OCC Wins 19th HCRA Regatta Championship

Kalani said it. Walter repeated it. And every coach reminded his/her crew before every race: "Every point counts." And count they did, as Outrigger scored 140 points to capture the 19th annual Hawaiian Canoe Racing Association Regatta Championship, August 5 at beautiful Hanalei Bay on Kauai.

The point standings were close all day, with Hui Nalu taking an early lead, then Lanikai and then Lokahi. But when the last boat was across the finish line, Outrigger was the state champion for the 10th time in the last 11 years.

Despite winning only four events, Outrigger scored points in 25 of the 31 events to bring home the trophy. In the state championships, points are given for the first eight places.

The Girls 16s won their event for the second straight year for the first victory of the day on a windswept course. They were followed by the Novice A Women, and finally the hard paddling Sophomore/Senior Women who came home with two gold medals each.

Lokahi was runnerup in the AAA Division with 109 points and six first place finishes. Lanikai was third with 104 points and six first place finishes.

Outrigger finished the regatta season with a 7-1 record, losing only the first regatta of the season.

Many upper division paddlers will now head into the distance season which culminates with the Na Wahine O Ke Kai Molokai to Oahu race on September 24 and the Molokai Hoe on October 8.

Kayak and One Person Canoe Storage

The Outrigger is a great location to paddle kayaks and one person canoes, and many members enjoy the privilege of renting stalls to store their kayaks and canoes. However, space is limited and many members and nonmembers have been storing their kayaks and canoes without authorization on Club premises. Specific policies have been established to cover kayak and canoe storage, and Club Management is prepared to enforce these policies immediately.

Nonresident members are not allowed to rent kayak or canoe stalls, and members must relinquish their stalls when transferring to Nonresident status.

Only one kayak or canoe stall will be allowed per member.

Stalls are not transferrable; a member may not buy a kayak or canoe and obtain the right to the stall it is in. All authorized kayaks and canoes must have an identifying decal (available from the Front Desk) on their right front side.

Stalls may be reassigned on the basis of member use or non use, and members who do not use their kayaks or canoes may be required to give up their stalls.

The Business Office keeps waiting lists in chronological order of eligible members who want kayak or canoe stalls, and when a stall becomes available, it will be offered to the next person on the list.

Any member or nonmember who stores their kayak or canoe in a stall or elsewhere on Club premises without authorization will be subject to a fine of \$5 per day, and their kayak or canoe may be disposed of.

New storage racks for kayaks and canoes in the parking garage are being completed, so if you are storing a canoe or kayak at the Club without authorization, please remove it by September 15 to avoid any fine and possible disposal.

If you would like to be placed on the waiting list or give up an existing stall, please contact the Business Office.

Additionally please be aware that the loading zone on the side of the Club's driveway should only be used for loading and unloading kayaks and canoes, not for parking. Once your kayak or canoe is loaded or unloaded, please move your vehicle immediately.

Lastly, to avoid damaging our landscaping, please do not leave your kayaks or canoes on the planted areas of the driveway.

Training for the Canoe Changes

eptember has arrived and the Molokai Channel Crossing for both the men and the women is just around the comer.

"One of the hardest parts of crossing the Molokai Channel and, where seconds into minutes are lost, is in the transition of paddlers in and out of the moving canoe," says Walter Guild.

The stronger the muscles that perform the task of lifting our body weight into the moving canoe, the easier and faster the transition. This month's issue of "Tips from the Trainer" will cover a weight lifting program designed specifically for getting in the canoe.

We begin by discussing what is being used while safely and quickly getting into the canoe.

- · Pair of strong forearms and hands for a firm grip onto the canoe.
- · Strong latissimus dorsi and abdominal wall to start the pull.
- · Strong butt and legs to move you out of the water quickly.
- · Strong arms to assure clean and fast landing in your seat.

Now that our targeted areas are clear, let's go to the gym.



Time: 15 to 30 minutes (depending on your time frame). Start by standing in Neutral

Strong Stance: from head to toe good

the pull up bar and standing on the

posture. Take three deep Power Breaths and squeeze your abdomen on the exhale of the breath.

Joint Isolations: Do eight to 12 pelvic tilts forward and back, do the same side to side and then circle each direction four to eight times. Roll your shoulders forward and back four to eight times. Slowly look down and up four to eight times. Look side to side four to eight times. Breath and return to Neutral Spine.

Now jump on a cardiovascular machine of your choice: bike, rowing machine, stairmaster or treadmill at least 15 minutes. After getting off the cardio machine take a moment to drink water and stretch at least two to four moves before moving into your weight lifting program.

The Program

Time: 30 to 45 minutes Position: Take a stick with a rope that can adequately hold five to ten pounds of weight. Stand in Neutral Strong Stance with your arms out comfortably in front of

Work the Grip: Holding on to the stick with two feet of line and a weight hanging at the end, begin to roll with your hands as the weight lifts toward the stick. When it reaches the stick, reverse and roll it down, remembering to use your abdomen. Repeat five to 25 times and change angle of arm higher, lower and slightly to each side. Change every four to eight repetitions.

Position: Get a flat bench and place it under the pulley system, where you can comfortably grab the pull up bars and stand on the flat bench.

Pull Ups: While holding onto

flat bench, begin pulling up approximately 1/2 your body weight for the first set of 15. Men pull 3/4 of your weight on the second set of 12 and on the third set pull almost your weight. On the third set, do as many as you can while holding good form. Remember to exhale when you go up.

