# 82 Enter OCC Photo Contest

If you should see someone leaning hard against a post, with a camera, he or she may be an OCC member shooting next year's winning photo in the annual Amateur Photo Contest.

This year, the 10th annual contest, the grand prize was awarded to Brian Howell for his shot of Uluwatu, Bali. That shot, which happens only when the photographer seizes the instant with an innate ability to catch it! Lighting, composition, universal interest--all were considered. It's this month's cover.

Judges seemed to have no difficulty picking the winners. Out of 82 entries, they independently voted tops for nearly the same photos. The more difficult task was to designate first, second or third position.

Surprisingly, there was a lack of Hawaiiana scenes. Far away places were shot instead. Perhaps OCC members are too accustomed to seeing the beauty of the islands and its people.

Next year, perhaps a new category for Hawaiiana may be established. More entries in Outrigger

activities also are encouraged. Places with 24 photos was most popular. People had 21 from which to choose.

Three judges were chosen for their diversity of interests. Stanley Hong, president of the Hawaii Visitors Bureau, obviously for his knowledge of a "one picture is worth a thousand words". Mr. Hong has judged many beauty contests but this was his first photo contest. "You call these amateurs, they're great," he commented.

Augie Salbosa is a professional photographer who has shot many architectural scenes for slick magazines and brochures of multi-million dollar properties.

The third judge was chosen for her vivacity and her broad interest in all things creative. Col. Kelly Hamilton is one of the youngest colonels in the U.S. Air Force. She flew tankers in the Gulf War. She authored Admiral Larson's (the Commander in Chief of the U.S. Pacific Command) written statements to Congress. Wherever she goes, the camera is with her.









The Club now offers a direct payment option. Complete and necessary authorization forms are available at the Front Desk and the Club will automatically deduct your Club bill from your checking account.

We will charge your account on the 20th of the month giving you ample time to review your bill for errors before we charge your account. For our members going on extended vacations, this option will assure that your account does not become delinquent. Please contact the Business Office for information or to sign up for this option.

## New Menus

Toward the end of 1992, several budget sessions were held to dis-

cuss and develop a systematic plan for meeting expenses during the coming year. Part of the budget process was an in depth analysis of the Club's food and beverage operations.

The number of meals served, average check per meal, total revenue generated per meal period, number of staff hours utilized per meal period, operational overhead, fixed costs and food and beverage cost percentages were all scrutinized in detail.

In order for us to achieve the goals set forth in our 1993 Food and Beverage operating budget, and at the same time continue to maintain our high standards for food, beverage and associate services, the Budget Committee recommended to the Board that we implement a modest increase to our food and beverage price structure effective January, 1993.

Reluctantly, the Board agreed to an increase of 3% to our food operation and 13% to our beverage price structure.

These increases are not across the board. The price structure and associated cost factors of each item were evaluated and adjusted accordingly.

The last increase to our food and beverage price structure was in January, 1991.

Our revised menus feature some new and creative selections in addition to our time honored favorites.

We will be most interested in hearing your comments. We have worked hard to build and maintain quality levels in our food and beverage operation and I'm sure the membership is well aware of the high value received for dollars spent in the Club's dining Room and Hau Terrace.

In summary, we felt that a modest increase to our price structure to cover rising operating costs was preferable to cutting corners on the quality of our food and service.

## Your Comments

I'd like your comments on our new menus or our food and beverage operation in general. There is an opportunity for your feedback on the reverse side of all food and beverage chits. Your comments are appreciated. You will help us focus on your likes and dislikes as we, together with the House Committee, continue to address our food and beverage operation.

## Snack Shop Renovation

After many months of planning, designing and studying the Club's Snack Shop operations, our Buildings and Grounds Committee has recommended to the Board, and they have approved, a complete renovation of our Snack Shop preparation area.

Plans were prepared, bids were solicited and a contractor selected and approved. Due to the extensive work in this project, it will be necessary for us to close the Snack Shop during the construction phase. Construction is scheduled to take place starting Monday, February 1 through Thursday, February 11. We will reopen the Snack Shop on Friday, February 12.

The renovation project will enable us to add items to our Snack Shop menu (saimin/pizza/nachos among others), and at the same time to prepare those items currently on our menu faster and more efficiently.

During the 11 days that the Snack Shop is closed, we will provide a morning (7-11 a.m.) self service continental breakfast bar on the Hau Terrace. This will be available every day during the construction period with the exception of Sunday, February 7.

You can be assured that we'll do everything we can to minimize the inconvenience to you and your guests. We thank you in advance for your cooperation.

# Winged "O" 25th Anniversary

Twenty-five years ago in 1967, the Outrigger Canoe Club's Winged "O" organization was founded to pay tribute to the members who have contributed to our athletic programs.

The first awards were given in 1968 to Duke Kahanamoku and seven other outstanding Club members.

The Winged "O" award is more than just an honor given to an athlete. With the award comes the lifelong opportunity to actively help perpetuate the Outrigger Canoe Club as an athletic club.

The Winged "O" honor is given by its members for either participating in Club sports, coaching, serving on the Club's athletic committees, raising funds or when necessary planning for the Club's continued involvement in all types of athletic endeavors.

In 1966, then Club President Tom Arnott asked Bill Brooks to form a committee to provide help and develop a more competitive athletic program for the Club. Brooks and

The nominee must have contributed directly to the Club. Participation must have been on Club teams and in Club events.

Contributions to athletic programs outside of the Club will not be considered. Awards are not given to deceased members.

## Long Distance Calling From The Club

Many Club members have asked how they can make a long distance telephone call from the Club. The answer is simple.

First, if you have a long distance calling card, like AT&T, SPRINT, or MCI, you can direct dial your number from either of the two telephones in the Lobby or the telephone at the back of the Cocktail Lounge next to the TV. Only these three telephones have been programmed to accept 1-800 numbers.

All you do is dial 9 for an outside line, get the dial tone, then dial 1-800 and your calling card access number. For your information, the AT&T access number is 1-800-882-2273, LD/USA and SPRINT is 1-800-877-8000 and MCI is 1-800-950-

1022. GTE Hawaiian Tel does not have an 1-800 access number. Therefore, long distance calls using their calling card must be placed with the Front Desk receptionist.

After reaching your calling card access line, you will hear the access line dial tone. Now dial zero, the area code and the telephone number of the party you want to call.

The calling card operator will come on the line and ask for your authorization number. Dial in your private authorization number and your call will be made charging the call back to your card.

For example, if you want to call 536-1000 in San Francisco using SPRINT, this is how you would do it. Dial 9 for an outside line, then

dial 1-800-877-8000. Upon hearing the dial tone, dial 0, 415 (which is the area code), and the San Francisco number 536-1000. There will be a pause and a tone and the SPRINT operator will ask for your SPRINT authorization number. Now, dial in that number (normally 14 numbers).

That is all you have to do to direct dial a long distance number. The same procedure is also true for calling a Neighbor Island, dial zero, area code 808 and the Neighbor Island number.

If you desire to make other types of long distance calls, you will have to ask the receptionist at the Front Desk for help. If you have any other telephone questions, please contact the General Manager. ☺


