





The 30th annual Hawaiian Open will take place the week of January 9-15. The members of the Outrigger have been granted clubhouse privileges at Waialae during the week of the Open. In order to obtain admission to the clubhouse, you need only present your OCC membership card. Waialae County Club will be extending cash privileges for goods and services during the Open. Parking and admission to the tournament are separate and not included.

KAYAKS, SURFSKIS AND ONE PERSON

To enable the Club to exercise better control over kayaks, surfskis and one person canoes stored on Club premises, we ask that you be aware of and adhere to our Board approved policy of requiring any kayak, surfski or one person canoe stored on Club premises to have an OCC decal.

The decals can be picked up at the reception desk and should be placed on the top front of your vessel. There is a charge of \$1 per decal. To get a decal, a member must be renting a storage space. There is a limit of one decal per member.

Any kayak, surfski or one person canoe stored on the Club's premises without a decal, and any vessel with a decal which is not stored properly, will be impounded.

MINORS IN CLUB BAR ROOM

One final note, I must remind you of the Club Rule pertaining to minors in the Club Bar Room or Lounge. Rule defines the Club Bar Room as the carpeted area of the Club where the Bar, hanging canoe and television set are located.

Infants and other minors under eight years of age are not permitted in the Bar Room at any time. Minors 8 years of age or older may be permitted in the Club Bar Room at appropriate times to watch sportscasts on television or other special telecasts as may be deemed permissible by the General Manager.

But in all cases, minors must be in the company of and under the actual, effective and responsible supervision of an adult member. Under no circumstances will any minor be permitted to stand or be seated at the Bar itself. I will remind you that this Rule will be strictly enforced. 9

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Dr. George Kanahele at Stew Rice Dinner on January 30th

e hear a lot these days about "sense of place" especially in relationship to Hawaii and Waikiki. If we think about it, we know that Waikiki's seductive sense of place is its source of power as "the engine that drives the Islands' economy."

But sense of place—emphasizing fertile lands and ponds—gave it a different kind of power than it commands today. In the past, Waikiki was the royal seat of power on Oahu.

If this kind of information and ruminating catches your fancy, don't miss the OCC Historical Committees next stewrice night—a slide show/lecture, "Prehistoric Waikiki" by noted historian, author, and businessman, Dr. George S. Kanahele on Monday, January 30 in the Main Dining Room.

Often described as the "spiritual father of the Hawaiian

Renaissance" and known widely as a Hawaiian-culture consultant, Kanahele has pioneered a new philosophy on the value of aloha to the visitor industry. Among his recent writings is a report for the Queen Emma Foundation, "Restoring Hawaiianness to Waikiki."

Research for his highly praised *Pauahi* (a biography of Bernice Pauahi Bishop) and other works have provided Kanahele a rich background on Waikiki, which he presents in his "Prehistoric" package in a warm, light and humorous manner

The mystique of Waikiki's sense of place will be unmistakable as this modern-day Hawaiian scholar shares insights about his forebears to an appreciative audience assembled on one of Waikiki's most splendid sites.

1 package tortillas

Monterey Jack Cheese

2 cans chopped ripe olives

1 can enchilada sauce

1 can tomato sauce

Fry meat and onions; grate cheese.

Layer meat, then tortillas dipped in enchilada sauce and tomato sauces which you have mixed together.

Then add some chopped olives and grated Jack cheese.

Repeat layers.

Pour remaining sauce over last layer, spread grated cheese on top and bake in oven at 350 degrees for 1/2 hour.

Serve with tossed salad.

TIPS Trainer

Many of us start the new exercise year off with a bang, only to fizzle out by spring. Worse yet, we've pulled out because of injury. The Body By You! foundational program will assist you in getting and staying fit in 1995.

Rule 1: Before starting any exercise program, consult your doctor for an overall health evaluation.

Rule 2: Don't put the cart before the horse. Take the time to lay down a good foundation before starting your new activity.

Rule 3: Get to know a good coach or personal trainer and a sports massage therapist. A good support team is essential for injury prevention and optimal performance.

The four components of building a strong body foundation are:

- Neutral Spine Position to insure body alignment and injury prevention.
- Power Breathe to strengthen your abdomen, support your back and manage stress.
- Build a Strong Abdomen to support your back and stabilize your hips.
- Practice joint movements all day to keep your joints working smoothly and easily.

Now we implement these four components into an easy routine that should be followed weekly (for best results three times per week and parts of the program all day). These sets and number of repetitions were designed to be completed in 15 to 20 minutes.

Warm Up

Time: 5-8 minutes (or two of your favorite songs).