Note: Every other workout change your handgrip to get strong in all angles wide, narrow and neutral.

Position: Stand in Neutral Spine Position which entails keeping your feet hip distance apart and parallel. Knees are bent and hips are neutral. Abs are in on the exhale, chest is lifted and head and eyes are

Squat with ball: While standing in Neutral, place a rubber ball which is eight inches in diameter between your knees. Begin to squat down slowly. Do not allow your knees to go past your toes. Do three sets of 12. To intensify-hold in each hand 10 to 20 pound free weights.

Position: Use a flat bench. Place both hands behind you and onto the edge of the bench or desk. Keeping the knees bent and feet hip distance apart secures the lower back and prevents injury of the shoulder.

Dips: Grip the side and then slowly lower your body keeping your knees bent. Remember to use your abdomen by exhaling and contracting on the lift. Do three sets of 12. Change the width of your hands to help work different angles. Also change how you lower yourself, by either lowering further or less. This will promote strength in different angles.

Cool Down: Repeat the Joint Isolations as seen in the Warm-up and return to Neutral Spine Position. Finish with two to four deep power breaths and full body contractions. Good Luck! 9

Board Briefs

Board Briefs is taken from the minutes of the Board of Directors meeting of June 29, 1995 and the Executive Committee meeting of July 13, 1995.

Bar and Lounge Renovation— The Board approved the design and concept for the bar portion of the renovation of the Bar and Lounge. The objective is to make the Bar a more efficient working area for the staff resulting in better service for the members, and replace old equipment. The appearance will be similar with the character of the new Dining Room. Cost estimates are still consistent with budget.

Membership Survey—Jeffrey
Smith of Mattson Sunderland presented
a brief executive summary of the
Membership Survey. There was a 40%
response. The top ten final conclusions
were: 1) the age profile is older. Median
age of 55 years old. 2) Members use
Club on the average of once a week. 3)
Main attractions are eating, exercise and
the Fitness Center. A minority takes
advantage of beach facilities. 4)
Difference of interest; younger members
focus on fitness and exercise facilities.
Older members focus on eating and
drinking. 5) Both management and

Board of Directors received "OK" rating. One-fourth of those members responded they would like a change in the process of nominating candidates for the Board of Directors. 7) Service of the Club facilities generally rated "OK" with the exception of food service. 8) Food service facilities is an area of greatest interest. Many members said they would use more often if there were some changes. 9) Over half who responded said improvements were needed on Hau Terrace service. 10) An important way to encourage Club usage is to provide a menu with more selections. The Long Range Planning Committee will review the survey and prepare recommendations to the Board regarding interpretation and methods of implementation. The committee will also include the Public Relations Committee in the process.

Treasurer's Report—The
Finance Committee is a standing committee and should be added to the Bylaws. . . A physical count of the inventory will be held at a cost of \$1,500.

Vice President of Operations— The Search Committee is proceeding with the recruitment of a General Manager. Search Committee members are Tim Guard, chair; Wendell Brooks, ex-officio; Mark Buck, Glenn Perry, Barbara Stehouwer, and John Pyles. Pannell, Kerr, Forster & Co. has been retained to assist the Search Committee. The search has been narrowed to 12 qualified candidates. . . The Marketing Adhoc Committee is preparing a letter to encourage more use of the Club.

Secretary's Report—Five members were suspended for 15 days due to failure to pay their account on time.

Manager's Report—The new host computer has been installed. . . All negative comments on food service are being tracked and responded to by phone. . . The Executive Chef William Teruya has resigned effective July 31. The Board asked the House Committee to recommend an appropriate farewell for the chef and appreciative gesture on his retirement. . . \$7,500 was authorized for the development of a master plan of the Club's computers.

Athletic Report—The new Force Five Canoe will be named the Moana. Funds were approved to purchase a second Force Five canoe and cover at the cost of \$8,800... The Canoe Racing Committee recommends improvements to the Kaoloa to be done by Domie Gose and members of the CRC following the

HCRA Championships. Modifications will not exceed \$1,500... Owners of illegally stored kayaks and one-person canoes must remove the boats from the Club premises by September 15, 1995 or be charged \$5 per day. Unclaimed boats will be removed after September 30.

Building & Grounds Report—
The concept of a lighting service contract to retrofit Club lighting and provide five years of maintenance was approved. . . The service ramp project will proceed not to exceed \$5,000. . . Concern about illegal use of the handicap parking stalls was referred to the House Committee with the recommendation that only those with State handicap parking permits be allowed to park in the stalls. . . A second sample application will proceed to solve the Dining Room acoustical problem at a cost of \$1,000.

Entertainment Report—A subsidy of \$4,000 will be provided for the Annual Luau.

Historical Report—The President settled Ms. Weinick's claim for \$500.

Admissions & Membership Report—The Bylaw Committee is researching the Bylaw change regarding Surviving Spouses of Senior Members. . . The membership count as of May 31, 1995 was 4,256. . . A policy was reaffirmed allowing applicants for membership whose names have been posted to train with the Club's athletic teams. . . A new policy was established that no admissions matters will be considered by the Board except in a session with a quorum present.

Other Business—Guest members and reciprocal members cannot sign out any of the Club's boats, canoes or paddleboards. . . Guest members and reciprocal members cannot represent the Outrigger Canoe Club on any Outrigger team. . . Guest members and reciprocal members are allowed unrestricted use of the Fitness Center. . . Raymond Ludwig's resignation as General Manager was received May 26, 1995. A severance agreement has been signed by both parties. O


