# 1st Annual OCC Biathlon a Huge Success

Race organizers feared a large south swell as they planned for the first OCC Biathlon, a 5K run and 1K swim, and sure enough, it materialized, sending large waves into the Kapua Channel on race day, June 6. Otherwise, the weather was blue skies and a beautiful summer day. Race applicants began trickling into the OCC at 5:30 a.m. for the 7 a.m. start.

All looked good as the volunteers took their places—Dorren German and son Mike, at registration, Ruth Munro at the park, Gina Schultz and Ron Sorrell at the start, Bob DeWitz setting the course cones, Candes Gentry bringing in artistic hand printed signs, and Gerry DeBenedetti racing around and trouble shooting.

Things were abuzz on the beach as Eric Rhodes, and beach attendants, Terri and Karen were pondering the increasing swells. A huddle was called among race director Arnold Lum, beach attendants and a pow wow ensued.

The swimmers were yelling, “don’t change the course we’re biathletes, this is what we do.” However, concerns not from the swimmers, but from the logistics of those setting the buoys, launching the Boston whaler, and the fear of having to rescue swimmers from the boat in the surf, required plan B to go into effect.

A modified course, inside the impact zone (still 1K) was put in place. However, even with the swimmers staying away from the high surf, the resulting breakers and outgoing tide made the swim a real challenge—not dangerous—just challenging.

The run course was around Kapiolani Park and couldn’t have been more beautiful. The shower trees that circle the park were in full bloom. Flashes of color emanated from the rainbow, coral, pink and white blossoms.

The course was clearly marked with more than 150 race cones, and volunteers stood like sentry’s at each corner keeping a sharp lookout so no one would miss a turn.

The transition from the run merged out of the park, across the median strip, and assisted by two policemen on duty, corralled the runners into a cattle shoot down the OCC alley. This alley is rarely seen by Club members, let alone, non-members, so it was quite dra-

matic to shoot down the alley and explode onto the private sand beach awaiting the runners as they stripped off shorts, shoes and socks, and after donning goggles and race caps plunged hot and sweaty into the cold and clear Pacific Ocean.

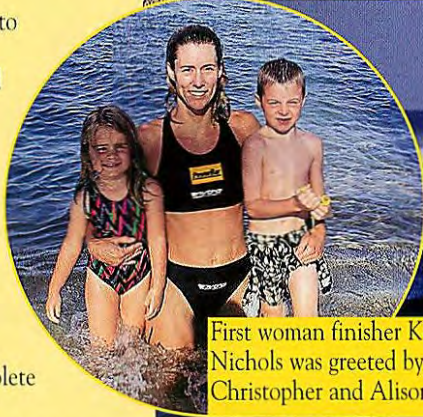
Like lemmings racing to the sea, one by one the exhausted runners struggled through the sand, quaffed a quick cup of water, and splashed out to the bright orange swim buoys. Five giant (8-foot tall) triangular buoys marked the swim course. The instructions were to race clockwise around the buoys and complete two laps.

The overall winner was veteran biathlete Rick Heltzel, barely beating out second place finisher, Manuel Campos, who actually came out of the water ahead of Rick but emerged near the Club steps instead of the finishers shoot. By the time he realized his mistake, he had been passed by Heltzel.

The first woman to finish was OCC’s Katherine Nichols, coming off a victory last week at the North Shore Triathlon, and also first in her age group the previous week at the Keauhou Kona Half Ironman. Katherine won the Tinman Triathlon last year (female) and has her sights set on July 12 for this year’s Tinman Triathlon as well. The event was a great success for the OCC as it was the first big biathlon held by the Club open to the public—a brain child of the Swim Committee’s Chrissy Lambert and Arnold Lum. They were assisted by the Running Committee’s Don Eovino.

The event was well organized, with 138 participants, 20+ volunteers, 100 spectators, safely held, with plenty of food and refreshments, cool designer T-shirts, a great visual experience for the spectators, fabulous awards, and a great experience for all involved.

