On July 27 at 5 p.m. a swell rose on Kalakaua as 500 non-runners slowly proceeded to register for the 5th Annual Non Run Fun Festival. Warning had gone out that this was going to be the big one. The Running and Fitness Committees pleaded with their friends that they shouldn't miss it.

Those who wanted to avoid the panic tried to get to this event early as cars jammed along Kalakaua for those hoping to get a choice spot.

When Colleen Moore pulled the trigger on Jack Scaff's Marathon cannon after Guido Salmaggi finished his incredible diaphragm busting rendition of the Star Spangled Banner, the wave exploded into the sands of the OCC and 500 people rushed to the aid stations to save themselves from starvation.

First to attack the food were the Golden Fork tables, those knowledgeable groups that were alerted earlier of the event and paid a premium to have a reserved spot, first shot and cuts in line to insure their sustenance.

Flashing their golden fork throughout the evening, they were assured continued survival as the first aid was depleting.

For those injured and fatigued, there were several massage stations to work out the kinks and keep the bodies moving.

Music by Rolando Sanchez kept the crowd spirits high.

As the food ran out, Joe Teipel herded the crowd into a seating area to commence a lightning auction. The participants were mesmerized by the cacophony of bids being screamed out as valuable gift items were being auctioned off at great discounts.

Bob DeWitz had his hands full for those quieter bidders whose adrenaline can't stand this excitement of the live auction, and preferred the demeanor of a silent auction. Nora Meijide couldn't stand the pressure of the bidding so she silently contributed \$300 for the cause.

Most of the masses huddled throughout the evening awaiting the drawing of the grand prize—three days, two nights at the Orchid Hotel in Mauna Lani on the Big Island. The first pull of the ticket by Clarissa Schenele found a winner, much to the disappointment of the other 499 stub holders.

The restaurants had fun talking to old and new customers and meeting other restaurant sponsors. Jon Hunter photographed the activities, Laura Williams, Gerry DeBenedetti, Pokii Vaughan, Tom German, and Bill Bright fed and watered all the volunteers and distributed non-finishers t-shirts.

The crowd control was handled smoothly again by Carolyn Corrigan, Ruth Munro and Katherine Nicols. Registration was coordinated by Dawn Isa.

The Club management team set up the Club perfectly to handle the onslaught and insured a successful event. The combination of the casual atmosphere, the beach front setting, the moonlight reflecting off the ocean after sunset, with the excitement of sampling of 10 of Hawaii's most interesting restaurants mixed with the conviviality of 500 people reacquainting themselves with old friends, meeting new ones, and mingling all over the Club's grounds, created a magic evening and a synergy that left everyone with a smile on their face, a pleasant experience and a good feeling about the Outrigger Canoe Club. Several people asked to be sponsored into the Club.

As a fund raiser each year for the Running and Fitness committees, the money goes toward new equipment in the Fitness Center, new uniforms, the message tent at the Marathon, the Hana Relays and several other Neighbor Island races which benefitted more than 60 runners this year.

Mahalo to all those who sold and bought tickets. So be on the alert next year when you start to hear those tsunami sirens staffed by Bill Bright and Don Eovino. It could be even a bigger one.

