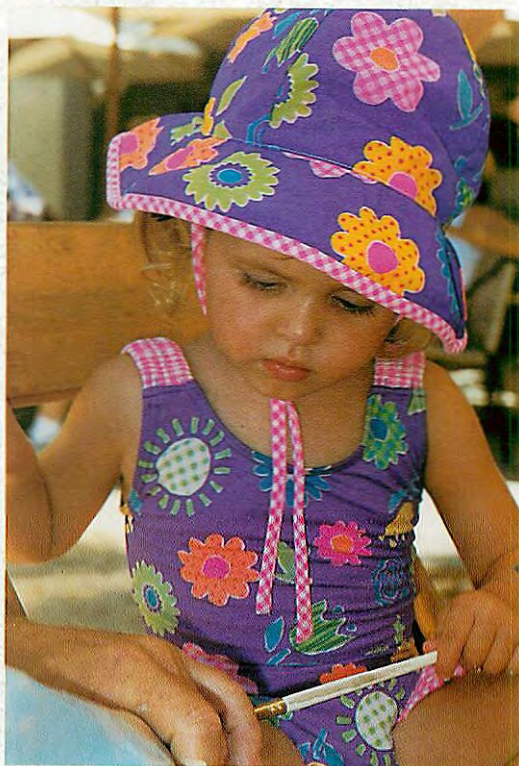

# 16th Annual OCC Photo Contest

After two rounds of review, the judges selected Julia's photo that was entered in the Junior category. Although several photos were initially considered, the judges eventually unanimously selected Julia's entry.

# Dr. Alexander Malahoff Presents Stew Rice Night Lo'ihī Hawaii's Undersea Volcano, January 25

"I gazed on a fantastic, jagged undersea landslide, just 47 days old. No human had seen it before. I was 4,357 feet below the sea, at the very bottom of a brand-new pit crater in Lo'ihī, an undersea volcano . . . The sights we saw were straight out of a science-fiction movie . . .

"We found ourselves close enough to a vertical wall to be entombed if a landslide happened to come down it. And judging from the relatively fresh piles we had seen, there had been frequent landslides . . . All around us, hot vents shimmered in our lights . . . we were snapped out of our engrossment by the unmistakable, high-frequency rattle over the hydrophone of rocks sliding down

the inner walls of the crater . . . Landslide!"

That was Dr. Alexander Malahoff giving an account, in Scientific American Presents, of the harrowing moment when he found himself in the path of a landslide as he sat submerged some 4,000 feet below the surface of the ocean about 21 miles off the south coast of the Big Island.

To find out how that cliffhanger was resolved and to enjoy a whole evening of other fascinating, riveting detail about nature's explosive violence that is creating our newest Neighbor Island and venting a bizarre life form possibly much like the very first of Earth's life forms, please join us for a slide show/lecture by the distinguished Dr. Malahoff at OCC's January 25th stew-rice

Alexander Malahoff is professor of geological oceanography and director of the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration's National Undersea Research

Laboratory at the University of Hawai'i at Manoa. He holds a bachelor of science degree in geology from the University of New Zealand; a master of science degree in geology from Victoria University of Wellington; and a doctor of philosophy degree in geophysics, UH.

Further, he is loaded down with honors including the Medal for Meritorious Service from the U.S. Department of Commerce.

Withal, Malahoff is a most engaging speaker, whom we are honored and privileged to have as our next Historical Committee guest presenter. You won't want to miss this opportunity.

Event details: Monday, 25 January 1999. No-host cocktails are at 5:30 p.m. Supper—OCC's traditional stew-rice buffet—begins at 6:00 o'clock. Dr. Malahoff takes the spotlight at 7:00 o'clock and will answer questions at the end of his presentation.

**O**n January 11 the Outrigger Canoe Club will celebrate the 35th anniversary of its move to the "new location" at the foot of Diamond Head.

The New Year's Eve party at the "old Club" in 1963 was a night to remember. Not only did it commemorate the end of an old year, but it marked the end of the "old" Outrigger as well. When the Clubhouse shut its doors at the stroke of midnight on December 31, it shut down for good, bringing an end to nearly 55 years of social and athletic activities and the many traditions that developed over the years at that location in the very heart of Waikiki.

January 11, 1964

On January 11, 1964, a moving dedication ceremony was held which would celebrate not only a new beginning for the Club, but a successful outcome after years of uncertainty and dissension that nearly brought about the demise of the Outrigger Canoe Club.

