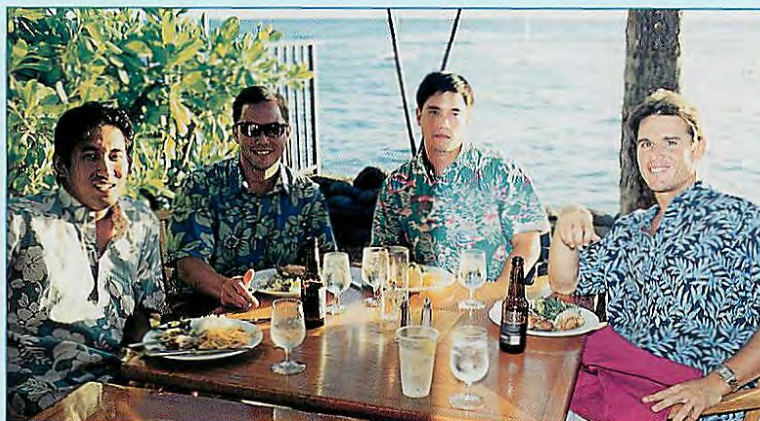

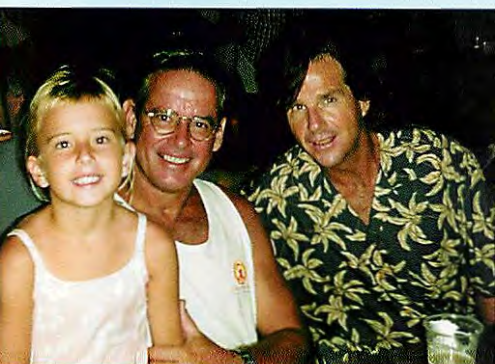

The trades were blowing, making the race very competitive. Surf was breaking across the OCC channel giving paddlers a wave to catch on the ride in to the finish line.

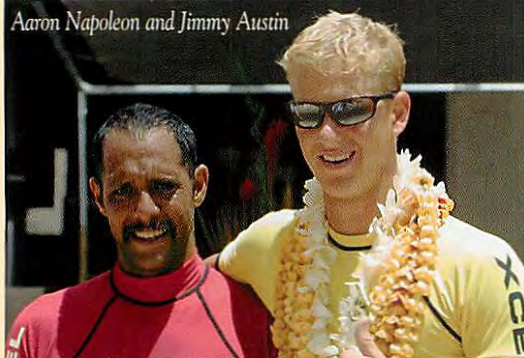

President's Message

I would like to thank all of you who took the time to complete the recent Club survey. The response rate was extremely high and helps to validate the results. These results have been compiled and will now be used by the committees and the Board to help determine what steps we can take to improve services and facilities.

Most areas of Club operations, services and activities received good to excellent ratings but there is always room for improvement and, consistent with prudent financial constraints, we will strive to put in place many of your suggestions. You may begin to see some of this in the near future.

One aspect that received significant comment across all membership categories was the desire for a better fitness facility. This is something that we started to look at a couple of years ago in conjunction with a larger Master Plan for upgrades to the physical plant.

The survey results validate the need for this and we will continue work on this project which is of a longer term nature and complicated by zoning and building restrictions. Stay tuned.

The use of cellular phones has recently made news with New York State's restriction of their use in vehicles to a hands free mode only. Closer to home, many clubs, restaurants, and other establishments are placing restrictions on when and where they are used.

I personally know of two clubs, one on the mainland and one in Hong Kong where cell phone use is not permitted anywhere on the premises.

As many of you already know, at the Outrigger we have extended the ban on cell phones to include the Hau Terrace, Bar and Lounge areas in addition to the already existing ban in the Koa Lanai. This includes ringing as well as talking.

If you feel you must take a call please put your phone on some silent mode and before answering go out to the sand, the Snack Shop area or the Lobby. To avoid embarrassment, please inform your guests of this policy. The staff have been asked to enforce this rule so please cooperate with them.

We have a wonderful location and a beautiful view which can best be appreciated in a relaxed atmosphere. Please help to maintain that.

Club Roster Update

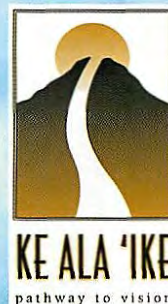

Gold medalists are persons who donate \$1,000 or more to the Foundation in one year.

The Board was able to award 22 scholarships for a total of \$17,500, eight athletic grants to individuals for a total of \$6,300 and 13 grants to teams for a total of \$12,500.