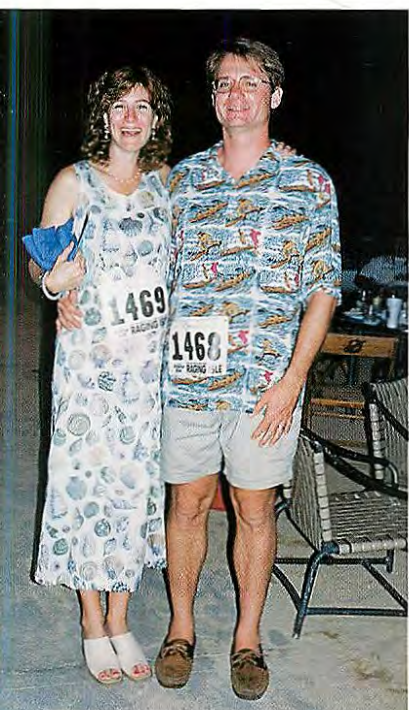

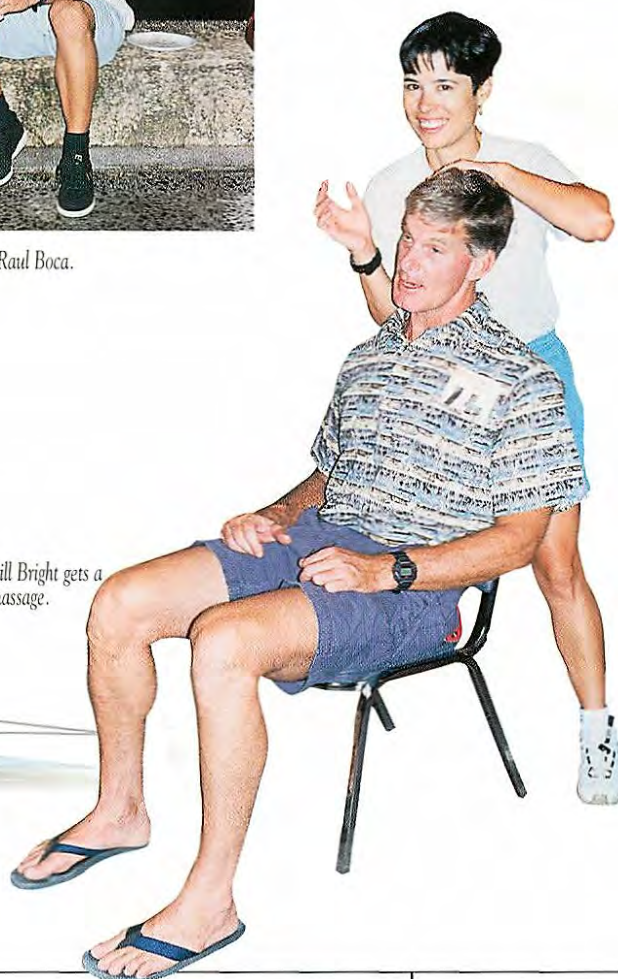

Outrigger Second in HCRA Championships

Six hours after some of the events finished, and 90 minutes after the last race concluded, the Hawaiian Canoe Racing Association announced the winner of the 1998 State Regatta, and much to the surprise of Outrigger paddlers, Kailua claimed the title in the AAA division.

Based on announcements and the postings of some of the races, most paddlers had figured Outrigger to be ahead of Kailua by one point. However, when the final results were announced, Kailua had 270 points to Outrigger's 262. Lanikai was third with 249, followed by Hawaiian with 207, Hui Nalu with 159, Lokahi with 121 and Malama Ula with 119.

The two races in which the

finishes were so close that the winners weren't determined until video tapes had been reviewed over and over by race officials were the Boys 13 and the Novice B Women. Outrigger won the Boys 13 and Kailua was second. Kailua won the Novice B race and Outrigger didn't have a crew entered.

Both Kailua and Lanikai had qualified a record 26 crews in this year's regatta. Outrigger qualified 21.

"Considering how many crews we each had, our paddlers did a fabulous job," said Head Coach David Buck. "I'm very proud of everybody. We were short paddlers all season long, so to finish this close in states was terrific."

"I want to thank everyone

who paddled for the Club this season, and all of the parents and family members who showed up every week to cheer us on. I especially want to thank all those paddlers who came out when we called them. It made the difference in having a crew to enter or not."

HCRA changed its scoring method this year so that every crew scored points, with a maximum of 14 points for the winner. Previously, only the top eight crews scored points. Under the old system, OCC would have won the regatta.

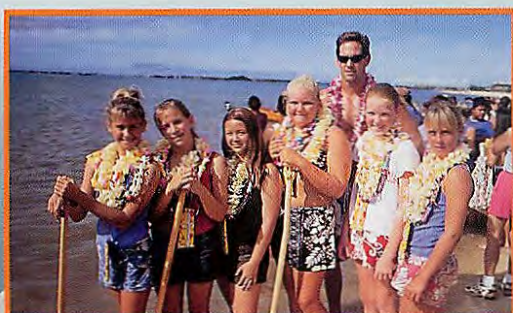
The distance on many of the races was shortened this year with only a few races longer than a half mile. The race course was also changed so that all crews raced on a

quarter-mile course, instead of the usual half-mile course in longer races. This resulted in a steersman race with all the additional turns that were required.

The regatta started out with a bang for OCC with the Girls 12 capturing their event. The race was a close one, with the outcome uncertain until the official announcement was made. The cheers and tears from the girls could be heard three tents away.