As the day's events began in mid-afternoon, hundreds of members and visitors gathered on the beach at Waikiki as a flotilla of 10 outrigger canoes made their way across the water from the new premises at Diamond Head.



The flotilla was reenacted 10 years ago on Club Day to celebrate the 25th Anniversary of the OCC at Diamond Head.

The beloved kahu of Kawaiaha'o Church, Reverend Abraham Akaka, presided over the ceremony which brought tears to the eyes of many old-timers.

Some people were concerned that a light rain which began earlier in the day would continue and dampen the festivities. However, most regarded the mauka showers as a Hawaiian blessing and when the ceremony began at 3:30 in the afternoon, the sky was clear and the sun beamed auspiciously down upon the gathering.

Reverend Akaka blessed each of the canoes with water sprinkled from a koa umeki once used by King Kamehameha the Great. He then anointed an area of sand on the beach and each of the participants in the ceremony took up a handful and placed it in the calabash.

leading the way. Reverend Akaka sprinkled sand from the calabash into the waters fronting the site, and President Russell cut the maile lei draped across the beach entrance.

#### Dedication Prayer

After Reverend Akaka sprinkled the remaining sand upon the grounds, he delivered a moving prayer of dedication in which he said, "We pray now for Thy blessings upon this new site, its facilities, its officers and directors, its members and families, its staff and employees - the men and women - children and youth - present and to come - that the noble spirit and high purpose of the Outrigger Canoe Club may be continued in them all."

From beginning to end, the ceremony was filled with high emotions...feelings of both sadness and joy; sadness at leaving behind a place so dear to the hearts of so many; a place filled with irreplaceable memories; feelings of joy and great expectations for the promising future that lay ahead; and relief that at last the uncertainty and dis-

sension of the past few years had been laid to rest and a bright new beginning appeared on the horizon.

#### The Procession Begins

The canoes then slowly reentered the water and headed out toward the open ocean in single file, following the Leilani steered by Duke Kahanamoku and a crew consisting of old-timers Jack McKenzie, Johnny Hollinger, Gay Harris and Charley Amalu.

Next came a double canoe on whose platform stood Outrigger president Ward Russell and Reverend Akaka carrying the sand-filled calabash. Dozens of surfers paddled their boards behind the canoes.

About 100 yards off shore the canoes formed a perfect circle as Reverend Akaka cast leis into the water, a memorial to departed members. At that very moment a brilliant rainbow appeared over Manoa Valley. As the flotilla proceeded toward Diamond Head, a circle of leis bobbed on the water before floating back toward shore.

The flotilla then proceeded to the new Club, the double canoe

#### A New Tradition

Following the ceremony, the first tradition at the new site was established when hundreds of members partook of a grand lu'au. The food service and entertainment stretched far beyond the dazzling sunset.

That the outcome had been so successful, that so many obstacles had been overcome, that the Club's future was now secure, was due to the unstinting work and dedication of many loyal members who tirelessly worked to achieve the happy ending and new beginning that this day signified.

#### President Ward Russell

First among those whose efforts were instrumental in shaping the future of the Outrigger during that time of crisis was J. Ward Russell Jr. who served as president from 1960 to 1964, one of the most critical periods in Club history.



Russell is quick to pass credit to others who worked diligently along with him...Cline Mann, Wilford Godbold, Leslie Hicks, Herbert "Yabo" Taylor, Hal Whitaker and many others. But Russell himself was the one who guided the negotiations, the planning, executing, and most importantly, the decision-making during those critical times.

A low-key personality, Russell does not possess the charismatic presence of Abraham Akaka or the athletic prowess of Duke Kahanamoku; heads don't turn when he enters a room; but the soft-spoken former State legislator, originally from Hilo, has been a pillar of strength and wisdom who has served the Club well during the nearly 50 years that he has been a member.

#### Rough Waters Ahead

Even before 1960 there was a growing sense of dissatisfaction spreading throughout the many segments of the membership. As the tourist industry grew up around the Club site, the once ideal loca-

tion brought about previously unknown problems. Many parents were concerned that the Club premises were too accessible and worried about the safety of their children when strangers wandered in off the beach.

Others, as the end of the lease on the property drew ever closer, took strong stands against moving the Club to the Elks Club site. Some preferred relocating over the Pali at Kailua Beach. Others

staunchly fought to remain at the old site.

Membership in the Club began to decline with nearly 300 members sending in their resignations during 1960, a time when strong membership was tantamount to survival. One of Russell's first acts as president was to form a special Membership Committee with L. Harold (Hal) Whitaker as chairman.

