grants for the year totaled \$24,000; athletic grants for the year totaled \$27,085; and a special grant of \$5,000 was made to the Boys and Girls Club.



## Youth Coaches Learn Positive Coaching Techniques

The Athletic Committee sponsored a Positive Coaching Workshop in the Board Room on November 19th for all youth coaches. PCA trainer, Robert Baarts from Beaverton, OR, conducted the two-hour session. Rob, currently on staff at the University of Portland, is a former professional soccer player.

The Positive Coaching Alliance, based in Stanford, CA, evolved from studies of attrition in youth sports conducted by researchers at Stanford University. By applying the PCA philosophy at the collegiate level, Stanford University has won the Director's Cup the past eight years. This prestigious award is voted by the Athletic Directors at all major universities across the nation.

Rob Baarts stressed the importance of PCA training when he said, "The youth sports experience provides opportunities for children to learn important lessons about determination, commitment, hard work, teamwork, and empathy while acquiring increased self-confidence and positive character traits."

Unfortunately, statistics reveal that 70 percent of Hawaii's youth athletes drop out of sports by the time they turn 13 years old because of negative coaching experiences.

According to officials from the Positive Coaching Alliance, "Youth coaches are untrained in and unfamiliar with principles of effective motivation and age-appropriate teaching strategies. There is no room in youth sports for a win-at-all-costs mentality."

Research has shown that positive coaching can increase an athlete's self-esteem and self-confidence, which results in more enjoyment from participating, which causes a child to be more likely to continue playing a sport.

More than 25 coaches from our Canoe Racing, Volleyball and Surfing programs attended the workshop. Jaren Hancock and John Marshall, youth paddling coaches and members of the Board of Directors also attended.

Rob impressed upon the coaches that Positive Coaching is "not soft and easy" or merely "happy talk", but a concerted effort to develop high standards for athletes. The consequence of implementing Positive Coaching is individual growth in every athlete and personal fulfillment for the coach. The goal of "attaining mastery" instead of "winning at all costs" eventually leads the team to higher performance in the sport.

The PCA philosophy embodies three fundamental principles:

- Honoring the Game
- Defining a Winner
  - Filling the Emotional Tank

Rob concluded the workshop by saying, "Support by the leadership of the organization is essential to the implementation of the Positive Coaching principles. The development of an appropriate "culture" and "elimination of impediments" will allow the "positive coaching epidemic" to spread throughout the organization and infect every coach, parent and athlete."

Siana Hunt, a youth paddling coach said, "We will definitely implement the PCA techniques into our girls paddling program next season. Our parent's orientation meeting at the beginning of the season will clearly define our expectations and our goals for the tids."

Terri Needels, Chair of Surfing and coach said, "My psychology background helps me appreciate the significant benefits of positive coaching on our kids."

Keoni Kino, Head Coach of the Canoe Racing Youth Division said, "I liked the emphasis on organization of practices, the communication techniques, and the involvement of parents to clarify




Mike Town leads discussion at Positive Coaching Workshop.

expectations. I also liked the attitude that coaches are responsible to help every kid improve instead of just thinking about winning races."

Mike Town, youth paddling coach said, "Using athletics to teach kids the skills they will need to succeed in life truly resonated with me. Anyone who plans to coach would benefit from the workshop."

Jimmy Austin, waterman and youth paddling coach said, "I've had so many coaches in my career that should have taken this workshop. I really liked it when Rob told us that fitness training should not be used as punishment. I also liked the concept of creating a positive team culture for our paddling program."

The two-hour session passed quickly and Rob engaged nearly every coach. The participants posed several coaching scenarios for Rob to address with positive coaching techniques. By the end of the workshop, the motto of the Positive Coaching Alliance was clearly evident to the entire group; "transforming youth sports, so sports can transform youth" is a goal that can be achieved within any organization.



## **A Tribute to Positive Coaching**

Approximately 70 percent of Hawaii's young athletes give up on sports by the time they become teenagers. Lindsay Wessberg was almost one of them. Instead, the Punahou junior became the ILH Girls Kayaking Champion on November 9, 2002 at Keehi Lagoon.

Slightly more than two years ago, Lindsay was discouraged with canoe paddling and had decided to hang up her paddle. Then Kisi Haine invited Lindsay to practice with her and friends Paula Crabb and Anne Marie Mizuno on Sundays. Eventually they entered the Kanaka I Kai Ka races in an OC-2. The following spring Kisi invited Lindsay to steer for her Women Masters paddling practices and eventually for the Open Women on Saturdays.

Head Women's Coach Mike Beyer encouraged Lindsay's steering efforts and more importantly, introduced her to the Olympic kayak, the K-1. Mike guided Lindsay to the Hawaii Canoe and Kayak Team that summer. Sarah Field, a member of HCKT and the 2000 ILH Kayak Champion from Punahou, was very enthusiastic about the program, so Lindsay started the eerie morning sessions on the dark Ala Wai Canal with coaches Chris Ball, Geordan Purdy and Eric Chun.

In July, Lindsay trained under Paul Podgorski, the USACK Sprint Coach, at Lake Placid, NY. She spent a month with Paul, who motivated her to train harder than she had ever worked in her life. Lindsay said, "Paul just made me want to get up early, work hard and do my best."


Lindsay Norcross, 2001 ILH Champion and member of the USACK Jr. National Sprint Team, also became a source of motivation for Lindsay. They eventually teamed-up to win a gold medal in the K-4 1,000 meter and a silver medal in the K-4 500 meter sprints at the U.S. Jr. Nationals at Lake Lanier, GA. Lindsay also won two individual bronze medals in K-1 500 meters and 5,000 meters.

The Punahou Girls Paddling coaches also supported Lindsay's paddling efforts last year. Coaches Marion Lyman-Mersereau and Reney Ching selected Lindsay to steer the Varsity crew and that really elevated her self-esteem. Kavaking coach, Denise Darval-Chang, helped Lindsay modify her training program to accommodate a shoulder and back problem during the season and always provided positive comments.

Australian coaches Shelley Oates-Wilding and Guy Wilding were nearly indispensable with the physical and mental conditioning programs they introduced to Lindsay for kayak racing. "Shelley is an Olympic athlete," said Lindsay, "so she inspired me to reach beyond my limitations. When I lost a race, Shelley taught me how to work through it, rebuild my self-confidence and come back even

"I look back on this kayaking season and realize that it took a lot of hard work and a little good luck to win the ILH Championship, but I know I wouldn't be where I am today without the many good coaches that helped me along the way," says Lindsay. "Regardless of how far I go in kayaking, I know the skills I am learning from these terrific coaches will help me be successful in life.'

"My parents tell me that coaches like Kisi and Shelley are very special because they personify the spirit of positive coaching," says Lindsay. "They sure made a difference for me. Two years ago I was ready to quit paddling and now kayaking is one of the most important things in my life!"


This year's winner was Chris Moore who has won every year since he joined the OCC in 1992, except 1999 and 2000 when he didn't enter.

On January 19, 1958 "Daddy Bray officiated



Athletics Report



He has been showing us his style at OCC for three years. He started on the Hau Terrace, and then moved to the Koa Lanai. He recommends the fresh fish.


