

# Duke's Crew Remembers His Birthday

They were an undefeated crew for nearly a decade in the 1940s and 50s, and they still come together as a crew every year to remember the birthday of their coach, and steersman—Duke Kahanamoku.

This year, on Sunday, August 28, four members of the crew gathered at the Club, as is their tradition, to paddle out in a canoe with leis, and remember their friend.

With surf breaking across the channel this year, they paddled beyond the wind sock and dropped their leis in the ocean as a tribute to Duke in memory of his 104th birthday which occurred on August 24.

The leis caught the current and were carried out beyond the reef.

"Usually we go farther out," said Tom Arnott, "but we're all more than 70 now and we don't paddle much anymore. The thought was there even if the bodies weren't up to it."

Back in the boat for the occasion were Tom Arnott, Thad Ekstrand, Jim Fernie and Tom O'Brien.

Missing from the occasion were Bob Bush who died in 1990, and Carlos Rivas, John Beaumont and Jimmy Pflueger who were not available.

The tradition of remembering Duke's birthday began in 1968.

Duke passed away in January of that year and he was given a beach boy funeral. His loyal crew carried his ashes out for burial at sea. When his birthday came around in August, the crew decided they wanted to remember their friend in a special way and paddled out together and scattered flowers in his memory.

And they've done it every year for the last 26 years.

In an article by Bob Krauss in the Honolulu Advertiser in 1990, Arnott recalled that they were in their 20s when Duke found them playing volleyball at the old Outrigger Canoe Club in Waikiki.

"Duke came along and said, 'Hey, you kids look like you're in pretty good shape. Why don't I teach you to paddle? Let's form a crew.' That's how it started."

At that time, Thad was in the Army and Tom O'Brien was in the Navy.

The Senior Six as they were known made history as they won every race they entered for the next decade, including the first Walter Macfarlane 4th of July Regatta. They were never defeated in their favorite canoe—the Leilani.

The senior six won the first Macfarlane Regatta in 1943 with Duke steering.

Watching their husbands paddle out were Pat Ekstrand, Betty Fernie and Marion Arnott.

"It's because Duke was a stickler for conditioning," Arnott told Krauss. "We'd paddle four miles and think we were through. Then he'd put it to us again out into blue water before he said, 'Way, 'nuff."

Watching their husbands carry out the tradition, Marion Arnott, Pat Ekstrand and Betty Fernie, recalled some of the chicken skin moments that have occurred during the ritual.

"One year, the men were spreading the flowers and talking about Duke and all of a sudden a school of porpoises popped up right in the middle of the flowers. It was a beautiful sight to see," Marion said. "Even the porpoises loved Duke and wanted to be part of the ceremony."

"In 1990, on Duke's 100th birthday, when the men took the flowers out, an iwa bird flew right over them. It was like the bird wanted to remember Duke too," she added.

With all of the Senior Six now in their 70s, how long will they continue this tradition?

"As long as we can still get in the boat and hold a paddle, we'll be here," Ekstrand said. "Duke was a wonderful friend. None of us will ever forget him." **9**



# Outrigger Long Distance Paddlers Win

utrigger Canoe Club crews won all three divisions they entered in the 27th annual Duke Kahanamoku Long Distance Race on August 21. The 26-mile race starts at Lanikai Point and finishes at Duke Kahanamoku Beach.

Our men's crew was the first to finish in 3 hours, 4 minutes—seven minutes ahead of previously undefeated Lanikai, many of whose paddlers were competing in Western Samoa.

Outrigger's masters crews won their divisions—the men with a 3:16:04 (sixth overall) and the women a 1:33:03 (sixth overall). A second open men's crew finished 9th overall in 3:21:53.

The women raced from the Hilton, westerly toward Kewalo Basin and then easterly toward Diamond Head and back to the Hilton's beachfront.

The biggest changes in the Dining Room will take place during October. All of the curtains and sliding glass doors will be removed. They will be replaced with custom manufactured teak bi-fold doors with glass panels.

These bi-fold doors will be moved to the outer most pillars. Thus, with these new doors, greater openness with a total outside feeling will be achieved. Also with the relocation of the new bi-fold door, superior protection from bad weather will be provided while still retaining the makai views. As a result, we will be able to eliminate the unsightly canvas roll down storm curtains.

For the evening hours, new interior and exterior lighting is being redesigned by Mr. Lowell Barnhart. He will try to create a special lighting effect similar to being under a hau tree during a full moon. He is also planning to install some additional tiki torches on the ocean side of the Club.

It is our hope that all of this work will create that special place for you to dine and entertain. Chef Teruya and his entire kitchen staff are ready to prepare for you the best meals available anywhere in Hawaii.

In support of that effort, our Food and Beverage Manager Don Figueira, with the help of Liz Ventura and her staff, are preparing to give service that you will be proud of. During these renovation months, we ask that you continue to support your Club and dine with your fellow Club members.

The Dining Room is the first major renovation of its type since the Club was built 30 years ago.


















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# Photo Contest Deadline November 7

Spearheaded by long time Winged "O" honoree Wally Young, the jacket is






Geoff Graf receives kayaking award from Walter Guild.

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
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#### Outrigger Masters Win National Titles for 4th Year

t the United States Volleyball Association National Championships held in Tulsa, Oklahoma, May 28 through June 4, the Outrigger Canoe Club Men's 35 and over and the Men's 40 and over both won the Gold Medal for the fourth year in a row.



Blankenfeld, traveled to Austin, Texas to play in the Junior Olympics, July 6-10. Forty-seven teams from around the U.S. were entered.






