

The Society of Military Widows meets twice a month, once for lunch and once for business. Kathy Cooper entertained a group of 40 in our Koa Lanai for one of


their regular lunches, and they had an Ikebana demonstration in our beautiful setting.


Club President Jim and Kelly McMahon had an enjoyable evening dining at the Club with long time friends Art and Carol Katz. They were observing Carol's birthday. .



The Green Flash Is Back at OCC

This natural treat has inspired poets, novelists, explorers and sailors, and we at OCC are lucky enough to see it fairly often. When people tell you it's a myth, it rarely happens, or they've never seen it, here is some information to help you tell the truth.

The green flash can be photographed; we have such a picture in the Bar. Therefore, it has nothing to do with the persistence of the complementary color in the retina after one stares at the setting sun.

The green flash can be seen more than once in the same viewing; if you are in a canoe or on a boat on a wave, you can see it on the rise, and then when the boat falls with the wave action, you can see it again.

The green flash can occur at sunrise but it is more difficult to witness because you cannot follow the sun in advance.

The green flash, although usually green, can be blue-green, bluish, or even violet. You probably wouldn't recognize another color as the green flash phenomena, just another gorgeous sunset in Paradise!

You can see it away from the ocean, from anyplace actually, all you need is a clear view of the upper rim of the sun's disc nearly touching the horizon. If this horizon is not the ocean, but something elevated-like a mountain-the sun will be too bright to look at for eye safety.

You need dispersion, absorption and scattering of the components of sunlight. When most of the orange and yellow light is absorbed by the atmosphere, and the light of the longer wave



length has already set below the horizon, there is nothing left but a narrow green rim.

What happens is analogous to a rainbow, but in the green flash other colors are eliminated by certain gases and natural dust in the air.

Since the shift to green truly is a flash, if you blink, or look away for an instant, you will miss it. Also, if you stare (as we usually do on the Hau Terrace) at the setting sun, it will be more difficult to see. Looking toward the setting sun too soon causes the eyes to become less sensitive to green color.

Check the paper for the exact time of sunset (from where you are--remember for every 15 miles of distance there is a variation of a minute for sunset time).

Look up occasionally, watching the sun progressing toward the horizon. Do not stare. Stretch out your arm and raise a thumb to help block the glare. You want to only look at the "set time".

There is a book called *The* Green Flash and Other Low Sun Phenomena by Daniel O'Connell, who studied the flash and other aspects of astronomy and astrophysics. His book was printed in 1958 and is considered a definitive work for scientists and lay


people.

As for historical references, ancient Egyptians referred to the green color occurring with the sunrise. Celtic folklore calls the flash a living light that has healing emanations. Jules Verne

brought written attention to it in 1882. The Great Gatsby (F. Scott Fitzgerald) observed the "green light" at the end of a dock.

And the best quote of all is from Joseph Conrad who recalls in the sea "the wealth of green infinite and varied...you and the sea...the good strong sea, the salt, the bitter sea, that could whisper to you and roar at you and knock your breath out of you...weary eyes looking still, looking always, for something that is already gone, passed unseen in a sigh, in a flash."

Dad Center Race

This year's Dad Center race was changed from a nine member crew to a 10 member crew format for the first time. Since all other long distance races leading up to Molokai raced with 10 member crews, the Canoe Racing Committee decided to make the change. Racing conditions over the 24 mile course were optimal as the windward side from Lanikai to Makapuu Point was relatively calm, and the run from Makapuu Point to Outrigger full of surf to ride.

With many paddlers returning to the women's program after a year's hiatus, coaches Tom McTigue and Liz Perry utilized this race to evaluate potential.

Hui Nalu won the race by taking advantage of 1998 winner Waimanalo Canoe Club as it bailed during one of its weaker rotations. Puuwai of Kauai was third and Lokahi was fourth.

Mahalo to the men's crews for rigging the canoes for the women. Outrigger may not win every race but its equipment is unequivocally the best. The women paddlers also sincerely appreciated the expertise of Kala Judd, Courtney Seto and Walter Guild who offered to escort each the crews.

Queen Liliuokalani Races

One hundred and six women's crews entered the annual Queen Liliuokalani Races over the Labor Day weekend, including five open women's crews from the Outrigger. This 18mile race from Kona Bay to Honaunau is now an iron race, meaning no crew changes. Only those crews entered as Masters or in malia canoes are permitted crew changes, and must start 15 minutes after the open crews.

The race started on time (quite a feat in canoe racing in Hawaii these days) on a glorious Kona morning.

