

Hui Nalu Beats OCC in HCRA Championships

Hui Nalu climaxed a perfect season by winning the State Hawaiian Canoe Racing Association Championship, August 7 at Hanakaoo Beach, Maui.

Hui Nalu held on to its early lead to defeat Outrigger, 137-127, in the AAA Division. Hawaiian of Maui was third with 84 points, followed by Kailua 82, Kai Opua 77, Hanalei 66, Lanikai 62, Lokahi 59, and Na Kai Ewalu 15.

Hui Nalu lead throughout the day after capturing the Girls 16 and 18 events, the Novice A and B Women and Novice B Men within the space of six races.

Outrigger failed to qualify the Boys, Girls and Mixed 12s, Boys 13 and 16, Novice B men and women, and Novice A women.

Outrigger's first victory of the day came from the Novice A Men's crew which finished ahead of Hawaiian Canoe Club of Maui and Hui Nalu.

Midway through the day, with lots of points from its kids crews, Hui Nalu led Outrigger 90-45. But Outrigger closed the gap to 114-100 after victories by the Sophomore and Senior Masters Women.

The close race between Outrigger (lane 4) and Hui Nalu (lane 1) found the two senior masters boats dead even and side-by-side about 10 yards from the finish line. HN discovered they were in the wrong lane, stopped paddling and tried to cross two lanes to finish in their assigned lane. They didn't make it and were later disqualified.

Interestingly enough, the Outrigger Senior Masters had won the state title for eight straight years until Hui Nalu outpaddled them in 1992.

The Masters Men wound up the day with a victory but it wasn't enough to close the gap.

"This was a 'different' season than we've had the last few years," said Head Coach Di Guild. "We had won the states every year since 1984.

"We did some switching of crews this year from open to masters and masters to senior masters in the men's events. We didn't win as many races as we would have liked but it opened up places on crews for our younger paddlers and I'm sure this decision will pay off in experience next year and the years to come," she added.

"I'd like to thank all the coaches, paddlers and their families who supported us this year. We're already talking about next season so take a short rest and then start getting in shape for next year. The coaches will be happy to give you exercise routines that will help increase your strength and endurance for next year.

"All of the other clubs have been trying to beat Outrigger for the past 10 years and that has really motivated them. Now we have a real goal to shoot for next year--beat Hui Nalu," Guild said.

Outrigger finished the regatta season with second place finishes in the Kamehameha, Paiaina, Macfarlane and Kaupiko regattas, third place finishes in the Waimanalo and Leeward Kai regattas, and second places in both the OH-CRA and HCRA championships.



OCC Masters Three-peat at U.S. Volleyball Association Championship

The Outrigger Canoe Club's men's 35 and 40 masters' volleyball teams achieved their goal of retaining their national championship titles and in the process achieved what no other team in USVBA history had done--win three consecutive division championships.

The volleyball teams traveled to Memphis, Tennessee to compete in the 1993 USVBA's national championships held from May 29-June 5, 1993. The Tournament consisted of a record 286 teams from all over the country.

OCC sent three teams, the Men's 35s and 40s, as well as the Open team, to this year's event.

The Men's Masters teams consisted of a nucleus of seven players--Jon Stanley, Randy Shaw, Chris Crabb, Tom Madison, Charlie Jenkins, Ilmar Tarikas and Mike Cote.

In the 40s division, the core team added Jim Bukes and Wayne Kekina. Veterans Ralph Smith, Jay Anderson and Jon Andersen, and rookies John Zabriskie and Scott Rigg completed the team in the 35s division.

Twenty-two teams competed in the 40s division which ran in the first half of the week. For the third straight year, the OCC team went through pool play in the Gold Division double elimination bracket undefeated.

They defeated Jump Serve from Villa Hills, Kentucky in two games, 15-5 and 15-10 to capture their third consecutive Masters championship.

The players receiving national recognition were Jon Stanley as 2nd Team All-American; Mike Cote, Randy Shaw and Charlie Jenkins as 1st Team All-American. Charlie Jenkins was recognized as the MVP.

Not to be outdone, OCC's Men's 35s repeated their 1991 and 1992 performance by capturing the team's third straight division championship. They beat Sun Sport

from Portsmouth, N.H. in two games, 15-8 and 15-11.

