A total of 58 swimmers competed in the event, including nine over the age of 50 who swam in a shorter one-mile race.

The race begins at Sans Souci Beach, out the channel to a buoy and then toward Waikiki and back, finishing at the Club.

The swim was hosted by the OCC Swimming Committee.

# **Outrigger's Long Range Plan**

A year ago, the Board of Directors tasked the Long Range Planning Committee to develop a five-year plan for the Club. The Board approved the plan at its February, 1991 meeting.

This plan is a "living" document that will be reviewed, updated and extended each year so that it will at all times reflect the current and long term goals and objectives of the Club and the Club's financial situation and projections for a full five-year period forward.

The plan is divided into four parts-1) goals and objectives for January 1, 1991 through December 31, 1995, 2) Assumptions, 3) Strategies—How to Accomplish Goals and Objectives, and 4) Appendix Exhibits, including 5-year financial projections, 5-year dues analysis and simplified cash flow analysis, 5-year capital improvement plan and capital expenditures reconciliation.

In the May issue of the Outrigger we printed the Goals and Objectives; in June we printed the Assumptions and 5-year Capital Improvement Plan.

#### Part 3 Strategies--How to Accomplish Goals and Objectives

## Maintenance of Club Facilities--Strategies:

- Establish and maintain consistent maintenance and capital improvement replacement programs. The maintenance programs shall include, but not be limited to:
  - An historical record of significant and/or recurring repairs and maintenance.
  - A schedule of recurring maintenance requirements.
  - An inspection schedule and comprehensive evaluation and reporting system; and
  - The development of an aggressive preventative maintenance program.
- Establish and fund as regular budgetary items, specific designated reserve accounts to cover the future anticipated costs of capital improvements and/or major maintenance programs (i.e., new roof, painting, new kitchen equipment, new furnishings, etc.).

#### Fee Purchase--Strategies:

- Establish/continue dialogue with Elks Club concerning purchase of fee.
- Look for innovative means of arriving at a "win-win" result with the Elks.
- Increase the balance of the Building Fund to not less than \$7.5 million by 1995 and to \$16 million by the year 2006. Con-

- tinue to allocate all new membership fees to the Building Fund, which Fund shall be used only for the purposes of purchasing the fee or to cover future lease rent increases.
- Update the real property appraisal report on the Club property in 1991 and on a two-year basis thereafter to keep current with property values and funding requirements.
- Consider alternate site possibilities for future relocation/expansion of the Club.

#### Capital Improvements--Strategies:

- Put the Club's building plans on a computer assisted design (CAD) system.
- ° Identify and evaluate the Club needs for:
  - Additional Lockers
  - Additional Storage Lockers
  - Second Floor Function Room
  - Other Capital Improvements
- Retain architect to perform feasibility study, initial layout and design possibilities, construction cost projections.
- ° Club decision on scope of work and timetable for completion.
- Architect to complete building plans, solicit bids for the work, and obtain necessary governmental permits.
- Consider means of funding new improvements:
  - From existing operating reserve funds.
  - Through conventional or private financing.
  - Special Assessments and/or dues surcharge on Club members.
  - Other sources.
- Contract for the work to be accomplished.

#### Service Strategies:

- A concerted effort shall be directed to hire, train, maintain and retain a competent and dedicated service staff who view their employment with the Club as a long term career opportunity, not just as a "job".
- On the extent practical, wages and benefits paid to Club employees shall be competitive with those currently being paid to hotel union members and by other private clubs in Honolulu.
- To encourage service oriented attitudes by Club employees, employees providing outstanding service shall be regularly publicly recognized in the Outrigger Magazine and the Club and through compensatory award programs.
- Evaluate the effect of changing the Club's gratuity charge policies to help achieve the goal that service will be consistently excellent at all times.

o To assure cooperation among employees, it is encouraged that waitpersons pool a portion of their tip income to bartenders.

#### **Revenue Strategies:**

- ° Implement dues increases as necessary.
- Implement food and beverage price increase as necessary.
- Evaluate the effect of changing the Club's food and beverage pricing structure to one based upon a targeted cost of sales percentage. The target cost of sales percentage should be set at a level which would result in prices 15% to 20% (or any other appropriate level set by the Board of Directors) below comparable restaurants.
- Encourage individuals and teams desiring to participate in out-of-state competitions to secure private and/or commercial sponsorships to help defray the costs.
- Other "non-traditional" revenue sources shall be studied for potential Club use should additional revenues/capital be required by the Club in the future, such additional sources may include (but not necessarily recommended): monthly Dining Room minimum use charge to members; increases in guest membership charges, increases in locker, parking or other Club activity charges; securing of private funding (sponsors) for certain athletic activities; sale of Club revenue bonds to Club members to raise capital; commercial licensing of Club logo and/or retailing of Club logo clothing and attire to the general public.

