

Bill Bright Selected to Winged "O"

When Bill Bright first became active at the Outrigger Canoe Club, his only thoughts were to participate in the water sports that he loved and had missed while attending high school on the Big Island and college in Vermont.

Once back in Hawaii, he didn't lose any time. He has been an avid canoe paddler and kayaker since 1974, as well as Club Captain, coach, and member of the Canoe Racing and Kayak committees.

"Being selected as a Winged "O" is a real honor. I remember looking at the pictures in the Trophy Case in the Lobby and thinking of all the things these guys had done. awesome. It never occurred to me that I might be selected someday," he modestly says.

But on Saturday, September 18 at the OCC 85th anniversary Luau, Bill Bright was selected as the 32nd member of the Outrigger's prestigious athletic group, Winged "O" in recognition of his outstanding achievement as an athlete and the service he has rendered to the

While Winged "O" members Walter Guild and Mark Buck were extolling his virtues before the full house at the Luau, modest Bill was standing in the food line and heard not a word. When he was escorted to the stage he was stunned but wasted no time donning his Winged "O" jacket and thanking his masters paddling crew for coming to the Luau to witness the event.

"I didn't want to go to the Luau," he says. "We had the Skippy race the next day and I wanted to get to bed early. But my "We had the crew insisted that we all come and enjoy the luau. Being selected to the Winged "O" was really a happy

surprise.

Paddler Since 1974.

Bill may be modest, but his accomplishments as an athlete at the OCC aren't.

Elected to membership in the Outrigger in 1963, he started paddling for the Club in 1974 and paddled his first Molokai race that year. He was a member of the winning OCC Molokai crews in 1979, 1980, 1983, 1984, and 1986, and was on the winning masters crews in 1990, 1992 and 1993. He also paddled on

Open crews in the Molokai in 1975, 1976, 1978, 1981, 1985 and 1989, and was on the second place Masters crews in 1988 and 1991.

If you're counting, that's 17

Molokai's in 21 years.

"As long as I feel that I can contribute to a team, I'll continue to paddle," he says. "I love the sport and the guys I paddle with."

During regatta season, Bill has paddled on novice, upper division and masters crews. He's won 12 Oahu championships since OHCRA

started in 1979.

His Winged "O" plaque, designating his Hawaiian Canoe Racing Association State championships is also full, including the Masters title this past August. Just for the record, he's been state champ on the Sophomore crews in 1976, 1978 and 1979; the Junior Men in 1981 and 1987; the Senior Men in 1983, 1984, 1985 and 1989; the Open 4, 1986; and the Masters, 1990, 1991 and 1993.

Again, if your're counting--13 state championship gold medals.

Kayak Committee Chair

Bill is a founding member of the Kayak Committee, which is one of OĆC's most active sports. served as chairman in 1985, 1986 and 1987, and has been a member each year since.

He is a regular competitor in kayak races, placing regularly in the open and masters divisions. He's competed in the Molokai kayak race twice.

Canoe Racing Committee

He's also been a member of the Canoe Racing Committee several times during the past 20 years.

'An Honor to Belong to OCC'

Bill likes the OCC because it's a family club and he likes its emphasis on ocean sports.

"Outrigger is a great place. We should all consider it an honor to belong and to be part of its great

traditions," he said.

"I hear complaints from time to time about different aspects of the athletic program. It's true, the program may not be perfect, but you have to remember that all of us in the athletic program are volunteers. We take time from our jobs and our families so that we can support the athletic program at the Outrigger.

"Most of the people who volunteer to serve on athletic committees at OCC go relatively unnoticed by other Club members. Most people take for granted that we'll have canoes at a regatta, or awards at an event, or traditional events like the Castle Swim or Cline Mann Paddleboard Race or golf tournaments. The amount of effort it takes to plan competitions, get coaches, order awards, handle travel, etc. is mind boggling.

"Parents who just drop off their kids to paddle or play volleyball, or members who just sign up to participate in an event, have no idea how much effort and time have gone into making our Club pro-

grams a success.

"Sometimes, things don't go as well as we'd like, but again, you have to remember that nobody is getting paid to run the canoe racing program or put on the kayak race. People who think they can do better, should volunteer to serve on committees.

"We always welcome new blood and ideas," Bright added.

Club Captain

When Bill served as Club Captain in 1990 and 1991, he took over where previous Club Captain Ron Li had started in defining the role of the Club Captain, streamlining procedures and simplifying the athletic budget. He won high praise from the Board and Club management for his professionalism and accomplishments.

The Club Captain is to OCC what an athletic director is to a university. He or she is responsible for every detail of formulating and administering the Club's budget, selecting the chairs of the athletic subcommittees, making sure that athletic equipment is available and making sure that the athletic pro-

gram runs smoothly.

"I'm very proud of what we accomplished while I was Club Captain," he said. OCC produced national volleyball champions and state and Molokai canoe championships during his reign, as well as revitalizing the junior volleyball program.

"We also reactivated the Surfing and Canoe Surfing Committees, and got new competitive paddle-boards and surfboards," he added. "We started holding our OCC surf-

ing contests again."

"I enjoyed being Club Captain but it took a lot of time. It's equivalent to a full time job."

Bill has been a coach on many canoe racing teams, and looks forward to coaching kids crews in the future. This past year, he coached

the Boys 16s.

Family Man

Bill has been married to his wife, Faith, since 1979. His son, Nick, paddled and played volleyball on the Boys 12s teams. His younger son, Scott, hopes to be a new member of the Club soon, and looks forward to participating next year.

For the past two years, Bill has been serving on the Admissions & Membership Committee and he looks forward to serving the Club in new capacities in the future.

"I've had a lot of fun at the Outrigger and I look forward to participating in the future. I thank the Winged "O" for this honor."

