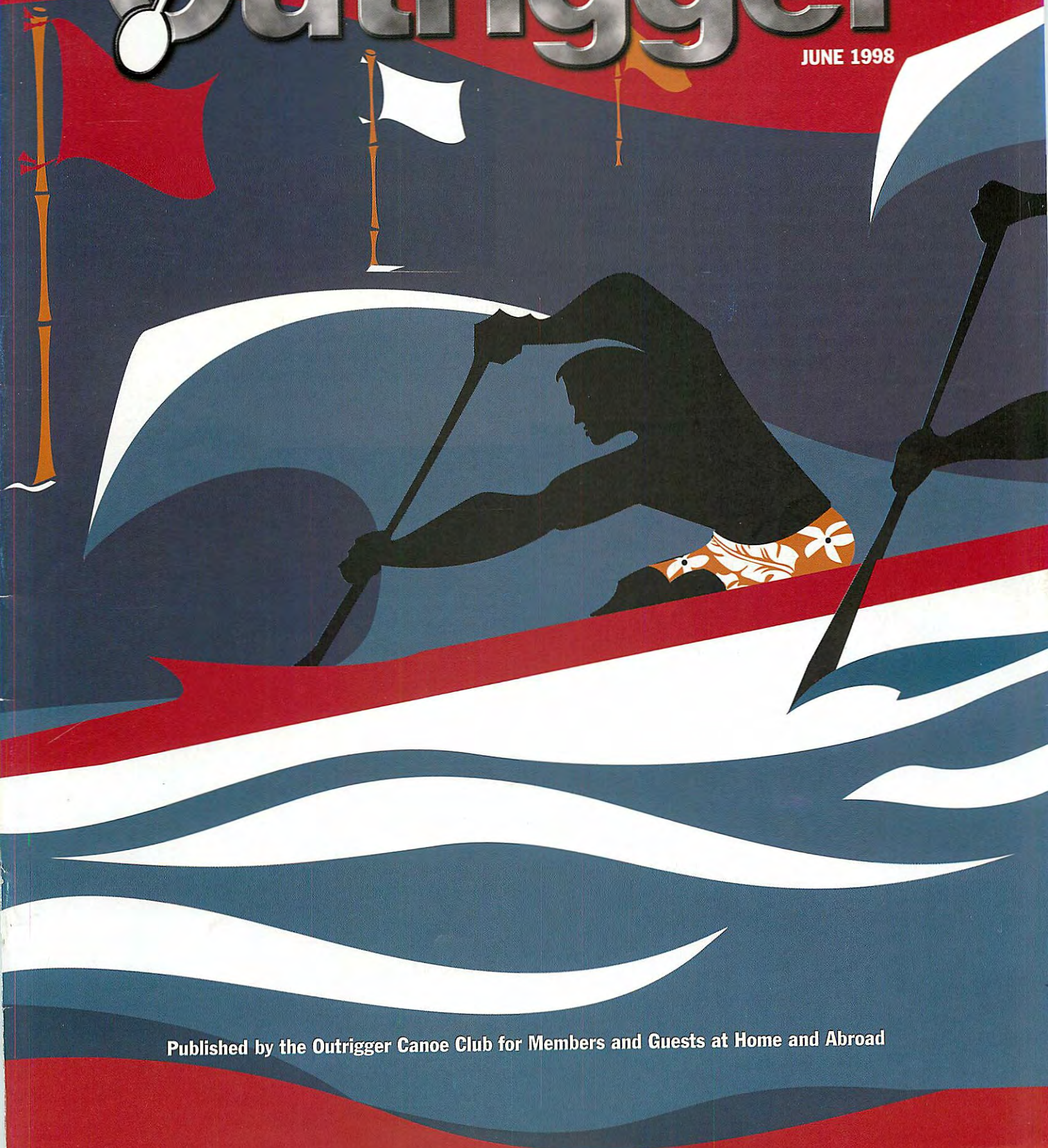

Macfarlane Trophies Have Long History

Every year on the 4th of July during the Paddler's Breakfast, the Canoe Racing Committee drags out all of the perpetual trophies for the Walter J. Macfarlane Regatta and proudly explains that if your crew wins their race, your name will be added to those who have gone before you on this important day in Club history.