Position: Neutral Strong Walking Position. Feet hip width and parallel, knees bent at all times.

Abdomen is pulled on the exhale of the breath: i.e. Power Breathe. Chest and head are lifted, arms are moving opposite to the lifting knee.

The Program

Time: 8-10 minutes (or three or four songs).

Position: Begin on the floor with your knees up and your feet flat on the floor hip width apart. If you have a soccer ball, a firm pillow, or 4-square ball, place it between your knees to stabilize your hips and strengthen your inner thigh.

Lower abdomen (the distance between navel and pubic bone). Slowly contract the navel toward your spine on the exhale of your breath and squeeze. This will produce a pelvic tilt. Repeat three sets of 12 repetitions.


Upper abdomen (from the bottom of the sternum to the navel). Slowly contract the navel toward your spine on the exhale of the breath and lift your shoulders off the floor, while keeping your chin away from your chest (spot a place on the ceiling). Repeat three sets of 12 repetitions.


The oblique (connecting the front to the back, these are the sides). With both feet on the floor, slowly on the exhale, lift your shoulder toward the opposite hip, while keeping your hips and one elbow on the floor at all times. Do three sets of 12 reps on one side, then repeat to the other side. (Stay on the same side for three sets, then go to other for maximum strength.)



BOARD BRIEFS

Board Briefs is taken from the Board of Directors meeting on October 27, 1994 and the Executive Committee meeting on November 10, 1994.

Dining Room Report—The project is more than 10% over budget due to unexpected problems, including building department changes which resulted in additional costs, the addition of a display reefer, a change request from the electrical department, drainage problems and additional cost for roofing. Not all the new tables or the lighting will be in place by the official opening on November 22. Manager was authorized to seek permission from the Elks Club to plant a tree on the Elks side of the wall as one of their lights shines directly into the OCC dining area.

Secretary's Report—Eight members were suspended for 15 days for failure to pay their accounts on time. One member was terminated for being four times delinquent.

Manager's Report—All seven capital projects in progress will be completed by the end of the year. Total capital expenses for 1994 are \$935,033. This is the second largest single year

capital addition expenditure since being at this site (garage addition was the first). . . The comptroller will look into accepting credit card payments. . . The Board set a mini charge policy as follows: Members who are subject to the mini charge and are residing outside of the state of Hawaii, will be assessed the mini charge on an annual basis instead of a quarterly basis. . . The Manager and the Club's legal representative appeared before the Board of Review to appeal the Club's real property tax. . . A total of 270 members are now using the automatic bill payment plan. . . In 1994, Guest members have accounted for 36.8% of sales in the Logo Shop, compared to 32.2% in 1993 and 46.9% in 1989.

Athletics Report—The Board approved the sale of the Iwalani racing canoe and the purchase of two Force Five canoes for the 1995 canoe racing season. . . Management will look into hanging the canoes from the existing racks for more storage, as well as the possibility of a warehouse for additional storage.

Building & Grounds Report—A Club Garden Subcommittee was approved as part of the B&G Committee.

Entertainment Report—The Board decided that the name of the Dining Room will remain the Main Dining Room.

Admissions & Membership Report—The membership count as of September 30, 1994 was 4,226. . . The current policy pertaining to children of Nonresident members was amended as follows: Children of Nonresident members who are voting members prior to transferring to Nonresident status, who are 10 through 14 years of age, admitted as Nonresident members will not be charged an initiation fee provided their completed membership application is received prior to their 14th birthday. These Nonresident members will be charged the Nonresident annual dues as established from time to time.

Nominating Committee—Serving on the Nominating Committee for 1995 are Karl Heyer IV, chair; Peter Balding, Ann Martin, Jimmy McMahon and Vik Watumull.

The Cool Down

Time: 4-6 minutes (or two songs).

Note: each movement should be done 8 to 16 times. Position: Slowly stand, return to Neutral Strong Stance.


Hips: Pelvic tilts forward and back. Pelvic tilts side to side. Circle the pelvis


slowly both directions.

Shoulders: Roll forward/roll back. Lift your shoulder up and down (shrug). Neck: Move your head down slowly and then up. Ear to shoulder, breathe, and slowly alternate from side to side. Looking slowly, side to side, in rotation. Stretch and Breathe: Slowly roll down toward the floor with your knees slightly bent. Breathe and slowly roll up and realign your spine. Return to Neutral Strong Stance.

Friendly Reminders
When tension and soreness occur, 5-8 minutes of ice is a great anti-inflammatory.
It is very important to drink water, especially while exercising.

Lasting change happens slowly. Don't give up. Health and fitness are a style of life that we can live with.