OCC 1 steered by Kisi Haine captured 1st place in the Koa Division and an impressive 6th place overall finish. It was quite a sight to see the Kaoloa glide through the beautiful blue-green water at Honaunau, and the crowd that gathered at the finish roared both its approval and appreciation. The race was won by Waimanalo Canoe Club 1, followed by Offshore, Hui Nalu 1, Tahiti, and Waimanalo 2.

Kona is a world class event that has everything for every paddler—elite competition, wide open participation (for anyone over age 16), gorgeous venue, powerful ohana, and just the best party.

For the women's program, this race was important in terms of developing future talent as two novice crews were able to participate.

Mahalo nui to our hardworking Canoe Racing Committee for helping to make that happen. Coaches Tom McTigue and Liz Perry were also gratified by the level of conditioning all the crews demonstrated.

Member Vladimir Ossipoff opened bids received from contractors for Club improvements to add a cocktail lounge and move the soda fountain. Visitors to the Club: Mr. and Mrs. Jimmy Stewart, Admiral W. A. "Bull" Halsey.

34 Years Ago — 1965

The annual Shipwreck Party was a time when the worse you looked the more likely you were to win a prize. You could wear a limu lei. Music was by Ken Alford and his Dixiecats; \$2.50 per person.

In a page of cartoons for OCC Club Week, activities spoofed included mountain ball, bridge and bikini watching.

30 Years Ago -1969

On October 19, the Molokai-Oahu race went off in calm seas and cloudless skies with very little wind. A hot, dull day. The water sat there, neither a help nor a hindrance, making it monotonous and miserable for paddlers. There was no help from the steady sea, just hard man-killing work. No wind for an extra little push. Finishing in front of the Hawaiian Village, OCC came in second behind Waikiki Surf Club.

Oktoberfest was sold out, a "swing affair with some wild dancing on the Hau Terrace."

Member Dr. Harry Huffaker made good on his second attempt at crossing the Alenuihaha Channel between Hawaii and Maui. The following day, another solo channel crossing was made by Tommy Holmes who paddled by himself across the Molokai Channel in an 18-foot outrigger canoe. Time was nine hours in light seas. No escort accompanied him.

25 Years Ago —1974

Edward J. Mullers returned to the staff as Dining Room Manager. Mullers was with the Club in earlier years departing in 1971. Before returning to OCC, Mullers operated his own restaurant in Lahaina for two years.

OCC members signed up for a Tahiti trip, round-trip fare: \$293.

OCC won two of the three long distance paddles, winning the Dad Center Memorial Canoe Race for Women, and the Duke Kahanamoku race. The Dad Center race is named for the long-time OCC member and local international sports figure. Dad is credited with being the father of Hawaiian outrigger canoe racing in the early 1900s and did much to develop sports programs at OCC.

Parking lot construction was postponed indefinitely and storage areas converted into stalls. Bar drinks were raised 10 cents and beer 5 cents.

10 Years Ago — 1989 Peter A. Balding, President

Australia was host to the newest international outrigger canoe race, located off the Queensland coast along the Great Barrier Reef. By virtue of winning last year's Molokai to Oahu canoe race, OCC was invited by the Hamilton Club. Host Keith Williams, owner and developer of Hamilton Island was one of the primary forces in starting up outrigger canoe racing in Australia.

The 25-mile race course ran around Dent, Hamilton and Pentecost islands in rough seas.

In the series on the Winged "O", John McMahon is featured; the awardee in 1976. One of the Club's best known and most loved members, he was one of the original innovators and organizers of the first major surfing contest anywhere in the world, including the Makaha Surfing classic. The Peruvian International Surfing Championships saw John carrying the banner of the OCC. There, he was guest, judge and darling of the senoritas. It would be safe to say that without John McMahon's concern for young people at the OCC, our surfing program would not have been what it became.

The 2nd annual Outrigger Invitational Water Polo Tournament was held in front of the Club on July 29, and reported in October.

OCC's 81st annual Luau saluted Alex Anderson, writer of many songs including Lovely Hula Hands.

The overall winner of the 5th annual Cline Mann Paddleboard Race was Pete Johnson with a time of 32 minutes, 20 seconds in the 5,000-meter race.

Outrigger men traveled to Catalina for the annual Catalina to Newport canoe race. OCC was about 1 1/2 hours from the finish line when the boat flipped. The crew righted the boat in some five minutes and still managed to finish a close second.

The Board of Directors increased initiation fees for Regular, Nonresident and Intermediate memberships, effective October 1.

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

Jay describes himself as single but not available, and lives very near OCC in Waikiki, close to the surf!


