Jones, Graf, Guild Win Winter Tri Ocean Races

Dawson Jones, Geoff Graf and Walter Guild won the 17th annual Winter 10K Paddleboard Race, and the 6th annual Winter Tri Ocean Surfski and One-Person Canoe Races on December 17 at the Club.

This is the second year in a row that the trio have finished first in their races.

Jones won the paddleboard event in a time of 1:08.35. Graf finished the 12K surfski course in :54:16 and Guild completed the 8K one-person canoe course in :43:58.

A record 112 contestants entered the races.

A staggered start between each of the three races, adjusted for different speeds and the distances each vessel had to com-

plete, created an exciting finish with the first place finishers of each division reaching the beach just seconds apart.

Other Outrigger members to win their divisions were Chris Moore, first, senior men, and

Dale Hope, first, masters men, in the paddleboard; Paula Crabb, first, masters women, one-person canoes; and Traci Phillips, first, women open, and Jennifer Lowe, first, women novice, surfski. ☐

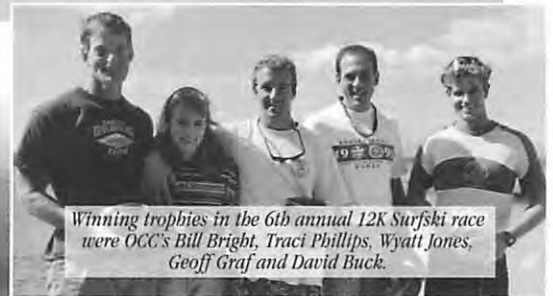

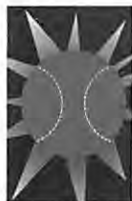

The OCC Softball team wrapped up its 1994 season with a third place finish in Leahi League action. Fourteen OCC players batted more than .300. Bill Kilcoyne led the team in batting for the fourth consecutive year. Paki Vaughan, however, denied Kilcoyne of taking his third straight Most Valuable Player award by winning for the first time.

Be Sure to Vote in Club Election

Board Briefs

Board Briefs is taken from the minutes of the Board of Directors meeting on November 17, 1994 and the Executive Committee meetings on November 10 and December 8, 1994.

Treasurer's Report—The Budget Committee proposed to continue with the policy established by the Board of making the Food and Beverage operation, including the mini charge, break even. Based on projected results for 1994 and the assumption that the level of covers are comparable to 1994, including the allowance for the "down time" for renovation, it will be necessary to make up approximately \$177,000. It is proposed to increase bar prices by 5% and to change the menu. . . The committee proposed to follow the existing policy of making small annual dues increases in lieu of higher, but less frequent increases. Projected differential to be made up by dues for 1995 is approximately \$60,000. . . The Board approved the following dues and locker increases effective January 1, 1995: Senior, \$44; Regular \$88; Intermediate \$61; Associate Spouse/Parent member \$9.50; Associate Parent Nonmember \$13.50; Junior Parent Member \$9.50; Junior Parent Nonmember \$13.50; Inactive \$4.75; Nonresident Annual Dues \$245. . . New locker

room fees will be Large \$17.50; Regular \$13.00; 2 Tier \$11.50; 3 Tier \$9.25; Junior Regular \$11.50; Junior 3 Tier 5.75; Daily Locker Rental \$2.75; Surfboard \$6; Surfboard Double \$9; Surf Ski/Kayak/One Person Canoe \$11.75; Utility \$11.75.

Secretary's Report—Nine members were suspended for 15 days due to failure to pay their accounts on time.

Manager's Report—The construction portion of the Dining Room will be completed and in operation on November 22. The teak chairs are scheduled to be delivered on November 21, however the cushions will not be here until the early part of December. The new tables should be here the early part of December. New china is in and will be used starting November 22. The project will be approximately 10% over budget.

Athletics Report—The Building and Grounds Committee is reviewing the possibility of off-site storage for canoes.

Building & Grounds Report—A structural inspection of the Volleyball Court fencing and recommended repairs was approved for \$1,000.

Other Business—The President was authorized to proceed with his request to the Oahu Hawaiian Canoe Racing Association for their year end financials which would be done annually starting with 1994. ☐