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OCC Wins Kaupiko and OCHRA Regattas

The headline in the *Honolulu Advertiser* on July 16 read, "Outrigger Canoe Club Returns to Glory". After being a bridesmaid in four regattas this season where they lost by two point margins, OCC paddled to victory in the John D. Kaupiko Regatta, July 15 at Keehi Lagoon.

Outrigger scored an overwhelming 97 points to second place Hui Nalu's 72.

OCC won 11 of the events to amass its winning total, the highest of the season.

The victory was achieved after Lanikai Canoe Club, which had won four regattas, scored only 50 points, and finished in fourth place. Lanikai paddler Jim Foti was quoted saying, "Lanikai fell flat on our faces. I'm not sure why, but we just weren't in it from the beginning."

Outrigger Head Coach Kehau Kali was very pleased with the Club's showing. "We're peaking at just the right time," she added. "All of our crews had good races. Our men won three races, which helped us pick up the winning points."

In the Oahu Hawaiian Canoe Racing Association championships on July 22, OCC again proved they have it, winning the Oahu's by a wide margin, 83-61 over Lanikai. The win was Outrigger's 13th OCHRA championship in the past 17 years.

OCC won 10 of the 36 races, and qualified 29 crews for the Hawaiian Canoe Racing Association championships August 4 at Hanalei, Kauai. Results of states will be reported next month.

The Girls 15 crew went through the season undefeated. They were also undefeated as 13s and 14s the past two years.

"We've been a really steady club all season," Kali said. "Coaching for the kids crews has been excellent. We've continued to score points in nearly every race we enter. The women started strong and have continued to place well. Bill Danford has built the men's program race by race, paddler by paddler."

In the seven regattas, Outrigger had two wins, was second four times, and finished fourth once. "I'd like to thank all of the paddlers who have practiced hard and raced well all summer. I'd like to thank their families who have supported them at all the regattas. Thanks also goes to those who set up our tent every week, trailered our canoes to the race site, held boats, handled registration and supported our canoe racing program. It's been a good season," Kali added.

Fabulous Response to the Club Survey

The management and the House Committee would like to thank the membership for its outstanding response to the Membership Survey, conducted by Market Trends Pacific. The survey was mailed on March 5th and returned on March 19th.

The participants were selected randomly and were representative of the Senior, Regular, Associate and Intermediate member categories. In addition, the survey could be picked up at the Front Desk by any member who wanted to fill it out.

Participating members were entered into a drawing. Ikaika Anderson won free locker rental, Rand Potts received lunch for four on the Hau Terrace, Barbara Norfleet won dinner for four on the Hau Terrace, and last but not least, Brant Ackerman will enjoy a dinner for four on the Koa Lanai.

Participation in this important study will help the Club supply better services and higher quality to our members. The Market Trends Pacific staff reported the return of our survey was higher than the norm, making the data extremely reliable.

The results indicated that overall satisfaction of the Club is high. In general, the members suggest the Koa Lanai could offer better value and the Hau Terrace better service. There is strong support for a better Fitness Center, more member canoe and kayak storage, new beach chairs, more seating capacity at the Snack Shop and improved shopping, including website shopping in the Logo Shop. Useful "tracking questions" were also tabulated.

We want the members to know, the Board, the committees and management are listening. Formal presentations of the survey results were made by Market Trends Pacific to the Board of Directors and the House

Committee. Copies of the reports are being distributed to all of the standing committees. The House Committee and management have informed the Board of responses already in the works.

The Koa Lanai menu already reflects lower fresh fish and other pricing. The Hau Terrace management team has been supplemented, provided with wireless communication devices to improve their effectiveness and supported with additional "food runners". Training is being reviewed.

Look for the "Bring 4 and Get One Free After 8" Koa Lanai Program. Any party of four or more after 8 p.m. in the Koa Lanai on any night of the week excluding Sunday and holidays (Thanksgiving, Christmas Eve, Christmas and New Years Eve) will receive the lower priced entree for free. Reservations must be for 8 p.m. or later. This does not apply to private parties using the private rooms.

Also, be on the lookout for a great new Monday through Thursday "happy hour" in the bar. Fabulous pricing on drinks and pupu is in store.

Check out the new and improved member's canoe and kayak storage and new beach chairs. The Logo Shop is working on web shopping.

You should be aware there is an Ad Hoc Master Plan Committee that includes all Committee Chairs. Timing is not established nor decisions made, but three architectural studies have been drawn of alternative solutions for improving the physical Club facility. A new Fitness Center is included in all three studies.

Great job members, your survey responses are much appreciated and a big help.

