Outrigger Wins 6th Straight HCRA Championship

Outrigger Canoe Club wrapped up an undefeated regatta season by winning the Hawaiian Canoe Racing Association State Championship, August 4 at Hanalei, Kauai. This was OCC's sixth straight state title, going back to the 1984 championship race at Hanalei.

OCC scored 182 points to runnerup Hui Nalu's 93, Hanalei's 89, Kailua's 75, Hawaiian's (Maui) 66 and Lokahi's 55 to capture the AAA Division.

Our paddlers won 13 of the 31 events, were second in three, third in four, fourth in two, sixth in two, seventh in one and eighth in two. Points are given for eight places in the state race.

When the season started, Coach Tom McTigue challenged the paddlers to "have fun". And fun was had. We won eight regattas and increased our winning streak to 10 in a row.

Since the start of the 1984 season, we've won 46 regattas, including five OHCRA titles and six HCRA championships, and lost only 10 races.

Marilyn Haine, Carol Wilcox and Keanuenue Rochlen, won their sixth straight state championship. They have won 17 straight races going back to 1988.

The only other undefeated crew in the state this year is our Girls 16s.

The Wilcox family came home from Kauai with four gold medals. Carol was on the winning Senior Masters crew, Darcie on the Freshmen and Eliza on the Girls 18s. Gaylord was on the winning Hanalei Senior Masters crew.

Several paddlers earned two golds-Missy Mowat, Dione Wilbur, Terri Pynchon, Sarah Reilly and Kaili Chun.

Congratulations to all the paddlers and coaches on a great season. Mahalo also to the Canoe Racing Committee, chaired by Chris Kincaid, for making sure that all the details were attended to, from getting the canoes, tent and sandwiches to each regatta without fail, to attending to all the other details most of us take for granted.

Nearly 250 Club members paddled this season, contributing to the success of the paddling program.

Life Member: Josephine Hopkins Garner

Among the women who have distinguished themselves in surfing and swimming competition for the OCC, one name looms prominently—that of Josephine Hopkins Garner.

Josephine was a pioneer in an age when competitive women's sports were virtually nonexistent. Prior to 1917, there was scant competition in the area of women's surfing at the OCC with one exception.

In 1910, Josephine C. Pratt was named winner of a Queen's Surf Surfing event and received a perpetual trophy—the Frank Clark Cup—which was kept at the Club. This competition was repeated for the last time in 1917 and the trophy was awarded to Josephine Hopkins.

Several OCC members, among them Club Captain Dad Center and Judge William T. Rawlins, who was an AAU Director, were working diligently to develop a women's swimming program at the OCC. It was with the encouragement and sponsorship of Judge Rawlins that young Josephine joined the Club.

"I was a frail youngster, tall and skinny.

It was recommended that I take up swimming to build endurance. Each day after classes at Sacred Hearts Academy, I went to the Waikiki home of family friends—the Akana family—who lived near the corner of Ohua and Kalakaua Avenues. There I changed into my swimsuit and swam at Kuhio Beach across the street.

Judge Rawlins, who was scouting for outstanding swimmers, observed her skill and sponsored her for OCC membership in 1917.

Within the year, Josephine had captured several medals, a trophy and the distinction of second place in an AAU meet as an OCC contender. This was her first major competition. Her main competitor was the then-Pacific Coast Champion Dorothy Burns who won first place.

"I was lucky enough to come in second in the 50, 100 and 200," she says and "became the first woman to swim for the OCC in competition outside of the Club. This became the start of a women's swim team.

"I also competed in the 1 1/2 mile swim from the Elks Club to the former OCC (Castle Swim) with 25 or 30 men and finished ahead of many of them. For this, I received a special medal from the Club.

"In 1920, the first women's relay team was formed which included Bea Dowsett. Gerd Hiorth and Ruth Scudder, along with myself."

While Dad Center was at the Olympics in Antwerp with Duke Kahanamoku in 1920, Josephine coached the fledgling women's swim team. Several of these aspirants went on to become champions.

She recalls many more happy events, meets held in Honolulu Harbor, in Hilo Harbor, at the YMCA and the opening of the University of Hawaii swimming pool which was marked by a visit of the Yale Swim Team.

