Outrigger Celebrates 85th Anniversary

Put another candle on the cake and raise your glass on high!

The Outrigger Canoe Club has now reached the ripe old age of 85. And lest we take for granted the attractive and comfortable premises we enjoy, let's stop a moment and compare our Club today with that loosely knit group of men and boys that evolved into one of Honolulu's most prestigious social and athletic clubs.

It's always a surprise to the uninformed that the man behind the formation of the Outrigger was not involved in water sports himself, or even a kamaaina.

Alexander Hume Ford was a malihini from South Carolina enamored by the surfing and canoeing he witnessed when he first visited Waikiki in 1907.

Being a promoter and an organizer by nature, Ford saw a need and figured out a way to meet it. The need was to perpetuate and promote Hawaiian water sports by "making the beach and surfing areas available to the small boy of limited means . . . and to provide a place where men and boys might ride upright upon the crests of the waves."

The solution was the Outrigger Canoe Club.

May 1, 1908

When it formally came into existence on May 1, 1908, the great heroes of Club history, like "Dad" and Duke and "Toots" were not yet on the scene. Neither was the grand dame of Waikiki, the Royal Hawaiian Hotel.

The beach was narrow, with heads of coral poking treacherously above the water at low tide, and lurking dangerously below the surface when the tide was high.

But if you were an avid surfer, or wanted to learn the sport, you could have taken the hour-long trolley ride to Waikiki, through swamps, banana farms and duck ponds.

The Club premises were situated on an acre and a half of land nestled between the Seaside and Moana Hotels, leased from the

Queen Emma Estate for \$50 per year.

If you could afford to plunk down the initiation fee of \$10 for men or \$5 for boys, you would be an instant member. There was no waiting list in those days. In fact, the Club started out with 86 regular members and 15 juniors and was vigorously seeking new members.

Annual dues for men was \$12 and \$5 for boys. Once a member, you would probably have been coaxed into soliciting donations from downtown businesses to get the Club going.

Two Large Grass Houses

The original facilities consisted of two large grass houses, moved to the site from a private zoo in Kaimuki. One was used to store boards and canoes, and the other served as a bathhouse and dressing room.

Apuakehau Stream, which ran through the property, provided fresh water for washing off the sand and salt water.

Before long, a large platform was built among the Hau trees, providing the Club with its first Hau Ter-

race. The platform was thatched over with wide lanais extending over a lagoon, or muliwai, which was fed by Apuakehau Stream.

Surfboards Were \$2

If you didn't own your own board, you could have purchased one from a carpenter who was busily employed on the Club grounds making boards and selling them for \$2.

The Club was also acquiring canoes for use by its members. The first was an eight year old koa canoe, the Hanakeoki, brought over from the Big Island. (Incidentally, that canoe is still in use and presently owned by the Makaha Surf Club.)

It would be a while before outrigger canoe racing would provide any real competition to the popular barge racing in Honolulu Harbor, but within a year, an Outrigger crew did compete against a crew from the Big Island and was soundly beaten.

Ladies On the Beach

Ladies were initially excluded from membership, but before long,

family outings were held on the Club grounds and picnic baskets and beach blankets were common sights under the coconut trees, where women and toddlers basked in the sun.

Soon, dances were held on the Hau Terrace as the social aspects of the Club developed right along with the water sports.

Common Goals, Then and Now

Primitive though it was, that original Outrigger Canoe Club had many things in common with the Club of today. That the goals and dreams of its founding fathers have been perpetuated for 85 years, is indeed a tribute to the succeeding generations of members and leaders

who have led the Outrigger through good times and bad, surviving many crises that would have swamped a weaker, less determined organization.

Since that day 85 years ago when Alexander Hume Ford talked a few young surfers into joining a club not yet in existence, the Outrigger Canoe Club has come a long way.

More than 50 men have followed Mr. Ford in the role of president, steering the Club on a course that weathered several financial crises, and saw the facilities completely rebuilt three times since the days of the grass houses, the most recent in 1963, at an entirely new site.