Other winning crews were the Boys 13 (another photo finish), the Masters Men 45 and 52, and the Junior and Senior Women.

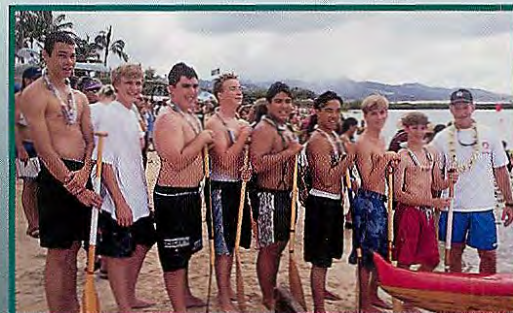
Outrigger finished the season with three second place finishes, two ties for second, and three third place finishes.

This was proven in the 13 national championships Keo won between 1939 and 1945. 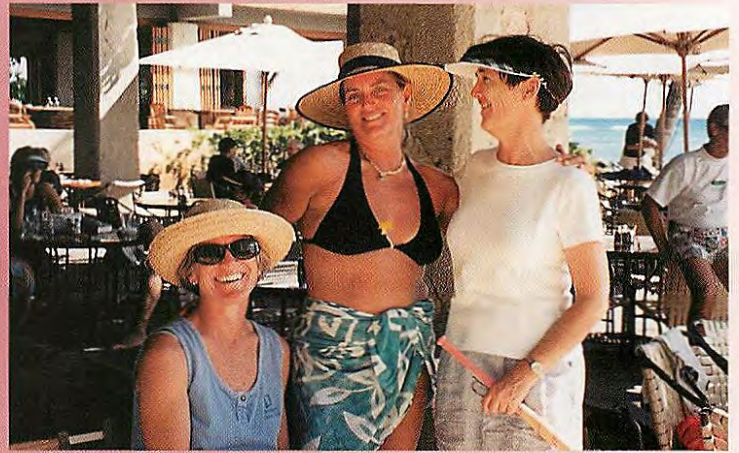

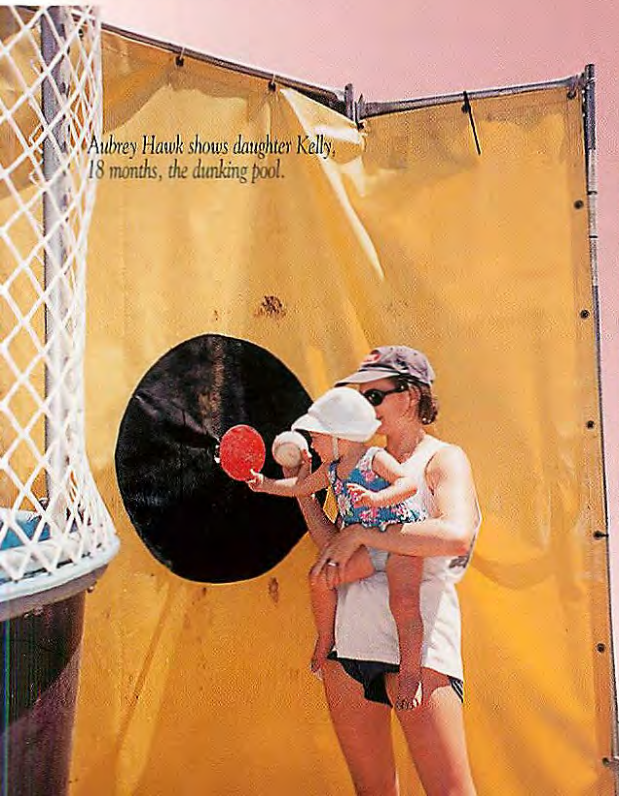

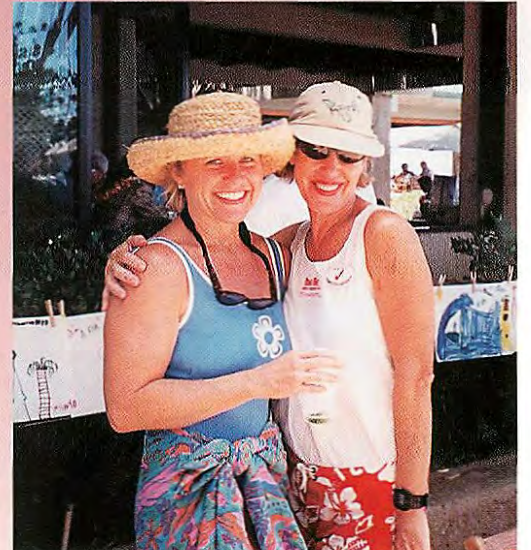

Reciprocal Club Review

NOTE: Twenty-third in a series of Reciprocal Club Reviews, this month features the Terminal City Club in Vancouver, B.C.