#### Increase in Dining Usage--Strategies:

- Focus on the premise that to increase usage requires that the dining experience be pleasurable. This implies excellent food (quality, presentation and menu variety) at moderate prices, excellent service, in a pleasurable atmosphere.
- Implement a management incentive program to enhance increased Club usage and service.

#### **Membership Strategies:**

- A chronological waiting list shall continue to be maintained for each membership category.
- Candidates for membership openings shall continue to be considered in order of their positions on the membership waiting lists.
- Vacancies in membership categories shall be filled as they occur so as to maintain the Club at full membership.

# Three Molokai Channel Races Test One-Man Canoes, Kayak and Sailing Canoes

Gone are the days when the Molokai Channel was the exclusive preserve of male warriors of Hawaii in six-man outrigger canoes.

This 30-40-mile crossing (depending on your course), has become the testing ground for a variety of crafts and participants.

The thrill of the open ocean often attracts an international field, as Tahitians, Maoris, Australians, Canadians and Californians bend their backs against the men and women of Hawaii.

Three Molokai Channel crossings took place in May.

On May 5, the Canoe Sports Hawaii Kaiwi Challenge team one-man canoe race from the Kaluakoi Hotel to OCC was held for the second time. Seven two-man teams, one two-woman team and one solo completed the course.

The race was very close, with the first four canoes together most of the way. At Koko Head, the winning team of Tom Conner and Kala Judd pulled away. Walter Guild and Mark Rigg battled Steve Cole and Pat Erwin all the way to Black Point when they finally pulled ahead.

The race was held in two classes--open hull and canoe. An open class hull is anything other than the standard oneperson canoe hull.

This was a two-man team event, with paddlers changing places on the canoe. In most boats, the paddlers averaged 20 minutes in the boat and 20 minutes off.

Conditions were excellent this year. In 1990 conditions were totally flat and the winning time was 6:20. This year Conner and Judd finished the course in 4:55:40.

Then, on May 19, the 15th Bankoh Kayak Challenge, a 32-mile crossing from the Kaluakoi Hotel and ending at Koko Marina pier, was held on a hot, flat, windless day which took out eight of the 47 starters, including the defending champion, Grant Kenny.

The race was won by Guy Leach of Australia in 4:30:56, nearly an hour longer than last year's winning time of 3:44:45.

Outrigger's top finisher was Kala Judd, who finished 10th overall in 4:47:54. OCC's other finishers were:

Several other Outrigger members started the race but had to drop out along the way. They included defending women's champion Lesline Conner, Geoff Graf and Chris Kincaid.

And finally, to round out the Challenge Triple Crown month, was the Ho'omana'o Challenge on May 26. This is a 75-mile six-man outrigger canoe sailing canoe race from Kaanapali to Waikiki.

Twelve 6-man crews, two from Kauai, three from Maui, one from Molokai and six from Oahu, completed the crossing. The race was held once before in 1989.


The conditions were perfect, with 3 to 4 foot seas and winds of 20-25 knots.

The race was between Island Tan, captained by Mike Muller, and Maui Sailing Canoe Association, captained by former national Hobie-14 champion Cappy Sheely, from the start.

Cappy had the lead until they fell into the lee at Hale O Lono, when Mike's crew paddled ahead. Cappy regained the lead in the windy channel, as Mike was handicapped by a broken steering paddle.

The two boats converged off of Diamond Head, collided right in front of the Club in the surf at Castles, then Muller squeaked ahead with a wave and superior paddling to win by 102 seconds

The Island Tan crew included OCC members Bruce Eliashof, Todd Bradley, Todd Payes, Loch Eggers, Hunter Eggers and Muller. Their winning time was 6:27:00. Maui finished in 6:28:42.



# ROUND THE CLUB

Our number one priority at the Club is to see that you enjoy yourself while you're here. We want you to feel that Outrigger is an extension of your home, and we want to treat you and your guests the way you would in your own home.

We want you to feel proud of the Outrigger and comfortable when you're here.

We train our employees to see to your needs from the minute you enter the parking garage. The Club building and grounds are beautiful and well maintained. We offer top quality and value in our food and beverage service. And members have a variety of athletic and social activities to choose from.

We're very fortunate at the Outrigger to have loyal, faithful employees who enjoy making the Club your home away from home.

The Club employs 150 people, full and part time. About 65% of the employees work in the Food and Beverage Department; 20% work in the cleri-



cal/general administration area; 10% are utility workers in grounds and maintenance; and the remaining 5% work in the locker rooms, laundry,

parking and beach areas.