Although Whitaker worked tirelessly at the job, few new members could be enticed into joining a club with such an uncertain future. An effort was also made to lure back the members who had resigned, offering reinstatement for a small fee. Even at that, there were few takers. Members of the Uluniu Women's Club were also invited to join at special rates, but not enough showed interest.

President Russell, in his speech to the members at the 1963 Annual Meeting said that "The problem facing the Board is that we have had little to offer existing members and prospective members in terms of specific plans for the

future."

in 1962, the Club presently boasts of 4,303 members, with more than enough applications on file to reach the limit of 4315.

Relaxing in a quiet corner of the Cocktail Lounge recently, munching on a handful of M & Ms (he is a notorious "chocoholic") Russell reminisced about those tumultuous days in the sixties. Although modest about his accomplishments, he must surely feel a deep sense of satisfaction knowing that the decisions he orchestrated 35 years ago were indeed the right ones. In 1987 Russell was honored

Russell, a Republican, should have been chosen by a Democratic administration for this vital assignment is a credit to his integrity and his ability to get things done.

Still an active Club member at 81, Russell, who retired after a 46 year career with Hawaiian Telephone Company, still serves on the Historical Committee where he has devoted his energies for the past 32 years. His attention has primarily been focused on the compilation of oral histories of Club members which have become an important part of the Club archives. Perhaps one of the most interesting ones is that of Russell himself, recorded in 1981 by Don Machado.

with a life membership at age 66 in acknowledgment of his many contributions to the Outrigger. He was the first member under the age of 80 to be so recognized.

This quiet unassuming leader was also the recipient of the coveted "O in Life" from Punahou School in 1982 for outstanding service not only to his alma mater but to the dozens of community organizations to which he has given unselfishly of his time, energy and talent throughout the years.

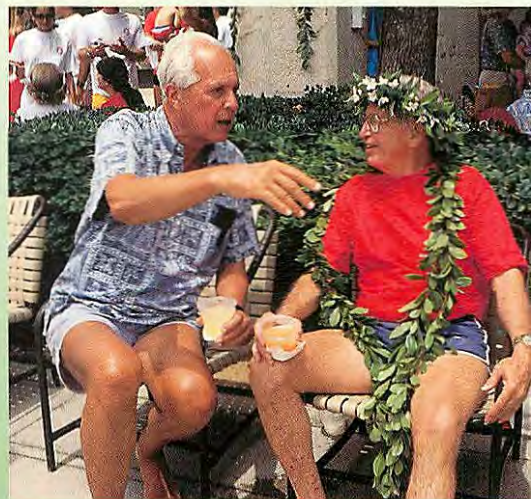
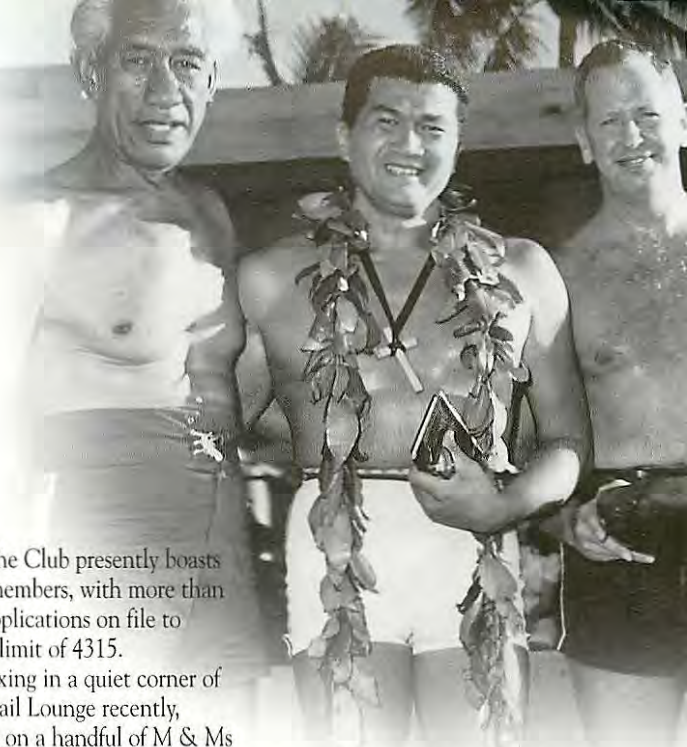
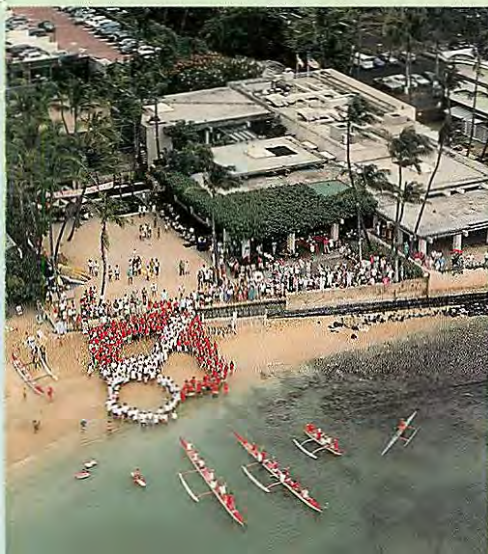