In fact, over heard mumbling on the way out of the Club after practically no sleep all week, Chrissy Lambert was heard saying, “I can’t wait until next year.”

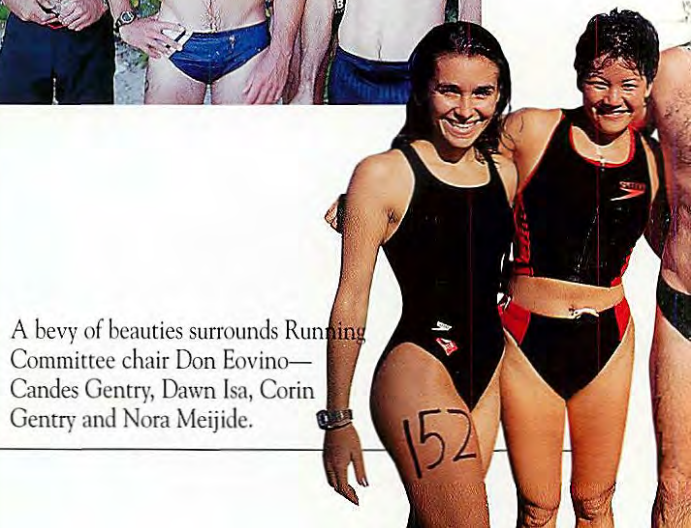

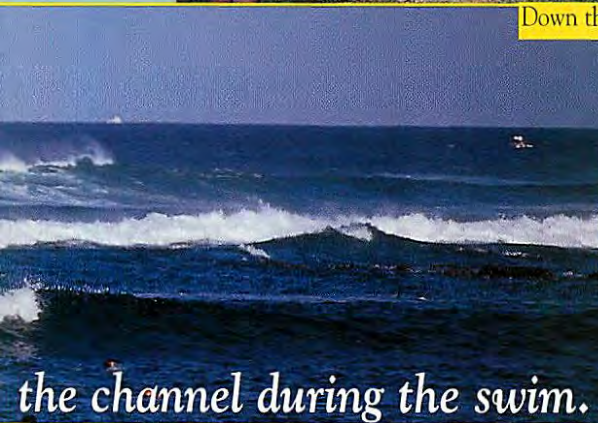
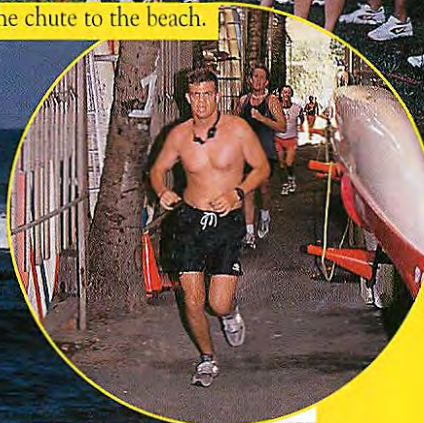

