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President's Report

It has been exciting and satisfying being your president. As you have heard we had a challenging but successful year. The year was successful because of the cooperation and mutual support from a very talented and hard working Board and equally hard working and professional staff.

Our major goal for 1992 was to solidify the system that had been recommended over the past several years which would allow the Board to have a better grasp of their jobs. We have:

- Established the Board retreat as a solid working session where the board and management reach consensus on what is to be accomplished during the coming year. This allows the Coordinating Director to select the appropriate committee chairmen for the task and it allows the Board and management to be on the same wave link from the very beginning instead of going through a period of indecisiveness.
- We have developed Director manuals for each Coordinating Director which includes the role (a job description) of the committee, the Club policies relating to that committee and the report from the outgoing committee chairman. In addition, Wendell Brooks took on the task of consolidating the Club policies so that each director has a comprehensive policy manual. This manual will be refined over the next year.

- We have updated all the employee job descriptions including upper management. We have established training programs and encouraged management to attend seminars and workshops to help them stay abreast of the industry. We have formalized the review procedure for the General Manager which did not previously exist.
- We have defined the roles of Club management, committee chairs, Coordinating Directors and committee members. As we have found areas where additional support is needed, we have instituted action.
- We established the Finance Committee as a standing committee.
- We set up a Marketing Adhoc Committee to coordinate the efforts of the House, PR and Entertainment committees during these very tough economic times.
- Management has developed extensive comparative charts and graphs to make it easier for the Board to assess the financial condition of the Club.
- We initiated the process to substantially reduce the Club's property tax burden.
- Most gratifying to me is that we see a definite trend of more use of the facilities by our Senior, Regular and Intermediate members which is a sign to us that you see the efforts being put forth by Don Figueira and his staff and appreciate it.

You are the backbone of the Club. You are the ones who allow us to continue our outstanding volleyball and canoe racing programs through your use of the facilities.

Please continue to support your Club and to provide your opinions as to how things can be improved. The manager and his staff will respond.

Lastly, I would like to recognize the outgoing Board members, particularly Diane Stowell, Bruce Ames and George Cook, who have worked tirelessly for six years during which many positive changes have taken place at the Club.

It has been a pleasure and an honor to be your President. Thank you.

Bylaw Amendments

Three Bylaws changes were recommended to the membership at the Annual Meeting. These had been initiated by the Bylaws Review Committee and endorsed by the Board.

The first amendment, to Section 6 of the Bylaws, Board of Directors, proposed changing the number of persons on the Board of Directors from 13 members to 15. This amendment was defeated.

The second amendment, to Section 8 of the Bylaws, Nominations of Directors, proposed changing the number of signatures required to nominate a member to the Board, who has not been nominated by the Nominating Committee, from 35 to 200. After discussion, this amendment was withdrawn.

The third amendment, to Section 56 of the Bylaws, Special Meetings, proposed changing the number of signatures needed to call a special meeting of the Club, from 25 to 200. After discussion, this amendment was withdrawn.

Missing Reports

The Treasurer's Report and the Long Range Planning Report were not available for inclusion in this issue. We hope to print them next month.

A total of 1,035 ballots were cast. Of these, 42 were invalid because they were unsigned, the voter was delinquent in Club accounts, or they voted for more than seven nominees. This left 993 valid ballots as compared with 988 in last year's election.

Ballots were mailed to 1,897 members entitled to vote. These include Regular, Intermediate, Senior and Life members.

Admissions & Membership Report

I am here to report that the Admissions and Membership Committee continues its work today under new and different conditions. As of this date, our membership has reached the overall quota set by your Board of Directors.

Openings in our core membership categories of Life, Senior, Regular and Intermediate will soon occur only through the process of attrition.

That does not mean that the work of this committee stops or even slows. In fact, it has intensified to cope with many issues which were not contemplated be-

fore membership quotas were established.

The Board has spent a great deal of time developing the policy for the committee to follow. It is this practice which enables us to deal with the present situation.

Your committee must continue to process transfers, recommend members for changes in status, admit the children of members who reach membership age and make other recommendations to the Board when requested even if we are not processing the large number of new memberships we did in years past.

Fortunately for all of us, the Outrigger Canoe Club continues to attract candidates for membership who are the current and future leaders of our community. It is a great pleasure to interview and recommend your people for membership who are already outstanding contributors to their schools, community associations and athletic teams.

It is even more rewarding to see these people become members and make the same contribution to our Club.