Our employees represent a multitude of nationalities--Vietnamese, Chinese, Guamanian, Filipino, Korean, Japanese, Caucasian, Part Hawaiian and Malaysian. For most, English is their second language. As you can imagine, communication behind the scenes in the Club can be very interesting at times.

Our employees range in age from 19 to 70+. Nearly half of our employees also hold a second part-time job somewhere else.

Luckily, our employees consider their jobs at the Outrigger as careers and our turnover is less than 5% per The average employee has worked here for 16 years. Yabiko of the Business Office has worked here the longest--36 years.

With such a low unemployment rate in Hawaii, we do everything we can to retain our employees. We pay them fairly and we treat them fairly. Our employee benefit package is excellent. Employees earn paid vacation of from one to four weeks a year depending on their years of service. We also offer a good medical plan, sick leave, funeral leave and a pension plan.

While many private companies have eliminated this, we still give employees a day off with pay on their birthday.

They also get uniforms, parking and one meal per work shift.

We think our benefit package is better than most private clubs.

We also have a strong belief in promotion from within, so our employees know they can be promoted to better jobs.

Several members have asked me how the 15% gratuity works since it is automatically added to their food and beverage bills. The wait help does not pool the tips. The employee who actually served the meal gets the gratuity.

This is an incentive for the wait help to do a good job. Those who do a good job and receive compliments, get larger stations and therefore get more tips. Those who are new or receive complaints, get smaller stations and therefore, fewer tips.

The bus boys do share in a portion of the tips, based on the number of hours they work in the month.

We also do a lot of in-service training for our employees. We bring in experts from the industry to motivate and train the food service staff and teach them to provide good efficient service.

We also give them training in a classroom setting. About once a month, we'll bring them in on a Monday and teach them how to set up, and actually run through various serving situations.

This lets them know that we're serious about how we treat our members.

We're also in the process of updating our operations manuals that tell our employees how to do various tasks.

Our employees have recently learned to operate our point of sale computers. For most, this was the first time they'd come in contact with a computer and they've done a great job learning this new technology.

I'm extremely proud of our employ-They work hard and many have developed close relationships with the

members over the years.

When you're served or assisted by an employee who does a nice job, a kind word from you is most appreciated. We all like to hear that our work is appreciated, and that goes for our employees as well.

If you have a problem with an employee, let me know about it. I'll be happy to discuss it with the employee. I won't tolerate rude behavior from our employees, but our employees don't appreciate assisting rude members either. Please be considerate.

We're very lucky at the Outrigger. We're a family and the ohana feeling extends from the Board and membership to management and employees.

Don't forget to pick up your tickets for our 4th of July party. Everyone attending the Club party must have a ticket for admission. Tickets are available at the Front Desk for \$1 each.

Because of our Club size, tickets are limited to members as follows: Junior and Associate, limit 2 per member; Regular, Senior and Life, limit 4 per member.



One of the nice things about all of the OCC staff is that they are flexible and oriented to helping each other out in an emergency. That's why, once in a while, you'll see people from the other work areas covering in the lockers.

But our main staff are Rosita, Mildred, Valentina, Winnie, Flo and Vicky. They are all supervised by Ted Nicolaou, operations manager.

Rosita Tigno, born in the Philippines, freely admits to being 55 and single. She admires the female members of the Club, saying, "I like them, they are so good." She received a testimonial during this interview from a Club member who described Rosita as always having a cheerful good morning and cheerful goodbye.

Rosita's day begins when she turns on the air conditioner at 7 a.m. as she starts the day shift. She also wipes the sports equipment with WD 40. Listening to her describing her chores, you can hear the pride in her voice that comes from doing a job for people she likes.

Winnie Uchino has been at OCC 1 1/2 years, and worked at Arcadia Retirement Home before coming to us. She says this "is the best job." She enjoys cleaning the locker room equipment and is always cheerful and helpful.

One of our newest helpers is Flo Rios, only one year at OCC. In her colorful work past is waitress work in the 70s in the popular Duke Kaha-

namoku night club.

Vicky Arre is our old timer, 14 years at the Club. She has a 23 year marriage, and three children, 21, 18 and 16. The youngest attends Farrington High School.

With 141 Junior Girl lockers, and almost 600 lockers in the Women's Locker Room, there are a lot of towels, personal gear and beach clothing and towels passing in/out of the laundry and lockers.

The ladies do the standard cleaning, like clean mirrors, toilets, sinks, showers, vacuum the floor and wipe, wipe, wipe all day long. This is why we always have clean white towels, TP by the roll, tissues by the box, and a roll of plastic bags that won't stop.