New Wines by the Glass

Management would like to thank the members who participated in the various wine tastings conducted at the Club to help determine the new wines to be offered by the glass.

The new medium priced Chardonnay that was selected is Heron from California. The aromas are of lush pear, peach and citrus followed by intense fruit flavors. This wine has a nice weight on the palate and a light toasty vanilla finish. The Heron replaces the Eschol.

Another new Chardonnay is Kendall-Jackson Camelot Vineyard from the Santa Maria Valley. This wine has aromas of ripe tropical fruit with toasty oak spice, layers of ripe papaya and melon fruit flavors with a creamy texture, toasty vanilla oak notes and an enduring finish. This wine will replace the Franciscan.

Our new Cabernet Sauvignon is Blackstone from California. This wine has rich supple fruit surrounded by elegant creaminess, supple oak flavors and firm tannins. The Blackstone replaces the Christophe.

The new Merlot is Santa Alicia from Chile. This wine is concentrated, ripe and balanced with a dollop of blueberry flavors and aromas and a good backbone of tannin that finishes with a hint of mint. The Santa Alicia replace the Kendall-Jackson Merlot.

We still offer Cavit Pinot Grigio and Buena Vista Sauvignon Blanc by the Glass. Come on down to the Club to try these new wines.

Frequently Asked Questions

Members often have questions about the Club but are not sure where to go for the answers. We have tried to answer some of them for you. If you have other questions that you would like addressed, please submit them at the Front Desk. It is not necessary to sign your name.

Q. How can a member obtain a kayak or canoe stall?

A. There is presently a waiting list for kayak and canoe stalls. To be put on the waiting list, a member should fill in and submit an application which is available at the Business Office.

Q. How can a member obtain a clothes locker?

A. A member should see the Locker Room

Attendant. Surfboard lockers and single lockers are \$8 per month. Double lockers are \$12 per month.

Q. Is there a Happy Hour at the OCC?

A. Yes. On Monday through Thursday, from 5 to 6 p.m., standard well drinks, draft beer and OCC Chardonnay and Cabernet by the glass are half price. Also, there is a 25% discount on all items on the Hau Terrace pupu menu, except for sashimi.

Q. Which cocktails are special to the OCC only?

A. The Club has several special cocktails: the Rabb Guild, a blend of mint lemonade and Vodka.; the Alice Guild (the non-alcoholic version); the Henry, a blend of passion fruit

wisdom were my mantra all the way across the channel.

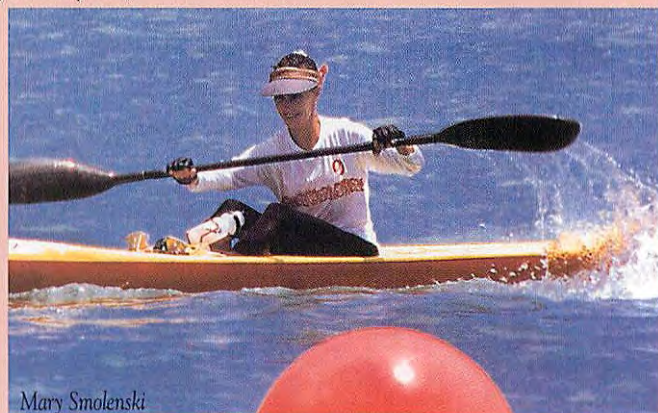

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The American Club, Shanghai

(Editor's Note: Member Ferne Weiner recently visited the American Club in Shanghai. She shares her experience in visiting this reciprocal club.)

Located atop a sparkling new glass tower office building, on the 29th floor, is this wonderful club, with views galore of the amazing Shanghai skyline. The entry is spectacular and floor-to-ceiling windows offer a panoramic, 180 degree vista. The cocktail lounge, with pianist, provides elegant calm. Service is superb and attentive, reminiscent of times past.

Two types of dining are offered: there is a choice of Western Cuisine (the American Grill), or Chinese fare (The Noble Court Restaurant).

We chose the American Grill as a change after eating Chinese food twice a day for two and a half weeks. The menu features, first, a page of daily Chef's selections. Six or seven pages of varied choices follow, such as non-frozen, chilled beef from Australia and the USA.

Many items are imported, all flown from areas of regional specialties throughout Asia and Australia, and the U.S. The menu is comprehensive and extensive with grilled entrees, seafood, a set dinner, steaks and chops, etc., etc.

The food delivered what it promised. Our cream of white asparagus soup, garnished with black truffles, was a subtle taste delight. My husband chose a New York strip steak with a perfect accompaniment of potatoes and vegetable in an eye-catching presentation. My lobster thermidor was outstanding and unusual in its asian flair with a spicy soy-based sauce. For dessert we chose a green tea ice cream which was flavorful and appealing.