Your committee has also been privileged to recommend some equally prominent individuals for Regular membership. Many of these people, while not in their athletic prime, have had long and distinguished histories of contributing to our community and its various associations.

Now that our space is limited, your committee believes it is more important than ever to recommend people for membership who will strengthen our long and distinguished traditions established by many hard working and dedicated members who have, and will continue to serve this Club.

During the year we were asked to offer recommendations to the Board and to the Long Range Planning Committee on issues such as initiation fee structure, Nonresident membership and admissions procedures. Additionally, we tried to respond to members requests to improve the admissions process itself.

On a sad note, we saw mounting evidence of the difficult economic times here in Hawaii as a record number of our Regular members moved away to become Non-

resident members. Letter after letter from these people told us that the move was not by choice, but of necessity. The Long Range Planning Committee and the Board have taken steps to adjust our membership policies to accommodate this situation.

Athletic Report

As stated on the bronze plaque at the entrance to the Club, the Outrigger Canoe Club has been dedicated to be "a place where man may commune with sun and sand and sea, where good fellowship and aloha prevail, and where the sports of old Hawaii shall always have a home."

The Athletic program for 1992 certainly served those purposes. We definitely did our share of communing with sun, sand, and sea as well as volleyball courts, golf courses, tennis courts, softball fields, etc. and the aloha generated from these all-volunteer programs is amazing.

Last year, we supported 13 different sports with the intention of not only funding our major programs such as canoe racing, volleyball and ocean sports, but also other sports where there was sufficient interest to warrant a program.

Each sport is run by athletic subcommittees composed of members. These members put in an incredible amount of time. Administering some of our larger programs like canoe paddling is similar to having a second full time job.

The time and effort put in by these dedicated athletes and mem-

bers has been matched by our successes.

Our programs span ages from 10 years old to senior citizens. Our athletes and teams compete all over the world, country and state bringing home championships and recognition to the Outrigger Canoe Club.

The canoe racing program continued its dominance in competition not only in championships won but in participation. We fielded teams during regatta season in every category, young and old, and won for the 8th and 9th year, respectively, the Oahu and State championships.

The 4th of July Macfarlane canoe race was a great event. The Outrigger pulled together to mark the 50th annual race and, as always, people throughout the community and tourists as well, enjoyed this great OCC tradition.

The highlight of the long distance season was our open women's team capturing the Molokai to Oahu canoe race. It was the first time in six years that a Hawaii based crew won this event. It was a great effort by all involved, especially Coach Steve Scott and the women who paddled.

Our masters women placed third in their division of the Molokai race in a very competitive field.

The men's program was well represented with teams competing in the open division and junior and senior masters. The masters men won their division of the Molokai race. The open men took 4th overall and senior masters placed third in their division.

Our volleyball program has continued dedication to the sport. The junior division participation is most impressive, driven by broad based support from our older teams. In competition, success has been plenty: In the nationals, the Boys 12s placed third, the Boys 14s placed second and the Boys 18s were fifth.

The men's teams, in addition to bringing our junior members along, did extremely well at nationals. The men's open team placed third overall and the men's 35s and 40s masters teams, both brought home to the Outrigger their second consecutive USVBA national titles.

Ocean sports such as paddleboard, kayaking and swimming again hosted a wide range of events to promote these activities. The popular tri-ocean races involving paddleboards, surfskis and one-person canoes were held with good participation.

Our runners were out pounding the pavement at the marathon and Hana Relays, our golfers played in bi-monthly golf tournaments, and the tennis players competed for Outrigger in local leagues.

OCC members were represented almost every weekend during the year competing in one sport or another throughout the state. We even had three athletes compete for the USA at the Olympics.

1992 was an exciting year. I would like to thank the many people who work to perpetuate the fellowship of sports within our Club and the community. I look forward to 1993. Our goal is to continue to expand our base of volunteers and to touch with our aloha as many members as we can.

Building and Grounds Report

This year, guided by the policy direction of the Board, the Building and Grounds Committee continued to accelerate the maintenance and renewal of the Club's plant.

We have been in this building for 29 years, we have used it 365 days a year, and we have seen its usage grow to serve an expanded membership.

Now, things are wearing out and if we are to continue to have the first class facility that our members expect, we are having to spend increasing amounts of money.

Five years ago, the B&G Committee would maintain the building with \$100,000 to \$150,000 per year.