The Matson Navigation Trophy, the oldest and most prestigious Macfarlane trophy, was donated for the first Macfarlane Regatta in 1943 and bears the names of 55 winning Senior Men's crews. Outrigger crews won the trophy the first six years, and a total of 21 times, the most of any club. You may recognize the names of the first winning crew—Thad Ekstrand, Jack Beaumont, Tom Arnott, Jim Fernie, Bob Bush and Duke Kahanamoku.

Outrigger last won it in 1991 with a crew of Kainoa Downing, Chris Kincaid, Bruce Black, Walter Guild, Courtney Seto and Todd Bradley.

All of the trophies in the first Macfarlane Regatta were donated by commercial sponsors—Matson Navigation, American Factors, Hawaii Brewing Company, Canada Dry, Royal Hawaiian Hostesses, and the OCC.

Paul Dolan of the OCC Historical Committee, has catalogued all of the Club's trophies, some 250. Twenty-two are from past Macfarlane Regattas. Fourteen of the Macfarlane trophies are still active.

Here's a run down on Macfarlane Trophies. Check them out on the 4th of July for the names of some of the Club's greatest athletes, including Duke Kahanamoku.



Makule Men Trophy

In 1979, Dome Gose and Hank Lass donated this koa trophy for the Makule race. A hand carved koa canoe replica of the Leilani is backed by a log slice which bears the names of winning crews. The trophy is 36" x 27" x 12". The makule race is for crews 50 and older.

Winning Club Trophy

In 1972, Mrs. Walter Flanders donated the graceful koa wave trophy which goes to the club scoring the most points in the regatta. It's 15" x 23" x 8". Outrigger has won it 19 times.



Toots Minvielle Trophy

This trophy was the Royal Hawaiian Hostess trophy for the winning Enlisted Six-Man crew in 1943. Outrigger won the race with a crew of Robert "Buckaloose" Bush, Jimmie Fernie, Edward "Mickey" Beggs, David "Dayday" Duncan, Gordon "Buster" Tribble and Duke Kahanamoku. The trophy was recycled in 1992 and awarded to the winning Novice B Men's crew. The silver cup sits atop a wooden base.



Matson Navigation Co. Trophy

Donated by Matson for the 1943 Regatta for the Senior Men's race. A silver bowl is attached to a koa base which bears the names of past winners. The beautiful silver trophy is 28" x

28" x 11". After the regatta, the winning crew drinks champagne from the silver bowl. Over the years, the Senior Men's race has ranged from 2 to 4-1/2 miles.



Primo Beer Cup

This trophy was the Hawaiian Brewing Company Primo Beer Cup and was first awarded in 1943 and retired in 1947. The perennial winners of this trophy were Tommy Arnott, Robert "Buckaloose" Bush, Kenneth "Cueball" Chaney, Alan "Turkey" Love, Jimmy "Speed" Pflueger, Carlos Rivas, Dan Wilkinson, Don Tobin, Jack Beaumont, Don "Slim" Denhart and Toots Minvielle. In 1991 it was returned to competition and awarded to the winning Masters Men. It is 11" x 11" x 21". The cup sits atop a wooden base.

Ke Ka Wa'a Kahiko Trophy

This hand-carved Polynesian canoe bailer was sponsored by OCC in 1993 as the perpetual trophy for the Senior Masters Men race. The koa bailer sits atop a koa base. It is 19" x 16" x 12".



Senior Women's Bowl

In 1984, Mrs. Flanders donated a sterling silver bowl for the winner of the Senior Women's race. The winning women's crew drinks champagne from the bowl.



Masters and Senior Masters Women Trophy

This flower-carved milo bowl was donated by Muriel Flanders in 1979 to the winner of the Senior Masters Women race. It is 12" x 16" and sits on a pedestal. In 1984, Mrs. Flanders donated a second matching bowl for the winner of the Masters Women's race.