The present facilities still boast a Hau Terrace which forms a congenial and pleasant center of activity, just as the original one did in 1908.

The water sports which inspired the founding of the Club are alive and well and surf meets and canoe races are held from spring to fall each year.

On July 4th, 1992, 14 canoe clubs competed in the 50th annual Walter Macfarlane Regatta, the premier Club-sponsored event of the season.

Had the Outrigger not come into existence at the time that it did, it is possible that the "royal sports" of surfing and outrigger canoeing might have disappeared from the waters of Waikiki. ♪

Backward Glances

1948--As always, the Club was short of funds and looking for extra income. Consequently, a "beach services" office was formed, serving both members and non-members, with "Sally" Hale and his wife and others teaching swimming, surfing, paddling, etc. for a fee.

25 Years Ago

1968--After six weeks of westerly weather, the sand beach fronting the Club decided to depart for calmer shores, leaving little but the coral base. After much (and often heated) debate, it was decided to build a groin from the Elks' ewa

boundary 80-feet into the mooring basin.

15 Years Ago

1978--Surfing magazine proclaimed Club member Joey Cabell as the "best surfer in the world today" according to an article by editor Dick Graham.

10 Years Ago

1983--Outrigger entered the Carole Kai Bed Race for the first time, and was the only canoe club to enter. OCC "Queen" Gina Jenkins was transported by Keahi Farden, Bob Riley, Henry Ayau and John Finney. They made it through the first two heats before being bested by a military team. ♪





AROUND THE CLUB

With summer just around the corner I think it's appropriate to review some of our Club rules which pertain to Club use.

First, membership privileges apply to the person whose name appears on the membership card and as applicable to that person's spouse and children under 10 years of age, when accompanied by a member.

Spouses of members holding a valid spouse card may use the Club facilities unaccompanied by their spouse, invite guests and sign chits on their spouse member's account.

The privilege of signing chits is reserved for the member whose name appears on the membership identification card and may not be delegated to anyone, other than spouses holding a valid spouse card, for any reason.

There are no exceptions.

I have instructed staff to be alert to unauthorized use of Club facilities by non members and unauthorized guests. Please do not feel offended if you or your guest are challenged by a Club employee as the intent is to protect the club from illegal use.

Of particular concern is trespassers who gain entry via the beach, as pedestrians through the garage, or into the Club through the main Club entrance without ever being challenged or confronted by employees on duty at these various entry points.

I have instructed all employees that all persons entering the Club who are not recognized as a member are to be politely and courteously asked if they are, in fact, a member of the Club.

If they are not a member, but a guest of a member, they must be in the company of a member host while on the Club premises. If the guest's arrival precedes the arrival of the member host, the guest will be asked to wait in the lobby area of the Club until such time as the member arrives.

Should the guest arrive after the member, they will be requested to wait in the lobby and the receptionist will contact the member host and either have the member come to the lobby or advise the guest as to the location of the member.

It is at the discretion of the member as to whether the guest is asked to meet the member in a

specific area of the Club, or if the member wishes to come to the lobby to greet his/her guests. Please remember any member in good standing may bring guests to the club but no more than two visits in any one month for the same person.

Members are responsible for determining their guests eligibility.

Guests are required to remain in the company of the host member as long as the guest remains on Club premises. The member host is responsible, and will be held accountable, for the conduct of his/her guests while on Club property.

The most violated areas of the Club with regard to illegal usage are the beach, volleyball courts and locker rooms. Special efforts will be made to safeguard these areas' illegal use.

The support, cooperation and help of the general membership in safeguarding the Club from use by unauthorized persons is imperative and will go a long way toward bringing about an harmonious solution. We need your help.

There is another area of serious concern, which involves members' children under age 10. The Club's Bylaws place these children in the category of guests, but not subject to the twice-per-month limitation.

It is important to note, however, that the Bylaws also dictate that these children must be in the company, and under the effective supervision, of an adult member. This applies constantly throughout the Club visit and in all areas of the Club.