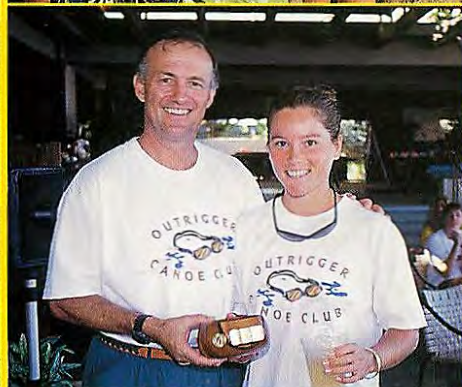

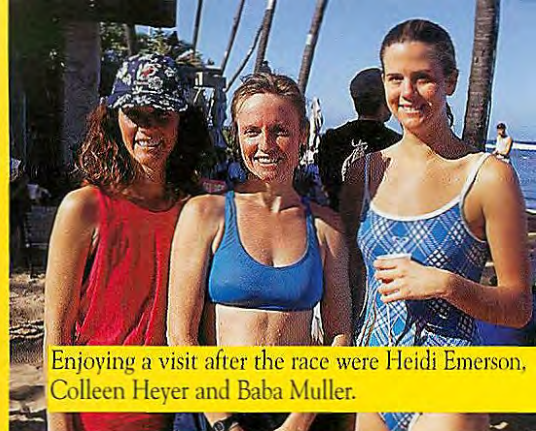

# OHCRA Regatta

Outrigger paddlers gathered at Keehi Lagoon to launch the 1998 Oahu Hawaiian Canoe Racing Association Regatta season, June 7, and then trekked to Kailua Beach Park on June 14 for the Kamehameha Day Regatta.

Outrigger tied for second at the Clem Paia Regatta with Kailua, trailing winning Lanikai 91-58.

At the Kamehameha Day Regatta, Club paddlers finished third trailing Lanikai and Kailua, Lanikai second 81, Kailua 58 and OCC 54.

The season started with new rules, new races and new faces. This year, OHCRA determined that no paddler could paddle in more than one race, unless moving up to a new division. Since many clubs doubled up their paddlers, paddling in the senior race and one other, there appeared to be fewer paddlers and boats in events this year. And in fact, in some events, including the prestigious senior men's race, there were only two canoes.

"I don't think they got the result they wanted," said Club Captain Marc Haine. "They wanted to encourage more participation, but the effect is less. Hopefully the rule will be changed back."

Outrigger was lean on paddlers in the opening regatta, having to scratch the Girls 13 and 18, Novice B and sophomore women races, but Head Coach David Buck expects more paddlers to turn out when they return home from college in the next few weeks.

"We have a good nucleus of paddlers now," he said, "and when the college kids return we should be competitive in all the events. I expect we'll be building all season towards states, which is when we want to peak. We want to successfully defend our state title."

Another change is the addition of a mixed novice event, which was added because HCRA will have the event in the State Championships on August 1. The event doesn't score points in the regattas but serves as a qualifying race for states.

OHCRA also changed the qualifying method for states. Instead of the Oahu champion automatically qualifying for one of the four OHCRA berths, the four crews accumulating the most points throughout the season, will qualify. This means clubs can no stack crews in the Oahu's in order to qualify for states.

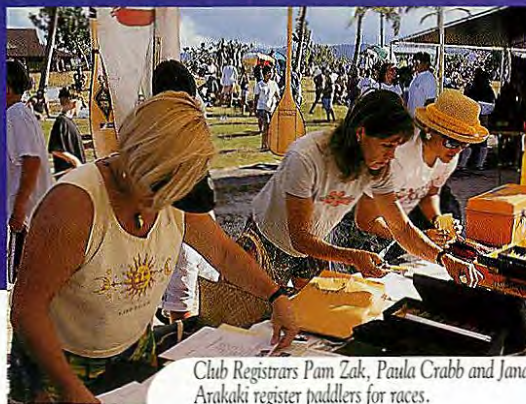
OHCRA also renamed the masters races from junior, senior and golden masters, to Masters 35, Masters 45 and Masters 52.

Outrigger kids crews did well in the Paia Regatta, winning the Boys 12, 14 and 18 races. Other winning crews were the Novice A women and the Men's Masters 45.

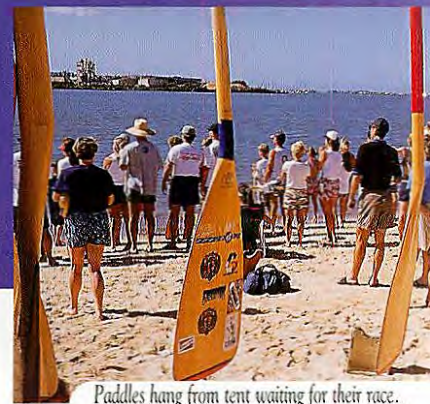
At Kailua, Club paddlers won the Girls 12, Men's Open 4, Boys 18, Sophomore Men and Junior Women.