She comments, "They had a swim meet. I won the ladies plunge record and came in second in the 50 and the 100."

According to Gerd Hiorth Blodgett, Josephine was "an excellent open water competitor."

Josephine also excelled in surfing, as evidenced by her winning first place in the Queen's Surf competition in 1917.

"I was under Clair Talt's tutelage who was head coach for the Club. Dad Center would accompany us out to Second Surf. At the former Club, the canoes were kept under the seats which ringed the pavilion. I borrowed a board from Dad Center. Whenever I could, I would surf from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. with time out only for lunch."

Married to the late Gerald Sheldon Garner, who was recruited from the Mainland to become the circulation manager for the Honolulu Advertiser, she is the mother of two sons, Alan and Charles.

The Hopkins' roots run deep in these islands-back to Josephine's great great

granduncle who was a member of "the House of Nobles and Director of the Government Press at Honolulu."

He was a brother of Manley Hopkins, the British Consul of the Sandwich Islands, the author of one of the first histories of Hawaii and the father of the famed English poet, Gerard Manley Hopkins.

She speaks with affection of her grandmother, Angela Kahala Aiwohi Hopkins, and of her grandfather, Charles Louis Hopkins, and of his scholarly pursuits.

The latter was Marshall during King Kalakaua's reign and Territorial Interpreter for the courts for a number of years.

Josephine was hanaied by her maternal grandparents early in life and reared with gentleness as their punahele (favored one).

This distinctively statuesque keiki o ka aina literally glows with a love of her island home, her friends and her associations with the OCC.

Always the engaging conversationalist, she serves on the OCC Historical Committee and is an invaluable resource person because of her familiarity with Hawaii and the OCC.

With an infectious grin, ready wit and sharp precise perception, Josephine is the quintessential OCC Living Treasure. This fact was recognized in 1984 when she was

designated a Life Member because of her contributions to the OCC through the years. Star quality is still evident in her wit, grace, charm and above all, dignity. From the time of her first association with the Club. her dedication and lovalty have been evident. She leaves no doubt about her sentiments regarding the Club:

"My happiest days have been spent at the OCC. I cut my eye teeth at this Club."

Kilipaki Vaughan placed first four times in the Boys (under 21) Division.



Broken teeth or teeth that have been knocked loose or completely out of the mouth are common injuries which, if treated quickly and properly, can result in the teeth being saved.

When a tooth is broken, gently clean the injured area of any dirt or debris. Place an ice compress to reduce swelling and bring the broken piece of tooth and the athlete to a dentist immediately.

When a tooth is knocked out, find it. Hold it by the crown only and clean it by rinsing it under tap water. Do not rub it or scrape it.

If the injured person is alert, replace the tooth in its socket, cover it with a clean gauze and have the person gently bite down to keep it in place. If the person is unable to hold the tooth in place, put the tooth between the cheek and gum, or place it in a container of milk or warm salt-water solution. Do not store the tooth in tap water.

An oral and maxillofacial surgeon should be seen immediately to reimplant

and stabilize the tooth. The sooner the tooth is reimplanted and stabilized the better the chance of saving the tooth.

Lower jaw fractures are the most common. The lower jaw's vulnerable position makes it the second most common facial bone fracture following the nasal bone.

Because of its "U" shape, the lower jaw usually experiences multiple fractures. Double fractures occur over 50% of the time. The break will many times occur along the line of the longest tooth, such as the cuspid, which can weaken the jaw in that area because of its length.

Impacted wisdom teeth (third molars) also contribute to weakening the jaw in their location and are frequently the site of a broken jaw. This is one reason impacted wisdom teeth should be removed prior to participation in contact sports.

The person with a broken jaw will most commonly complain that his/her teeth do not come together properly. Another way to determine if a jaw is broken is by gently placing your thumb on the person's chin and your fingers underneath the jaw bone and feeling for any irregularities.

Upper jaw fractures are less common. Most are limited to the lower portion of the upper jaw, but can involve the nasal area and cheekbones. The most obvious sign of an upper jaw fracture is distortion of normal facial symmetry and bleeding from the nose.