The Winged "O" was founded in 1967 to pay tribute to the Club's finest sportsmen. With being named a Winged "O" comes a lifelong obligation to actively preserve the athletic purpose of the Club.

To be selected, you must have been a regular member of the Club for at least 10 years, and have demonstrated unflagging loyalty to the Club and its athletic program over a

long period of time.

Contributions to athletic programs and excellence in sports outside of the Club are not considered. Service must be contributed directly to the Club and participation must be on Club teams and in Club events.

OCC Finishes Second in Na Wahine O Ke Kai

Forty-three crews lines up on the starting line for the 1993 Na Wahine O Ke Kai Molokai to Oahu canoe race on September 26. With hundreds of hours of training behind them, the Outrigger was one of three crews having a legitimate chance of being the first to finish.

The day prior to the race was spent preparing the canoe and mentally getting ready. Everyone knew the race would be tough, especially with the weather being so

uncooperative.

Our favored trade winds had disappeared and had been replaced with the dreaded variables, which meant mostly southerly winds.

Our canoe, Iwalani, was chosen with the idea there would be trades and an ocean to work during the race. The conditions would not be that, but the women were ready for anything.

In our meeting the night prior to the race, I told the women that if the conditions stayed calm and the ocean flat, it would take a record crossing to win the race. This proved to not be too far off the mark.

Race morning started as usual: up at 4:30 if you slept at all, a few bites to eat, and then off to Hale O Lono. The best part of this is the ride to Lono, with the sun coming up over Molokai Ranch turning the sky red and orange.

After the opening ceremony, the starting crew of Traci Phillips, Donna Kahakui, Katy Bourne, Sara Ackerman, Malia Kamisugi and Kisi Haine, paddled to the starting line, positioned about in the middle with our competition closer to shore.

At the gun, the Outrigger canoe jumped to an early lead, but this would not last. After five minutes, Surfers Paradise had pulled even and Offshore started to pull ahead.

At Laau Point, Offshore was in the lead by about five boats, with Outrigger and Surfers Paradise side

by side.

The next three hours were uneventful with the ocean so calm. The balance of the crew, Nicole Wilcox, Kaili Chun, Cathy Ho, Diana Clifford, Mary Smolenski and Lisa Livingston, came in with excellent

changes and paddled as well as the starters to keep us in the race.

Offshore was in the lead to the south of the Outrigger, about a minute plus ahead, and Surfers was directly behind us by one and a half minutes.

Then, the southerly winds came up, just to make the race interesting. This means the swell comes from the ama side, and the canoe becomes very tipsy.

Just to prove this, the Outrigger canoe flipped over and Surfers Paradise came up on our tail fast. By the time the canoe was righted and we started paddling, we were only 15 seconds ahead of Surfers and our four seat was still bailing.

One minute and thirty seconds of our lead was gone, and we were now in a battle for second place.

Fortunately, the Outrigger women responded to the challenge and took the lead back up to 45 seconds, only to almost flip again. The best thing to do at that point was to stop the canoe and add a weight to the ama, which Kala Judd was able to do very quickly.

Now, the canoe was stable and the women could concentrate on paddling, a job they would have to do since Surfers had closed on us again.

Just prior to flipping, Outrigger had been closing on Offshore in the sloppy conditions, but now the battle for second place was one that we did not want to lose.

Our race was for the inside line as we passed Koko Head, trying to catch the incoming tide headed for Diamond Head. We stayed ahead of the Australians and were able to cover their line to the finish.

The only excitement was squeaking over a wave at Diamond Head, Kisi's preferred line, and then we were at the finish line.

This Molokai to Oahu canoe race was not won by Outrigger, but it was certainly not for the lack of training and preparation. If you haven't been a part of it, it's hard to appreciate the effort that goes into racing at this level.

Unlike Offshore and Surfers Paradise Australia, who can select all star crews from around the world, the Outrigger competes with the best using the members that we have.

The Outrigger women paddlers should be congratulated for what they have accomplished this year, and it wouldn't hurt to tell them so.

Editor's Note: Offshore won the race in 5:47:53. Outrigger finished second in 5:54:17 and Surfers Paradise was third in 5:55:34. OCC was second in fiberglass and was the first Hawaii canoe to finish.

AROUND THE CLUB

By the time you read this, both our kitchen renovation and the trash room, downramp and receiving dock area renovation projects will be completed.

As has been reported earlier, the kitchen project provided new enlarged walk-in freezer and chill box units, improvements to our employee's lounge and the installation of two new salamanders (top side broilers).

The completion of this phase completes the total renovation of

the Club's main kitchen.

The second capital improvement project, our trash room, down ramp and receiving dock area was completed in mid-October and provided a general overall improvement to this long neglected but vital area.

The scope of work associated with this project included replacing a badly worn asphalt downramp with a new six-inch reinforced concrete driveway slab, installation of new side-wall skid rails, new utility sink, removal of the wooden utility storeroom and replacing it with a larger hollow tile structure, providing a new safer floor for the interior of the rubbish room, and replacing the inoperable sliding door to the rubbish room with a manually operated light-weight roll down aluminum door.

I am pleased to report that both of these capital projects were completed on time and within budget.





Joie will now meet Diane Plotts who had won over Dicey Brinck in the first round. Terri and Baby Cross will play in the other half of the draw.


The final stroke play tournament in December will be at Hickam Air Force Base. The date has yet to be announced, so please keep in touch with the Golf Committee.

Athletic Report: The Board approved sending a second women's open crew to Molokai. . . The Board also approved sending a fourth team to the Hana Relays.


House Report: The Board thanked Steve Timpson for provid-

Admissions & Membership Report: Membership count was 4,242 as of July 31, 1993.



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