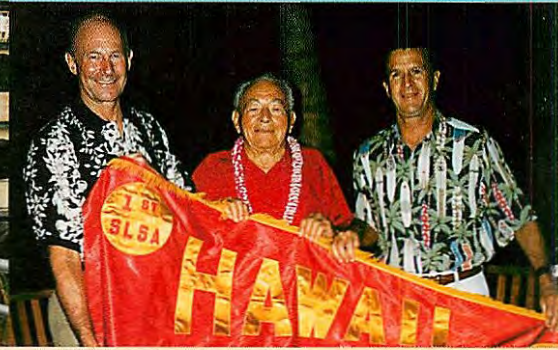
Duke Kahanamoku, who introduced the original Hawaiian surfboard to Australia years before, was an honored guest.

**A**s outgoing President of the ODKF, I hereby submit the annual report for 1997-98, and simultaneously thank all of you who donated to the Foundation this past year. We sincerely appreciate your support.

During this fiscal year we were able to distribute \$50,000 for 22 scholarships and 38 athletic grants, the first time we have been able to give this amount. I add that during this past year we also received the largest single donation ever. Thank you, Mrs. Muriel Flanders, for your boundless and continuing generosity.

My special thanks to the General Grants Committee, headed by Diane Stowell, for the many hours spent reading, verifying, and processing the 150 applications we received during the year. We truly regret that our existing budget lim-

ited our ability in making more funds available to more qualified people, especially the youth of Hawaii. In order to donate more funds to help these more deserving applicants we must continue to receive your financial support. Our goal remains to fulfill the requirements of the charter under which the ODKF was founded.

In this light, this coming year we will extend the knowledge, and the availability of our scholarship program, to more schools by initiating a program throughout the island school system, hoping to benefit more students, particularly on the neighbor islands. We feel Duke would applaud.

We have outgrown the available facilities at the Outrigger Canoe Club itself, resulting in our relocating our office and facilities to 1108 Fort Street Mall #10.

Thanks not only to the donors who provided furnishings and energy for this move, but also to those who provided the space to the Foundation.

I emphasize that our leaving the OCC in no way reflects a lack of support by, or interest of, the OCC itself. My personal thanks to the entire OCC Board, Mary Philpotts-McGrath, its President, and to Peter Nottage, our liaison representative, for their cooperation in assisting us in fulfilling the mission of the Foundation.

The Outrigger Canoe Club will continue to accept members' monthly donations for the Foundation, and will continue to provide *the Outrigger* magazine with timely news items about the Foundation.

Special thanks, too, to all the members of the ODKF Board of Directors, the special committee members and the consultants who have given so much of their time.

My personal thanks again, to all of you who helped make this year a success.

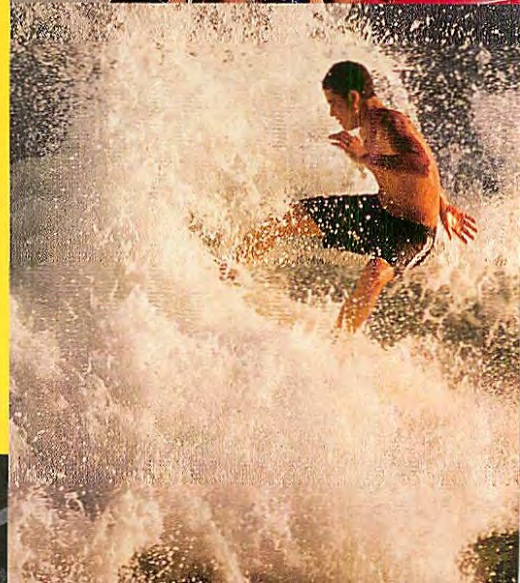
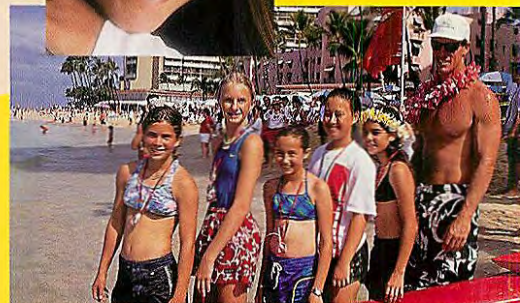