The upper jaw may be visibly mobile and the person will also complain that his teeth do not properly come together. In more severe cases, the face may appear flattened. Gently pressing on the upper teeth or palate may cause movement of the upper jaw, indicating a fracture.

In all cases, immobilize the jaw by making a temporary splint out of a towel or rag. Place the cloth beneath the jaw and tie it on top of the person's head. Request and obtain immediate treatment by an oral and Maxillofacial Surgeon.



Outrigger Wins OHCRA Championship

Outrigger Canoe Club won its sixth straight OHCRA Oahu Championship on July 22 at Keehi Lagoon, outscoring second place Hui Nalu by 50 points.

OCC won 17 events and was second in five to score 103 points to runnerup Hui Nalu's 53. Kailua was third with 45. This was the most points ever scored in the 12 year history of the OHCRA Oahu Championships.

Outrigger's Girl's 16s and its Senior Masters Women remained undefeated for the season, while OCC's Senior Men continued their dominance of the premiere race by winning that event for the eighth year in a row.

The Girl's 18s set a new meet record by covering the 1/2-mile course in 4:31.34, shaving four seconds off the previous mark.

Walter Guild added his 11th and 12th gold medals in the 12-year history of the Oahu Championships, edging out Bill Bright, who now has 11. They lead OHCRA in gold medals.

Jr. 'Rigger CeeCee Sheehan brought her total Oahu Championship gold medals to six. She's won as a 13, 14, 16 (twice) and 18 (twice).

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ODKF Is Unique Among Givers, Focusing on Hawaii Athletes, Scholars

The Outrigger Canoe Club is headquarters of one of the nation's most unique and special philanthropic institutions: the Outrigger Duke Kahanamoku Foundation.

As the month-long celebration of Duke's 100th birthday winds down, Foundation President Tom Lalakea is spearheading a new effort to make the ODKF more visible throughout Oahu, and to heighten awareness of its programs among members of the OCC.

The ODKF is the successor organization of two other foundations. The Duke Kahanamoku Foundation was founded in 1963, during the latter years of Duke's life. A group of his friends sought to honor his many contributions to the Hawaiian Islands by establishing a vehicle for awarding scholarships to deserving students who demonstrated proficiency in sports of traditional interest to the islands.

And in 1980, the Outrigger Canoe Club Foundation was created to formalize a program of grants for participants in sports. Representatives of the two foundations met in 1986 to explore means by which both could do a more effective job of fulfilling their respective missions. The result was a merger, and the creation of the ODKF.

In 1990, the Foundation has awarded nine scholarships totalling \$10,000 and a total of \$3,000 in grants to enable six athletes to continue their training, to compete nationally, and to prepare for international competition.

As President Tom Lalakea noted, "There is no other organization that supports Hawaii scholar-athletes in the manner we do. We wish to enable them to compete at the highest levels—to provide them the training opportunities and the travel and other resources necessary to enter international competitions.

"Our objective is to help a number of young people in the hope that some of them may someday emulate Duke Kahanamoku's remarkable accomplishments.

ODKF Vice President Elia Long is chair of the Foundation's Development Committee. "Our objective is to increase the ODKF's endowment from its present level or about \$300,000 to \$1 million over the next few years," he reports.

"When we have achieved that level of funding, we will be able to make significant annual awards to both scholars and athletes. The conclusion of the celebration of Duke's 100th birthday is a logical time for us to provide more focus to our fund raising and we're looking forward to encouraging many individuals, both within and without the OCC, to help us achieve our objectives."

Foundation activities will increase on many fronts, and as a result, OCC Director Gerry DeBenedetti has been appointed Development Coordinator of the ODKF. This part-time position will involve staffing the Board's fundraising and related programs and helping increase the institution's visibility.

President Lalakea emphasizes that all residents of the State, the community atlarge, as well as the OCC family, are eligible to apply for financial assistance.

"Our Board and the Athletic Grants

Committee take their responsibilities very seriously," he said. "We encourage any individual to apply for assistance who believes that financial support from the ODKF can enhance his/her athletic/scholarship ability and thus bring increased recognition to all the athletes of Hawaii.