Violations of the rule have been escalating, particularly on the Hau Terrace and the adjoining sand storage and sunning area. I have alerted staff to this situation and given instructions to apprehend those parents whose unsupervised children are infringing upon the enjoyment by members.

Sammy Steamboat. He remembers carrying the BIG BOARD and the traditional ways they taught him to surf.

Brant surfs and paddles, was head paddling coach. In fact, you'll find him at the Club early in the morning when 10-30 other members going out for the day-break ride, far out into the Pacific where all is calm, serene, fresh. What a way to start the day! Sunset is the second best time, he says.

The LIGHT SHOW, Brant calls the scene from the Terrace at night. Waikiki highrises light the shoreline and beyond to Barbers Point, the planes land and take off, sometimes you can see the fiery red glow of Campbell Park's refinery. And on Friday nights, the Hilton fireworks! Brant says, "It's like lighting the Eiffel Tower!"

Brant is operations manager for Surf Line Hawaii Ltd., sports wear and dress wear. Sixty percent of all sales are made off island to Europe, Japan, to the Caribbean Islands and elsewhere.

Brant and wife Stephanie have two children--Aaron and Briana, who spend much time at the Club. Aaron is a member of the 12 and under paddling crew.

As a new director, Brant's main objective is to keep constant the traditional values, the roots of the Outrigger Canoe Club which is now a facility of great variable complex operations.

Kent Giles, a former director, remembers being at the Club nearly all his life. 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
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


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Treasurer's Report

Either the economy of the Club impacts the nation or the nation's economy impacts the Club, for 1993 was not a great year for the Club. However, the Club still managed to generate net operating income of \$34,158 for 1992.

This was \$67,100 below what was budgeted due primarily to sales being 5% below budget. There were initiation fees collected of \$322,750 and the net building fund income was \$235,151 for a total increase in members' equity of \$592,060 (7.2%). As of December 31, 1992, members' equity was \$8,869,529.

During 1992, the Club spent \$302,927 on capital improvements and an additional \$274,729 on repairs and maintenance. Athletic expenditures were \$132,171 which is 2.3% of operating revenues and dues.

In budgeting for 1993, we included a 3% increase in food prices and a 13% increase in beverage prices but no increase in dues or the mini charge. These increases were necessary to maintain the financial strength of the Club.

The current long range plan of the Club calls for food and beverage prices to increase every year to recover inflationary cost and for dues to be increased every two years in even number years. The goal of management is to increase the usage of the Club so as to minimize the inflationary price increases.

The Building Fund increased by \$557,902 (12.4%) during the year and totaled \$5,072,464 at the end of the year. This money has been designated by the Board of Directors to be used to purchase the fee interest in the land or to pay for future increases in the lease rent.

While the fund has accumulated a substantial sum of money, it may not be sufficient to accomplish the purpose for which it is being accumulated.

To minimize the chances of the Building Fund being short of the amount needed, the Board of Direc-

tors increased the quota for pure nonresident members by 115 to 400 and made the Finance Committee a standing committee.

At the present time, the Club continues to be financially strong and had operating fund cash and money market funds of \$601,375 at the end of 1992.

The auditors are presently examining the 1992 financial statements and their audit report will be available for review in the manager's office.

There are three other items which I would like to mention. First, during the year the Board of Directors voted to make the Finance Committee a standing committee and has structured the committee so there will be a continuity of its members.

Second, we appealed the real property tax assessment of \$23,617,400 for the land upon which the Club sits. Based upon our appeal, they reduced the assessed value to \$19,189,000, saving the club more than \$14,000 in property tax. We still feel that the revised assessed value is too high and are appealing the revised valuation. Our appeal is scheduled for October of this year.