Rosita's biggest complaint: the dust that collects on the fans, and summer paddling in the Ala Wai with all the mud that gets trailed into the Junior Girls lockers.

The biggest problem of course, sand in the showers. You can help by rinsing your feet and bag of toys in the tunnel showers and not dragging it into the locker rooms.

The most popular addition to the locker room has been a centrifugal force water extractor that spins bathing suits nearly dry in seconds. People actually stand in line to use this wonderful new piece of equipment. The locker ladies appreciate this because this means no more wet suits in lockers, water puddles on locker floors and damp everything else.

The laundry does all of the personal clothing dropped in the boxes in the locker rooms, the kitchen laundry (but not the dining table linens), and the janitorial and kitchen workers uniforms.

For those who may not know, the locker ladies and laundry staff do provide personal laundry service back to your locker. Simply put your locker number on your towel or clothing, drop it in the bin provided, and the next day it will be back in your locker (somewhere).

We admit, sometimes this doesn't happen, so drop laundry at your own risk. The locker/laundry ladies are very conscientious, but even they can't solve that missing sock syndrome.

The missing socks are all in the laundry room, deep within the lower innards of the Club where there are two monster Speed Queen computer operated washers and three dryers.

If you have any questions, compliments or complaints, handle them thusly:

Compliments--tell the attendant and drop a note in the maildrop in the Lobby so the management knows what/who you're happy about.

Complaints--about no TP, tissue, etc. tell the attendant directly; about faulty equipment, broken things, tell the attendant and drop a note in the maildrop in the Lobby; about cleanliness or chronic problems, drop a note in the Lobby and ask that someone from management call you to discuss the problem,

Things don't get resolved all by themselves. You need to tell, explain, share your concern.





# BOARD BRIEFS

The notes for Board Briefs are taken from the minutes of the Board of Directors meeting on April 25, 1991 and the Executive Committee meeting on May 16, 1991.

Treasurer's Report: Net income for March was \$8,273, a total of \$15,120 below budget and \$12,173 below March, 1990. . . Initiation fees collected were \$80,450 and building fund income was \$18,309 for a net increase in member's equity of \$107,032. The year to date increase in member's equity is \$391,388.

Secretary's Report: 13 members were suspended for 15 days for being three times delinquent.

Manager's Report: DLU informed the OCC that the beach erosion project was classified as a minor project and did not need to be reviewed by the City Council. A public hearing is scheduled within 45 days. A setback variance should be able to be obtained along with the building permit. An environmental impact statement will not be required.

. There is a need to purchase an additional point of sale computer for the Hau Terrace to speed up service. . . New surfboards from Downing Hawaii

should be here by June 1. . . Renovation of the Business Office scheduled for June, including painting, new carpeting, new ceiling and panels and new furniture. . . A new 1991 one-ton Chevy Van was purchased. . Total food and beverage sales were \$265,193. . . Year to date, the Dining Room operation sales of \$522,500 is ahead of budget by 2%. . . Manager is developing a safety recognition program at request of staff. . Employee picnic held on May 6 at Ala Moana Park.

Athletics: The Board recommended an ad hoc committee be appointed to form and adopt a manageable policy regarding special memberships. . . \$1,000 was allocated for the purchase and installation of a cold water drinking fountain in the Fitness Center . . . \$2,250 was released to support 12 OCC members participating in the Molokai to Oahu Kayak Race. . . \$22,100 was allocated to the three Outrigger teams going to the USVBA National Volleyball Championships. . .

Long Range Planning Committee: The Board approved the following members to the committee--Jason Oliver, chair; Jeannie Anderson, Peter Balding, Peter Dillingham, Richard Ferguson, Harold Henderson, Ronald Larsen, Hank Lass, Joseph Miccio, Robert Moore, Donald Onasch, John Pyles, Barbara Stehouwer, John Zabriskie.

Historical Committee: Terry McKinney was approved to serve on the committee.

Admissions & Membership Committee: Membership as of March 31 was 4,155. . . Peter Ehrman was added to the committee.

Special Membership: The Executive Committee recommended an ad hoc committee comprised of the Club Captain and selected past presidents be formed to develop a policy on special membership.

Guest Memberships: The Executive Committee expressed its concern about athletes participating on behalf of the Outrigger while holding "guest membership." The Club Captain was asked to inform respective committees of the Board's policy.

Fitness Center: The Board denied a request by the Fitness Center Committee to allow selected individuals to use the Fitness Center during hours that it's regularly closed.


# **OCC Celebrates Memorial Day**