# Change of Address — We've Moved!

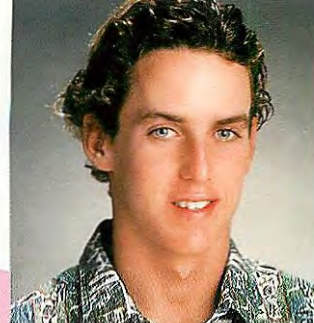

documents and supplies and getting settled has taken some time.

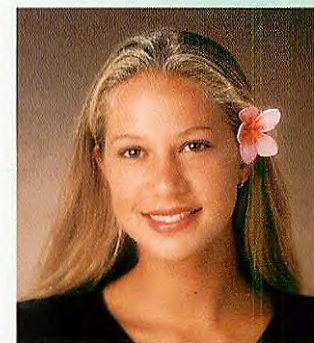

# Board Designated Funds

There are five Board Designated Funds:

The **Muriel Macfarlane Flanders Fund** established by Muriel Flanders for support of water sports, perpetuating the Macfarlane canoe races, and honoring the activities and accomplishments of Duke Kahanamoku.

The **Terrence McCarthy Fund** established by Terrence McCarthy in the memory of her husband Edmond McCarthy, who was a firm believer in the combination of athletic participation and education. Mrs. McCarthy is interested in support of our athlete-scholars in his memory.

The **Tom "Daddy" Haine Fund** established by the Board of Directors in 1994 at the time of his death. Funds are used in support, development and grants for the sport of volleyball. Haine was the Captain of the 1968 U.S. Olympic men's volleyball team. He was an 18 time USVBA All-American and in 1991 was inducted into the U.S. Volleyball Hall of Fame. He was a member of the original Outrigger Foundation which later merged with the Duke

Kahanamoku Foundation to form ODKF, and at the time of his death he was a member of the ODKF Grants Committee.

The **Kala Kukea Fund** established by the Board of Directors in 1996 and named for Kala Kukea, water sportsman who died in February, 1996, at the age of 52 while kayaking off shore Waikiki. In 1996 he posthumously received the Hawaiian Canoe Racing Association John DeRego Perpetual trophy for service to the Association and the Molokai/Oahu canoe race.

His own son, Nalu Kukea, was a recipient of ODKF funds for both athletic grants and scholarships while he was in college.

The **Cline Mann Fund**, named for John Cline Mann, water sportsman who died in 1996. He was captain of his Dartmouth swimming team, an avid small boat sailor in Sunfish and Scorpions, and taught sailing skills to junior sailors, many of them now champions.

Professionally a surveyor, an authority on Hawaiian lands and land boundaries, he was a retired

engineer and served as President of the Outrigger Canoe Club in 1964. In addition, he served on numerous committees, and was a walking historian of OCC as well as a recipient of the prestigious Winged "O" award for his contribution to Club athletics, and a life member of OCC.

A promotor of paddleboard racing and instrumental in the inauguration of three annual paddleboard races. In 1985, one of these races was officially named the Cline Mann 5,000 meter Paddleboard race. The first grant from the Cline Mann Fund went to this event in 1997.

A member of the original Board of Directors of the Duke Kahanamoku Foundation, founded in 1963 to honor Duke Kahanamoku during his lifetime, Cline played an important role in the merger of the two Foundations. The present Outrigger Duke Kahanamoku Foundation is now 12 years old.

Board Designated Funds are pooled for investment with other funds of the Foundation. Only the interest is used from each fund,

enabling the principal to continue to provide annual gifts in the name of the fund.