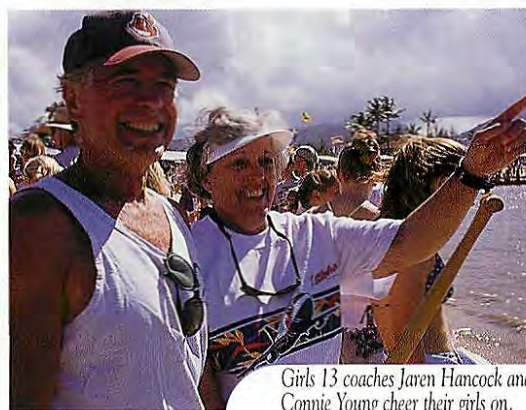

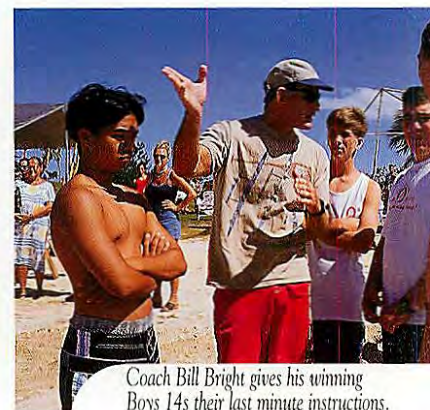
Club Registrars Pam Zak, Paula Crabb and Jana Arakaki register paddlers for races.



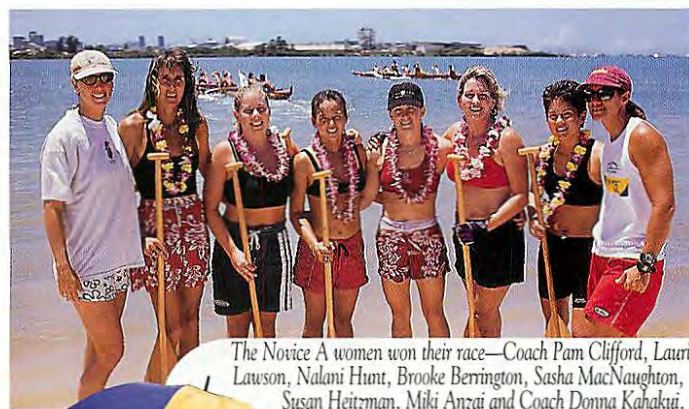
Paddles hang from tent waiting for their race.



Girls 13 coaches Jaren Hancock and Connie Young cheer their girls on.



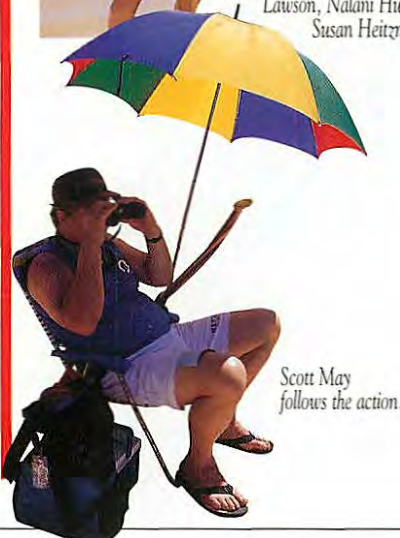
Coach Bill Bright gives his winning Boys 14s their last minute instructions.

