



Matt Kresser Leads OCC Marathoners

On December 15, 1991, the 19th annual Honolulu Marathon was held, fielding over 13,000 local and international long distance runners and walkers.

Twenty-two OCC runners entered, most of whom opted for the 4:30 a.m. van ride from the Club to the Aloha Tower start, provided by marathon retiree Russell Allen.

Emotions amongst runners are mixed at the start of the race. For OCC runners Jeff Kissel and Jill Cheever, this was a first. For experienced Ed Moore and Don Eovino, maybe a personal best time could be set.

Confident OCC marathoners Matt Kresser, Tommy Holmes, Billy Balding and Geoff Piper would try to better their seven-minute race pace time.

Old timers like Bruce Ames and Norm Dunmire, completing 15 and 11 marathons each, would look forward to yet another "Finisher" T-shirt, a proud reward given only to those runners who complete the 26.2 mile course.

Wahine OCC runners Katy Bourne and Paula Jenkins, would cover the en-

tire course side-by-side, striving for a second and third marathon finish respectively.

Lady Ruth Munro would run competitively, seeking first place in her age group, 65-70. And would Fred Hemmings survive?

Unknown first time marathoner Benson Masya of Kenya took first place in a respectable time of 2 hours, 18 minutes. Ritva Lemettinen of Finland finished first for the women in a time of 2 hours, 40 minutes.

Although there were no course records, probably due to the high humidity, the first place winners clocked in at a 5:16 and 6:06 minute per mile running pace, respectively.

Matt Kresser was Outrigger's first finisher for the second year in a row, completing the course in 3:15. Katy Bourne and Paula Jenkins finished in 3:54. 🏆



We Sponged, Watered, G'aded and Cheered at 17th--and Final--Marathon Aid Station

More than 150 Outrigger members and their friends volunteered at the Outrigger Canoe Club Aid Station for the Honolulu Marathon on December 15, 1991, offering cold sponges, ice water, Gatorade and encouragement to the more than 13,000 runners and walkers.

And, while it was the best turnout of volunteers we've had, it was also the last time the OCC will sponsor the Aid Station.

"We've been very loyal for the past 17 years," said OCC Aid Station director Cline Mann. "We are the last of the original Aid Station sponsors and have worked very hard to make our station the best on the course."

"As the number of runners in the Marathon has increased, it has become increasingly difficult to staff and operate the Aid Station adequately," he added.

"Marathon officials are considering several changes to the 1992 race, including limiting the field and changing the route. It seemed like the right time to bow out and let someone else have a turn."

"We've enjoyed being part of the Honolulu Marathon for 17 years," he added.

In 1973, the first year of the Honolulu Marathon, about 150 runners participated in the race. The small aid stations along the route were staffed by marathon officials, Boy Scouts and other volunteers.

In 1974, the number of runners doubled and in early 1975, the organizers feared that another doubling would place an impossible burden upon the existing system.

Consequently a new system was proposed whereby each station would be staffed by a different and already established organization. Member Jack Scaff, Marathon Association president, encouraged the OCC to become involved and Club Captain Fred Hemmings Jr. accepted the challenge with Cline Mann taking charge. The OCC is the last of that original group.

"We've gone from 600 runners in 1975 to more than 13,000 in 1991," Cline said. "Fifty-five members helped at the Aid Station the first year, and more than 150 this past year."

"It's very hard, just before the holidays, to ask people to stay at the Aid Station from 5 a.m. until the last runner passes. That used to be about six hours. Now, the last participants, most of whom have walked from the starting line, are still coming through nine hours later. That makes for a very long day."

Another problem has also made the Kahala Avenue Aid Station more difficult to operate. In the early years of OCC's participation, Club members (Kimo Austin, CB Ayau, Dale Hope and Bruce Ames) lived on Kahala Avenue and their homes were used

for water sources.

"Now, with many new homes owned by nonresident foreigners, obtaining water is much more complicated. We have a very hard time contacting owners for permission to use their water. This year was especially difficult.

"I'm very pleased with the way we responded to this year's challenge of 13,000 plus runners, serving them twice--on their way to Hawaii Kai and on their return to the finish line.