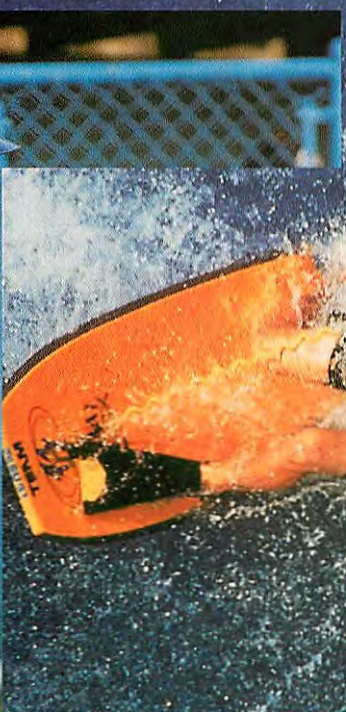

# Financial Report

The financial statements for the ODKF as of and for the year ended September 30, 1997 were audited by

PricewaterhouseCoopers. These financial statements are available to our members by request. This audit was mailed to 1997-98 donors on November 1, 1998.

At the Foundation's Annual Meeting on November 23, 1998, a report was made with regard to the Foundation's financial results for the fiscal year ending September 30, 1998. These financial statements are currently being reviewed by PricewaterhouseCoopers, and when that review is completed in early January 1999, financial statements will be made available to the members upon request.

Income to the Foundation comes from the donations of the Gold Medalists (those who give \$1000 or more), as well as loyal

donors who pledge a specific amount each month, and those who make an end of the year contribution.

This year we continued our fundraising through the sale of T-shirts at the annual 4th of July Macfarlane Canoe Races in Waikiki.

Scholarships for the year totaled \$19,000. Athletic Grants for the year totaled \$31,000.

Some funds are donated for a specific sport, and we encourage anyone who particularly wants to take advantage of the tax savings of supporting your favorite sport to investigate this gift giving option. Donations are also accepted in memoriam.

# Applications for Assistance

There are two types of grants made by the Foundation.

Athletic grants are usually for a specific purpose, or specific competition. These monies may be applied for at any time, and may be granted to an individual or to a team.

Scholarship grants are given once a year. Applications are accepted from January to March 15. If a grantee continues in school with satisfactory grades, he/she is given preference in succeeding years, but they must reapply for the grant annually.

## Scholarship and Grant Requirements

To qualify an applicant must:

- Be a resident of Hawaii and an American citizen.
- Have participated in competitive sports.
- Demonstrate financial need.

Submit:

- A personal letter of intention.
- A list of competitive sports, awards.
- A letter from an athletic coach or trainer.
- Federal tax return (or parent's if claimed as a dependent).
- A recent photo, preferably action.

In addition, Scholarship applicants must:

- Plan to attend an accredited college as a full time student in any major.
- Submit a transcript of grades.
- Submit two letters of reference.

In addition, Athletic Grant applicants must:

- Describe their training program.

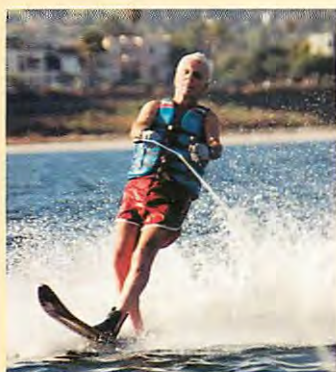

# New Winged "O" Jon Stanley Has Led OCC to Volleyball Titles in Four Decades

When Ron Sorrell telephoned leaving a number to call, Jon Stanley expected bad news. When Sorrell congratulated him on his designation as the 1998 Winged "O" honoree, relief was his first reaction. "At my age, you know, I thought the worst."

Stanley has been with the sport of volleyball since its infancy. The sport first caught his interest while he was at BYU in Provo, Utah playing varsity basketball. At that time, volleyball was simply a club sport. Upon graduating from BYU, Stanley came to Hawaii to take business graduate courses at UH.

"All my BYU acquaintances told me if I was looking for sand ball, I had to go to Outrigger." He fondly recalls the famous "sign up board", and playing with Dodge Parker, Paul McLaughlin, Ron Sorrell, Carl McGowan and Daddy Haine.

In 1964 volleyball became an Olympic sport, and Stanley was a member of the 1964, 1968 and 1972 teams.

Stanley recalls one of the most memorable events during this era was the 1967 Pan Am Games whose round robin tournament format would decide which team

would go on to the 1968 Olympic Games. Although the team struggled, the USA prevailed over Cuba in a rousing final to qualify the USA for the 1968 Olympics.

Stanley went on to play in the International Volleyball Association professional league in 1974. He played two years for the LA Stars along with Tom Madison and Dodge Parker; then another four years with the Denver Comets.