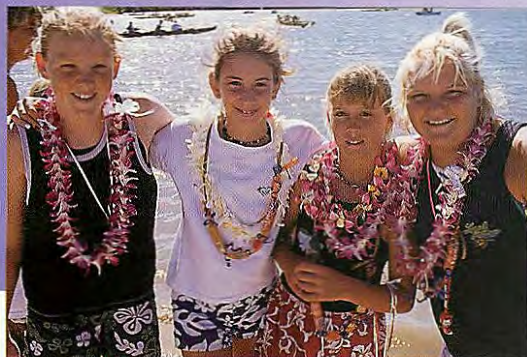

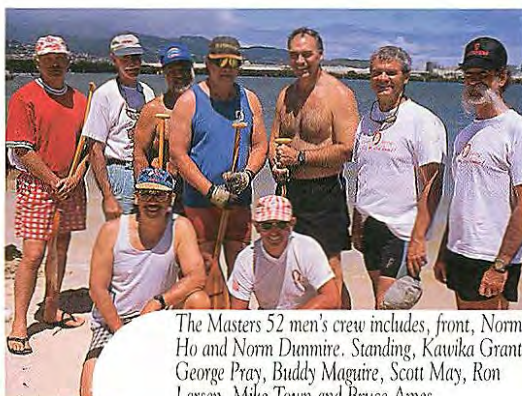

# The Sun Always Shines on the 4th of July

Some years the waves are up; sometimes the ocean is flat. Winds may vary and the luck of the draw determines which teams get the more desirable lanes. Some years the races are neck and neck; other times one team racks up the points early in the day. But there is one factor that never changes; the sun always shines on the Fourth of July.

When the annual Walter J. Macfarlane Memorial Regatta gets underway at 8:30 Saturday morning, July 4 suspense will hang heavy in the salty morning air as crews from more than a dozen teams look forward with eager anticipation to competing in the oldest continuous canoe race in Hawai'i.

For the past 56 years, the Outrigger Canoe Club has sponsored this popular water sport event, the only wave race on the O'ahu Hawaiian Canoe Racing Association calendar, and certainly the most colorful. Most paddlers agree that it's also the most fun.

It all started when Club president Walter Macfarlane unexpectedly died in 1943 (long before most of our paddlers were even born) and the Outrigger decided to rename the Club-sponsored canoe races held on the Fourth of July in his honor.

As World War II raged across Europe and the Pacific, a tremendous effort was put forth by Club members to make this first memorial event a truly outstanding one. A full page ad appeared in the newspapers inviting one and all to Waikiki to enjoy a water extravaganza. A picture of Walter Mac appeared beside one of Duke Kahanamoku surrounded by Outrigger beauties, Anna Morris, Wanda Grant and Kathleen Patterson.

The Outrigger ad listed a program of 16 events, including races between MP class sailing boats from Kaneohe Yacht Club, a mixed tandem surfing contest and a tug of war between Outrigger and Hui Nalu.

Participants, in addition to OCC and Hui Nalu, consisted of two six-man teams comprised of officers and enlisted men, and a wahine team made up of WACS, WAVES, SPARS and lady marines. A couple

of beach boy teams were formed especially for the occasion.

The next day the papers proclaimed the races a big success. As for the tug-of-war, when the two teams began to vigorously paddle in the opposite direction, the rope broke. When the same thing happened on the second try, the officials declared it a tie.

Each year since, the Macfarlane Regatta has continued to be one of the most popular canoe racing events in Hawai'i.

Part of its appeal is the element of unpredictability, with the outcome of the races depending as much on luck as on skill. One year, the Waikiki Surf Club's canoe swamped during the senior women's event. With only the ama visible above water, the crew opted to paddle instead of bail and managed to win the race, crossing the finish line stern first.

Then there was the time the waves were so big that 30 canoes swamped. One year, the Outrigger had everything going for it in the senior men's race. With perfect waves and a draw of lane one, they appeared to have it made. However, the canoe swamped and Hui Nalu, in lane seven, came in first.

There have been four ties in the Macfarlane Regatta, but one of the closest cliff-hangers was the year that Outrigger and Hui Nalu went neck and neck throughout the day. The outcome depended on the senior men's race. Again, the two teams were side by side, even coming in on the same wave at the finish. The officials ruled that Hui Nalu won by a nose.

Last year, the Thunderbirds put on an awesome aerial show as the canoes raced directly below.