Including cocktails, our meal, with superb service, cost approximately \$135, USD. What a wonderful evening in Shanghai! We would highly recommend the American Club.

We fought gamely against Balboa to stay in the gold Division, but lost both games. It turned out we had the toughest pool on day two with two top four finishers overall.

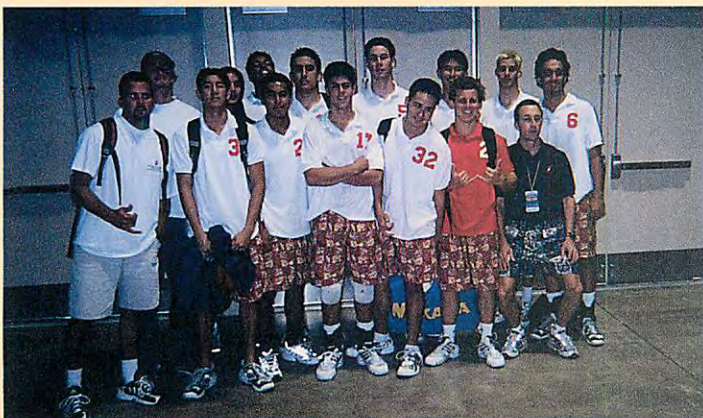

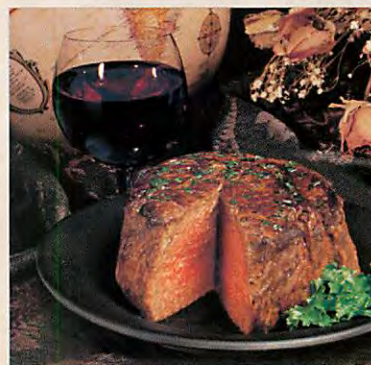

We Get Letters

Canoe clubs participating in the first Macfarlane Regatta, July 4, 1943, were OCC, Hui Nalu, and Healani. Waikiki Surf wasn't formed until 1947 or 1948. Check it out with George Downing and/or Wally Froiseth.

The Outrigger Canoe Club had three racing canoes then, i.e., (#1) The Leilani, (#2) Kakina, and (#3) Hanakeoki. If we could round up four more paddlers, male or female, we used the Eleu (actually a fishing hull canoe, much shorter and slower.) If you weren't in the Leilani or Kakina, you wouldn't win and if you paddled the Eleu, you were guaranteed to lose.

In 1951, I was chairman of the Canoe Committee and Acting Club Captain for Canoe Competition. For two or three years, the new Waikiki Surf dominated all canoe races. Starting in January, I contacted every old timer (Arnott, O'Brien, Ekstrand, B. Bush, Ackerman, Pflueger, etc.) to come out of retirement and the post WW II changes, (i.e., marriages, career jobs, return to school, etc.), plus all the more active younger members.

"Beat Waikiki Surf was our cry."

In February we started practicing once weekly; in March twice weekly; every day in April and May. On June 11th, we took first and second in every race but one. On July 3rd John D. Kaupiko, Hui Nalu Coach, refused to race us saying, "OCC with two teams would use one canoe to block other contestants leaving one OCC canoe to win."

Sam Fuller, Wilfred Godbold and Tommy Kiakona joined me in attempting to change his thinking, but to no avail. John D. was an old and good friend.

When he pulled out of the July 4th race, Healani and Waikiki Surf joined him and raced on the Ala Wai.

OCC teams raced each other at Waikiki that day, one team in the Leilani and the other in the Kakina.

Surf was quite high and there were many swampings. It was fun but not the same without the other teams. This led to the founding of the OHCRA and the end of canned salmon, tomatoes, onions and poi lunches with Duke, John D., Charley Amalu, Gay Harris, and myself.

Treasurer's Report - Insurance renewals were 11.9% more than the expiring premiums. . . The general liability policy will add Club members as additional insureds on the policy.

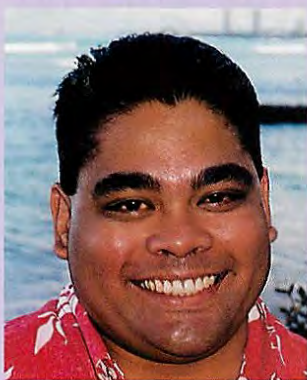

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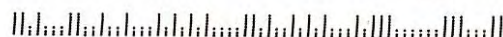
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