Girls 18 Cup

In 1990, a new silver cup was introduced to recognize the winner of the Girls 18 race.



Bob Fischer Memorial Trophy

A silver cup, donated by the Hawaiian Brewing Company for the original 1943 regatta, was returned to perpetual competition in 1991 in memory of Bob Fischer, a strong supporter and coach of women's paddling. Bob steered the Outrigger women to victory in the first Macfarlane Regatta. The cup is given to the first place Novice B women's crew.



Boys and Girls 12 Trophies

For the 50th annual Macfarlane Regatta, Mrs. Flanders donated two new trophies to recognize the youngest competitors in the race—the winning Boys and Girls 12s.



Muriel Macfarlane Flanders Trophy

In 1980, Walter Guild, a grand-nephew of Walter Macfarlane, dedicated a magnificent self-hand-crafted koa racing canoe to his grandmother, Muriel Flanders which, in her name, is awarded to the winning Boys 18 crew. The canoe is named Alaka'i.

Other Macfarlane Regatta trophies that have been won by the Club are:

Women's Senior 6

Won in 1943 Macfarlane Regatta. It was won again by the OCC girls in 1944 and retired.

American Factors Trophy

Won by OCC for finishing second in the Girl's Six.

Canada Dry Trophy

Won by OCC Six-Man Relay in 1943.

Wilford D. Godbold Trophy

Won by Outrigger's Senior 4 Men from 1952-55.

Samuel T. Fuller Trophy

Awarded to the Women's Senior 6 from 1952-55.

Misc. Bowls

Outrigger won monkeypod bowls for placing in various Macfarlane Regattas. Bowls include 1986, 1st Place, AA Division; 1993, 2nd Place AA Division; and (no date) 1st Place, AA Division.

Junior Boys and Girls Teams

Sponsored by Anita Brightman in memory of Bob Fischer, this trophy was introduced in 1991 for the winning junior boys and girls teams. The trophy has two cups, one for the girls and one for the boys. It sits on a wooden base.