He has played his entire master career with the Outrigger Canoe Club. Over the past two decades, he has claimed various masters titles with teammates including Ilmar

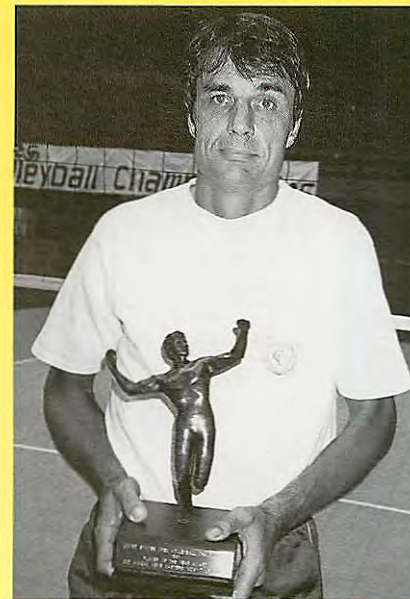
Tarikas, Chris Crabb, Randy Shaw, Charlie Jenkins, Daddy Haine, Jon Haneberg, Dave Shoji, Tom Selleck, Tony Crabb, Chris McLaughlin, Jim Bukes, Bill Baird, John Zabriskie, Tim Ralston, TC Gray, Jon Andersen, Mike Cote, Ralph Smith and Jay Anderson.

Jon currently works at the Army's Family Fitness Center. But his real interest remains rooted in volleyball. He coaches the Kaiser High School's varsity boys team and, for the past 10 years, the Hawaii Junior Volleyball Club which includes more than 100 boys and girls playing in various age group divisions (12s, 14s, 16s and 18s). He also assists at UH helping Coach Mike Wilton with the men's team which enables him to spend time on the court, teaching the game to the game's future stars.

He and his wife of two years, Tammie, have an eight month old son, Wil Maka'ala. Stanley is also proud of son and daughter, Clayton and Taeya, by a previous marriage.

"I never thought anything about being a Winged "O" before, but now I have this opportunity and I'm looking forward to supporting Winged "O" and its activities, and just being more involved with the Club."

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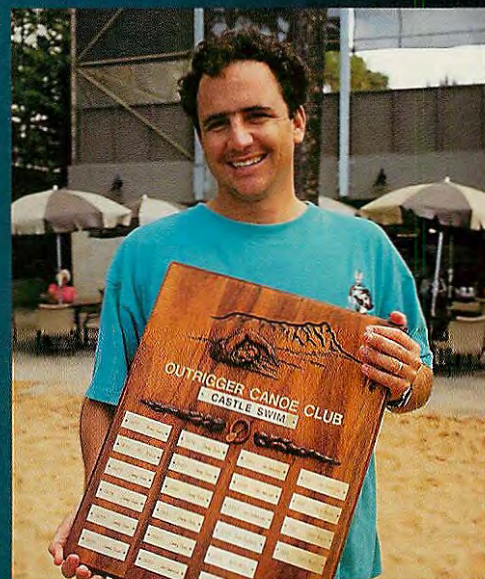
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## 24 Enter 25th Annual Castle Swim

## Reciprocal Club Review

*NOTE: Twenty-seventh in a series of Reciprocal Club Reviews, this month features the Pittsburgh Athletic Club.*

If you're heading to Pittsburgh either on business or possibly to visit a child attending one of the many colleges around such as Pitt or Carnegie Tech, then put a stop at the Pittsburgh Athletic Club on your agenda. The PAA is located 15 miles from the airport and approximately three miles from the downtown business, nightlife, major shopping, entertainment, and tour boat areas; and is situated in a cultural and educational hub. This club has been in existence for more than 85 years, and has 2,200 members.

PAA is known not only as a major social and fitness club, but also offers a place for you to stay. There are 13 private guest quarters, ranging from single rooms to one bedroom suites that have recently been redecorated. Room rates are singles from \$60-\$65, doubles from \$70-\$95, and suites are from \$85-\$95.

Guests may use the health and fitness center. Singles, ladies traveling alone, and children are all welcome. You may stay here for 14 days, and then renew for another 14 days. All rooms are air conditioned with private bath and color TV, and there is a 24 hour cancellation policy. Parking facilities are located in an adjacent lot.