For the first 22 years, the races took place right in the Outrigger's "front yard". Since the move to our present site in 1965, the Club has provided a hearty, early morning breakfast at the crack of dawn. Following a pep rally in the Bar, the paddlers give their traditional OCC cheer loud enough to wake even the soundest sleeper.

Each club sets up its headquarters in a tent on the beach, and along with paddlers, spectators, canoes, coolers, umbrellas, beach chairs and other paraphernalia, the beach is a solid mass of people, sound and color. In the ocean, the brilliant blues of sky and water are dotted with sailboats, surf boards, rubber rafts and inner tubes, adding yet more color to the scene. Even the turtles, swimming peacefully on the other side of the breakwater, seem to be enjoying the day.

When the canoes line up in the water and the crews get ready for the first race, the excitement begins to build and it continues to mount throughout the day as the points are tallied and one team or another takes the lead. When each winning crew crosses the finish line, a spontaneous cheer erupts from that club's supporters, joined by spectators along the beach, those leaning over their hotel room balconies and others watching from a flotilla of assorted seacraft anchored at the half-mile turn.

As the day wears on, the excitement reaches a climax when the major races of the day take place in mid-afternoon. After the last race, when the winners have been officially declared, the trophies awarded, and the last drop of champagne emptied from the prized silver bowls, the weary but happy paddlers, laden with leis, put down their paddles, catch their second wind and the partying begins.

The official paddling party on the Club grounds attracts hundreds of paddlers and their coaches, families and friends who gather to celebrate with a BBQ, dancing and entertainment.

It's anyone's guess what the 1998 Macfarlane has in store. It's sure to have some surprises, some unexpected thrills and sad disappointments. The only thing we can be sure of is that, whatever happens, the sun will shine!