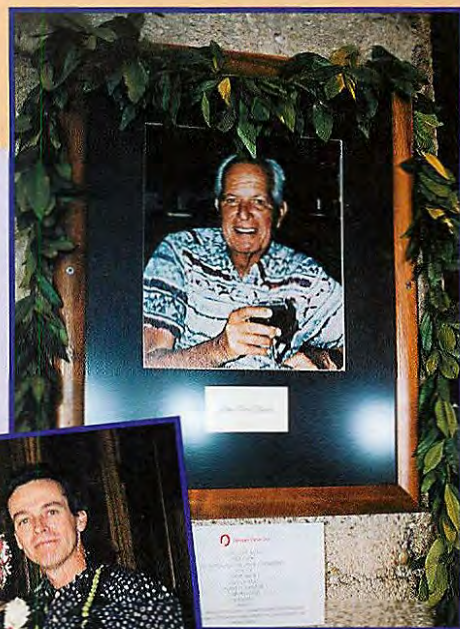

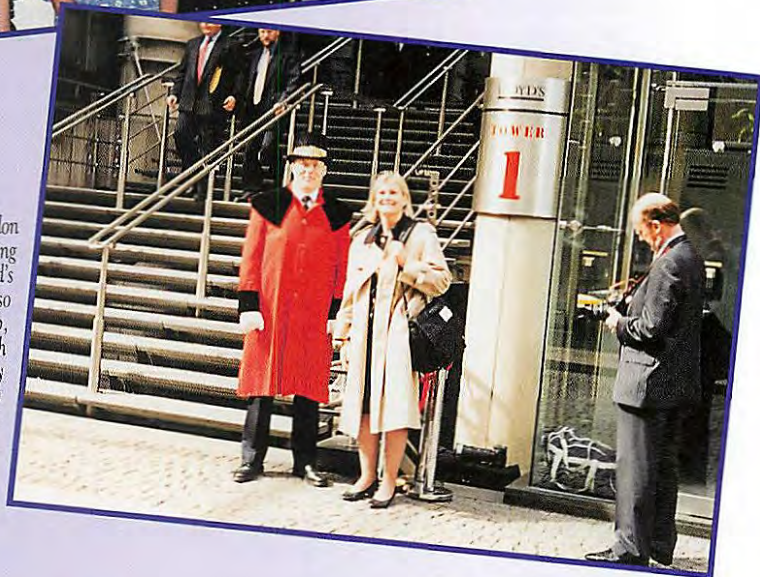

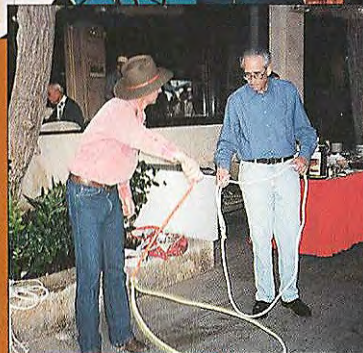

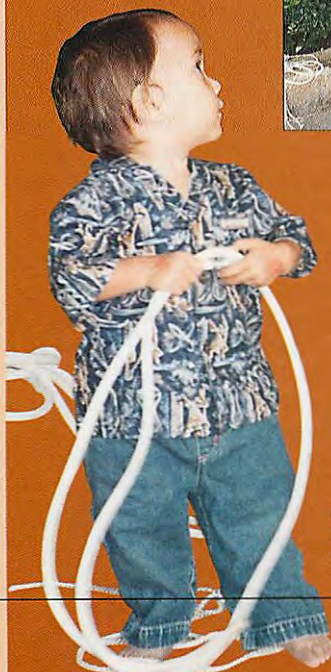

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Reciprocal Club Review

NOTE: Twentieth in a series of Reciprocal Club Reviews, this month features The Tattersall's Club in Brisbane, Australia.

The Tattersall's Club has been a member of our Reciprocal family for quite some time. There are other Tattersall's Clubs in Australia which will be reviewed at a later date. These clubs derive their name from a London horse auction mart founded in 1776 by Richard Tattersall, who had been stud groom to the second Duke of Kingston.

The Brisbane club was founded in 1865, and has long sought to provide a wide range of sporting and recreational pursuits for its members. OCC member Gloria Keller visited this club in February and brought back current information.

This is a cosmopolitan city club right in the heart of Brisbane and offers both art deco elegance and convenience. A major extension was completed in 1997 which includes wonderful accommodations. These consist of 18 spacious suites with twin or king beds, private bathrooms with hair dryer, bathrobes, toiletries, air conditioning, direct dial phones, remote control TV, radio and alarm clocks, tea and coffee making facilities, refrigerator and mini bars, and personal safes. VCR's, fax machines and laundry and ironing facilities are available.

Room rates are 130 Australian dollars per night. Some suites are executive suites and include private spas, rates on request. Payment may be made with credit card, cash or check. You cannot stay longer than three weeks at one time, and children must be at least 14 years old to stay in the suites.

The club has many other facilities such as a barber shop, full gymnasium, saunas, spas, massages, roof-top 25 meter indoor heated swimming pool, a library, billiard room, television room and a wide variety of bar and dining areas, including a major wine cellar in the basement where you may go make your selections. They are open from 8:30 a.m. to 5 p.m., Monday to Friday. Casual pool parties, BBQ's and cocktails can be arranged in the pool area. There are small charges for use of the gym and pool areas.

There is a member's bar and a member's dining room which are restricted to male guests only—except on Friday nights when female guests may be in the member's bar. This bar evokes images of the Raj in India of Rudyard Kipling's day - and has a mag-

nificent high ceiling. The member's dining room is said to be one of the finest examples of Art Deco design in the Southern Hemisphere.

Both the member's bar and dining room are open Monday-Friday with the bar opening at 10 a.m., the Dining Room at 11:30 a.m. and both staying open later on Tuesdays and Fridays until 11:30 p.m. There is one other, male-only area - the Needham Room which is a small private dining room.

All other bars and dining rooms admit both male and female guests, and reciprocal club members have access to all drinking and dining areas.