As most of you are aware, there was a special meeting of the membership last year where a change to the Club's articles of incorporation was approved by a majority of the membership present. This change was necessary to allow the Club to apply for an exemption to real property tax for a portion of the Club. This exemption could be as high as 100% or nothing, but will probably be around 50%. The necessary papers applying for this exemption have been filed and we are awaiting a reply. ☺

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Long Range Planning Report

The Long Range Planning Committee had three main areas of focus in 1992:

Five Year Plan

The major work of the LRPC in 1992 involved our evaluation of how the existing Long Range Plan worked in its first two years and providing recommendations to the Board for modification to and extension of the plan out for another full five year period.

We contacted each Club committee chairperson and requested that all Club committees provide detailed input to the LRPC concerning their respective areas of the Club's operations.

The chairpersons of the House and the Building & Grounds committees met with us to discuss their recommendations for the 1993 plan.

The LRPC waited until the Board approved the 1993 Club budget before submitting its 1993 recommendations to the Board for changes to the Club Long Range Plan. These recommendations are now being finalized and were submitted to the Board in March.

The LRPC also devoted considerable time at the end of the past year to evaluate the actual 1992 Club performance against that projected in the approved 1992 plan.

In addition to making its recommendations for suggested changes to the Club plan for 1993, the LRPC will be providing the Board with a Plan Performance Evaluation which we hope will be of use to the Board in their decision making process in 1993.

Fee Acquisition

We are pleased to report that in 1992 the first real steps in opening a meaningful dialogue with the Elks (informal) has taken place. The Board has implemented action this year to insure that this important

dialogue will continue in the future.

The Outrigger and the Elks are working together on a joint appeal of their respective Honolulu real property taxes. The LRPC believes that this joint effort, regardless of the results of the appeal, will help build a better working relationship and management familiarity between the two clubs, one that will prove mutually beneficial in the future.

Nonresident Membership Study

The LRPC completed its study of the feasibility of increasing the number of Nonresident memberships in the Club. As part of its study, the LRPC looked at three principal impact factors that would necessarily be involved in any membership category increase:

- Impact on the Club Facilities Usage.
- Social Impact on the Club.
- Financial Impact on the Club.

The LRPC's study indicated that increasing the "pure" Nonresident membership quota to 400 members from the current 285 (actually resulting in only 84 new Nonresident members from the present number of members in this category), would have negligible effect on facilities usage but would have a significantly positive financial impact for the Club.

The initiation fees resulting from this increase would result in an increase of \$1.2 million to the Club's Building Fund. We concluded that with continued attention to our Club's membership application screening process, there should be no adverse social impact from the admission of these new members.

I'm pleased to report that the Board has recently approved the LRPC recommendations and the Club's new Nonresident member quota has been increased to 400.

BOARD BRIEFS

Board Briefs is taken from the minutes of the Board of Directors meeting on February 18, 1993 and the Executive Committee meeting on March 11, 1993.

Vice President of Operations report: The Board approved a Golf Tournament sponsored by the Canoe Racing Committee to pay off an overage from last year's Catalina race.

Secretary's Report: Nine members were suspended for failure to pay their accounts on time. Their memberships will be terminated if the accounts are not paid in full by the end of the 15 day period.

Athletic Report: A new Hawaiian class racing canoe with splash cover will be purchased for \$6,975. The Kilakila will be sold for approximately \$4,000.

Building & Grounds Report: The concept of improving the Main Dining Room with budgeted amount of \$300,000, plus estimated design fees in the magnitude of 15% or \$45,000, was approved and the House/Building and Grounds

Adhoc Committee for the Dining Room will solicit proposals from not less than three qualified interior designers. This project should be part of an overall concept that would eventually encompass and be coordinated with bar/lounge and lobby. . . Due to overwhelming response opposed to the conversion of the sauna/weight area in the Men's Locker Room, Building & Grounds recommended the area remain as is. . . The Board requested the Fitness Center Committee become involved and poll members for their views on a solution and if there is a need for a change.

House Report: Smoking is banned on Club premises for members and guests with the exception of the top parking level; designated area for employees' smoking is the receiving area effective May 1.

Long Range Plan: The five-year Long Range Plan has been updated to include 1993 through 1997.

Admissions & Membership Report: Membership count as of January 31 was 4,223. ☺