About a year ago I mentioned the Terminal City Club in an article I was doing on Vancouver. The Club was under construction at the time and I mentioned that I would review it when it was complete, and that time has come.

This high-rise facility is just magnificent—I had a very brief look at it in May—on the ground floor only as the upper floors weren't complete, and just that quick view was impressive. The club has been in existence for over 100 years, founded in 1892 and is one of the city's most prestigious private social and business clubs.

Now it's not only a private club—but also houses the Terminal City Club Tower Hotel. The location is extremely convenient—right down near Canada Place where all the cruise ships to Alaska tie up—the Pan Pacific and Waterfront Tower hotels—close to historic Gastown, Chinatown, and

the business and shopping areas. It is also next to the Vancouver Club - another one of our reciprocals.

The Tower Hotel has 60 large studio and one bedroom suites, many with breathtaking water and mountain views as Vancouver is truly one of the most beautiful cities in the world. All rooms have king size beds, full kitchenettes, individually controlled heating and air conditioning, and luxurious bathroom appointments.

Rates at this time are as follows and are in Canadian dollars: High season - (May 1-September 30, 1998) range from \$190 standard to \$300 for an executive suite based on double. Single high season range from \$165-\$275. Low season (October 1-April 30, 1999) are \$170 standard to \$250 for the executive suite, based on double, and singles rates from \$145-\$225. Taxes are additional. If any of you have priced the hotels in Vancouver recently you will know that these rates are excellent, especially considering the location.

The club has a full fitness center consisting of a 25 meter ozone-treated pool, whirlpool, saunas, steam and massage rooms,

state of the art equipment and an outdoor aerobics terrace. Hotel guests use all of these and other facilities, including a fully equipped business center. Other facilities are a billiards room, games room, squash courts, golf simulator, and even golf privileges at nearby golf clubs.

When it comes to dining there are three main choices serving breakfast, lunch and dinner seven days a week. There is the Main Dining Room serving lunch and dinner and requiring a jacket and tie. The Grill Room is the only room serving breakfast, as well as lunch and dinner and has a code of business casual during the week, and casual on weekends. The TC Lions Pub, open from 11 a.m.- midnight 7 days a week is casual. There is also the Discovery Lounge for cocktails which requires a jacket and tie. The Main Dining Room is non-smoking; the Grill Room and TC Lions Club permit cigarettes in certain areas, while the Discovery Lounge and Billiards Room also permit cigars and pipes. By the way, the Billiards Room is open 24 hours a day, seven days a week, as is the Reading Room.

There are some age restrictions on children in some of the areas, ranging from minimum six years to minimum 19 years. Children of all ages can eat in the Grill Room, and be in all the main areas, such as lobby, administration areas, private function rooms, etc.

The club has its own parking lot underneath the building. Tipping is permitted in the hotel and pub areas only. Reciprocal members may visit the club up to 14 times per calendar year, but must have a letter of introduction from the home club. There is a 15% surcharge to all reciprocals, plus a 10% service charge on food and beverages, plus 7% G.S.T. is applicable on all accounts. Payments may be made by cash, traveller's checks, Visa, MasterCard, or American Express—either daily or prior to departure.

Stop by the OCC office to review the beautiful brochure on this club, and be sure and make it a point to pay a visit if you're going to Vancouver—I know you'll be impressed.