Horse racing is big in Australia and the club has a Racing Bar open for drinks from 11:30 a.m. to 7 p.m. where you can pursue your racing interests complete with Sky channel.

The Healy Room is a grand dining room which is part of the addition opened in 1997, and offers very high standards of dining - including table side flambe cooking. It has its own adjacent cocktail lounge, and is open for lunch and dinner everyday from 11:30 a.m. to 11:30 p.m.

One of the features of this room is Afternoon Tea served in the old style - a tradition the club wishes to uphold. Dress code is smart casual, though keep in mind that most areas of the club require a jacket and tie. The Bistro provides a more informal atmosphere for quality meals and snacks, including breakfast and lunch. The room is fully licensed so you may enjoy wine of your choice with your lunch. Dress is casual, and they are open from 7 a.m. every day, at 1 p.m. on weekends, and 2:30 p.m. the rest of the week.

There are two rooms for private functions - both of which require jacket and tie. The Needham was previously mentioned - and the Chandelier Room which offers the ultimate in atmosphere, style and elegance. There is also a grand ballroom with full length glass walls displaying the city lights. All dining areas of the club are non-smoking and some of the accommodation suites are classified as non-smoking as well. On her trip, Gloria Keller found that she had to pay cash in the Healy Dining Room so be sure to check ahead of time if that is still so - or if you can sip with your reciprocal card.

As usual, you need an OCC card of introduction - so stop by the office before your next trip Down Under and pick one up.

Kanaka Ikaika Season Wraps Up

As the 1998 kayak and one-man canoe season comes to a close, Outrigger members dominate the field.

On April 6, conditions for the Oahu Championships were precarious. High winds had churned the seas. The 18 mile course from Makai Pier near Sea Life Park to the Waikiki Yacht Club challenged racers with five-foot swells as they rounded Makapuu Point.

"Looking at five foot faces of water wasn't fun at all," commented Donna Kahakui, who despite getting knocked off her canoe a few times by the rough conditions, easily won the women's division in the one-man canoe event.

Mark Rigg easily cruised to first place in the men's division. Joining him in the top five were Courtney Seto in second and Chris Kincaid in fifth.

Despite getting flipped by the ocean swells, Kelly Fey took the women's kayak division, with Nicole Wilcox second and Mary Smolenski, fifth. Nalu Kukea won the men's kayak division, with Jim Beaton, third, and David Buck, fifth overall.

The state championships on April 19 were a lot calmer, but as predictable. Fey, who usually joins the season midway, embarrassed the competition by finishing the 24

mile course from Kailua to Kaimana Beach 17 minutes ahead of her closest competition. Kukea beat out training partner, Wyatt Jones, for the men's kayak title.

As expected, Kahakui won the women's one-man division, having swept every race this year except one, when she finished an abysmal second. In the competitive men's division, Walter Guild and Chris Kincaid slugged it out right down to the wire, finishing fourth and fifth. Oh yea, and Rigg won. These guys aren't doing too bad for a bunch of over 40 types.

And now that the only race left to run is the Molokai Challenge, the Poai Puni Series has closed for the 1998 season. The series calculates overall points for each racer's best eight races of the 10 in the series. With the completion of the regular season, the Poai Puni leaders in the men's and women's divisions for kayak and canoe are all Outrigger Canoe Club paddlers. Mary Smolenski and Wyatt Jones finished as the top point getters among the kayakers, while Donna Kahakui and Mark Rigg led all the one-man canoe racers.

On to Molokai.

Softball Team Eyes Another Championship

The OCC Softball team won all its games in April and leads the Leahi Spring League in its quest for a second straight title. A combination of high-powered hitting, excellent fielding and quality pitching accounts for OCC's incredible average of 14 runs per game, giving up an average of five runs.

Perhaps the biggest story in 1998 is Traci Phillips' break through on OCC's men's team. On April 14, Traci pinch-hit for Henry Ayau, grounding out to shortstop. On April 21, she pinch-hit for Clay Chee against the Elks Club. Traci got to first base on an infield error. She finished the game playing catcher.

