

## Come Celebrate the Duke's 100th Birthday

Hawaii will celebrate the 100th birthday of longtime OCC member Duke Paoa Kahanamoku with a variety of activities this month.

The Outrigger Duke Kahanamoku Foundation will sponsor the Duke Kahanamoku Centennial Boat Day Ball on August 24 at the Hilton Hawaiian Village Coral Ballroom.

A benefit for the ODKF, the ball will feature a nostalgic voyage to the 30s, complete with a dockside sendoff, the Captain's Dinner and dancing in the Grand Salon.

Also on August 24, a dedication will be held for the new Duke Kahanamoku Statue at Kuhio Beach Park in Waikiki.

Duke was born on August 24, 1890 and raised in Waikiki as a child of the sea. Years of ocean swimming, surfing, body-surfing and canoeing honed Duke into a superb waterman.

At the age of 20, Duke burst into national prominence when he unofficially broke the world's record in the 50 and 100 yard freestyle. One year later, in 1912, he smashed the 100 meter freestyle record in the Stockholm Olympic Games and won his first gold medal.

Duke returned home amid national acclaim and with countless requests to demonstrate his new stroke. The stroke looked like the Australian crawl, but it differed in one important respect: instead of using a "flutter kick" to keep his legs near the surface of the water, Duke used his feet in a powerful up and down kick which drove him ahead much like the stern paddle wheel of an old river steamer.

Duke began competing in national and international meets demonstrating his new swimming technique and the art of surfing. He also taught water safety methods and inaugurated the use of the surfboard for lifesaving.

He introduced surfing in Europe, Australia and the Eastern Seaboard of the United States. Duke is also recognized as the first person to surf both coasts of North America, and today, is known as the "Father of Modern Surfing."

The 1916 Olympics were called off because of conditions in war-torn Europe, so Duke, at 26, was denied what many thought might be his last chance to win new laurels as a competitive swimmer.



But in 1920, Duke and some other Hawaiian athletes joined the American Olympic Team to compete in the Antwerp Olympics where Duke retained his title as the world's fastest swimmer by winning gold medals in the 100-meter freestyle and 800meter relay.

Duke joined the Outrigger Canoe Club in 1917 but did not enter the Olympics to represent the Club because the Club had no funds at the time to help defray his travel expenses.

In 1922, Duke signed a five-year contract to star in several upcoming movies, but he found Hollywood not to his liking. In 1928, illness prevented Duke from competing in the Amsterdam Olympics, but four years later, at the age of 42, he was a member of the U.S. Water Polo Team in the Los Angeles Olympics.

In an amazing replay of his former glory, Duke swam the 100 meter freestyle in a trial meet in 59.8 seconds bettering his 1912 and 1920 Olympic performances. This feat capped Duke's sensational Olympic career and he retired enjoying one of the longest athletic pursuits in Olympic history.

Back in Honolulu, Duke was more than ready to return to the life that he loved, swimming and surfing and at the same time, helping aspiring youngsters around the OCC to improve their skills in surfing, swimming and canoe paddling.

Duke's long love affair with the sea never ended. He remained a long-board surfer through the age of 50. At 60, he was Waikiki's best canoe steersman and guided OCC to seven straight state championships. He was elected Sheriff of the City and County of Honolulu in 1935 and later became Ambassador-at-Large, an office he held until his death on January 22, 1968 at the age of 78.

### **Motorcyclists Enter Mauna Kea 200**

Once again, the OCC motorcycle team ventured to the seemingly prehistoric slopes of the Big Island for the 15th Annual Mauna Kea 200 Enduro, May 26-27.

This is a race which pits man and motorcycle against the clock and the treacherous terrain of the ever changing Big Island.

Starting at sea level in Hilo and winding its way circuitously up to the top of Mauna Kea and back down again, the riders are faced with a wide diversity of environments.

The lower regions of the course include dense rain forests with saturated jeep and mule trails providing quick-sand like mud holes and gaping water crossings. Herein lie log jumps, rut traverses, limb duckings and the infamous Koi Pond.

After the steamy depths of the jungle, speeds increase over a section called Planter's Road. This fast section roller coasters over moss glazed rocks and shale.

Once past this section, the riders face consecutive lava crossings over fresh, jagged flows. One fall and you could be out of it.