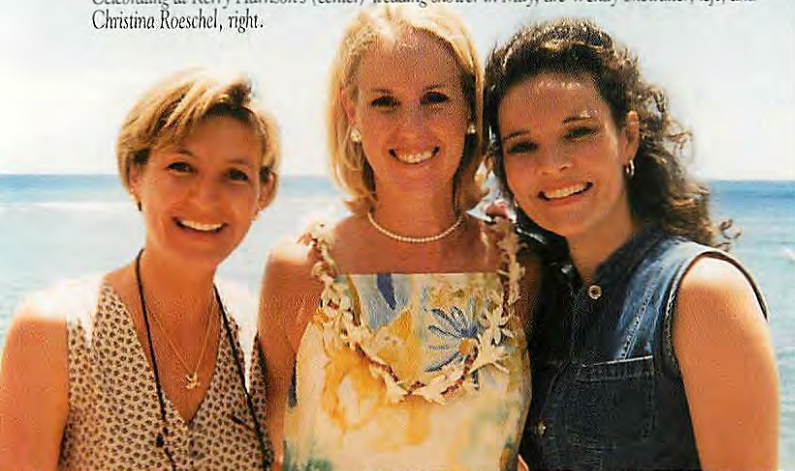

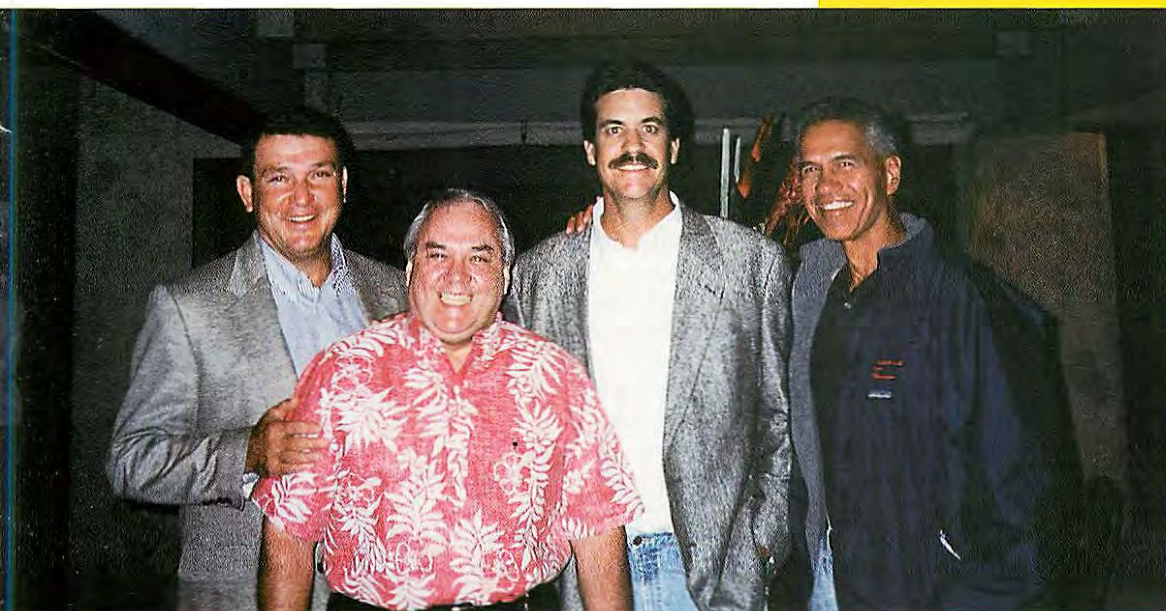

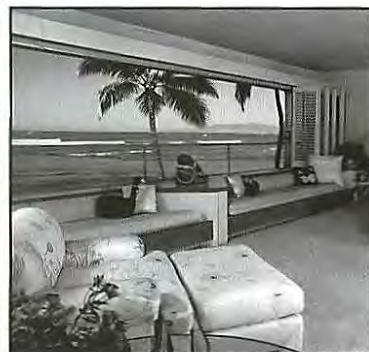

Well, two times was bad enough to show off, but now the

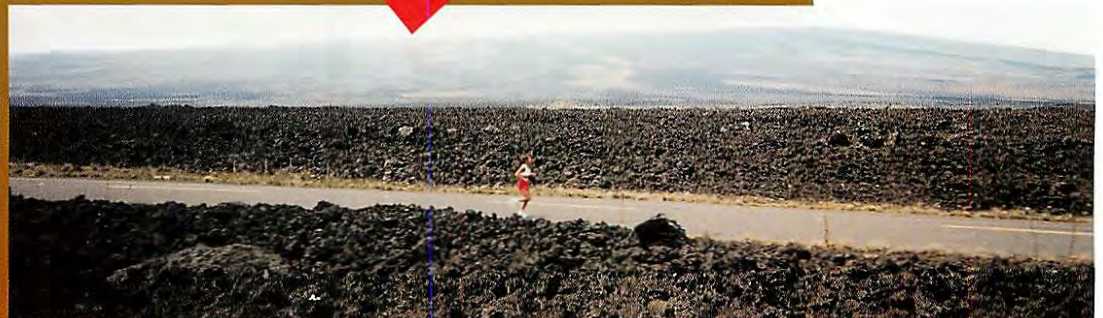
chivalry of the OCC male runners was at stake since insult was added to injury by the humiliation put upon our female runners.

# Reciprocal Club Review

Note: 21st in a series of Reciprocal Club Reviews, this month features the Tattersall's Clubs in Sydney, Australia.

You noticed that clubs is plural—that's because there are two Tattersall's Clubs in Sydney, and they are very different from each other.

The Tattersall's Club at 181 Elizabeth Street is a prestigious club having only 4,000 members, and is male only. OCC member Gloria Keller was there recently and describes it as "old hat traditional". Women can enter as a guest of a member for meals only. The club is located in the center of the business district, overlooking beautiful Hyde Park. Many of their private function rooms and the main dining room overlook this lovely park.

This club has a complete athletic department located on the second floor and it is open seven days a week. This department consists of a fully equipped gymnasium, hand ball and squash courts, swimming pool, spa, sauna, steam room, massage for a fee of 20-40 Australian dollars, and circuit classes.