"Applications can be obtained at the OCC offices, and we assure everyone that we will give their requests our most serious consideration."

Rab Guild is Board liaison to the Grants Committee; he is prepared to answer any questions applicants or others may have.

OCC members will receive information regarding the Foundation's programs and aspirations on a regular basis, and later this fall, an even more systematic effort will begin to encourage all members to support the institution.





'Do We Have as Much Sense as a Goose?'

OCC's Best Chefs

This story by Todd H. Fast Sr. in the Seattle Rotary Invocation, January 13, 1988, was told by Head Canoe Racing Coach Tom McTigue to paddlers at the Macfarlane Regatta Breakfast on the 4th of July.

It had a great message and we thought we'd share it with all of our Outrigger readers.

"This spring when you see geese heading back north for the summer flying along in a "V" formation, you might be interested in knowing what scientists have discovered about why they fly that way. It has been learned that as each bird flaps its wings, it creates an uplift for the bird immediately following.

"By flying in a "V" formation, the whole flock adds at least 71% greater flying range than if each bird flew on its own.

BASIC TRUTH #1: PEOPLE WHO SHARE A COMMON DIRECTION AND SENSE OF COMMUNITY CAN GET WHERE THEY ARE GOING QUICKER AND EASIER BECAUSE THEY ARE TRAVELING ON THE THRUST OF ONE ANOTHER.

"Whenever a goose falls out of formation, it suddenly feels the drag and resistance of trying to go it alone and quickly gets back into formation to take advantage of the lifting power of the bird immediately in front.

BASIC TRUTH #2: IF WE HAVE AS MUCH SENSE AS A GOOSE, WE WILL STAY IN FORMATION WITH THOSE WHO ARE HEADED THE SAME WAY WE ARE GOING.

When the lead goose get tired, he rotates back in the wing and another goose flies point.

BASIC TRUTH #3: IT PAYS TO TAKE TURNS DOING HARD JOBS WITH PEOPLE OR WITH GEESE FLYING NORTH.

The geese honk from behind to encourage those up front to keep up their speed.

BASIC TRUTH #4: WE NEED TO BE CAREFUL WHAT WE SAY WHEN WE HONK FROM BEHIND.

Finally, when a goose gets sick or is wounded by gun shots and falls out, two geese fall out of formation and follow him down to help and protect him. They stay with him until he is either able to fly or until he is dead, and then they launch out on their own or with another formation to catch up with their group.

FINAL TRUTH: IF WE HAVE THE SENSE OF A GOOSE WE WILL STAND BY EACH OTHER LIKE THAT.

Artichoke Fritata

- 1. Saute 1 onion, chopped fine in oil from artichoke heart jar. When transparent drain.
- 2. Add 4 eggs beaten, 20-24 crushed crackers, 1/2 pound sharp grated Cheddar Cheese, 2 jars marinated artichoke hearts, drained and chopped fine, and salt and pepper to taste.
- 3. Place in 9-inch square pan. Bake at 325 degrees for 30 to 40 minutes. Cut in squares when cool and reheat to serve.

This recipe may be frozen. You may want to add Italian sausage for a different taste.

Five projects have received Board approval and funding. They are:

- Beach erosion. Working drawings are nearing completion and will go to bid.
- Telephone system to be installed September 10.
- Koko Terrace flooring tile has been ordered and should arrive in September.
- Computer system implementation and training is scheduled for October and will be in operation by November 1.
- Snack Shop renovation (design phase) conceptual sketch to be presented to B&G Committee.

Total cost for the five projects is \$110,551. The manager has arranged for an employee management development training program through the Hawaiian Educational Council. The six classes, at two hours each, began in August and continue through November.

A new surfboard locker policy has been adopted. "No member will be allowed to rent more than one surfboard locker if there is a waiting list for surfboard lockers. If there is no waiting list, members will be allowed to rent additional lockers until they are needed by other members."

Comeback funds were approved to send six paddling crews to the Kona race Labor Day weekend. In addition, one crew was sent to the Catalina Race in Newport Beach, California in August.

- Eight members were suspended for 15 days due to three times delinquent.
 Present membership count is 4,073.