This year, we spent or committed to approximately \$300,000 of capital expenditures.

For the next two years, we have recommended to the Long Range Planning Committee and to the Board that approximately \$450,000 to \$550,000 a year be budgeted.

After that, we see the expenditures tapering back to a level of \$300,000 a year.

These are large sums of money we are committing. Let me assure you that no project is undertaken without careful review and analysis. We are fortunate to have within the Club a number of outstanding professionals in architecture, interior design, real estate and construction who are willing to give generously of their time and knowledge to serve on the B&G Committee to see that this money is spent prudently.

1993 Projects Completed

Let me briefly list the projects which the Committee worked on this year:

Changes in sand levels required a different access to the beach, and after a tortuous permitting process, we were finally able to have the new steps to the beach built.

Portions of the waterproof membrane under the volleyball courts has deteriorated. After considering options ranging up to \$170,000, we recommended to the Board a fix costing \$65,000 and this fix seems to be working.

The Dining Room carpet was replaced on its three year cycle.

The floor of the kitchen was treated with a surfacing material to eliminate an unsightly and dangerous condition.

In the Fitness Center, the carpet was replaced and new mirrors added to one wall.

The Executive Office was refurbished to replace old and tired interior furnishings.

The louvers around the Bar were replaced as the old ones had deteriorated.

The floors in the men's and boy's locker rooms were retiled so now it is possible for the locker

room staff to do a better job of maintenance.

A new maitre'd stand has been built for the Dining Room.

A baby changing table was added to the Ladies Locker Room.

A major project was to replace much of the equipment in the Snack Shop. This has been contracted out and will start shortly. This was a joint effort with the House Committee which first determined a revised menu to be served at the Snack Shop.

Ongoing B&G Projects

Some of the ongoing projects which are under study and which should be executed in 1993 are:

A redesign of the exterior lighting and landscaping of the makai side of the Club.

The paved floor of the Bar has deteriorated and is to be replaced.

The Hau Terrace service station is to be upgraded, to permit better service on the Hau Terrace.

The paving on the ramp leading to the service entrance has deteriorated badly, and the trash room is showing its age. Work has to be done on both areas. An unglamorous but necessary project.

Long Range Projects

Let me tell you about three major projects that are under study in cooperation with the House Committee. The Board has recognized that these are projects that are going to take longer than one year and so joint committees have been formed that will follow these projects to conclusion.

The first is the Dining Room. We have a world class Dining Room. We have done a lot to upgrade it in recent years--new uniforms, new menus, staff training, etc. The missing element in the upgrade is the physical surroundings.

If you look critically at the room, you realize it is getting very tired. The chairs are worn out, the tables are ratty, it is dated. The Board has approved a major remodel of the Dining Room and, at a later date, the Bar.

Secondly, we are taking a long look at the Kitchen. Can we improve either its design or its equipment to permit the staff to do a better job of serving the members.

Thirdly, and this is a really long range project, we are responding to a suggestion that it might be possible to raise the volleyball courts one level. This could create space for things such as an enlarged Fitness Center, more lockers, an expanded Logo Shop, and more storage.

The adhoc committee is to look at the problems with zoning, engineering, financing, usage, and most important, to ask how members feel on this proposal.

Special Thanks

Finally, one member of our committee deserves special recognition. That is Val Ossipoff. Val's perspective as the designer of the Club and as a long time member is irreplaceable. When Val designed the Club, he had a vision of what the Club should look and feel like.

Today Val is making a unique contribution. He is guiding us in preserving that special ambiance and harmony which we unconsciously absorb when we enter the Club. He has saved us numerous times from well meaning suggestions that would have clashed with the wonderful environment that he created. We all owe Val a special vote of thanks.

Entertainment Report

We had dance classes that were well attended, and then we had the "really big" parties.

Next on the agenda is yet another new idea--the Outrigger Concert by the Sea with the Peter Moon Band. This will be held on March 27.

1993 was indeed a successful year. All functions were well attended and, with the exception of the Wine Tasting Party, were at or over capacity.

Financially, we have done well and I think we have pleased the membership with the creative ideas. Lots of people of all ages and types have come and had a great time and I want to thank everyone who has been supportive.

Finance Report

The Finance Committee was designated a Standing Committee during this past year to provide recommendations and advice to the Board regarding an investment policy and an on-going strategy for the Building Fund. Prior to last year, the Committee had operated on an ad-hoc basis.