There are three different venues

for dining—the Grill Room and Pub for lunch and dinner, and the Main Dining Room for breakfast as well as lunch and dinner. In the summer months the club is closed on Sundays, as well as most major holidays. There is also the Schenley Lounge for cocktails. Coat and tie are required in the Grill and MDR, but the Pub is more casual. Tipping is optional.

The health and fitness center is where this club really stands out. Imagine having your shoes cleaned while you're doing your workout! You can relax in jet spas, saunas and steam rooms, and enjoy massages. Ladies, you can relax in your own individual whirlpools and get pedicures and manicures. Child care will be provided if necessary. Gentlemen have their own Barber Shop. The fitness center has a crushed rubber tile floor to provide a more comfortable workout. The new exercise studio features a wooden floor under laid with small rubber balls to absorb each bounce. Equipment includes Stairmaster, Precor, NordicTrack ski exerciser, Quinton treadmills, a 15 ounce circuit of Icarian weight lifting equipment; the list goes on.

You may work out by yourself or with a personal trainer. There are running and walking tracks overlooking the full court gym and 25-yard swimming pool. There are single squash courts as well as handball and racquetball courts. The club's double squash court is one of only two in the

city and was the recent site of the Men's National Doubles Tournament. The club also offers billiards and a bowling alley, as well as a pro-shop to help with your equipment and clothing selections. There is a \$10 daily fee for use of athletic facilities.

You may not pay cash or use credit cards and you do need to have

an introductory card that will enable you to sign for charges. You may cash a check up to \$50. The fee for the guest card usage is 15%, but there are no additional service or administrative charges.

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# Board Briefs

**B**oard Briefs is taken from the minutes of the Board of Directors meeting on October 29, 1998 and the Executive Committee meeting on November 12, 1998.

**Treasurer's Report**—The Finance Committee recommends the Board ask the Bylaw Review Committee to review the existing Bylaws and refer the following suggested wording changes to Section 64 of the Bylaws to the review committee:

Checks and Other Instruments in Writing. All checks shall be signed by the General Manager and an officer designated by the Board of Directors or any two officers so designated except that checks of denominations less than [\$300] an amount designated by resolution of the Board of Directors may be signed by the General Manager and an employee designated by the Board. All contracts, evidences of indebtedness and other instruments in writing in excess of an amount designated by resolution of the Board of Directors shall be signed by the President and Secretary or such other officers as the Board may designate; contracts, evidences of indebtedness and other instruments in writing less than the amount designated by the Board of Directors shall be signed by an officer designated by the Board of Directors or the General Manager.

**Vice President of Activities**—The Board approved the use of OCC membership mailing labels for ODKF donations.

**Secretary's Report**—Nine members were suspended for 15 days due to failure to pay their accounts on time.

**Manager's Report**—Net income for September was \$23,491. . . There was a combined food and beverage income with the mini charge of \$3,640. . . Equipment for the Time Management System is on order and should arrive in November. . . The OCC Web Site should be up and running in December.

**Admissions and Membership Report**—Membership count was 4,301 as of September 30, 1998.

**Building & Grounds Report**—The Board approved the hiring of Garduque Architects to develop the Master Facility Upgrade Plan for the Club. . . The Board approved a special membership for one year for Ted Garduque and Buck Welch.

**House Report**—The Reciprocal Club survey of the various charges/fees/surcharges has been completed. It will be reviewed by the House Committee for recommendations.

**Athletic Report**—\$10,090 was approved for the Women's Molokai race and \$11,780 for the men's. . . The Board approved \$500 to send Robby Farrow to compete in the ASP Longboard Surfing Tour in the Canary Islands.

**Entertainment Report**—The new name for the Main Dining Room will be announced at the end of the year. . . 1999 events being considered are a big band dance party featuring "swing" and "40s" music for March 13 and Na Kupana Night, modeled after the ones that used to take place at the Moana Hotel many years ago in late spring or summer.

**Public Relations Report**—The 1999 OCC Calendars have been ordered and should be mailed to members by Christmas.

**Historical Report**—330 images, which is 12% of the Club's total photographic collection, have been scanned onto CD ROM disks. . . The Ka Mo'i canoe will be returned to the Club from the Hanalei Bay Hotel. Allan Dowsett will store the canoe.

**New Business**—Scrappy Lipton was nominated as chairperson for the Nominating Committee. . . Hal Henderson, Brant Ackerman and John Rader will meet to discuss the Bylaws preliminary revisions. . . 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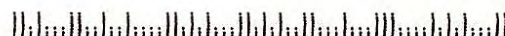
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