Featured players and game highlights begin with the home run parade. Team captain Jim McAluney leads the team with three home runs, including a grand slam on April 21. Chris Siegfried has two home runs. Paki Vaughan, Clay Chee and Rick Piper all have a home run each.

Since moving to leadoff batter, second baseman Mike Miranda is seven for 10 with eight runs scored and three RBI's. Shortstop Jim Cavanah is the only player to have two or more hits in every game he has played. Utility player Ralph DeWitt leads the team in batting average at .777 (he's 7 for 9 from the plate).

In OCC's 24-11 win over OCFD, Paki led the team with four hits, Stew Kawakami, Keith Letman, Siegfried, McAluney and Chee all contributed three hits each.

Bill Kilcoyne, Miranda and McAluney were all three for four against Matsuno. Aaron Eberhardt and Kilcoyne had three hits each against the Kahala Mandarin. Paki had another four hit game against OCFD in a rematch. Jake Mizuno and Aaron had three hits.

Head Coach Jim Gaddis returned to the mound against the Elks Club and, along with Cavanah and Miranda, came up with three hits. Gaddis and Brian Hoernig came close to a softball rarity against OCFD. Gaddis left the game with a no-hitter and two strike outs. Brian extended the "no-no" and added two more strikeouts before OCFD scored two runs in the last inning. Jake got the last out for OCC.

The positions are not set in stone but in general, your 1998 OCC Softball team looks like this: Brian Hoernig (C), Rick Piper (C), Traci Phillips (C), Head Coach Jim Gaddis (P), Keith Letman (P), Assistant Coach Bill Kilcoyne (1B), Ralph DeWitt (1B), Mike Miranda (2B), Paki Vaughan (2B), Jim Cavanah (SS), Curt Lajala (3B), Jake Mizuno (3B), Team Captain Jim McAluney (OF), Clay Chee (OF), Chris Siegfried (OF), Stew Kawakami (OF), Aaron Eberhardt (OF), Jon Whittington (OF), Henry Ayau (EH), and Jim Joy (EH).

The toughest job for the coach is to be sure everyone gets into the action. This is the largest turnout OCC has ever experienced. Be sure to watch the play-offs this month and cheer on OCC for a repeat championship.

Bill Danford and Bob DeWitz shared the additional last leg and stepped up to the plate to run 10 and 16 miles respectively. They finished in third place in their division.

Candes Gentry worked hard putting two teams together. What a time was in store for Candes as she struggled and improvised as one member of each team failed to show up which created some juggling and creativity. With Candes' last minute switching, she was able to salvage

one team's effort. They went on to win first place. The second team was not able to finish. Reveille sounded at 7 a.m. as runners pitter pattered past Schofield porches and subdued cheers uttered encouragement when the exuberant runners finished their legs.

thing just right for you.

You can reserve the entire Dining Room for breakfast, Monday through Saturday; lunch on Monday or Saturday, or for dinner on Monday. The Dining room will accommodate up to 200 people seated for a meal and up to 300 for cocktails and pupus.

You can reserve the party rooms on the Diamond Head side of the Dining Room for lunch or dinner, Tuesday through Saturday, or for brunch on Sunday. Full capacity for all the rooms combined is 80 seated for a meal, and 125 for cocktails and pupus.

You can reserve one room for a party of 10. Other combinations of rooms are available depending on the size of your group.

If you plan a meeting before or after your meal, you can sit as you do for dining or it is possible to have one room set up for the meeting and another for eating and socializing.

If your meeting is early in the morning, get everyone off to a good start with a Continental breakfast.

The Club will provide a TV/VCR or a slide screen, a microphone and sound system and a lectern upon request.

You may choose what you wish to serve from the regular Dining Room menu, talk with Liz about anything else you would like to



have, or just give her the general idea and she and the Chef will take it from there.