As you may know, all initiation fees go into the Building Fund, and the objective is to enhance its value over time in order to, in one form or another, lessen the impact of the inevitable lease rent increase the Club is facing in 2006.

To this end, we formulated (and the Board approved) an investment policy which places equal emphasis on long-term preservation of capital and asset appreciation.

Our goal is to have 70% of the fund invested in fixed-income securities with staggered maturities, primarily U.S. Treasury bonds and notes, and high-quality Hawaii municipals.

Thirty percent of the Fund will eventually be invested in equities, using carefully selected and monitored growth and income type mutual funds which give us the advantage of employing diverse managers and styles at a low-investment threshold.

This is a conservative program and we have adopted a very disciplined and consistent approach to the equity investment process.

At the beginning of 1992, the Fund totaled \$4.5 million and was invested in fixed-income securities and some cash (money market funds). At year end, it totaled \$5.1 million; the increase being about an

equal contribution of initiation fees and investment income reduced slightly by expenses (primarily income taxes assessed on this non-Club income).

The equity investment program began last summer and the Fund is now approximately 3% in equities and 97% in fixed income.

The Finance Committee is structured slightly differently from most other Club committees. Members are: the current President and Treasurer of the Club, the immediate past Treasurer, and currently, four other members who have staggered terms. This insures that we have the continuity that we believe is necessary for a consistent investment process.

Historical Report

After listening to the other committee reports, I am struck with the idea of how necessary it is to look into the future. Whether it be Long Range Planning that must project many years down the line, or Entertainment that must plan for activities many months in advance.

Our Historical Committee, on the other hand, looks the other way. We are the keepers of the Club's past which is indeed an awesome responsibility. But although we look backward, we do move forward.

One of our committee's most important projects is the recording of oral histories. The interviews are taped, transcribed, proof read and eventually typed. The team is very conscientious in their work and we owe them a very big mahalo for their long hours and dedication.

To date, 37 oral histories have been completed and bound and are available to Club members by appointment.

All Club activities that have appeared in print are collected in a series of scrapbooks which are also available to Club members by appointment.

The Photo subcommittee has taken on the gargantuan project of replacing the photographs in the Bar, and the job is progressing nicely and should be completed before too long. This subcommittee has also spent many hours this year sorting, indexing and identifying the photos in our collection.

The Slide Show subcommittee presented a stew and rice dinner preceding a wonderful evening of entertainment with Bob Krauss giving a presentation on the old time Interisland steamers which brought back some wonderful memories.

Our second program, which took place on March 15, was DeSoto Brown of Bishop Museum presenting "Hawaii--the Way It Was" a series of wonderful 1930s travelogues on the islands.

We have continued to enlarge our library which focuses on books primarily relating to the Club, Club members, and Waikiki in general. A call for donations from the membership resulted in the acquisition of several fine volumes for which we are very grateful. These books are also available to members by appointment for use on the Club premises.

We have done a great job of keeping a detailed record of all senior members and their backgrounds as related to Club activities.

A Reception subcommittee was available to display photos and scrapbooks before our programs.

This year, we revived the column, "Backward Glances" which appears monthly in the Outrigger. We hope you enjoyed them.

House Report

In April, 1992 the House Committee embarked on a mission with our new Food and Beverage Manager Don Figueira to make a differ-

ence in the quality, service and resident member usage of the Outrigger Canoe Club.

Our goals were to:

- Improve and upgrade service.
- Review and improve personnel training.
- Review and suggest menu changes/promotions, pricing and gratuities.
- Increase usage in food and beverage areas by marketing the Club to members.
- Run regular monthly articles in the Outrigger magazine regarding food and beverage operations--in conjunction with the PR Committee.
- Renovate the Snack Shop--kitchen, menus, pricing, hours, seating--in conjunction with the B&G Committee.
- Review Beach Shop operation, inventory, logo shop (possible name change).
- Continue regular maintenance inspections with Building & Grounds.

The committee placed a high value on its members and employees in suggesting and implementing programs to achieve these goals.

Improve & Upgrade Service

Don Figueira instituted weekly meetings with Chef Teruya, Ike Furukawa and Liz Ventura to review all food and beverage operations. All member comments from the back of chits were reviewed at these meetings and action reported to the House Committee.

Thanks to the hard work of this group, the Dining Room service and food have improved dramatically in 1992 and the Hau Terrace has the best staff ever.