On through the foggy elevations, the course climbs up to the crater where vegetation thins out until there is nothing but barren, wind swept and snow topped cinder cones speckled with the fallout of moonstones and over volcanic spews.

At this point, the air is cold and biting and breathing is difficult. Ironically, this is the most coveted part of the race. The majesty of The Mountain is so incredible that the race becomes insignificant. Win, lose or draw, the trip across the crater makes it all worthwhile.

The crew for this year's event had Walter Guild, Brant Ackerman, Brenton Block and Matt Kresser making the assault, while Al Serafin, Mark Kennedy, John Beaumont and Aaron Ackerman provided the backup and support.

Tiare Finney, alias "Mama Moto", a legend amongst local riders because of her pit-side prowess, surprised the troops with a finish line appearance as well.

Day one ended with Matt Kresser and Walter Guild each at 12 points and firmly in the top 10. Brant was forced to pull out because of an injury and Brenton, though completing the ride, was out of the running because of time consuming mechanical difficulties.

The speeds on day two picked up and so did the casualties. The infamous Koi Pond trail took its toll on many riders including

Walter who suffered a double-drowning and was forced to play catch up for the remainder of the race. His point total was 44, good enough for fourth in his division.

Matt finished with 24 points and a ninth overall standing. The competition this year was stronger than ever with 125 entrants. Riders from all over the world were entered, making it a truly international event. Word has it that ESPN will cover the event next year, and you can bet that OCC will be there, ready to go.





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### AROUND THE CLUB

At the June 28 board meeting, there were some policies adopted which you should be aware of. They are as follows:

#### **Locker Decals**

The placement of decals or stickers will no longer be allowed on the exterior of lockers in all the Club's locker rooms. You may place them on the interior if you so desire.

### No Cigarette Sales

Cigarettes will no longer be sold in the Club effective with the depletion of our inventory.

I would also remind you that there are areas of the Club where smoking is not permitted. They are the Lobby, the Locker Rooms, Board Room, Business and Executive Offices.

Smoking on the Club premises by persons under the age of 18 is prohibited. Cigar smoking is prohibited in the Dining Room and the Bar,

#### **Fitness Center**

The Board also revised a policy pertaining to music in the Club's Fitness Center. The previous policy prohibited music of any kind. The amended policy permits music with procedures to control music selection and volume.

The Board also approved funding for the Fitness Center's music system in the amount of \$300.

The Board also approved the Fitness Center's survey form. The form will be available in the Fitness Center so that the committee can better understand the needs of our members who use the facility.

#### Telecommunications System

After nearly two years of study, review, recommendations and evaluations, I am pleased to announce that we have finally come to a decision with respect to the Club's telecommunication system.

Our current system, a GTE 120, was installed back in 1978. I am told it is only

one of two such systems currently in use in the state.

The Club owns the main attendant console and the control panel. The 33 instruments located throughout the Club are rented from Hawaiian Tel on a month-tomonth basis. In addition we have a month to month maintenance agreement for our main console and our PBX.

We have serious concerns about the continued dependability of our present system. Given the frequency and duration of our down time and the difficulty of obtaining replacement parts, it was imperative that we take the steps necessary to provide a new system.

The Board reviewed proposals from GTE Hawaiian Tel, Tel-A-Com Hawaii and AT&T and elected to receive the proposal from AT&T.

The number one priority in the selection process with myself and the Board was providing a system which would best serve the members and or course provide the Club with the best value for its dollar. We believe AT&T's system will accomplish this.

We expect the new system to be installed and fully operational by this September. I am sure you'll be pleased as the new system provides many features that were not previously available on our present system.

#### New Koko Tile

Also approved at the June Board meeting, was funding for and selection of, tile flooring for Koko Terrace. We expect installation to take place some time in August.

The tile selection recommended by our Building and Grounds Committee, with concurrence of the Architectural Review Committee, is in keeping with the review of all the Club's hard surfaces and recommendations.

#### **New Club Computer**

And lastly, the Board approved funding

for our new computer system. Our current Club computer was purchased in 1981 and has an estimated useful life of five years.

Our new computer system will increase reliability, be faster and have greater capabilities. Both the hardware (equipment) and software (programs that run on the equipment) will be replaced.