There's food service here for breakfast and lunch. There is a charge to use the gym, and it's only open to members and their male guests. The club also has a card room, reading room, and billiards room. There are no hotel room facilities.

There are several dining venues and all are open Monday-Friday for both lunch and dinner, but are not open on weekends. The main dining room and adjoining cocktail bar welcomes ladies with members. The Bistro, for informal lunches, is members and male guests only, as is the Club Bar. Gentlemen are expected to wear cost and tie and jeans are not allowed. On weekends the code is more casual, but still requires long pants, collared shirts and no jeans. Jogging and training clothes are of course permitted in the athletic department, and people dressed this way have a special entrance to the department.

Tipping is permitted, and reciprocal members must pay with cash or credit card.

The other club, the City Tattersall's Club, located at 198 Pitt Street, has a large membership of 35,000 and welcomes both men and women as members. Its location is in the heart of the city also. It is open daily except Sunday - has several restaurants, including a main dining room, a Bistro, several bars and cocktail lounges. They serve lunch and dinner and welcome female members and guests, as well as male members and guests. Jackets are required but ties are optional, and jeans are not allowed.

It has a gymnasium for both ladies and men - open from 7 a.m. to midnight. As in the other Tattersall's, there is a small charge for using this facility. They also have a gaming room with poker machines. There are no room accommodations, and accounts may be cleared with credit cards.

At time of going to press I have very limited information on this club; all that I have came from a quick phone call. When Gloria Keller was there, it was a holiday, and she wasn't able to get any updates on this location.

They are mailing new and updated brochures to the Executive Office, so be sure and check with Debbie or JoAnne before you go to see what they have received.

If any other OCC members are going to Sydney, and it's convenient for you to stop by this club, please do so. We would welcome any additional input you might bring back to us. You will of course need introductory cards for both clubs.

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# ODKF Awards 2 Grants

The Outrigger Duke Kahanamoku Foundation announces \$500 athletic grant awards to OCC members Hadley Gaffney and Mike Stock.

Hadley's grant is to assist her in participating in the U.S. Canoe/Kayak Sprint Nationals in Green Lake, Washington in August.

A participant in many paddling events, canoe sailing races, and kayaking competitions, Hadley's training program and training sessions with the Hawaii Canoe & Kayak Team are intense.

She is rated nationally among women kayakers, finishing 12th in the 1996 Olympic Team Trials.

Mike is also a kayaker, planning to attend the Nationals as well as participate in European Team trials. He is presently at the Olympic Training Center in Chula Vista, California, where he attended special classes to complete his senior year of high school.

Since 1996, Mike has competed in Florida, Washington,

Georgia, and internationally in Poland and Finland. His coach at the Olympic Center says he is one of the top Junior kayakers in the U.S.

OCC members will be interested to note that a \$1,000 grant was given to the Hui Nalu Canoe Club for their May 9 Kala Kukea Ironman Challenge. Many OCC members participated in this event with paddlers ranging in age from 12 to Golden Masters. Entrants were in six person canoes as well as individuals and surfskis.

Formerly known as the Maunalua Bay Challenge, in 1996 this event was renamed in memory of Kala Kukea, long time Hui Nalu member and coach, who also coached many OCC members of the Hawaii Canoe and Kayak team. His son Nalu is an OCC member.

Funds for the grant come from the ODKF Board designated Kala Kukea Fund, established in 1996 and maintained with donations made in Kukea's memory.

Two previous grants from this fund were made to OCC member Mahealani Lum.

Other athletic grants were made to the Hawaii Swimming Club, Team Hawaii (body surfing), David Shinbara (knee board surfer), Raymond Reichle (surfing), International Hawaiian Canoe Association, and the Hawaii Masters Marathon Canoe Team.

The purpose of the Outrigger Duke Kahanamoku Foundation is to encourage athletes and scholars whose endeavors will contribute to the growth and development of athletics in Hawaii; to support athletic events and participation by teams and individuals in furthering their edu-