A new member survey has been produced and will be included with an upcoming bill. This survey includes specific evaluations of all areas of the Club and should help pinpoint areas that members are concerned with.

A major undertaking by a joint Building & Grounds and House committee has begun regarding the Dining Room. The joint committee is working on a recommendation as to the scope of work and concept for a major Dining Room remodeling. This project is still in the preliminary stages but promises to be

a much needed and exciting improvement.

A new training program has been implemented for all Food and Beverage employees. To tie in with this, the House Committee has recommended employee recognition programs that have been approved by the Board of Directors. These programs will be implemented by the management team.

New Menu, Promotions

The House Committee worked very closely with management to implement new menu suggestions which began in August 1992. The menu changes included not only food and pricing but a new look that made the menu more flexible for future revisions.

In addition to these improvements, the staff has worked hard to keep food and labor costs within the 1992 budget during a rough recession year when guest and reciprocal member usage is down.

Several new food and beverage promotions and functions were added during 1992. These were done in conjunction with the House Committee and Adhoc Marketing Committee. The social calendar was included with your monthly bill that announced special events for the month. New events included:

- Monday--Surf Sandwich Cart on the Hau Terrace.
- Wednesday--Sunset Buffet featuring various ethnic dishes.
- Thursday--Special Ohana dinners for the family (this has since been discontinued)
- Live Maine Lobster nights

In addition, to these regular events, the Entertainment Committee is to be congratulated on the tremendously successful programs that they have put on this past year. All this has helped increase regular resident member usage for the year 1992.

Thanks to the effort of the Public Relations Committee and various members of the House Committee, there have been regular monthly articles on every aspect of the food and beverage operations, from parties and catering to new menu items.

Renovate Snack Shop

With the continuing support and help of the Building & Grounds

Committee, the Snack Shop kitchen will finally undergo a major overhaul early in March. This improvement will bring new menu items, better service and improved efficiency for both members and employees.

Rename Logo Shop

The name has now been officially changed to the Logo Shop and more changes are just around the corner. A point of sale computer has been installed to help with inventory control, new and different OCC logo merchandise is and will continue to come in on a regular basis, and the interior look of the shop will change over the coming months.

A more aggressive marketing approach is planned for the Logo Shop in order to increase resident member usage. Look for regular special sales, similar to the Valentine's sale, and hopefully an OCC Logo Shop color catalog by mid-year.

Probably the biggest change will be that Martha Ting is retiring at the end of March and a new face will be smiling in the Logo Shop in April. Mahalo to Martha for her dedication and many years of friendly service to the Club.

Maintenance Inspection

A major club inspection was undertaken by the House and Building & Grounds committees in the Fall. Members inspected all aspects of the Club and provided management with written recommendations for improvement and implementation.

Public Relations Report

Committee Reports

During the past year, your Public Relations Committee has placed a very strong emphasis on marketing the Club's activities, programs, services and facilities to the membership.

We have been particularly active in bringing to you information about the Club's food and beverage operations, and have cooperated with management in developing new services and ways of presenting information.

A brief summary of your committee's major efforts follows:

- We made a commitment to insure that the Outrigger magazine not only continues to be a superior product, but that it reaches even higher levels of excellence. The publication has covered an extremely diverse mixture of Club and member activities. In order to provide assistance and continuity, the committee recommended to the Board of Directors that a position of assistant editor be established. This suggestion was accepted, and we now have additional support for the magazine.
- The Display Case has been the best in memory. There have been 24 exhibits highlighting Club services and activities.

- This year's Photo Contest attracted 85 entries. The quality of the photography was excellent, and the winning photographs were outstanding material for both the Outrigger magazine and the Display Case.
- In addition to its other activities, the Public Relations Committee sponsored Coach's Night. This activity, which featured a steak fry and presentations by UH football coach Bob Wagner and members of his staff, was well received. The rationale for the activity was to provide the membership with an interesting alternative on an otherwise quiet Monday night. It is hoped that the event can continue and that other committees will also sponsor their own Monday night events.
- In an effort to promote the Logo Shop, the committee placed articles in the Outrigger magazine, mounted a display case exhibit, suggested ways to display merchandise and caused a new advertisement for the shop to be produced.

In the continuing effort to help the membership to be better informed about club activities, the

committee worked with management to produce a flyer listing a calendar of events and special meals which is inserted into the monthly billings. Also the activities calendar appearing in the Outrigger magazine was revised in format to show events for two months instead of the traditional one month.



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

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
