The Finney family brought home three Gold medals—Thomas on the Boys 12s, Tiare on the Junior Women and John with the Senior Masters Men. 9







#### Stew Rice Night August 19 "Madam Pele and the Ring of Fire"

awaii—a hot spot in the middle of a ring of fire, where a goddess wreaks havoc.

If that sounds like a hot topic, it is.

And pilot/aerospace historian/preservationist David Huffman is a hot ticket on top drawer cruise ships, where he is in demand as an enrichment lecturer.

OCC is fortunate to have caught Dave between cruises and willing to present his popular and highly informative "Madam Pele and the Ring of Fire" slide show/lecture at the Historical Committee's midsummer stew-rice night, Monday, August 19.

In the 1950s as a U.S. Air Force pilot stationed at Hickam AFB, Dave was assigned to fly a heavy transport plane filled with enlisted soldiers, sailors, Marines, and airmen on a sight-seeing flight over the then-active Halemaumau Fire Pit at Kilauea volcano. He remembers the relatively low-level circling flight as one of both awe and very bumpy air. And it was the beginning of an abiding fascination with volcanology, a subject he has pursued diligently and in depth over the decades.

In the 1960s, as a commercial pilot, he had the unique experience of being the first person to view the first visible signs of a volcanic eruption that would soon claim world wide attention—but, enough! Let Dave tell that story himself, in his own inimitable style characterized by joyous enthusiasm for his subject, impressive scholarship, and throw-away wit.

So, just think, a Dave Huffman presentation for the price of an OCC stew-rice buffet, saving the cost of cruise ship passage. The trip around the Pacific Rim and back to Hawaii with Dave is sure to be a highlight of the summer.

The evening will begin at 5:30 with no-host toasts to Pele, followed at 6 p.m. by OCC's traditional stewrice buffet. The show is set for seven o'clock (or 7:15 if need be to assure a darkened room).

#### About the OCC Historical Committee

The 25 years I served as a member of the Historical Committee were very enjoyable. I think the reason this is true is that the committee members have been Club mem-

bers who have a great aloha for the Outrigger Canoe Club and are intensely interested in the Club's history.

This feeling was very apparent when the committee took on the very difficult project of getting the history

of the Club, the book *The Outrigger* written and published. The Committee did
a lot of the work in getting
historical data from
Hawaiian sources, and
assisted the author in every
way possible.

Another project which has been ongoing for quite a few years is the recording of oral histories. When the Committee began this project, we used computer lists organized by the age of the individuals and listed with the oldest at the top of the list. We were able to record the oral histories of the oldest members who were involved in the early years of the Club.

The committee was very fortunate to have several members who were experts in the field of oral histories. These included Margaret Young, who had been active in Punahou's Oral History project, and Ken Pratt, who had done many histories. Other members found it was very enjoyable to interview one of their old friends. The number of oral histories which have been recorded, transcribed and printed is approaching one hundred.

A very enjoyable activity is individual members working on personal projects. One member, Tay Perry, is finding out the present location (or fate) of the koa canoes which were used at the "Old Club".

Another member, Tommy
Thomas, arranged to have four "redwood plank" surfboards designed by
former member Cedric Cook, who
had actually made similar boards for
club members in 1908. Suitable redwood was located and the boards
were made in the Club Carpenter
Shop. The story was reported in 1971
in an issue of the Outrigger.

The Castle Swim was revived as an annual event as a result of the discovery of a 1926 news item.

For the past ten years, the Historical Committee has provided the Board of Directors, and others who are interested, an annual report which includes a computer print out which is based on Club business office records.

The Committee list is adapted to show the age of each Senior and Life

member and the service each has provided to the Club as a Director or as a Chairman of one of the Standing Committees. Listing is by age, from oldest to youngest. One use of this report has been to provide one source of information for the selection of nominees for Life Memberships.

Great progress has been made in the past few years in the establishment of a first class photo archives. Untold hours have been put in on that project by Eugenia McMahon.

A system of filing newspaper clippings covering Club activities and personnel has taken many hours of work by Anita Brightman. Mazeppa Costa has been responsible for putting on the programs, which have an historical nature, and which have been enjoyed by the Club members. The current Oral History program is handled by J. Ward Russell and Marjorie Moore, who has typed all of the transcriptions of Oral Histories to date. I would like to urge Club members who are interested in the past activities of the Club to join the Historical Committee and get involved. A lot of information is available, such as in the old Forecasts. I'm sure you will find that digging out that information will be a lot of fun. 9

On a recent visit to Hong Kong, I decided to take advantage of the new reciprocal agreement the Outrigger Canoe Club had established with The American Club.