"I want to thank everyone who came out this year. At times it was so fast and furious out there that the people filling the water and Gatorade cups never even had a chance to look up for an hour or more.

"The kids and others who ran the used sponges back to the start really got their exercise.

"We have had a loyal group of helpers participating every year, and I'd like to thank them, especially the crew that spent all day Saturday helping get everything ready. I'd also like to thank the people who stayed until the bitter end on Marathon Sunday to make sure

all the litter was picked up, the streets swept clean and everything brought back to the Marathon headquarters and to the Club," Cline said.

Although it's a lot of work, for most of us, the reward comes from the runners who yell, "Thanks, Outrigger," or "Nice Job Outrigger," as they grab their last cup of water before starting up Diamond Head on the way to the finish line.

1992 Golf Program


Golf Chairman Jim Hammons has

Mann, a noted surveyor who specializes in ancient Hawaiian land boundaries and land title history, will also show map slides.

R FOR HEALTH

Beyond preventing cancer with attention to diet, sun exposure and abstaining from smoking, there are many things which can help to catch these most dreaded of diseases while they are still curable.

It is important to remember that cancer is a family of diseases, some of which are alike, while others vary tremendously in cause, behavior and curability.

Approximately one in three of all people living in the United States today will have cancer at some point in their lifetime and, fortunately, progress is being made on many fronts.

What can be done? If you smoke, stop. The continued prevalence of cigarette smoking is astonishing, and although tobacco use contributes to bad health in many ways, lung cancer is one of the most dreadful.

Breast cancer is the most common form of malignant disease in American women and the second leading cause of cancer death after lung tumors.

A family history on the maternal side (especially when it has affected the mother, aunt or sister, premenopausally) cigarette smoking, a high fat diet in adolescents, and a prior history of cancer in the opposite breast all increase a woman's risk.

Careful self-breast examination, annual checkups and mammograms can detect a disease in its early stages. Curative and non-disfiguring surgery is available. Mammography should be initiated at age 35 unless special risk factors or other conditions warrant an earlier start.

Colon and rectal cancer is the second most common cause of cancer death in the United States. Simple and painless examinations can prevent the disease by catching colon polyps in their premalignant phase or they can detect cancer in its earliest and most curable form.

Any change in bowel habits or bleeding mandate a thorough checkup.

Prostate cancer is common in men after middle age. New methods for its early detection are simple, painless and readily available. Every male over age 40 should be checked annually.


Pap smears are critically important in the early diagnosis of cancer of the cervix. All women who are sexually active or who have reached age 18 should

be checked every year.

Malignant melanoma is a very serious form of skin cancer and is increasing in incidence in both men and women. It is now, like other forms of skin cancer, believed to be related to sun exposure. Protect yourself.

Any of the American Cancer Society's seven warning signals should lead you to your doctor.

- A change in bowel or bladder habits.
- A sore that does not heal.
- Unusual bleeding or discharge.
- A thickening or lump in the breast or elsewhere.
- Indigestion or difficulty in swallowing.
- An obvious change in a wart or mole.
- A nagging cough or hoarseness.

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

This is a favorite Valentine Day breakfast treat for our family. Easy to make and great to eat. It takes 10 minutes to make and 30 minutes to bake.

Dutch Baby

2 eggs
1/2 cup sifted all-purpose flour
1/2 teaspoon salt
1/2 cup milk
2 Tablespoons melted butter or margarine
1 Tablespoon lemon juice
1 1/2 boxes fresh strawberries

1 package frozen sliced peaches (drained)

Confectioners sugar

Dairy sour cream (sometimes I add brown sugar and cinnamon)

Heat oven to 450 degrees. Beat eggs until blended. Sift flour and salt together. Add with milk to eggs; beat smooth. Stir in butter. Pour into greased 9 inch skillet with ovenproof handle. Bake on bottom shelf for 20 minutes. Reduce heat to 350 degrees. Prick shell; bake 10 minutes. Drizzle with lemon juice, sprinkle with sugar. Fill with fruit, and cut in wedges. Top with sour cream. Serve at once. ☺

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