- Lunch is served, Tuesday through Friday, from noon to 2 p.m. The menu includes sandwiches, salads and hot entrees.
- Dinner is served Tuesday through Saturday from 6 to 9:30 p.m. Complete menus include pupus, Salad Bar, Entrees and Dessert.
- On Sundays, a Breakfast Buffet is served from 8:30 a.m. to 1 p.m.; Brunch is served from 8:30 a.m. to 2 p.m., and a Prime Rib Buffet is available from 6 to 9:30 p.m.
- Closed on Mondays.

The Main Dining Room has four private dining rooms that can accommodate from 10 to 125.

The Dining Room is available for meetings, weddings or private parties on Mondays and Saturdays (until 4 p.m.).

Aloha wear is acceptable attire. Gentleman's attire must include closed footwear, long

trousers (dress or walking shorts are allowed during lunch) and collared shirts. T-shirts, tank tops, athletic clothes and/or swimwear, beach sandals and rubber thongs are not acceptable.

The Club prohibits the use of cellular phones in the Main Dining Room. Smoking is prohibited.

- The Cocktail Lounge is open Tuesday through Thursday, 11:30 a.m.-11 p.m.; Thursday, Friday and Saturday, from 11:30 a.m.-Midnight; Sunday from 10 a.m.-11 p.m.; and Monday from 10 a.m. to 10 p.m.

Casual dress is permitted. T-shirts and athletic clothes may be worn; upper torso covering required for ladies and gentlemen. No tank tops after 6 p.m. No wet clothing or swimwear. Footwear is required.

Children under the age of 8 are not allowed in the carpeted area of the Bar at any time. Minors eight years of age or older may be allowed in the carpeted area at appropriate times to watch sports-cast provided they are in the company of, and under the actual effective and responsible supervision of, an adult member. Under no cir-

cumstances shall any minor be permitted to stand or be seated at the Bar.

Smoking is prohibited in the Bar/Lounge.

Snack Shop

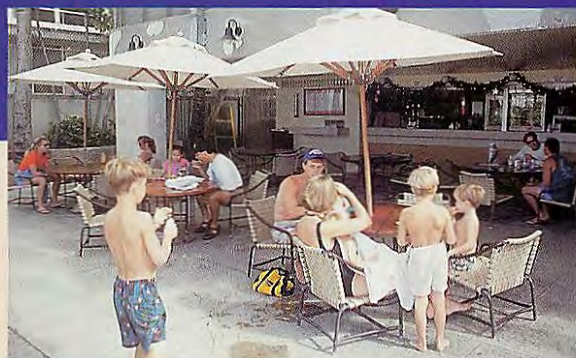

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Board Briefs

Board Briefs is taken from the minutes of the Board of Directors meeting of March 26, 1998 and the Executive Committee meeting of April 16, 1998.

Treasurer's Report—The audit report from Coopers & Lybrand was distributed. The Board adopted a revised vesting schedule for the new employee retirement plan.

Vice President of Activities—Peter Ehrman has resigned from the ODKF Board of Directors to serve on the OCC Board of Directors. . . OCC has been awarded athletic grants from ODKF in the amounts of \$1,000 for the Cline Mann Paddleboard Race, and \$5,000 for the Macfarlane Regatta.

Secretary's Report—The Board approved the suspension of 11 members for 15 days due to failure to pay their accounts on time.

Manager's Report—The Board did not approve the design of the motorcycle T-shirt. . . Net income for food and beverage was \$59,500, which is better than bud-

get. . . The Building Fund increased from the gains in the investments and initiation fees by \$400,000. . . CIP projects in progress are the space utilization study and the Bar flooring. The beach steps are complete and the time management system payment has been refunded.

Admissions & Membership Report—The membership count as of February 28 was 4,280. The Board approved a change to Board Policy 2.3.3. It now reads "No immediate family (Grandparents, father, mother, sister, brother, aunts, uncles, nieces, nephews, first cousins, grandchildren) shall sponsor an applicant for membership."

Historical Report—Paul Dolan has inventoried all trophies on OCC premises. Of the 250 trophies, 60 are recommended for disposal. . . The committee is prioritizing and working on a time line for the digital archiving.

Public Relations Report—The OCC Roster is complete and will be available for distribution at the Front Desk. Members will be billed \$10 on their May statements.