With my introduction card (issued by OCC) in one hand, and my passport in the other hand, I arrived at The American Club's business office located on the 47th floor of Building II, Exchange Square Central, Hong Kong Island, a short walk from the Star Ferry Terminal.

I presented my card and passport (a must) and before I knew it, the place was a-buzz. It turns out I am the first OCC member to request reciprocal privileges.

The president of the club, Mark Blacker, comes out from his office to greet me and the next thing I know, Douglas Holtz, the GM is being pulled out of a staff meeting to welcome me and show me around. Many of you may remember Doug from his days as GM at Mid-Pacific. He brought several pieces of memorabilia from Hawaii and they adorn his office.

Needless to say, I was a bit over-

whelmed by the attention and the Chinese equivalent of the Aloha Spirit bestowed on me.

As I mentioned before, The American Club is located in Exchange Square. It's reception and business offices are on the 47th floor. The 48th and 49th floors are the public rooms, with a library, meeting/conference rooms, and numerous restaurants from casual to formal.

The view from the club is spectacular. Hong Kong Harbor is at your feet from one direction and Hong Kong Peak from another direction.

I had lunch in the Boston Clipper Grill, no reservation needed, however plan to go early in order to have a view table. All purchases are by credit card only. There is no billing. You will be issued a guest card with your name, guest number and expiration date. You will need to

carry the card while visiting the club.

The American Club also has a location overlooking Tai Tam Bay, which is near Stanley. It is referred to as the country club with a large pool, tennis and sports activities, not to mention a Sunday Brunch to end all brunches. The seatings for brunch are 11 a.m. and 1:30 p.m. Advance reservations are a must and do not plan a dinner party for Sunday evening.

After brunch, it is an easy walk (20 minutes) and the exercise will do you good, to Stanley Market where the world seems to gather on a Sunday afternoon. Good shopping, good bargains, good prices.

The country club is about 30 minutes by taxi from Central. Be sure to have the concierge at your hotel write the address in Chinese for the driver as well as the name of your hotel. The drivers often do not understand the English version.

The day ended with a ride back to Central on double decker bus #6. You must sit upstairs, left side, forward for the full on experience of a lifetime. The cost is 800HKD (\$1.25) and takes about 35-45 minutes. Traffic tends to be heavy after 3 p.m. The bus goes to Central where you can get off and it is a short walk to the Star Ferry if you are staying on the Kowloon side. (Taxis prefer not going

to Kowloon from Hong Kong Island.)
The ferry is a perfect way to end your day.


The country club sits on a bluff overlooking Tai Tam Bay. The view from the club is awesome. While I was enjoying the brunch, the Dragon Boats, the Chinese version of our outrigger canoes, were in the water practicing for the Dragon Boat Challenge Races. The American Club in Central is 99% business oriented, whereas the country club location attracts the family, all ages, and is casual in feel and dress.

An August article described OCC's "Waikiki in the Gay Nineties" party. Descriptions were taken from H. M. Whitney's Guide Book of 1890: "on the left side of Waikiki Road (Kalakaua Ave.) is the Marine residence of King Kalakaua.

It is a simple, unpretentious wooden structure standing in a large lot planted with coconut trees." Decor described an anchored "boat from an American Man-o-War just beyond the newly-constructed Moana Pier."

#### 25 Years Ago - August 1971

#### Sport Specific Weight Lifting Part Two Canoe Paddling

This series of weight lifting moves is specifically designed to stabilize and improve your stroke for paddling canoes for long distance season.

Last September, I wrote an article on Training for the Canoe Changes (getting in and out of the boat). I suggest you get a jump on that weight lifting program, as well as these moves: Part I and 2 Sport



Finish One Arm Rowing

Now is the time. When
September arrives, you need to
taper your weight lifting program
slow, steady and focus on
endurance. The ladies need to do
this sooner than the men, because
the ladies Molokai race is before
the men's. Continue your band
training and the stretching programs at the same pace or increase.

#### Weight lifting Guidelines

- Always stand, sit or move in Neutral Spine Position. Power Breathe exhale when you lift and squeeze your abdomen.
- Always follow the natural range of motion of the working joint.
- After all moderate to stressful workouts, ice the area(s) 5 to 10 minutes for inflammation and pain management.