Jon Stanley and Scott Rigg were recognized as 2nd team All- Americans. Jon Andersen, Jay Anderson and Charlie Jenkins were selected as 1st team All-American members. Charlie Jenkins received the MVP for the second time in a week.

Kimo Brown coached both teams for the third consecutive year.

OCC's players once again dominated the highly competitive US-VBA tournament. The opposing teams just couldn't pose a serious challenge to the OCC men at any time.

Out of the three years, 1993 proved to be the easiest of all victories.

Coach Brown found the key to the teams' success and was in the team meetings held prior to each match to analyze their opponents strengths and weaknesses. This strategy allowed the teams to use their conditioning, depth, skill, talent, team cohesiveness and experience to physically overwhelm and mentally demoralize their opponents. The OCC Masters teams were just unstoppable.

The OCC Open team also participated in the Open Silver Division where they made a strong 5th place showing. Members of the team were Tony McInerny, John McDermott, Todd Harrison, Jim Kalaukoa, Darryn Holt, Sean Scott, Tim Walston and Mike Mulahey. The team was coached by Mike Normand.

In addition to the three OCC teams, other OCC members competed in the national champion-ships.

The Golden Masters Division included a group of OCC members playing for Riggers Hawaii. They finished third. Team members were Tom Haine, Bill Baird, Bob Kashare, Fred Hiapo, Mark Lawson and David Porteus.

In the Men's 50s division, the first place team, Chuck's Steak House of Fort Lauderdale, included

OCC members Dennis Berg, Tom Haine and Fred Hiapo. Dennis was selected 1st team All-American.

Dennis Berg and Tom Madison played for Silverado of San Diego in the Masters 45s division and captured first place. Madison was selected 1st team All-American.

1993 proved to be a successful and rewarding year for the OCC volleyball teams on both the local and national levels. The masters teams (aka the Quad Squad) now look forward to the challenging task of four-peating at the 1994 USVBA national championships in Tulsa, Oklahoma.

The Volleyball Committee and teams would like to extend a special thanks to the OCC Board of Directors for their continued support and contributions leading to six national championships in three years. Mahalo.

Employee of the Month





Despite all the trauma, the team succeeded in taking home overall honors

as well as having an epic road trip to the Garden Island. Our palatial accommodations Casa de Pflueger, combined with the renowned managerial and pit-crewing expertise of Greg Moss and Tiare Finney, made for quantum catered cookouts and horseplay.

In May, we participated in what is now considered one of the world's most demanding off-road events, the Mauna Kea 200. The cornerstone of the OCC riding program, this year's race proved to be the most gruelling ever with the entry of pro level riders from around the world.



Olympics Festival


Outrigger was represented in the Olympic Festival, July 23-August 1 in San Antonio, by several athletes.

Board Briefs is taken from the minutes of the Board of Directors meeting on June 24, 1993 and the Executive Committee meeting on July 15, 1993.

Secretary's Report: Eight members were suspended for 15 days due to failure to pay their accounts on time. Three members were terminated for being four times delinquent. . .

Manager's Report: It was estimated that between \$6,000 and \$7,000 was lost in revenue in May due to the no smoking policy, but the manager felt that this figure will decrease and by the end of six months will not have an impact on sales volume. . . Manager reported that of the 1,196 Nonresident members, 699 were at one time voting members; therefore their children are eligible for the Nonresident-Junior membership category.

Athletic Report: Funds were released for the Men's and Women's Molokai races. . . \$720 was allocated from the Athletic budget for the Surf Committee. . . The Board reiterated its policy that only Club members may use Club surfboards.

Budget Committee: Wendell Brooks was named chair of the 1994 Budget Committee. Other members are Ken Brown, Tom Haine, Jaren Hancock, Scrappy Lipton, Jim Peterson, Chuck Swanson, Ray Ludwig and Gordon Smith.

ODKF: Manager will formalize athletic requests that will be forwarded to the Foundation for budgeting purposes. Ron Sorrell is handling the Barry Pritchard Fund.

Mini-Charge: The Board reaffirmed its policy of purchases in only the Dining Room and Hau Terrace be credited towards the mini charge.

OCC Milk Caps: Half of the net proceeds generated from the sale of Outrigger milkcaps will be allocated to the Volleyball Committee.