We decided to include in the new system point of sale capabilities. A point of sale system captures information as it is entered by the server. A good point of sale system will provide many advances over our current system.

The hardware selected was an IBM System 36. The software is by Watson Steach and Company. The decision on our point of sale system will be made at a later date.

We are planning to install the back office system as soon as possible and once we are certain that it's running smoothly, incorporate the point of service system. If all goes as expected the point of sale system should be in place by December or January.

All of the capital improvement projects are within the approved capital improvement budget for the current fiscal year.

#### 4th of July

This year's July 4 party was, I believe, one of the best ever. I have received many favorable comments on the policies and controls implemented over the past few years.

As a result, we are seeing many more members participating in the after-regatta festivities here at the Club. I want to thank you for your cooperation.

I also want to thank our hard working staff. July 4 is a long day with a lot of activities and we simply could not do it without the support of the entire staff. I want to thank them all for a job well done.







### **OCC's Best Chefs**

This is Shawn Moynahan's favorite addition to any mega party, especially after winning a paddling regatta! It's a great robust Italian pupu.

#### Bruschetta

4 to 5 tomatoes (about 1 3/4 pounds)
2 tablespoons minced garlic
1 small onion minced (about 1/2 cup)
1 cup fresh basil leaves
1 teaspoon fresh lemon juice
Salt and coarsely ground black pepper, to taste
1/3 cup plus 1/4 cup extralight olive oil (Bertolli's)
4 cloves garlic, slivered
8 soft french bread rolls

- 1. Cut tomatoes into 1/4 inch dice and place in a bowl. Toss with minced garlic and onion.
- 2. Chop basil coarsely and add to tomatoes, along with lemon juice, salt and pepper and 1/3 cup olive oil. Set aside.
- 3. Heat 1/4 cup olive oil in a small skillet. Saute slivered garlic until golden, 2 to 3 minutes. Discard garlic and reserve oil.
- 4. Cut each french roll in half and toast under the broiler until golden. Arrange toasted halves on a serving platter. Brush garlic-flavored oil over each slice, spoon tomato mixture over the bread and serve immediately.

Serves 8 as an appetizer.

The 1990 grantees are able to participate in national and international athletic competition, continue their education and be winners in the Hawaiian tradition.

Recipients of \$500 grants were:

Harry Antipala of Kauai is a 20-yearold bodyboarder with ambitions to travel around the world. In the past, he was competitive in U.S. and state surfing championships. He now represents the Kauai Classic team and wants to be a professional world champion bodyboarder.

Ralen Chang, a 1990 Kamehameha High School graduate from Pearl City, is a member of the Hawaii Canoe/Kayak team with plans to compete in Olympic flatwater kayaking. In 1989, he received a gold and two bronze medals in the Junior National Flatwater Kayaking Championships in Indiana. He'll compete there again in 1990.

Malia Kamisugi's goal is the 1992 Olympics in Barcelona, Spain. She trains as a member of the Hawaii Canoe/Kayak team. Ranked on the National A team of the Junior World Championships, she is described as one of the "most outstanding young water sportswomen in Hawaii."

Nalu Kukea is also a member of the Hawaii Canoe/Kayak team. He began flatwater kayaking in 1988 and participated in the 1989 National Championships as the top junior man in the country. He is a 1989 graduate of Kamehameha Schools and is now attending college at UC Irvine.

Billy Robello of Honolulu is a member

of the Hui Nalu Canoe Club. He was a grantee in 1989, using the ODKF funding for transportation to Lake Placid, N.Y. the site of the U.S. Olympic Training Center. He is ranked 7th in the nation in 500 meter kayak singles and is training for the 1992 Olympics.

Mu Togoai is 18 years old, born in Samoa, and just graduated from Punahou School. His grant financed his trip to California to compete in the Golden West Invitation Track and Field Meet. He holds state discus and shot put records. He will attend the University of Arizona in September.

The foundation has awarded \$10,000 in scholarships to student/athletes for the 1990-91 school year.

New recipients of \$1,000 to \$1,500 are: Kelly Ah Chick was a four year varsity swimmer at Kailua High School. She is now a freshman attending Loyola Marymount University in California, studying communications.


