

OCC Members Sweep 5th Annual Tri-Ocean Races

The athletic talent of members at the Outrigger Canoe Club overwhelmed the competition at this year's 16th annual Winter Paddleboard Race, and 5th annual Winter Tri-Ocean Races, by winning all three events.

Open to the public, and held on December 11 in the water off Waikiki, the races were the third and final races of 1993, sponsored by the Paddleboard Committee. This is one of only two races in the state where paddleboards, surfskis and one-person canoes race simultaneously.

A 13-minute staggered start between each of the three divisions, adjusted for different speeds and the distances each vessel had to complete, created an exciting finish with the first place finishers of each vessel reaching the beach just seconds apart.

Dawson Jones won top honors in

the 10K Paddleboard Race by edging out defending champion Bruce Eliashof for first overall. Dawson's name will be added to the perpetual trophy on display in the Lobby. Current record holder Dale Hope finished third overall, capturing the Masters Men title, while Blair Thorndike won the Senior Men's division by finishing seventh overall. Sarah Spoehr out-paddled her competition, winning the women's title.

The 12K Surfski Race was won comfortably by Geoff Graf who finished second overall last year. His time of :53:37 establishes a new course record. Georg Kissner and Alfred Horner rounded out the Men's Open division by finishing third and fourth overall.

Winning the Masters Men's division, and finishing second overall, was Bob Rocheleau. Wyatt Jones won the Men's Novice

division, with Kathy Erwin and Nina Pacewicz capturing first in the Women's Open and Women's Novice divisions.

Current record holder Walter Guild recaptured top honors in the 8K One-Person Canoe Race by outpaddling Robby Harrison and John Foti who finished second and third respectively in the Senior Men's group, and overall.

Finishing first in the Men's division, and fourth overall, was Bobby Nottage. Jimmy Kincaid captured the Masters Men division, and Connie Johnson won the Women's title.

A total of 87 paddlers participated in this event, making it and the entire '93 paddleboard racing season a tremendous success. The Paddleboard Committee would like to extend a big mahalo to everyone who contributed their time and energy.



OCC's Best Chefs

If you want a dessert fit for a President or a Valentine, try this Swedish Cherry Cake.

Swedish Cherry Cake

1/4 cup butter 1 cup sugar 1 egg, beaten 1 cup sifted flour 1/2 tsp. soda 1/8 tsp. salt

1 1-lb can sour pitted cherries, thoroughly drained and coarsely chopped (keep juice) 2/3 cup coarse chopped walnuts

Cream butter and sugar together thoroughly; add and beat in egg. Sift flour, soda and salt together and add to creamed mixture alternately with chopped cherries. Fold in nuts. Spread in 9x9 inch greased and floured loaf pan and bake at 375 degree for 25 minutes or until done. Cool a few minutes then remove from pan and cool on a wire rack.

When cold, spread with topping as follows:

Topping1/2 Tab. unflavored gelatin
2 Tab. cold water
1 cup heavy cream

Soften gelatin in cold water and dissolve over hot water. Whip cream until it starts to have some body then gradually add the softened gelatin. Spread on cake and refrigerate while making the glaze.

Glaze

1 cup cherry juice (add water as necessary to make cup) 1/2 cup sugar 2 Tab. cornstarch 1/2 tsp. red food coloring

Combine and cook, stirring until thick and clear. Cool, stirring often. Add few drops of almond extract. When almost cold, spread over the cream topping.

Be Sure to Vote in Club Election

Nine OCC members have been nominated as candidates to serve on the Club's Board of Directors for 1994-95. They are Bill Bright, Ken Brown, Paula Crabb, Kawika Grant, Scrappy Lipton, Robert Moore, Jim Peterson, Charles Swanson and William Swope.

The candidates were profiled in last month's Outrigger magazine.

You will be receiving your ballot in the mail in early February. This is time dated, so please don't ignore it.

Club members will be asked to vote for six Directors to be elected to two-year terms.

The people you vote for will be in charge of guiding this Club, choosing

the management, approving the activities we fund and directing the long range policies of the Club.

When your ballot arrives, it will have information about the candidates and voting instructions on it, but these will be repeated here for you as a reminder.

The final date to vote is Sunday, February 27 at 6 p.m. But you don't have to wait until then. Vote as soon as you get your ballot, then mail it or drop it off at the Club.

Sign the outside envelope on the ballot, include your number and write legibly. Ballots without the outside envelope are discarded. Your signature tells the election judge that you are a qualified voting member. If you are delinquent in paying your bill, your ballot is invalid.

Vote for no more than six candidates. The candidates with the highest number of votes are those who are elected.

All Senior, Regular, Intermediate and Life members of the Club in good standing are eligible to vote. Your vote counts. Please kokua.

Attend the Annual Meeting on Monday, February 28 at 5:30 p.m. and hear the committee reports and election results. Become involved with the operations of your Club.

What Does the Board of Directors Do?

The Outrigger Canoe Club Board of Directors consists of 13 members. Directors are elected for two-year terms, with seven members elected in odd-numbered years, and six members in even-numbered years. Directors may not serve more than three consecutive terms, but may serve for more than three terms which are not successive.

According to Section 7 of the Club Bylaws, all corporate powers of the Club are vested in the Board of Directors.

The Board has the following powers:

To appoint and control and at pleasure remove (without cause except in the case of the elected officers) any officers, agents and employees, and to allow such compensation for their services as to the Board shall seem proper.

To appoint or authorize the appointment of such standing and other committees as these Bylaws may authorize and as to the Board shall seem proper for carrying on the activities of the Club and for the conduct of its business or affairs, and to define their jurisdiction, duties and powers, provided that all committee shall be subject at all times to the control of the Board and be subject to change at the pleasure of the Board.

To make and enforce rules not inconsistent with these Bylaws, regulating from time to time the affairs and conduct of the Club, and the conduct of its members in connection with the Club, and of other persons admitted to any of the privileges of the Club or within its precincts; and to give effect to such rules of committee as shall meet with the approval of the Board; all as in the judgment of the Board shall seem advisable from time to time.

To determine and govern all matters affecting finances, discipline, decorum and harmony.

To make and authorize expenditures, and the purchase of supplies or personal property for the Club or for the use or accommodation of its members.

To incur such special indebtedness as they deem necessary not exceeding Fifty Thousand Dollars (\$50,000) in any one year.

To call special meetings of the members to consider specified subjects.

To censure, suspend, request and enforce the resignation of or expel any members who shall be found guilty of any offense against any Bylaws, rule or regulation of the Club, and to drop from membership or expel any member for nonpayment of any indebtedness to





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
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Backward Glances

Reciprocal

Persons eligible for Nonresident membership who also are members of clubs having reciprocal agreements with the Outrigger Canoe Club.

Guest

Persons eligible for Nonresident membership and sponsored by qualified Club members.

Service

Commissioned officers of the armed services and government officials of the United States of America while temporarily stationed in the State of Hawaii.

Life

Persons who have been Regular members and who have been recommended for Life membership by the Board of Directors and approved at a general membership meeting.

Honorary

Persons noted for outstanding achievements or service.

Special

Persons who would make a special contribution to the Club and who would otherwise not be available for membership may be admitted for a term of one year or less following written application and recommendation by the Admissions and Membership Committee and approval of the Board of Directors.