### Let's Get to the Gym: total running time 75 minutes

Start with a good 15 to 30 minute warm-up on the treadmill. While walking or jogging on the treadmill, it is better for the lower back to be on the incline. I recommend you have a 3 to 5% incline grade and work up to 7 to 9%

incline. Always walk or jog in neutral. Feet should be hip width apart and parallel, knees slightly bent, abdomen pulled in and chest up.

When finished with the treadmill, take a moment and walk around the room, drink water and stretch your walking/jogging muscles. Do a few pelvic tilts, shoulder rolls and neck isolations. You may want to alternate with the bike or stairmaster.

#### The Program

Note: Your weight should be determined by your own personal strength level. When using free weights, increase in 3 to 5 pound increments to avoid losing form and injury. Straight bars for endurance athletes are not recommended. You need strength in all aspects of the ROM which the straight bars cannot offer due to their fixed range.

#### Pull Ups (Latissimus Dorsi)

Position: Get a flat bench and place it under the pulley system, where you can comfortably grab the pull up bar and stand on the flat bench. Begin in Neutral Strong Stance. Pull up approximately half your body weight for the first set of 15. Pull 3/4 of your weight on the second set of 12. On the third set, do as many as you can holding form and lifting full body weight. Remember to exhale on the pull.

#### One Arm Rowing (Rotator Muscles)

Position: Stand in Neutral Strong Stance. Bend from the hip, keeping a flat or neutral spine. Pull your abdomen in on the exhale of the breath to support the back. Place one hand on the flat bench, the other is holding on to the weight. Keep your body still and exhale as you bring your elbow toward the ceiling. Repeat three sets of 12 each side. Increase weight each set.

#### Overhead Pulls (Serratus Anterior)

Position: On the flat bench lie in a Neutral Strong Lying position—feet hip width and parallel on the floor or bench, knees bent, chest

and head up. The weight should be held directly over your chest, with the arms straight and the elbows slightly bent.

Inhale when you take the weight over your head, let the weight drop just beyond parallel to the floor. Exhale and bring the weight slowly back to the starting point just above the chest. Squeeze your abdomen and sides of the rib cage. Repeat three sets of 12 going up in weight each time. Practice using your abs getting on and off the bench.

#### Back Extensions (Spinal Erectors)

Position: Make sure feet are a little higher than your hips. When you look down at you legs, see Neutral Strong Stance—feet hip width and parallel, knees bent and the hips should be square to the bench pad. Do not go more than two to three inches above parallel to the floor to insure protection of the back.

Inhale while the trunk is vertical to the floor, exhale while you lift the trunk parallel to the floor.

Arms are comfortably out of your way located by your side (see photo for detail). Repeat three sets of 12. Advanced people use three to five pounds of free weights on the second and third set to add resistance. Do not go over five to eight pounds as it could strain the back. Keep your knees bent at all times.

#### The Cool-Down

Go through a complete round of Joint Isolations from feet to head with extra focus on the shoulder and hips. Then go to the floor and do a round of lower, upper and side abdominal. I would recommend one set of 25 to 30 in each position.

Stretch out your butt and back by doing the cross leg knee into the chest move, and leg crossovers while looking over the opposite shoulder. Hold all stretches at least 45 to 90 seconds.

In closing remember to follow and practice healthy habits. It all counts.

Board Briefs

chase an IBM A/S 400 central processing computer unit for the back office system, not to exceed \$30,000. . The Manager informed the Board that he was sending Chef Pirscher to San Francisco to visit the Millennium, a totally organic restaurant staffed by one of the most notable chefs.

Athletic Report—The Board reviewed the Volleyball Committee's "Huli Fund"... Robert Gifford was approved as chair of the Water Polo Committee... The Board approved sending three qualified teams to the Junior Olympics (Boys 16 and 18) on July 3-7 and Volleyball Festival (Girls 16) on June 22-30.

Long Range Planning Report—The Board declined the proposal to purchase the Maunalua Bay Tennis Club. Entertainment Report—Ann Bodison was approved to serve on the committee.

Public Relations Report—A suggestion was made to review the rates for ads published in the magazine.

Admissions Report—

Membership count was 4,273 as of April 30, 1996. . . The Executive Committee requested the Admissions Committee review the subject of reinstatement requests and discuss if it would be feasible to establish a penalty before the effective date of reinstatement. The Admissions Committee agreed with the Executive Committee that a penalty be charged to a consistent offender.