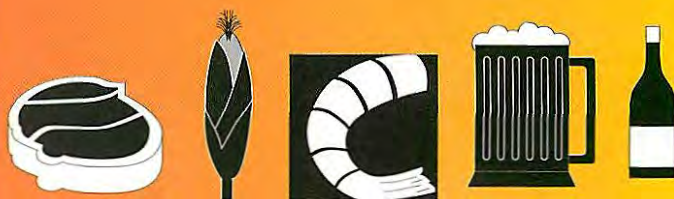

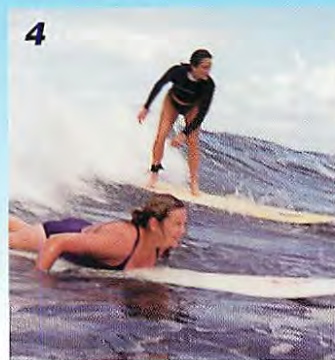

Backward Glances

50 Years Ago—1948 Wilford D. Godbold, President

In London's Empire Pool at the 1948 Olympics, Hawaiian ace and OCC member Bill Smith Jr. won the 400 meter swim. His time 4 minutes, 41 seconds. After a hitch in the Navy during WW II, Bill took off a semester from Ohio State to train at UH with his swimming mentor, Soichi Sakamoto.

In a *Forecast* photo, lined up behind a surfboard named Manu, are the treasured watermen of the OCC Beach Services: Louis "Sally" Hale, Earl "BB" King, "Laughing" Johnny Kauo, "Turkey" Love, "Blueboy" Makua, Harry Robello, "Bataan" Nunies, and Charles "Panama Dave" Baptiste.

Each spent years dispensing Hawaiian hospitality while teaching swimming, surfing, and outrigger paddling.

Thomas Singlehurst resigned from the Board of Directors. Treasurer since 1930, he was acknowledged for incalculable service to the Club. Singlehurst joined the Club in 1908 and it was assumed he held charter member status. He served in the Army in WW I.

25 Years Ago—1973 Robert W. Guild, President

A report was made on the refurbishing of the Club's prime racing canoe. In a race against time and finishing at midnight, Mark Buck and paddlers gave her the final wet sanding. Brant Ackerman put racing stripes the length of the gunwales; Wally Young hand-lettered Kakina and

the canoe was ready for the Leeward Regatta. With coats and coats of varnish on her koa hull, she was paddled with varnish still wet. Outrigger took third.

15 Years Ago—1983 Benjamin B. Cassidy, President

In the year of the 75th anniversary of the OCC, the Club hosted the TransPac Yacht Race. The beach shop offered a commemorative TransPac '83 tee shirt.

"Weepuls" Club volunteers from age 61 to 12, attacked Diamond Head and collected 142 bags of trash. They discovered that green beer bottles far outnumbered brown. Management put on a luncheon for the volunteers.

In the Bar, the Club's Monday night football-watching sessions began, to continue through the season. The Bar was

open, with hot sandwiches available.

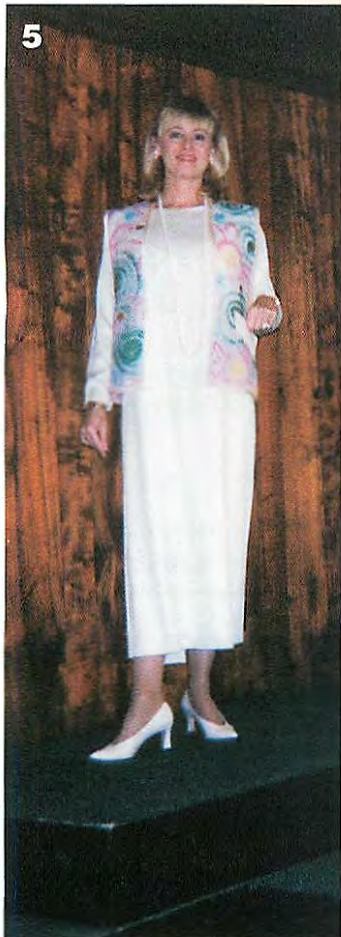

Board Briefs is taken from the minutes of the Board of Directors meeting on June 25, 1998 and the Executive Committee meeting on July 16, 1998.

Finance Committee—The Club's property, liability and worker's compensation insurance costs will be lower for the coming year.

Marketing Committee—The PR Committee is working on a Club calendar for January 1, 1999. . . It was suggested that at the next new member reception that members of the A&M Committee be included. . . Work is on-going to standardize the Club's logo. . . The Club attorney reports that the OCC logo and name cannot be used with regards to the athletic medals/dies without consent of the OCC.

Vice President Activities Report—The Welcome Party for new members was an outstanding idea and he would like the new members to receive a complete tour of the facilities. . . ODKF's move has been extended to August 31.

Secretary's Report—Two members were suspended for 15 days for being three times delinquent.

Manager's Report—The budget for the Time Management System is \$11,500. . . \$5,000 was approved for the Space Utilization Study.
